Dr. W. A. Sullivan Gives Advice to Hog Growers.

FOUR OUTBREAKS IN TWIN FALLS COUNTY THIS WEEK

Prompt Action Should be Taken to Satisfy Inspector in Charge of Twin Falls, Who Will Act at Once.

This article is written with the object in view of better acquainting all farmers of the hog cholera condition that exists in various localities within the territory that the bureau of animal industry in carrying on hog cholera control work, with the use of free anti-toxins serum and treatment to the infected herds.

During the past week ending May 29th five outbreaks of hog cholera occurred within Twin Falls county. The outbreaks were of the following nature: One at the farm of Mr. J. W. Smith, near the town of Twin Falls, where the disease was first observed.

The source of infection on the premises of Mr. George L. Coleman, near the town of Caldwell, at the time of investigation four hogs were found in a very advanced stage of the disease and were destroyed.

IDAHO GRADUATES PLACED

Majority of Agricultural Classes Have Definite Plans.

Selection from "Twin Falls" by J. H. Hildings. Dean of the College of Agriculture, Moscow, demonstrates the fact that the type of young men now being trained in the practical courses of our state university are in demand in advance of the supply. Prof. Hildings writes of the class graduating this June as follows:

"Four weeks in advance of commencement of the fifteen graduates of the 1915 class of the College of Agriculture of the University of Idaho have made permanent plans for employment. The calls upon Idaho have been such that two men of this class are already at work and another leaves within a week.

Seven of the nine mentioned have gone or will go to other agricultural management or agricultural improvement and development work in the Northwest, where the youthful vigor, earnestness and skill of these trained men will be of great value. Three of the seven, twenty per cent of the entire graduating class of the year go directly into Idaho farms.

One man goes to the University of Illinois as a post graduate student, having received appointment to scholarship and having had his work in agriculture and related lines done at Idaho recently by the University of Illinois on the work presented by graduates of the larger universities of America. Another man goes to the United States Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C.

The following is the list of men who have made permanent plans: J. A. Lockhart, of Watto, South Dakota, is already at work as field man for the division of dairying, U. S. Department of Agriculture, working principally in Idaho and Washington.

S. L. Deanning, of Moscow, Idaho, has just gone to take charge of one of the two large creameries at North Yakima, Wash. A skilled and trained man has been employed by this concern that there may come from the factory a higher grade and more uniform product.

Ray Cammack, of Wendell, Idaho, has been offered two positions recently—one, the management of a cheese factory in Chautauque, Idaho, and the other an appointment as assistant in cheesemaking, Division of Dairying, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

H. E. Lattie, of Payette, Idaho, has been appointed as bookkeeper and assistant in the live-stock and general agricultural work on the 1500 acre Copper and Marco ranch at Stockton, Alberta, Canada.

F. H. Laffren, of Couer d'Alene, Idaho, has been appointed superintendent of the University of Idaho. This farm is to be developed as the experimental and demonstration farm of the cut-over-woodlands of central and northern Idaho. Live stock work will be made prominent in the development of the farm.

J. E. Nordby, of Genesee, Idaho, has been awarded a scholarship in animal husbandry at the University of Illinois at Urbana. Mr. Nordby will do advanced work in Animal Husbandry and incidentally study the operation in the control of hog cholera within the Twin Falls district. Mr. Nordby will go back to his father's farming lands near Nez Perce immediately after commencement to assist in making extensions and improvements in the handling of live stock and in the general farm practice.

Mr. Johnson plans to develop an improved live stock farm, building in pure bred herds.

Edwin Waters, of Nez Perce, Idaho, will go back to his father's farming lands near Nez Perce immediately after commencement to assist in making extensions and improvements in the handling of live stock and in the general farm practice.

Edwin Waters, of Moscow, Idaho, is already laying the foundation for live stock herds on his father's large farm near Moscow.

In addition to Mr. Johnson, Carl Ekler was a member of the 1915 class in agriculture, but was compelled to discontinue his work at the university at holidays the past winter on account of illness in his family which resulted in the death of his mother. He plans to complete his course next year. Both these young men have maintained a high standard of excellence in the school and both are graduates of the local high school.

erly cared for an average of 90 out of every 100 hogs can be saved.

"Hog cholera appears in your herd or in your neighbor's please notify the bureau of animal industry, office at Twin Falls in the county court house, telephone 712. We need this information to save your hogs and reduce the loss in your county. All farmers' attention is again directed to the fact that the anthrax cholera serum and treatment given to the hogs at the local stock show, but to the nearest extent, let it be further understood that there are no charges made for any investigation of any sort of hog cholera, there is no charge of any part of the farmers that the hogs are becoming infected with hog cholera. Do not delay in notifying the government officer immediately. Do not always rely on your neighbors' conveying this information to the government officer, but go to the nearest office and see that the information gets to the clerk in charge of the government office at once. Please always state the number of hogs in your herd and give the township, range and section in which your hogs are located and a prompt investigation will be made.

Delays in informing the government office of any outbreak of cholera tend not only to increase your loss but on danger the disease disseminating to your neighbors' herd. I shall be pleased to call at farmers' when they are located in Twin Falls, in call at our new quarters on the main floor of the court house so they may better acquaint themselves with our methods of hog cholera control work and receive an interesting farmers' bulletin on hog cholera.

SETTLERS MAY FILE SUIT

Propose To Charge Mismanagement Against Directors of Canal Co.

An action against the Salmon River Canal company, alleging improper expenditures and charged with mismanagement in other respects and to secure an accounting and appointment of receiver for that company is being considered by the directors of the Salmon River Settlers' association, and their attorneys have been instructed to investigate the matter with the idea of determining the feasibility of such a course.

The meeting of the directors held in Twin Falls Tuesday afternoon was not attended by a quorum because of the rain, which kept some of the board living in the southern part of the tract from being present.

While no decision has as yet been announced in the suit filed in the Federal Court early this spring, it is thought that the suggested action will cover some matters not included in the Federal suit.

If the action succeeds, the control of the canal company will be taken away from the Twin Falls-Salmon River Land and Water company, and placed in the hands of an officer of the court and an accounting had of all collections made by that company.
