In its new undertaking which will be pushed with vigor after January 1, 1916, when the anti-alcohol prohibition law goes into effect, the firm will be known as the Overland Beverage Company. Mr. Jacob Lockman, the present owner, will continue as head of the business and the employees now working for the firm will be retained.
Pure apple cider is another product which Mr. Lockman plans to make under the changed conditions. He will install a large apple grinding mill and a press, hoping to fill from 3000 to 4000 barrels with juice from Nampa valley apples this fall.
Manufacturers of the new enterprise who wish to store apples and other fruit, enough to last through the winter, should look into the new facilities for 15,000 boxes of apples. After the first of the year additional space, sufficient for 50,000 boxes will be provided. Not only fruit but all kinds of produce requiring refrigeration will be accepted-Nampa Leader.

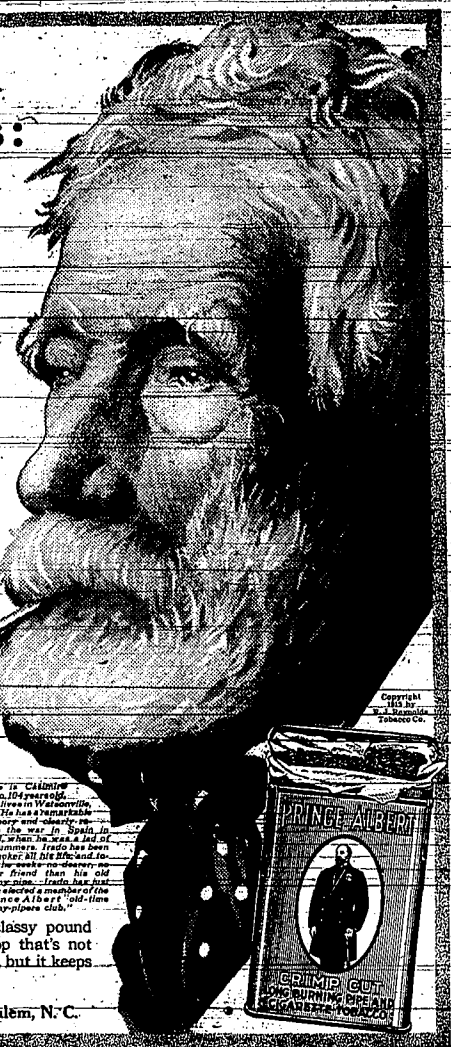
