WHO IS THE VICTOR?

The Times is delighted that the troublesome waterworks question is in a way to be settled by purchase instead of long and costly legal procedure. But it will not come amies to set forth the facts in the case so that the voters may know just what is contained in the agreement made by the City Council and the Waterworks company. Eighty thousand dollars for the plant to be taken over at the end of six months looks like a concession on the part of the waterworks company, but when the real facts are carefully analyzed by the voters, they will find that Mr. Critchlow of the waterworks company, has gained over 200 points for which he contended the concession is merely that of the city meeting practically the first offer of \$250,000 for the plant. The city council this was scornfully rejected and an offer of sixty thousand dollars in bonds tendered the company. In six months however, Mr. Critchlow will sell at eighty thousand dollars. He loses nothing by the deal. During the past thirty days that have elapsed since the offer of Critchlow expired, the net returns of the water company approximated \$1600. In the six months, time in which the company has to turn over the plant, it will take out at least \$12,000.00. It will be possible for the reason that all kinds of upkeep or improvements will be avoided. Two men will run the system during that time where four are usually employed. If that six

months the company will not have much business, and the balance of the money taken in will be added to the eighty thousand paid by the city. Totaled up this will bring the sum actually accruing to Mr. Critchlow and his associates a profit \$93,500 or one thousand dollars more than his first offer so scornfully rejected by the majority of the city council. It is a barren victory for the city as far as concessions are concerned, yet a victory for the people in that it gives them the opportunity of a municipal system.

The Times believed that the \$250,000 offer was more than the actual value but contended that was the only way out and the cheapest. The stand taken by Mayor Sweigley and Councilman Parrott is also confirmed by the action of the city council taken Monday unanimously confirmed by those who did not get first agree. The water company will soon be out of the way and it is up to the citizens to proceed cautiously in deciding on the best system for the city. It is a time when all the people should get together and work intelligently toward the solution of a hard problem.

CHICAGO BEEF BARONS VERSUS THE BRITISH CROWN

Seven hundred years have elapsed since King John gave way to the barons at Runnymede, and in this interim the British Crown has increased in power so largely that now it defies the beef-barons of Chicago, whose rate has endeavored unshaken the efforts of more than one Administration at Washington. Our Government is not developed a part in the matter, however for the British seizure of American meat is characterized by the London Times as "a commitment to American Jurisdiction," since the doctrine of "continuous voyage," under which the ruling was made, was promulgated by the American courts during the Civil War. But this complicity does not seem to please our newspapers. Those criticisms of the decision range from denunciations of it as "a heinous outrage," and "robbery by price-cutting" to dispassionate analyses and predictions that it will be reversed on appeal. Some editors, however, share the view of the Wall Street Journal, which sees no ground for questioning the British court's interpretation of the law, and remarks that "if its findings are correct, the decision would be approved even in an American court." Meanwhile, those most immediately concerned—the Chicago packing companies of Morris, Armour,

Hammond, Swift, and Sulzberger—intend to appeal the case before the British Privy Council, which meets this month. "Should this appeal fail," said a representative of these packers to a correspondent of the New York Sun, "then it will be necessary for the American State Department to conduct diplomatic relations concerning our products; and if this Government is unable to agree it will probably be necessary to appoint an international commission." In this connection it is interesting to recall that Dr. Dumba in one of his intercepted letters, quotes a purveyor of the Armour firm saying that the packers still held in reserve a trump-card, namely, "a refusal to export meat to England under any circumstances." While this controversy as the New York Journal of Commerce remarks, "is not so serious a matter as the difference over German submarine operations," it is nevertheless "not calculated to strengthen friendly relations with Great Britain."

The news as gathered from press dispatches, are as follows: In November, 1914, four Scandinavian steamships bound from American cargoes, including tinned meats, bacon, and rubber, were seized in transit by the British authorities. After numerous delays the case of these shipments came before a British price-court, and on September 16, nearly a year after their seizure, the bulk of their cargoes was declared forfeited to the Crown on the ground that its real destination was Germany, where it was to be used by the Army and Navy. In handing down his decision Sir Samuel Evans, president of the court, complained of the bad faith of American shippers and declared that "belittlement are entitled to expect from neutrals a 'fair' course of conduct." As evidence that the goods seized were for German consumption he pointed to the sudden and enormous increase in the number of such shipments to Scandinavia immediately after the outbreak of the war. These four ships when captured, he said were carrying more than thirteen times as much meat to Copenhagen as under normal conditions would be taken to that port. To rule otherwise than that the meat was for German consumption, he said, would be "to allow one's eyes to be blinded by theories and technicalities." In a statement given to the press by the attorneys of the Chicago packers we read:

"England's confiscation of four cargoes of American meat valued at \$2,600,000 and the holding of thirty other cargoes valued at \$12,500,000, as announced in press dispatches, are not justified by the facts of the case of international law. It can only be construed as another step in England's policy to interfere with the trade of American citizens with the citizens of neutral countries.

"All these shipments were destined neutral countries, and the ships' papers at the time of their seizure clearly showed such fact. They were not destined to or for the enemy of Great Britain, and upon the trial of the case no evidence showing they were destined to such enemy of Great Britain was adduced and none could have been. This makes necessary further presentation of stronger protests to the Department of State for an equitable adjustment of the claim."

"From the start these seizures have been arbitrary and unwarranted, and in spite of vigorous protests of our State Department to the representatives of Great Britain."

"It would appear from the brief dispatches that the court bases its right to seize these shipments on the theory that the amount of products being shipped to Denmark in these neutral ships is in excess of quantities received prior to the declaration of war. These neutral countries received large quantities of these products through German ports prior to the war and through other sources of supply which the war cut off. That these countries wanted more of our products than before furnished no justification for such seizure."—Literary Digest.

CALIFORNIA'S SECRET

The Place For Poor Farmer Declares Writer.

To the Editor of the Pioneer Press: "All is not gold that glitters" may truthfully apply to the state of California.

Who has not read and delighted in the beautifully photographed booklets sent out by the California land agents to lure the unwary?

And, also, how many have snapped at the shining bait and have gone to the land of promise only to find the harsh words being told about this nefarious swindle?

Therefore, after three years of personal experience and close observation, we would like to suggest that California be known to warn away the new settler, to let him know that California is for the millionaire only.

Unfortunately, one cannot eat either rhapsody or scenery, much less live on them, and a man with but a few thousand dollars would soon starve in California. What chance, then, for a poor farmer?

In the great Sacramento valley the land is subject to the most disastrous floods, which come surely as fate, at least every third year, overwhelming, swamping everything, even the flowers and the young fruit trees.

The water stands twenty-five feet deep, reaching to the very roofs of homes and covering the great stretch of land like one vast sea, the waves rolling and heaving restlessly, snatching one building after another from its foundation to dash it into a thousand pieces.

These floods remain on the land for six or seven months, preventing the possibility of a crop for that year. And yet they will tell you there is a "reclamation board" which sees that the levees along the river banks are built so high that "there is no longer danger of flood."

You are assessed from \$25 to \$50 an acre, annual "reclamation tax" and you have your floods just the same.

Last winter there had been an unusual fall of snow in the mountains and in February when that snow melted, swelled the rivers to raging torrents which fairly laughed at the levees considered so all-sufficient by the reclamation board.

That was an open secret advertised with a chuckle by old settlers. For, you must know, no matter that the state may say, the fact remains (as new settlers have discovered to their sorrow) that the old Californian does not extend a glad hand of welcome to the intruding low settler.

This attitude toward the small buyers of the present day; those many small items which go to make up comfort; this reclamation, which does not reclaim, yet which taxes so heavily; none of these things is mentioned by the California real estate men.

They would to dream, think he has found the realization of his dreams, and with glowing heart crosses the continent to this "land of golden delight" to discover too late that "all is not gold that glitters" for a verity.

Then, between hurricanes, sandstorms and sun-baked desert land, which requires a fortune for the irrigation absolutely demanded in order to make it produce, the new settler goes down into the black depths of utter despair.

DUMBA RECALLED

Baron Burlan, Foreign Minister, Announces That Aedon Is Placid.

Washington — Dr. Constantin T. Dumba, Austrian minister to the United States, formally has been recalled by his government, and the state department is arranging with the British and French embassies here for safe conduct on a steamer sailing from New York October 5.

This announcement was made Tuesday by Acting Secretary Polk after receipt of a cablegram from Ambassador Penfield at Vienna, which reported a conversation with Austrian officials, and a message from Dr. Dumba asking safe conduct in accordance with instructions from his government.

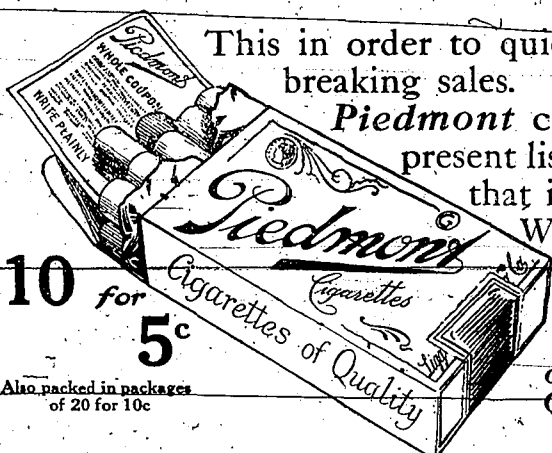

No Leave of Absence.

Ambassador Penfield, however, was instructed to make clear informally to the Austrian foreign office that Dr. Dumba's official relations with this government must be severed and that "leave of absence" would not be satisfactory.

Baron Burlan, the Austrian foreign minister, then sent instructions to Ambassador Dumba to return to Vienna and at the same time told Mr. Penfield the recall is, as a matter of course, final.

Verified at Vienna.

A record of this conversation was shown to Baron Burlan and verified before being transmitted by Ambassador Penfield, and when the state department received it, the copy was sent to Dr. Dumba for his information.

It had been thought at first a formal answer to the note asking for the recall of Dr. Dumba on account of his plans for interfering with American munitions plants might be waited before safe conduct was obtained, but the assurance of the Austrian foreign minister, even though given in conversation, was regarded as sufficient, because it later officially was verified by him and made a matter of record between the two governments.

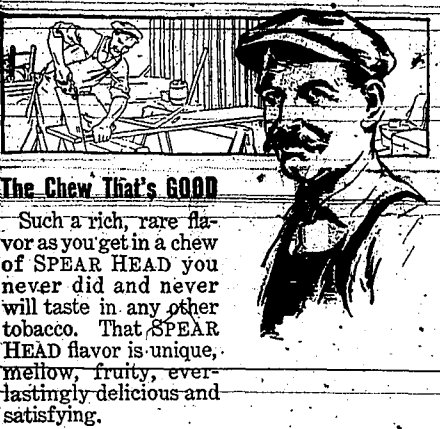

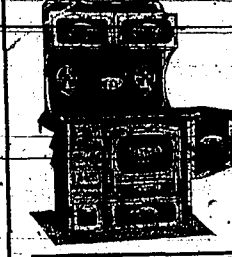

FEDERAL GAME LAWS FOR 1915

A Summary of the Provisions Relating to Seasons, Limits, and Licenses.

The present bulletin, containing the history, a summary of the game laws of the United States and Canada, has been prepared on the same general plan as those issued last year and 1912. It includes a summary of the more important features of the new legislation, a brief synopsis of the new game laws and a series of tables showing the provisions relating to seasons, export, sale, and use of game.

More than 240 new game laws were enacted during 1915—a larger number than in any previous year except 1911. Forty-three states held regular legislative sessions, and in all of these states except Arizona, Georgia and Nebraska some changes were made in the statutes protecting game.

The more important changes affecting the game laws of the United States and Canada, has been prepared on the same general plan as those issued last year and 1912.

Under the present conditions deer hunting is permitted in Oregon on about one-third of the time as in the past. In Nevada the limit is now one deer a season and in most other states two.

All but fourteen states which permit quail hunting now have a limit of 20 birds or less per day.

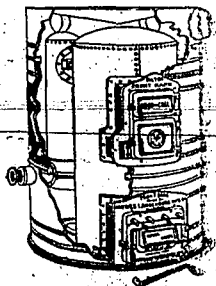
