WOULD RE-BUILD AMERICAN NAVY

Administration Plans Call For More Big Battles.

WHOLE FLEET TO BE SUPPLEMENTED IN FIVE YEARS' TIME

Congress Will Have Plenty of Work Cut Out for It in National Defense Program.

Washington - Fifteen to twenty fighting ships of the dreadnaught and battle cruiser type, with a proportionate number of auxiliary vessels, scout submarines, scout cruisers, destroyers and auxiliary vessels - enough to make a new American fleet - is recommended by Secretary Daniels in a recommendation as a five-year building program for the United States navy.

President Wilson and Secretary Daniels have discussed informally the needs of the navy and are agreed that in order to be adequately defended for defense the present strength of the fleet must be almost doubled in the next five years, with the addition of many of the latest type of fast and covered fighting craft.

Details Not Worked Out. Details as to numbers have not yet been finally worked out, but the idea of fixing a number of building programs over a period of five years is the basic principle upon which the general board of the navy and secretary Daniels now are planning their recommendations. Another conference between the president and the secretary will be held Friday, when the new five-year building program will be discussed.

The five-year naval program, which completed would add to the dreadnaught and battle cruiser fleet nearly a hundred submarines, about 70 destroyers and several scout cruisers, and a proportionate number of fuel and auxiliary ships.

More Men Needed. An important part of the program, too, will be a proposal for a large increase in personnel. Appropriations for the next fiscal year, in addition to \$248,000,000, or about \$100,000,000 increase over last year. Just what construction should be provided for the first year has not been determined. As to the approximate number of ships the fleet should have at the end of five years, the members of the general board and Secretary Daniels are understood to be in thorough accord.

First Year Program Large. It is considered probable the construction program for the first year will exceed that of any previous years in order that any deficiencies may be met promptly. The general board has been consistently recommending a building program for the next five years, although building of a third dreadnaught was made possible by a special appropriation of \$10,000,000 from the treasury.

SAVING THE WRECK

The report of the State Irrigation Commission (appointed by the last legislature) on the Salmon river tract, offers the only reasonable solution of the difficulties which have beset that project since its inception. To cut the average 70 thirty thousand acres of to twenty-five thousand acres is the right thing to do. It is utterly absurd for the state to think of countenancing a continuance of the present ghastly methods. Certain water rights on that tract must be made sure unless the state desires to see many of the highly improved farms abandoned. As it is now managed, not a single settler on that tract can look forward with any hopefulness to anything but a bare existence with the water which can be delivered. It will not take very long to discourage every Salmon tract rancher under the present condition.

On the other hand if the acreage is cut down there will be thirty thousand acres of good crops supporting contented farmers.

There is no question but what the settlers who lose out by the cutting down are entitled to heavy damage which should be paid by the state and the bondholders (not by the settlers).

The Times in making this statement makes it with a full knowledge of the actual facts in the case and with the belief that the two—the state and the bondholders—must also bear the responsibility for the failure of the project. The state must, for the reason that it guaranteed to every settler, certain things. It put the seal of approval upon the plan of the Kuhnns in settling apart the much too large acreage in the first place and by its approval intimated that it had investigated the project and found it sound. The approval of the state had been had weight with every settler who purchased land. Therefore the state stands equally guilty and liable with the irrigation company for any shortcomings of that project.

The bondholders, while to a certain extent were innocent parties and deceived by the promoters, yet should take their share of the burden which should come to any investor, who without proper investigation enters into any enterprise. They were promised certain incomes from the bonds which the Kuhnns sold them. They cannot look to the settlers for any aid but must look to the bankrupt promoters. It is a cold-blooded business deal at the most. These bondholders might have legal action against the state because of the approval given to the project, but never against the settlers, who so far have lived absolutely up to their contract.

The Times sincerely hopes that the actual settler may be protected and given a chance to at least get back the money spent in cultivating the land—it can see no good reason why any settlers should be made to pay for the errors of the state and the promoter by being compelled to settle damages to any who may lose out in the cutting down of the segregation.

NEW IRRIGATION PROJECT BEST OTHER NATIONS TO FOLLOW U.S.

Recognition of the Carranza Government in Mexico Officially

Washington, Oct. 11.—President Wilson today gave formal sanction to the plan of the Pan-American conference to extend recognition to the Carranza government. Mexico and Central America.

Diplomatic representatives here of several South American governments received instructions to take the same step as the United States. Similar word was dispatched within a few days from the governments of all the other American republics. The time of recognition will be fixed then.

European governments, it is understood will follow the lead of the United States and the other American Republics. Great Britain and France, it is known, have indicated that this would be their policy and it is believed here that they will be likewise both, having maintained an accredited agent to General Carranza for some time.

Pledges Demanded

Correspondence that passed between Eliseo Arredondo, Carranza's representative here, and Secretary Lansing and members of the Pan-American conference, relative to the protection of foreigners, amnesty, the treatment of the government Carranza's pledge to restore constitutional government, became public tonight. It revealed that Secretary Lansing asked, particularly of Mr. Arredondo, what he had to offer the Carranza government to ward the clergy.

The Arredondo reply, dated October 8, follows:

Complying with your excellency's request asking me what is the attitude of the constitutionalist government toward the Catholic church in Mexico, I have the honor to say that inasmuch as the re-establishment of peace will be our aim and will be the purpose of the government of Mr. Venustiano Carranza to the end that all the inhabitants of Mexico, of whatever nationality, or foreigners, may equally enjoy the benefits of true justice and hence take interest in co-operating in the work of the government, the laws of freedom of worship, according to the provisions of the constitution, shall be strictly observed.

Carranza's Promise

Therefore the constitutionalist government will respect every body's life, property and religious beliefs, without other limitation than in accordance with the laws in force and the constitution of the republic.

General Carranza telegraphed his thanks to the United States and announced to death for complicity in the coup which resulted in the killing of President Madero, had been executed, excepting those who have had every "privilege of a defendant, under the law."

An official dispatch from Mexico City to the effect that General Carranza had closed food distribution headquarters and was sending its representatives back to the United States, after a conference there was no more need for famine relief.

WANT SALMON TRACT CUT

Irrigation Commission Will Recommend Acreage Be Trimmed Heavily.

When it reports to the governor, the irrigation and drainage commission appointed in accordance with a law passed by the last session of the legislature, will recommend that the Salmon river irrigation project be cut from seventy-three thousand to thirty thousand acres. The commission was in session Thursday and it was ascertained that it will take that action. The ground, whether the project has water enough to supply only the lesser acreage.

The commission will probably make a report to the governor within a few days. The report on the Idaho irrigation company's project is in its progress, and will be ready for filing today or tomorrow.

The Twin Falls-Coe report has been prepared, but the commission decided to give out nothing concerning it until after it has been filed.

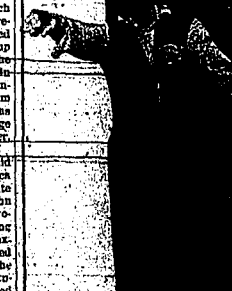

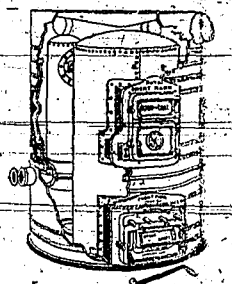
