WARNING TO HORTICULTURISTS

Orchards Should be Carefully Cleaned This Fall.

I wish to call the attention of the fruit growers of the state to the necessity of making a general clean up of their orchards between now and next spring.

The blight not only shortened the apple crop this year but also killed a great deal of bearing wood for next year's crop. In order that this may not occur again I am going to ask all owners of apple or pear trees to see that all blight and blight cankers are removed from their trees before the first of next March.

In my travels over the state I notice that there are a great many orchards badly infested with San Jose scale and, almost without exception, with trees in the different towns of the Boise and Payette valleys badly infested.

The codling moth was very numerous this season and it will be a good idea for the grower to make a thorough clean up of old culls and trash in the orchard that will afford a harboring place for the worms during the winter.

The appalling accident is still in the minds of many automobilists and those for the next few days or weeks will be careful upon railroad crossings. After a time even this precaution will pass from the minds of drivers who are too prone to take chances. But though the care manifested while going over crossings is important in all minds, the same disregard of speed is going on within the city limits and on country roads. Too few drivers realize that the complicated mechanism of the automobile is not always built upon honor, that into the particular machine which you may be driving is some part which has a flaw. That flaw may develop a serious break. It may come when at thirty-five miles an hour, the car is not under control and the occupants are hurled into eternity through the original negligence of the driver. Life holds out much of enjoyment and promise to all and as far as the relative enjoyment of twenty and thirty miles an hour, there is no appreciable difference. But twenty miles per hour is within safety, while thirty miles or over is not. Why take chances with your own life? It is criminal to risk the lives of others.

**A HEAL THANKSGIVING**  
Editorials upon national holidays as a rule must echo the same trite thoughts, many of which do not to any extent find lodging in the minds of the readers. But this year Thanksgiving to the people of the Twin Falls tract in particular should mean Thanksgiving really for many gracious gifts from Divine providence. With abundant crops and attendant prosperity, there is no other section of this state for which the most part equal the wealth of Twin Falls county. It means ease and plenty for the people of the whole county at a time when real poverty hits the hardest. After a struggle all of the people of this county have come through two years of financial depression with few failures and a steady progress toward ultimate prosperity. It is much more than many other communities have accomplished.  
Now, with the end of the harvest gathering, the people of Twin Falls county can and should with joyful

hearts gather on Thanksgiving day to spend a few moments in praise to the Creator of all good and to make of the day something apart from its usual festivity. Make it in fact what our Pilgrim fathers meant it to be—A Real Thanksgiving.

**THREE MILES FOR \$12,000,000**

A piece of eastern railroad-building which is termed "more daring and original than any of the great railroad-construction works of the West," and which contains the largest concrete bridge in the world, was opened November 6 by the president of the Lackawanna Railroad and public officials of New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania. The most impressive engineering feature of the new cut-off on the Lackawanna line between the cities of Scranton, Pa., and Binghamton, N. Y. is the great viaduct over the Tunkhannock Valley. It is half a mile long—2,375 feet, to be exact—and is as high as a twenty-story building. The whole cut-off from Clark's Summit to Halstead, Pa., is 35.6 miles long and cost \$12,000,000. It reduces the distance between New York and Buffalo just 3.6 miles. Yet Lackawanna officials insist that it will pay for itself many times over. Says President W. H. Truesdale in a New York Times interview:

"There were other savings than the shortening of distance to be considered. The new route will give us a maximum grade of 0.68 per cent, against a previous maximum grade of 1.23 per cent, and a total curvature of 1,560 degrees, against a total curvature of 3,875 degrees. "These, to the layman, may seem as small and unimportant results—as the slight saving in mileage may seem. But, together these changes will cut the running-time of every passenger-train between New York and Buffalo, by twenty minutes, and will reduce the running time of freights by a full hour. Nor is this all. By reducing the traction, through reducing the grade, they will make it possible to move trains with two engines which, under present conditions require five."

A few impressive facts about the viaduct are thus sketched: "The Tunkhannock Viaduct is 240 feet high, more than a hundred feet higher than the roadway of the Brooklyn bridge, and is half a mile long. It is by several times the largest concrete bridge in the world, with ten spans of 168 feet each and two spans of 100 feet each. "It contains approximately 4,500,000 cubic feet of concrete and 2,280,000 pounds of reinforcing steel, the trains which cross it being guarded between massive parapet-walls rising four feet above the level of the track and three feet thick. Each of its foundations has been carried down to the bed-rock, and this, in the case of two of its piers, meant making excavations ninety-six feet deep."

Further description of the cut-off as a whole is given in the press by the Lackawanna Railroad as follows: "It is what railroad men know as a replacement-line, being for the most part in sight of the old line for which it is substituted. The radical reduction of grades and curves is achieved by very heavy cutting, and filling, and by viaducts of enormous size, all of which was impossible in the early days of railroading. Some idea of the magnitude of the operation is seen from the fact that the amount of earth moved reached a total of 5,225,000 cubic yards, while the rock excavation amounted to 7,647,000 cubic yards, 8,100,000 cubic feet of concrete was used, and the amount of re-enforcing steel employed in the various bridges, viaducts, and culverts aggregated 1,200,000 pounds."—Literary Digest.

### BAD SPOTS IN ROADS

Temporary Expedients for Making Them Passable.

Temporary repairs to roads are, or at least should be, confined to emergency measures. In proportion to the results obtained, temporary work is always expensive and is never justified by ordinary conditions. Unusual conditions, however, often occur to plague the road man. For example, the closing of a main highway to traffic because of construction, repair, or washouts may suddenly throw a heavy traffic for a short time on a little used and probably unimproved by-way. Clearly, in such a case temporary expedients are legitimate.

The most common troubles met with in a case of this kind are mudholes and ruts. If the soil is heavy, and dust and loose sand if the soil is light or sandy.

Mudholes the Chief Source of Trouble. On a clay or gumbo road mudholes usually cause the most trouble. As water is absolutely necessary for the existence of a mudhole, any treatment, whether temporary or permanent in character, must provide for getting rid of the water. The first step is, therefore, to dig a trench to the side ditches. Furthermore, remove all of the soft mud left in the mudhole. The bottom of the trench should be filled with broken stone or coarse gravel so as to provide a drain to prevent any further accumulation of water.

Gravel is the best material for filling the old mudhole. If gravel is not available, use the best earth at hand, tamping it down in 2 or 4 inch layers. If possible, spread a little gravel or sand over the new fill, which should be made slightly higher than the adjoining road surface. The best treatment is to fill a mudhole without the first draining out the water and removing the soft mud. Don't try to fill it with large stones, because if they do not there will soon be two mudholes instead of one. Don't try

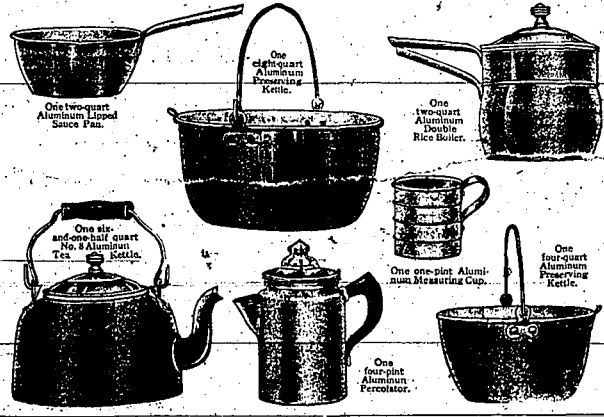

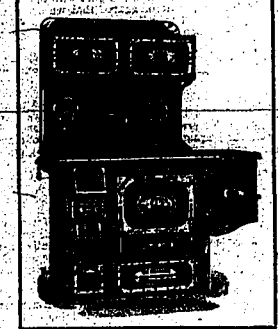

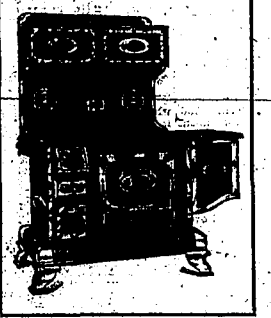

to fill a mudhole with soil or similar material which absorb water readily. On an earth or gravel road ruts are best treated with the drag. Don't be afraid of wet weather. If a rain spell, if a thin coat of sand or gravel be spread over the road surface, it will have been softened by rain and then worked in by traffic and a liberal use of the drag, a poor earth road can be much improved and made to carry a surprisingly heavy traffic for a short time. In contrast to the clay or gumbo road, the sand road gives least trouble during wet weather. On sandy roads anything that will prevent the free movement of the sand particles will be of value. As long as the road is damp, the surface tension of the capillary water acts as a binder and holds the separate grains of sand in place. All efforts should, therefore, be directed toward preventing the sandy places from drying out, or to adding some binder. The addition of clay furnishes a positive binder and is really the best and most permanent treatment. The addition of any fibrous material such as straw, spent tan bark, sage brush or pine needles is of value and when spread on the road and covered with a thin coat of sand or allowed to run into the surface, will make an almost impassable sand road fairly good for a time. But the best way to treat a bad piece, whether on a road or a sand road, is to treat it before it gets bad. Immediate attention in small injuries will prevent the prolonged attention and extensive repairs to serious damages.—U. S. Dept. of Agriculture.

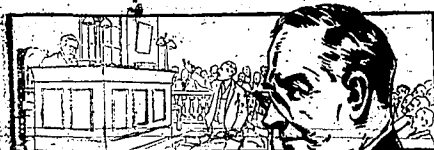

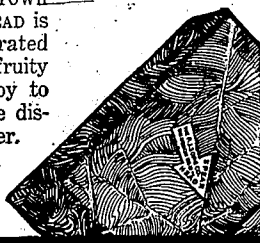

**ORDINANCE NO. 168.**

An ordinance granting a franchise and privilege to James McMillan, his successors and assigns, to construct, maintain and operate gas plant and all pipes and other apparatus necessary and convenient for the operation thereof for the purpose of supplying the inhabitants of said city with manufactured or natural gas for light, heat and power purposes.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Twin Falls Idaho:

Section 1. That there is hereby granted to James McMillan, his successors and assigns, the franchise and privilege to lay, construct, maintain, use and operate gas pipes, in, under and along the streets, avenues, alleys, highways and public places, of and in said City of Twin Falls, to carry, conduct and convey manufactured and natural gas in and through said pipes for heat, light and power purposes, together with the right to lay, construct, maintain, use and operate all necessary house and service connections and such other apparatus and appliances in connection therewith, as may be necessary to safely and efficiently operate, maintain and use said pipes and plant to carry on the business of supplying and selling manufactured and natural gas, or either thereof, to said City of Twin Falls and its inhabitants.

Section 2. That said franchise and privilege shall continue for the term of **five years** from the date of the adoption of this ordinance.

Section 3. That said franchise and privilege is granted upon the following terms and under and subject to the following conditions and restrictions:

(A) The grantee of said franchise and privilege, his successors or assigns, shall, in good faith, commence work to lay said pipes, and to construct, install and equip a system for furnishing gas to the inhabitants of said town on or before the first day of June, 1916, and shall thereafter, from time to time, prosecute said work, in good faith and shall complete and have in operation said system within not more than **thirty days** thereafter.

(B) All pipes laid, located or maintained under said franchise and privilege, shall be so placed as not to interfere with the uses of said streets, alleys, highways or public places by the traveling public or for public purposes; in laying said pipes, the grantee of said franchise and privilege, his successors or assigns, shall fill the trench and "tamp" or settle the loose earth in, under or about the surface of the street, avenue, alley, highway or public place in as good condition as it was prior to such excavation, the work of excavating and refilling of trenches to be done under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the street commissioner of said City, and in the event there shall be a subsidence of the dirt in said trench or trenches after the same have been filled, notwithstanding the filling was done to the satisfaction of the Street Commissioner, the grantee or his successors in interest shall repair at his or their expense, such subsidence or other defect and all pipes laid or maintained under this franchise and privilege shall be laid, located in conformity with the conditions given by and to the satisfaction of the City Council of said city and the street commissioner, and where the pipes are laid along or across any street, alley or public place, which has been paved the said grantee, his successors or assigns, shall repair and repave the broken or opened pavement after the laying of said pipes, of the same material and in such a manner that the opened portion of said pavement shall be in as good a condition in all respects as it was before said trench or opening was made, any when the City Council of said City of Twin Falls, shall at any time by ordinance or otherwise, declare its intention to improve any street, alley or public place by paving, the said city shall give the grantee a written notice of thirty days of the time when such work of paving will commence, within which time the said grantee, his successors or assigns, shall lay his or their gas pipes along or within said street, avenue, alley or public place, prior to the construction of said pavement, and if said pipes are not laid within such time the right to lay and operate the same over said street, alley or public place shall be forfeited.

(C) The grantee of said franchise and privilege, his successors or assigns shall, in the event said City of Twin Falls desires to purchase gas for any purpose, sell the same to said city upon such terms and for such price as he or they sell gas to the most favored customers.

(D) Before constructing or laying any gas pipes under said franchise, alley or public place the grantee, his successors or assigns, shall make application to the City Council of said City to designate at what place and along what portion, and to what depth within said street, avenue, alley or public place said pipes shall be laid.

(E) The pipes, taps and all struc-

tures, machinery and appliances constituting said system, shall be of the latest and most approved pattern, of the greatest efficiency and the best quality of materials.

(F) Any and all tanks, manufacturing and storage structures and machinery shall be located at a sufficient distance from the business and residence portion of the City as not to constitute a nuisance to the citizens thereof, and before commencing the construction thereof the grantee, his successors or assigns, shall obtain from the City Council a permit or authority to build or construct the same at the place proposed.

(G) The granting of this franchise shall not be deemed the granting of an exclusive franchise for the purpose of manufacturing, operating, and selling the product to be manufactured, nor shall this franchise ever prevent the sale of gas by any other person, if at any time it may see fit, from constructing, maintaining and operating a municipally owned gas plant to furnish gas for the use of the City, and to sell the same to the inhabitants thereof for the purposes aforesaid.

(H) The City of Twin Falls shall in no way be liable for any accident, damage, loss or injury that may occur in the construction or operation of said gas plant, or by reason of the default or negligence or misconduct of the said grantee or his successors or assigns, or his or their employees, officers or agents; and the acceptance of this gas and franchise shall be deemed and become an agreement on the part of said grantee, his successors or assigns, to hold the said City harmless from and against all liability, loss, costs, expense and damage of every nature arising out of any default or negligence or misconduct of said grantee, his successors or assigns, or of his, their or its officers, agents or employees, or which may accrue to or by reason of the said grantee, his successors or assigns, shall indemnify and make good to said city for any loss, costs, damages or expense of any kind which it may sustain or receive by reason of any such default, accident, negligence, misconduct or injury on account of which any judgment shall have been recovered against said City.

(I) The said grantee, his successors or assigns, shall, before this ordinance takes effect, file with the City Clerk of said city a bond, under the seal in favor of said city in the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, with good and sufficient surety or sureties to be approved by the City Council of said City, conditioned to the effect that said grantee, his successors or assigns, shall save the said city harmless from and against all liability, loss, costs, expense or damage of every nature arising out of any default, negligence or misconduct of said grantee, his successors or assigns, or of his or their agents, officers or employees, or which may accrue in and by reason of the construction, maintenance or operation of the said gas plant.

(J) Any neglect, failure or refusal on the part of said grantee, his successors or assigns, in complying with, keeping and observing any of the terms, conditions and restrictions of said franchise and privilege, shall subject the same to forfeiture.

(K) Such a pressure of gas in the pipes shall be established and maintained by the grantee, his successors or assigns as shall give the greatest efficiency and economy in its use.

(L) If for any reason, except the death of said grantee, his successors or assigns shall fail to continue to operate the plant which is the subject of this franchise, for a period of six months, this franchise shall automatically cease, terminate and become void without action of the city council of said city and upon such termination said city of Twin Falls shall have an option for a period of six months from such termination, to purchase the plant and property of the said grantee his successors and assigns; for a reasonable price and terms, such price and terms to be determined by the Justice Commission of the State of Idaho, if such a Commission is in existence at such time, and if not, then such price and terms to be determined by a board of arbitration to be composed of three members, one of which members shall be chosen by said City, one to be chosen by the said grantee, his successors or assigns, and the third to be chosen by the two members theretofore chosen, and if the said grantee, his successors or assigns shall fail or refuse to appoint a member of such board, the Judge of the District Court of the district in which said city is located, shall appoint such member.

(M) The grantee of this franchise and privilege shall, within thirty days after the passage of the ordinance granting said franchise and privilege, file with the City Clerk of said City of Twin Falls, a written acceptance of the terms and conditions of said ordinance, said franchise and privilege shall be granted upon each of the con-

ditions and provisions herein contained, and in consideration of the promise of the grantee thereof, to keep and observe each of such conditions and provisions therein expressed to be kept and observed by him, and in the acceptance of said franchise, the grantee shall agree to keep and observe each of said conditions and provisions.

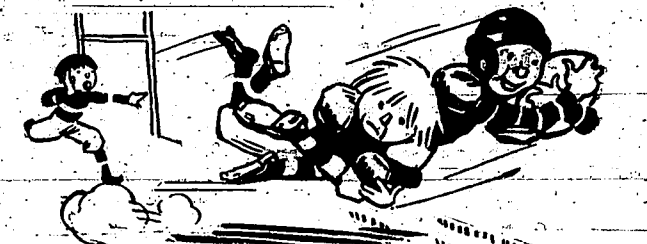
