CLEAN-UP DAY FROM

APRIL 9 TO APRIL 16

Twin Falls Officials Ready to Act in Accordance With the Proclamation of the Governor.

In accordance with the terms of an official proclamation by Governor Alexander, calling on the people to observe clean-up week from April 9 to April 16, inclusive, the officials of this city are getting ready to see to it that all unclean deposits of animal and vegetable matter and other debris are removed before the hot season begins and to see that they are kept removed during the summer months. The Chief Engineer will have charge of looking into the removal of all debris that might cause fire or might assist in the spreading, and will cooperate with the police in getting the town organized and in shape to get rid of the dirt. The matter of holding a clean-up day has been under discussion for the past couple of weeks here, but the officials determined to wait, if possible, until the official state proclamation was issued, setting a date. They feel that it is the duty of individuals to clean up thoroughly and not stop at the order of the law. The requirements of the law are set forth in the official notice of the state dairy, food and sanitary inspector, J. K. White, and are as follows:

- RULE XXV.** All privies, toilets and outbuildings used for depositing human excreta must be made fly-proof and protected as follows:
1. The roof shall be water tight.
 2. The house shall be without cracks through which flies may enter.
 3. The door shall fit closely and be self-closing.
 4. The openings in seats shall have hinged coverings.
 5. The vault, whether pit, box or tank, tub, pail or other receptacle, shall be securely protected against flies.
 6. All openings for ventilation, etc., shall be screened with wire netting.

IS TAKEN TO COURT

Writ of Prohibition Asked Against Mayor and Council to Prevent Submission Under Referendum.

BOISE. A writ of prohibition directed against Mayor Robinson and members of the city council to prohibit them from calling a referendum election to submit to the voters of the city the ordinance providing for the opening of the picture shows on Sunday was filed in district court this afternoon by Charles P. Tedesco. The writ sets forth that the council does not have the power under the law to submit the ordinance to a vote of the people, for the reason that the act of the council in passing the ordinance was a judicial act, not subject to the referendum as the statute prescribes under what method picture shows may be allowed to run, and when that procedure is adopted no other power has any right to interfere. It is charged that the expense of calling and holding a referendum election upon the ordinance would be an improper and illegal charge against the taxpayers of the city. Arrangements are being made by the picture show proprietors to open their theatres next Sunday under the ordinance recently passed, permitting Sunday opening, and to which a referendum petition has been filed asking that the ordinance be submitted to a vote of the people.

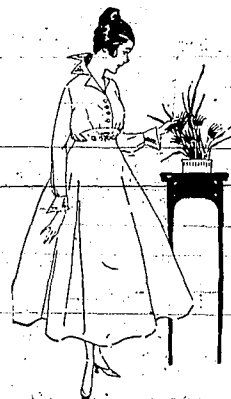

CARRANZA BUSY

UPHOLDING DIGNITY

Protests Against Americans Occupying Towns, Permission Asked to Use Railroads.

WASHINGTON. Gen. Carranza has formally protested against American troops occupying Casas Grandes in their pursuit of Villa and the American government has replied that the troops have been ordered specifically not to occupy Casas Grandes or any other towns or cities in Mexico.

The protest and reply were included in an exchange of notes between Acting Secretary Polk of the state department and Elicio Arredondo, ambassador designate to the United States.

After a conference today between President Wilson and Mr. Polk it became known that Mr. Polk is to be forwarded to Mexico said instructions had been sent to Gen. Funston to keep his troops away from all towns.

The state department today had not received a reply from the request sent to Carranza for the use of Mexican railroads in transporting supplies to the expeditionary force.

In urging the use of Mexican railroads for that purpose it has been pointed out to the Carranza government that similar permission was granted Carranza for the use of railroads in the United States last fall.

Mr. Polk declared today that the United States had not requested permission to take over any railroads in Mexico, but had merely asked for permission to transport supplies.

Every effort is being made by the state department to disseminate in Mexico the information that the United States has no motive of aggression in sending troops across the border. Following out the same policy the American troops now in Mexico have been given instructions to be careful in their dealings with Mexicans generally.

Gen. Carranza today replied to the American government's request for use of Mexican railroad lines for movement of supplies to the punitive expedition, with a request for more complete information of exactly what the war department wants. Gen. Carranza's reply was sent to President Wilson. The information he asks will be furnished.

PRESIDENT WILSON WILL SIGN THE PHILIPPINE BILL

WASHINGTON. President Wilson has told congress leaders he will sign the Philippine bill, including the Clarke amendment for independence not later than four years, despite his disapproval of its details. The president discussed the bill today with Chairman Jones of the house Philippine committee and Senator Simmons. It is planned to take the measure up in the house after the army bill.

In his correspondence with former Secretary Garrison, the president expressed his disagreement with the Clarke amendment and some other features of it, but he said the view that he would act against the sentiment of the majority of both houses.

THE RECALL AGITATION REVIVED IN BOISE

Boise's mayor, a gentleman by the name of Robinson, has been in one perpetual state of hot-water since his election because he took the job seriously and has endeavored to enforce the ordinances of that city. He had not progressed far along the route to civic purity before he encountered the active opposition of some of the leading business men of the capital city whose suggestion to put the "soft pedal" on the police department had been ignored. Since that time there has been an open break between a certain element in Boise which includes a number of men of excellent standing, and the mayor's friends.

While we do not attempt to pass upon the merits of the controversy, because we are too far removed from the seat of the disturbance to be familiar with the situation, at this distance, however, it appears that the mayor is in the right; that he has had the backbone to offend certain Boise interests that are lined up with the "open town" element; that the Boise Statesman, which is obviously out to "get" the mayor if it can, is giving a great deal of uncalculated publicity to the activities of the police department, and that the reputable business men in the background blame the mayor and police department because the town is getting some publicity which they believe is undesirable.

Such an unseemly row is characteristic of a place that has seen better days and is on the decline, as Boise is, if all reports are to be credited. The "open" element blames the reformers, the "wets" lay it all upon the prohibitionists, the opponents of the Black law insist that the Black law did it, and one political party blames it on the other. Thus it goes.

The position in which mayors sometimes find themselves is not altogether enviable. Mayor Sweeley of Twin Falls has been attacked by local papers because he has refused to make public the information obtained by "imported" detectives, the Twin Falls official taking the position that the conditions uncovered by the stentis court and would be corrected without any undue publicity. His opponents have been able to advance unpleasant insinuations relative to the thousand dollars paid these outside investigators. The opposite condition exists at Boise, and the mayor there is attacked on what appears to be more of a pretext than a real reason, that his activities are placing the city in a bad light. Thus has any mayor who desires to reduce to the minimum the immorality of his city, an excellent opportunity to lose half of his friends whenever way he moves.

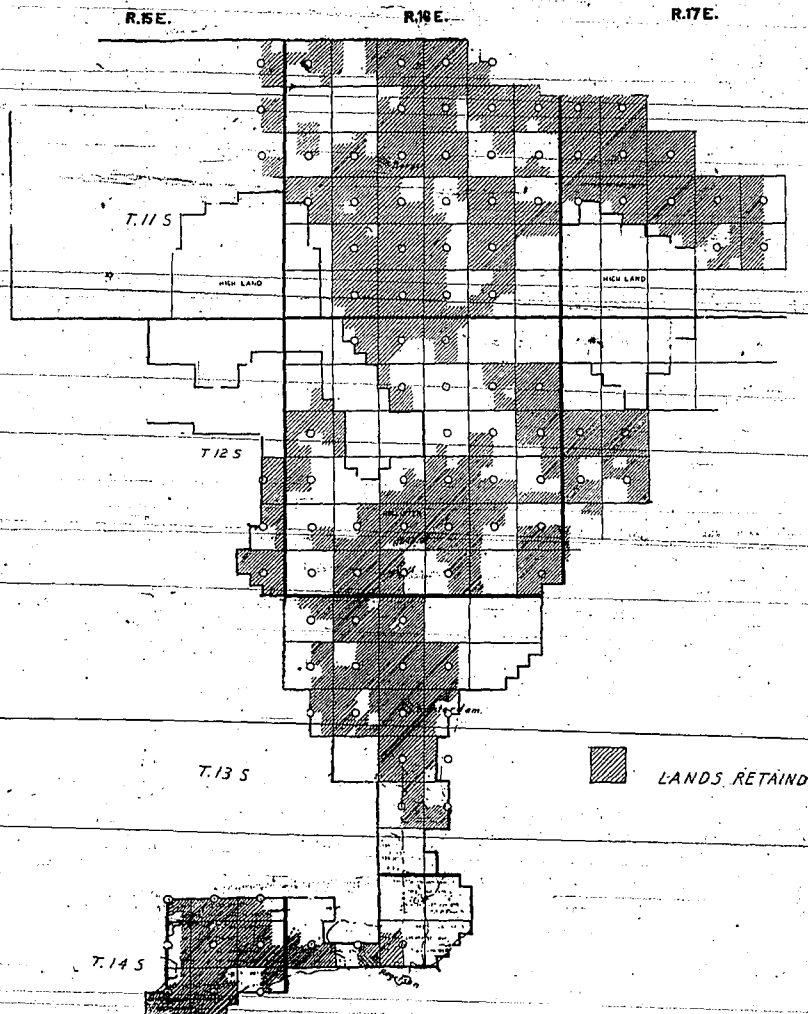
In any event the Boise mayor made one serious mistake, and that was his compromise a few months ago with his opponents when the first recall movement had assumed threatening proportions. If Mayor Robinson was certain that he was combatting the forces of evil he should have reflected that never since the time of Saul has there been found an instance when a compromise availed anything. Whether the mayor's friends will rally to his support in the present situation, when another recall movement is under way, remains to be seen.

THE PROBATE COURT APPOINTMENT

The withdrawal of A. B. Hicks, a prominent Twin Falls attorney, and representative from Twin Falls county in the last legislature, leaves a clear field for the appointment of Judge Dan T. Welty of Castleford, to the vacancy in the probate court created by the retirement of Judge Shanks. Attorney Hicks, Mr. Bell of Twin Falls, and Judge Welty are the three men who have been most prominently urged for the appointment (which is in the hands of the county commissioners) although none of these three gentlemen, in so far as we are aware, have lifted a hand to secure the appointment. Mr. Bell, in whose behalf a number of friends circulated petitions, conveyed to the commissioners his wish to be eliminated from consideration in connection with the appointment, and expressed his hope that the commissioners would see fit to appoint Mr. Welty. Wednesday afternoon Mr. Hicks, whom it was known the commissioners were seriously considering for the place, announced his withdrawal, thus virtually deciding Judge Shanks' successor.

ARBOR DAY IS SET FOR FRIDAY, APRIL 14

Suggesting Made That It Be Combined
With Rural Life Day and Observed
By All the People.

Conforming to the proclamation issued Saturday by Governor Alexander, County Superintendent Bertha Noel has issued a proclamation setting Friday, April 14, to be observed for that purpose. The state superintendent has suggested that the people also observe Rural Life day on the same occasion, with services appropriate to both. The proclamation of Governor Alexander reads as follows: "Whereas, in order to call attention to its importance and to add greater assurance to its due observance, it has become customary for the governor of the state to issue his proclamation urging that one day in each year be set aside in the public schools and other educational institutions of the state, to be known as Arbor day; and Whereas, I, M. Alexander, governor of the state of Idaho, do set aside and proclaim as Arbor day, in each of the several counties of the state, that day which the superintendent of public instruction of each of said such

counties of the state of Idaho may determine best suited to the requirements of climatic or other conditions for the better promotion of a due regard for the care and cultivation of trees, shrubs and ornamental plants; and I, too, call upon the citizens, school authorities, children and parents of each such county to observe such designated day by planting some tree or ornamental shrub as well as to assemble to participate in instructive and entertaining public exercises intended to aid and encourage their propagation and protection.

ASKS THAT OLD SURVEYS ALONG RIVER BE NOT DISTURBED

Congressman Addison T. Smith has taken up with the commissioner of the general land office at the request of settlers on both sides of the Snake river, between Twin Falls and Clear Lake, the survey which was made last summer, with the view of having the rights of the settlers protected where the survey shows any material change in the corner. Mr. Smith contends that settlers who have been on their land for years, and have received patent under the old official survey, should not be disturbed by the most careful consideration when the returns from the survey are received at the general land office. Congressman Smith has recommended that Surveyor General Vitor at Boise or the supervisor of surveys be directed by the commissioner to visit the section and confer with the settler and ascertain by personal examination the complaints and the changes which it is proposed are to be by the new survey and the commissioner will probably take this action.

SUGAR PRICES GO TOWARD THE MOON

Rise of More Than a Dollar in Two Months—Reported by Wholesaler—Due to Lack of Transportation.

Sugar prices have gone up \$1.16 a hundred pounds since January 22 and now range from \$7.50 a sack for beet sugar to \$5.25 a sack for cane. Jobbers' prices, said Manager Kinney of the Kinney Wholesale Grocery company yesterday. "This condition," he continues, "is due to lack of transportation facilities to haul the sugar from foreign countries to the United States, and the result of wartime conditions. A strike in some of the refineries some time ago had something to do with it, but lack of transportation is the principal cause. There is a slight rise in some other articles, but it is scarcely appreciable."

The rise in sugar prices is creating much interest and speculation in all parts of the country, and predictions of a price of \$9 a sack are freely made.

TWO MAD COYOTES

AT ROSEWORTH

That the rabid coyote scare is not a trifling thing in the Roseworth country, thirty miles southwest of Buhl, is evidenced by the statement of Fred Hartwell who was in Buhl Wednesday, says the Buhl Herald. He said there two mad coyotes had been killed near the Hartwell ranch during the past week. Each, however, had bitten several dogs before they could be shot.

One of them put in its appearance among a band of sheep that was being guarded by Ben Segars, a herder, and his dog encountered the rabid coyote. The Segars dog was bitten, and the coyote then attacked the sheep. Hartwell ranch where he bit four sheep dogs, before the animal was finally killed.

The following morning, last Friday, another mad coyote visited a camp about two miles from the Charles Hartwell place and it bit three dogs before it was brought to the ground with a bullet. It is not known if there were other dogs bitten in the neighborhood, nor not, and there may have been some of the livestock encountered by the rabid animal.

DR. CHALFANT EXTENDS THANKS FOR CO-OPERATION OF PAPERS

Dr. Charles L. Chalfant, superintendent of the Children's Home Finding Aid Society of Idaho, in a letter addressed to the editors of the leading Idaho papers this week, after extending thanks for the co-operation, takes a few lines to explain the amount of work done by the organization and to make a statement of the source of its funds. In this connection he says: "Over two thousand little ones have been cared for by this society during the seven years since its incorporation by the state of Idaho. The support of the work comes from three sources: Of over three dollars expended in this charity, one dollar comes from the state by special legislative appropriation, one dollar from the county in payment for special cases committed by the county commissioners to the receiving homes, and one dollar from individuals, churches, schools, societies, women's clubs, clubs, etc., throughout the state.

Dr. W. Davis of American Falls, was favored by the "Star" (High), the "Record" (Nampa) "Republican" (Blackfoot), "Times" (Rockland), and the "Press" (American Falls), all papers classed as Republican, and located in the south.

Captain E. G. Davis of Boise, has the support of the "Times" (High), with D. W. Davis as second choice; the "Enterprise" (Malad), and the "Courier" (Star), whose editor advised on the decision to cast his vote for him, and whose decision was influenced by the fact that Captain Davis was the only avowed candidate at the "New" (St. Anthony), and the "Lead" (St. Anthony), and the "Republican" papers located in the south.

Two of our newspaper cards were returned urging the candidacy of Ex-Governor Hawley, one postmarked at Idaho City and the other mailed on the train, but neither having any signature attached.

The "Star" "Gazette" favors the candidacy of Charles L. Heltman of Rathdrum, the New Meadows Eagle would like to see L. J. Purcell of Idaho Falls, State not seen fit to indicate their position, and of the "papers in the state classed as Democratic, only six are outspoken in support of Governor Alexander for re-election.

The result of the poll of the press indicates that there has been no coalition of more than one-half, were cast for D. W. Davis of American Falls; Governor Alexander had 145; Captain E. C. Davis 15; E. H. Dewey 30; ex-Governor John M. Haines 55; G. H. Martin, Progressive candidate for governor in 1912 and 1916, H. E. McElroy of Boise, (Progressive candidate for governor 1914), had 25, and the remainder were scattered, being about evenly divided between various Socialist, Democratic, Republican and Progressive leaders.

In judging this result, it must not be forgotten that the circulation of THE GEM STATE RURAL is much larger in the southern part of the state than in the Panhandle, and that a vast majority of the coupons received came from the south. Hawley of Boise, Senator Bowman of Adams county (Socialist) about evenly dividing the honors.

ORDINANCE NO. 178.

An Ordinance providing for the appointment of an Electrical Inspector in the City of Twin Falls, defining his duties, powers and jurisdiction, in installing, repairing and maintaining of all electrical wiring, machinery, apparatus, appliances, matters of things in or on any building in the City of Twin Falls and fixing the fees to be charged by said inspector for his inspection, supervision and control of such work.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho:

Section 1. That the Mayor of said City shall nominate and by and with the consent of the City Council appoint an electrical inspector for said City, who shall be subject to the City Council and shall be subject to the City Council of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho.

Section 2. The term of office of the electrical inspector shall be for two years, and he shall be subject to the City Council and shall be subject to the City Council of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho.

Every person, persons, firm or corporation who has received a permit from the City Inspector to install, construct or repair any electrical wiring, machinery, apparatus, appliances, matter or thing or do any electrical work within the limits of the City of Twin Falls, shall post a card at the meter panel box giving the name of the person, persons, firm or corporation doing the work, and shall keep such card posted during the continuance of such installation, construction or repair.

Section 8. For the purpose of inspection of any electrical work, the City Inspector shall have access to all installations, but, plastering, matters or things which may interfere with such inspection to be removed at the cost of the person, persons, firm or corporation or concealment, and no person shall interfere or prevent said inspector from removing any obstruction, matter or thing which may interfere with or prevent his making a thorough inspection of any electrical work.

Section 9. No person, persons, firm or corporation engaged in the business of furnishing electricity for lighting, power, heating or cooking purposes shall connect up or permit to be connected up to its lines any electrical wiring, device, machinery, apparatus, appliance, matter or thing which may interfere with or prevent any electrical wiring or apparatus contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, and shall be liable to the penalties hereinafter provided.

The electrical inspector shall have the authority and it is hereby made his duty to enter in and upon any premises within the limits of said City of Twin Falls at reasonable hours and examine and inspect any and all electrical wiring and apparatus installed in and on premises with such frequency as he shall deem necessary and if he finds that the said electrical wiring and apparatus as is installed in a defective or dangerous manner, he shall notify the owner or occupant or agent of owner of the said premises to remedy the defect or remove the said danger and within three days thereafter remedy the said defect or remove said danger in accordance with the rules and regulations of the said electrical inspector. And should such person person fail to remedy such defects or remove such danger within three days then the electrical inspector may disconnect all service wires from such electrical wiring or apparatus. Any person failing to comply with the requirements of the said ordinance who shall violate any of the requirements of the ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be liable to thereof shall be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars.

Section 15. All wiring within the fire limits shall be placed in conduit. All service wires entering any building shall be free from all signs, signs, signs, water drains or piping and at least six feet from any fire escape.

Section 16. Nothing contained in this ordinance shall be deemed or construed to relieve any

AUSTRIAN FORCES RETIRE BEFORE RUSSIANS

Ispehan Invited by Russian Armies. Austrian Retreat to Avoid Capture by Soldiers of the Czar.

LONDON—Austrian forces, operating northwest of Usclesko, on the Danube river, near the Bukovina border, were forced by the pressure of the Russians to evacuate the bridgehead fortifications and to abandon their transport. Under cover of night they succeeded in reaching the safety of the mountains northwest of Zale Szeky, north of Csernawitz, according to the Austrian official statement issued today.

The official statement pays a tribute of admiration to the bravery of the Austrian troops, who gave way only on account of the superior strength of the Russian attacking forces. It adds that the only means left to the Austrians to avoid capture was to break through the Russian positions at Usclesko and this they did with complete success.

"After six months of brave defense, the bridge fortifications northwest of Usclesko collapsed on Sunday evening and were evacuated. Although the Russians succeeded in the morning in causing by means of explosions a breach of 300 meters wide, the garrison, which was attacked by forces eightfold superior, held out seven hours longer, notwithstanding all losses in the face of the most violent artillery and infantry fire. It was not until 5 o'clock in the afternoon that the commanding officer, Col. Pfianck, determined to evacuate the destroyed fortifications.

"Smaller detachments and the wounded men reached the south bank of the Danube in boats. Soon, however, it was necessary to abandon the transports under the concave fire of the enemy. There remained for our brave troops a complete lack of food, clothing and shelter, only one way to escape capture. They were under the necessity of cutting a way through Usclesko, which was strongly occupied by the enemy, to our troops encamped on the heights north of Zale Szeky.

"The march directly through the enemy's position succeeded. Under cover of the night, Col. Pfianck led his brave troops across the mountains northwest of Zale Szeky, where he arrived early Monday morning.

"The Russian for the bridge fortifications at Usclesko will remain for all time a glorious page in the annals of our army."

ORDINANCE NO. 179.

An Ordinance creating the office of City Employment Agent, providing for his appointment, fixing his remuneration and defining his duties.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho:

Section 1. That there is hereby created the office of City Employment Agent, who shall, with the consent of the Council, be appointed by the Mayor, and whose remuneration shall be the sum of Twenty-five (\$25) Dollars per month.

Section 2. The City Employment Agent shall perform all the duties required by law of a City Employment Agent, and shall obtain the required records, keep and maintain the same, use at all times all proper methods of bringing to the notice of the public the work desired, collect the fees named by law, and in all ways as now required by law or as may hereafter be required by the City Council, conduct such office in the way most likely to achieve the results desired, namely: The finding of places for those who desire work and the finding of workmen for those who desire work done.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of each person registering his or her name, or of any corporation or association registering its name, with the City Employment Agent to promptly notify such agent when they have found work, or when they have found persons to work for them as the case may be, and to pay to the City Employment Agent the fee fixed by law for such service, to-wit: Fifty (50) Cents for each such service performed within the City of Twin Falls, Idaho; the sum of One (1) Dollar for each such service rendered without the City of Twin Falls, Idaho.

GERMANS CAPTURE FRENCH POSITIONS

2500 Prisoners Claimed to Have Been Taken in Latest German Official Statement.

BERLIN—French positions north-east of Avocourt were captured by the Germans, who took 2500 prisoners, the war office announced today. The text of today's official statement follows:

"West-of-the-Meuse, Bavarian regiments and the cavalry of the 1st Landwehr, after careful preparations, stormed the entire strongly fortified French positions in and near the forest northeast of Avocourt. In addition to considerable sanguinary losses, the enemy has so far incurred losses amounting to 32 officers, including two commandants of regiments; and more than 2500 men in unwounded prisoners, and much war material, the amount of which has not yet been ascertained.

"Counter attacks attempted by the enemy did not bring him any advantage, but the enemy incurred further serious losses upon him.

"East-of-the-Meuse the situation is unchanged.

"Eastern theater: The Russians are continuing their attacks on the uttermost wing south of Riga and on the Dvina front and west of Jacobstadt. They were repelled by sanguinary losses. Strong enemy reconnoitering detachments advancing against the German front northwest of Posen and between Lakes Narocz and Wlasynew, delivered especially strong and fruitless attacks throughout the day and night. The losses of the enemy were proportionate to the number of troops employed.

"A far-reaching, narrow salient of our front detached south of Lake Narocz has been withdrawn a few hundred meters toward the heights of Bilanicki to avoid the enemy's encircling fire. The salient was held by our important patrol engagements on the lines of the Anglo-French front, the situation is unchanged."

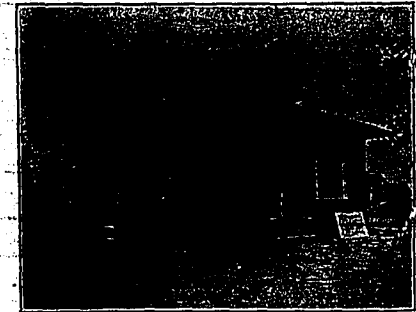
