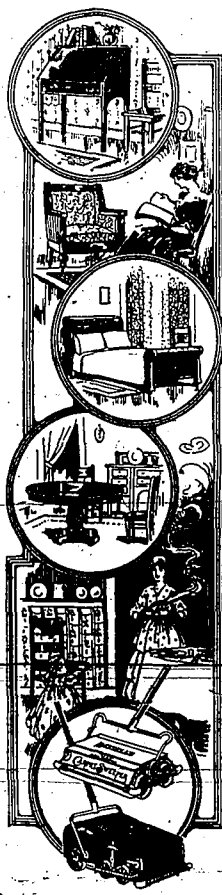

BUHL BARBERS BOOST PRICE OF SHAVING

Two Bits Charged—New Chair Car Creates Sensation—Beets are Hauled From Pile to Factory.

Now don't get it into your head that the prices on barber work is being shaved in Buhl, says the Buhl Pioneer. You will observe by looking elsewhere in this issue that it will take the sum of two-bits, twenty-five cents—the fourth part of a dollar, mind you, to get a shave or to get your face washed with a razor, in case you haven't heard that is worthy of the name. You will note that a hair-cut and shave is fifty cents, which is an even half dollar. So if you desire to put one over on the barber just call for a hair-cut and shave, give him thirty-five cents for the hair-cut and fifteen cents for the shave and credit yourself with ten cents, which you saved on the shave by getting a hair-cut at the same time. It might be added that this policy has been adopted for the purpose of doing away with the annoyance of giving-back change—quarters and half dollars are convenient pieces of money to handle, and deducting a dime or nickel or so from them doesn't leave very much.

It is understood, also, that a movement is on foot among our tonsorial artists to have a bill introduced at the fourth coming session of the legislature making it a misdemeanor to go more than one week without a hair-cut, and requiring two shaves daily. In case this bill becomes a law, it is understood there will be no increase in prices above referred to.

Except where a man's wife has tried to cut his hair, and in that case the extra charge will only be a quarter. Considerable surprise was occasioned Wednesday evening by the presence of a really first-class chair car in the train. UNIVERSITY SHORT COURSE ANNOUNCED

Mineral Department Will Give Special Instructions—Course Opens on January Second.

The winter short course for miners and prospectors at the University of Idaho opens January 4 at Moscow, and continues for eight weeks, ending February 25.

This is the fifth term of the short course at the University of Idaho, and an unusually large enrollment is indicated for this year. There are no entrance requirements, nor is there any age limit. The students ages have run from eighteen to sixty-six years, and every man who has taken the course has found that it has improved his earning capacity. Last year seventeen men enrolled in the course coming from all parts of the northwest.

The instruction in the school is under the corps of experienced and practical mining men. The courses offered include studies of prospecting, assaying, mineralogy, mining geology, chemistry, mining ore dressing, gold and silver milling, placer mining, the cyanide process, the concentration of ores, the flotation process, and other subjects.

The student who comes to take the short course selects the subjects he desires to study and the course is adjusted to help him solve his problems and increase his earnings.

The course has been devised particularly to help the man who works either on a mine or at a mill. The man who will work while attending school, should know after completing these courses, where to look and where NOT to look for ore deposits; how to make a fire assay for gold, silver, or lead; to figure the distance and direction to run a drift in order to figure the best way to determine a mineral by using a flow pipe; to figure the best way to open up a new prospect; to estimate the size of flume, and the gross amount of water to carry a given quantity of water; to install a small hoisting and pumping plant; and he will know the basic principles underlying mining geology, gold milling and cyaniding; and the concentration of ores.

There is no charge for tuition. The only cost is for a few books and supplies, and for board and room in Moscow, which runs 6.00 to \$8.00 per week.

The university has issued a free bulletin describing the courses and giving the necessary information which will enable you to select your course. It is yours for the asking. Simply write to the mining department, university of Idaho, Moscow, Idaho, and tell them that you are interested in the short course for miners and prospectors. The book will be sent you at once.

HIGH PRICES ARE UNDER INVESTIGATION

Government Officials After Facts In Regard to Reports of Illegal Combinations.

WASHINGTON—Information gathered from many sources by the nation wide inquiry into the high cost of living pointed with increasing directness Thursday night to the conclusion that the high prices of certain necessities of life were due, in part at least, to the manipulations of speculators in food and other commodities who had combined to force quotations upward.

The combinations are, believed by the government investigators to have been criminal in character, rather than rather short lived.

Special attention is being given to alleged price manipulation in the case of the "hog" market, which recently resulted in soaring prices to a panic level. Investigation of the high price of coal has already convinced some officials that there was no warrant whatever for the \$12 coal in Boston and New York other than the activity of these alleged combinations.

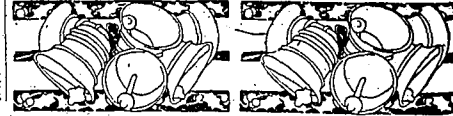
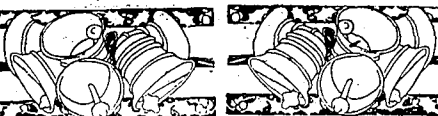

"Not at all. It's a homely thing, but I don't care. I can give it to somebody for a Christmas present."

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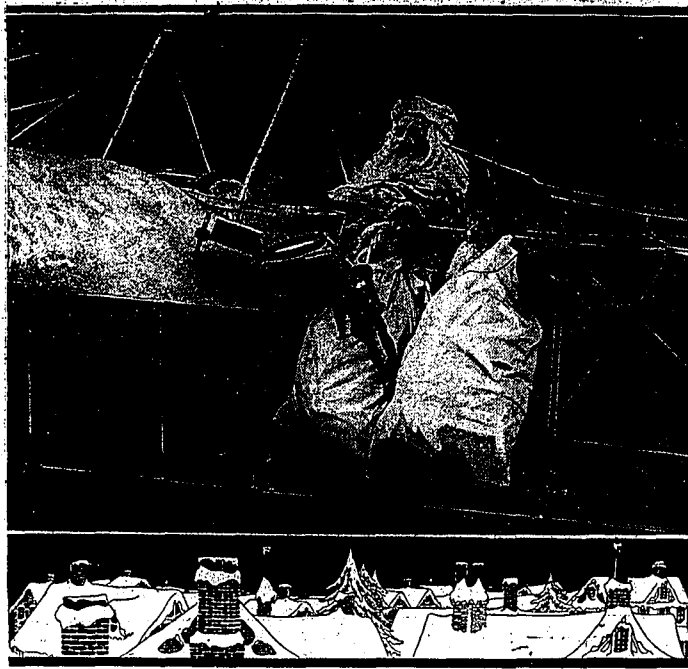

FARMERS APPLY FOR A RURAL CREDIT LOAN

Meet and Effect Temporary Organization in Commercial Club Rooms At Buhl.

Pursuant to a call for the farmers who were interested in getting rural loans at a lower rate of interest under the new Rural Credits law, about fifteen men met at the Buhl Commercial club rooms, and took the initial steps necessary to obtain a loan on their farms, says the Buhl Herald. Applications were made to the amount necessary to perfect a working organization. The object is to get a lower rate of interest. Most farmers are now paying 8 per cent on first mortgages, and the new Federal law makes it possible to make loans for four to six per cent.

SWIFT TYPISTS AT THE HIGH SCHOOL

LECTURER, EXPLAINS

NEW-OLD RELIGION

William H. Rathvon of the Christian Science Board of Lectureship Addressed Audience Tuesday Evening.

Before an interested and attentive audience in the high school auditorium Tuesday evening, William H. Rathvon of Denver, Colorado, gave a lecture on Christian Science. The topic of his evening's address was "The Way to Happiness Here and Hereafter."

In introducing the Christian Science lecturer William H. Rathvon, Judge F. E. Chamberlain said in part:

It is the universal opinion that the world is slowly but surely growing more tolerant and broadminded in matters of religion. About fifty years ago Mrs. Eddy began teaching the new-old religion of love. Old, because it was taught and practiced by Jesus of Nazareth, and His disciples. New, because during the long ages of religious bigotry and intolerance, it seemed to be forgotten until Mrs. Eddy discovered it, so Dr. Eddy, and named it Christian Science.

Now, no one except the narrow ecclesiastical and those controlled by him, any longer, eager at or condemn it, and I am hopeful that in time, we shall be able to subscribe to the famous utterance of Frederick the Great when he said, "In my domain can

each one be saved after his own fashion." I take pleasure in introducing to you the lecturer of the evening, Mr. William H. Rathvon, member of the board of Lectureship of The Mother Church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.

Mr. Rathvon said in part: Because Christian Science is not a religion of waiting but of immediate action and prompt results; because it is the religion of the present as well as the future, because it puts joy into life and helps us to overcome death, and because in all its ministrations it pushes aside the transitory forces of the human will and the human mind and grasps instead the ever-available and unlimited powers of the divine Mind, God Himself, for these reasons it is the investigator to acquire a practical knowledge of this Science for which no man is claimed?

The textbook and its author. Every student should be rightly learned from its textbook and Christian Science is no exception to this rule. Besides the Bible there is but one textbook of Christian Science, the book "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy, the book that has won its way into the hearts and lives of unnumbered men and women and children, who have found in it a quiet friend whose silent influence is a mighty power for good. It is perhaps unnecessary to inform

this audience that the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science and the author of its textbook was a woman—a feeble woman, Mary Baker Eddy. You may know too that for years she stood alone—one lone woman against the whole world—opposed and assailed by the world of theology, of medicine, of established usages, of tradition, of conservatism; opposed by the world of intellect and of ignorance, of common sense and uncommon sense, of history and cruelty, of ridicule and falsity; and ever pursued by the human and inhuman hatred of truth. All these forces were for years arrayed against this one woman who brought the message God had placed in her hands to deliver to humanity. But she was never haunted or dismayed by anything the world did to her, or evil might try to do to her, for she never let go of the hand of God.

Never in modern times has a spiritually-minded woman been so relentlessly abused without cause, and her message so misinterpreted and misapplied from envy, jealousy, and spite. Yet, in all the years of persecution which Mrs. Eddy suffered, not one word of retaliation or resentment sprang from her tongue or pen. She never returned evil for evil. And I assert this not as a matter of hearsay or opinion, but from personal knowledge gained from several years of daily association with Mrs. Eddy, who was a member of her own household.

Need it be wondered then that there are multitudes of people who are today profoundly grateful to her who has been the means of restoring to them the things that make life worth the living? And as one among that multitude I am glad here and always to declare my gratitude for what Christian Science has brought into my life through the right understanding of God which it imparts.

God as Principle.

It has been aptly said that life is like an arithmetic, made up of problems which a very few find easy to solve, and which the others never learn to work out. Now we all know that the student's failure to solve the problems of arithmetic are due to his incomplete or defective knowledge and application of the principles of mathematics. But if we ever consider that so many of us fail to solve the problems of everyday life because our incomplete or defective knowledge of the infinite Principle of existence, God?

Christian Science is giving to man an understanding of God as the infinite Principle of all that really exists, the Principle which, in words of our textbook is "underlying, overlying and encompassing all true being." (Science and Health, p. 496.) The Principle which operates through unchanging laws, which are always beneficent, and always comprehensible and demonstrable.

Many of us have been taught in our earliest days that it is not essential to understand God, if we will but believe in Him. Now think of trying to solve an intricate problem in mathematics by merely believing in its principles, without understanding them. And are not the problems of life vastly more important and momentous than anything that mathematics can present? Problems which when wrongly worked leave us heavy laden with sickness, fear, want, misery and sin? Christian Science, following the teachings of Jesus the Christ, shows us that a right understanding of God is as essential to every student in the school of life as an understanding of numbers is to the student of mathematics.

Omnipotence

Every right concept of God as infinite good must include His omnipotence. His omnipotence is His omnipotence. "Little man cannot comprehend these divine qualities in their fullness, but it is a noteworthy fact that in the proportion that you do realize them, in that proportion do you find good coming into your life and evil leaving it. You do not need to know all of God that is in the world, before you get only of the good that comes from using even a little of such knowledge.

As you thus learn to know God, you will discover that any evil thing which may come upon you has not the power to harm you that you once believed it had. You will no longer dread what men may say or do to you. You will no longer fear things, or things to come. You will learn to succeed in spite of failure, to be strong in spite of weakness, to be steadfast in spite of the storm. Sickness, sin, want, failure, and the like lose their hold upon you, and even if they should come upon you, they can not destroy, disturb, or depress you, or master you, or deprive you of your God-given rights, nor can they separate you from the love of God, omnipotent good.

In the proportion you realize that God's omnipotence, that He knows the eternal truth about all that really exists, even to knowing you far better than you know yourself, knowing you and saving you as no man can, and knowing your own image and likeness, reflecting every quality of good—when you discover this about yourself, and see that evil is a part of you, does not belong to you, and cannot control you unless you submit to it, then you put your yourself to get rid of it by refusing it to its native nothingness. As you learn to know more about God, your thought dwells less upon yourself and your own affairs, and you lose that habit of that injurious habit of self-thinking that shows itself in such things as sensitiveness, self-pity, self-righteousness, self-justification, and self-condemnation, which is quite bad. For my friends, man does not need to be condemned, not even by himself; he needs to be saved.

Humanity and the Divine are in the old way of thinking we used to hear much about man being the creature of circumstances. Christian Science is restoring this belief of limitation and is proving that man, if he will, may be the master of circumstance, not its victim. There is a short sentence in our text book bearing on this subject containing only seven words, but so carefully chosen and so skillfully grouped as to form a standard for thought and action which is in agreement with the facts of the universe and leads to victory. were about to enter peace negotiations was immediately sent to President Wilson. Speaking for the president Secretary Tumulty said it was deeply interested, but could make no comment, at least until it was learned what reception the proposal received from the allies.

London Skeptical

LONDON—General note of pessimism prevails in London. One prominent official expressed himself to the Associated Press as being very skeptical that the proposed terms would offer even a basis for negotiations. This official said, however, that the note was a dramatic coup which would create interesting developments in the diplomatic situation and provide the first official peace overtures of the war.

The offer finds the foreign office upset in the midst of a change of administration, but as the new foreign secretary, A. J. Balfour, has kept most closely in touch with the foreign affairs while serving in a different department in the late government it is not expected that it will take long for him to be as well prepared as Viscount Grey, the retiring foreign secretary to take charge of Great Britain's end of any negotiations which might follow Germany's offer.

CHICAGO—Wheat prices came down with a rush Monday, crumpled by Germany's formal proposal of peace. The market was falling of its own weight before the peace news came, but then tumbling headlong making a sheer drop of nearly 50 cents a bushel. Transactions took an immense proportion and the changes in price were too rapid to be followed with anything like completeness on the blackboards.

EYES AND TEETH OF PUPILS TO BE TESTED

These children who are receiving first attention.

The general direction of the work is in charge of Miss Agnes Dillon, the director of Physical Education in the public schools. Miss Dillon is working in cooperation with the physicians and dentists. All communications to the parents advising them of results of the examination are signed by the principals of the buildings.

The first examinations were made this week. Ten children were examined. The children were taken from the primary grades and from the teachers' lists of pupils appearing to be in need of treatment. The following interesting results were produced:

Six of these children have very severe cases of adenoids. These cases are so severe that the progress of these pupils in school will be extremely slow. In three cases the adenoidal trouble has begun to deform the shape of the lower part of the face.

Three children were found to be suffering with very poor eye sight. One child was fitted with the wrong kind of glasses.

Two children were found to be slightly deaf. In both cases it is felt that the deafness can be cured. It is probably caused by catarrhal disorders.

One child was found to have very bad teeth and consequently was suffering with disorders resulting therefrom.

Five children were discovered to have slight defects in their teeth. These can all be remedied at little cost.

One child was found to have very badly diseased tonsils and two with slight disorders of the tonsils.

Nine of the ten children were found to be retarded. It is very probable that in every case, the retarded conditions can be directly traced to bad physical disorders. What a wonderful boon it would be to these children if they could be given necessary medical treatment and their bodies restored to good normal conditions. The parents have been notified of the results of the examination in this splendid work and it is hoped that they will take some steps to bring about helpful corrections.

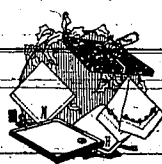

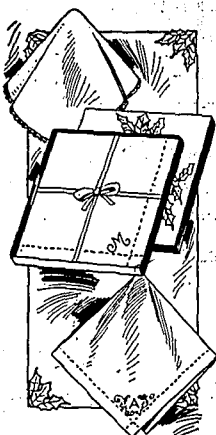

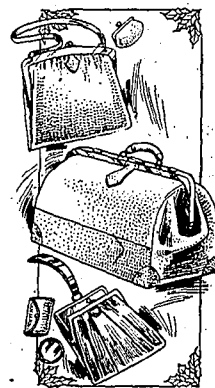
