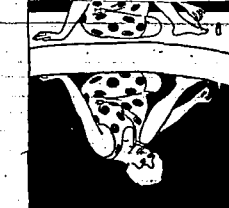

pleased to look for concerts nearer home. This is from Northcliffe's conservative Weekly Dispatch: "We want no more foreigners in our royal family. It is their misfortune, it is their misfortune, that they are pure German in blood, and that whenever and wherever a royal prince or princess is born it is pure German in blood. There is no British blood in our royal family. This remedy is obvious."

"That from the more radical Evening Star: "English opinion, at the present time, would rather see the British prince take his wife from the chorus or the gutter than from a German royal house. And that, of course, is not the alternative."

So confines in the Manchester Dispatch: "These newspapers and others are urging restriction of the Royal Marriage Act, whereby princes of the royal line are practically compelled to marry foreign princesses. The law was passed in 1772 as the result of George III's anger at two brothers who married English ladies of far from royal rank."

"This causes a correspondent of the London Times to say: "British society is barred on religious grounds but after the recent revolution it would be a blinding increase for our court to bring about an alliance with them. The royal families of Italy and Belgium are married by Roman Catholics and the French Bourbons are Protestants or are equally ineligible for that reason or for the offense which would be given the French Republic."

The Manchester paper brings the matter closer home, by saying: "Even in England the position has not always been as clear as one would have liked to see it. We have seen a Royal mother opening bazaars in our midst with her son as the chief attraction. We have seen the brother of a royal prince who fought and died for England fighting for Germany."

RUSSIA REPUBLIC OF PEACE SAYS WRITER

Enthusiastic Correspondent for Magazine Declares That It Will Be Land of Light in Future.

NEW YORK, May 24—Predicting that a republic of peace will rise in Russia after the war, a writer in an issue of the provisional government today sent a message to the American people, through Isaac F. Marcosson, representative of the American Legation in St. Petersburg. "The newest of democracies greets America with peculiar fervor, because it feels that the American people can really understand what the great Russian revolution means," said Mr. Levoff. "Autocracy in Russia is done forever. In its stead will soon rise a republic of peace."

"We wish America to realize thoroughly that there can be but one result of the great upheaval, and that result a real democracy modeled along the lines of the American republic, creating a government by and for the whole people, with equal justice and opportunity to everybody."

"The name Russia once meant darkness and oppression. It will now mean light and freedom. The New Russia will be the frankest and most liberal of republics. In new Russia the Jews and Ghetto are banished. We want America to know that Russia will continue the war to a peace dictated by allied victory. The Russian people are ready to sign any peace, any peace that national conscience approves. Only on complete victory can our republic of peace be secured."

"In that struggle we are proud to have America as an ally. Russia looks to America for fresh funds and for the leading commercial democratic kinship."

NATIONAL LEAGUE MUST WIN THIS YEAR OR SUFFER

President Says They Have As Good Material As America, But Do Not Appear As Well.

BY H. C. HAMILTON (United Press) NEW YORK, May 24—The National league must win some world's championships or baseball—as well as the National League, is going to suffer, said John K. Tener, president of the National League today.

"The ease with which the Red Sox defeated Brooklyn last year and the fact that they had little trouble in winning from Philadelphia the year before makes it rather hard for the National League."

"We haven't been winning world's championships often enough. The reputations of the old Cubs and the old Giants don't do us much good. The fact that the Braves established a record by winning a world's championship in four straight games, defeating what is called the greatest baseball machine ever pieced together, doesn't get us any prestige at all. We have to get to win championships and keep on winning them."

"I realize just as much as any one that our league doesn't seem to shap up with the National League. I know in my own heart that by comparison—honest comparison on the record of years—that we do not suffer."

Tener undoubtedly has grasped the point on which the National league kind of baseball is going to live or die. The National league will have to win some championships before it can take rank with the brand produced by Ben Johnson's subjects.

JAPANESE TO BRAZIL FOR COLONIZATION

Large Number to Work on Coffee Plantations and in the Rice Fields at Sao Paulo.

arrived in this port the captain announced that his was the first steamer of a regular service established between Japan and South America. His ship brought the first cargo of Japanese manufactures ever shipped to this country. It included colloid articles, toilet articles, perfumes, silk goods and some canned foods. The next ship in this service, the captain declared will bring the first lot of immigrants from Japan to Brazil, 5,000 of whom must arrive before the end of December according to a contract signed by the Brazilian state of Sao Paulo and the Japanese government. The Japanese immigrants will be controlled on the coffee and rice plantations of the interior of Sao Paulo. The "Kafuka Maru" took a return cargo of rubber, woods, minerals and coffee. The service will be four steamers per year to begin.

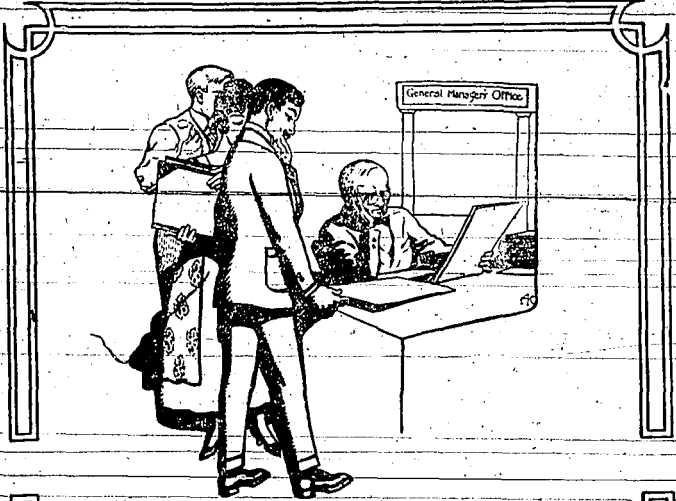

NATIONAL BANK FOR BUHL ALMOST ASSURED

Application Has Been Made and Comptroller Will Soon Be on Hand to Inspect.

"Yes, you have been correctly informed," said Asher B. Wilson yesterday, when asked if it were true as reported from Buhl that he was interested in a proposed national bank for the west and metropolis. Mr. Wilson said that he was interested along with a number of well to do citizens of Buhl and that application for a charter had been regularly made. The comptroller is expected soon to investigate the proposition, and if satisfied, a charter will be granted. He declined to disclose the names of others interested pending the receipt of a charter, but said he hoped that the institution would be ready for business by August 1. 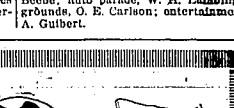

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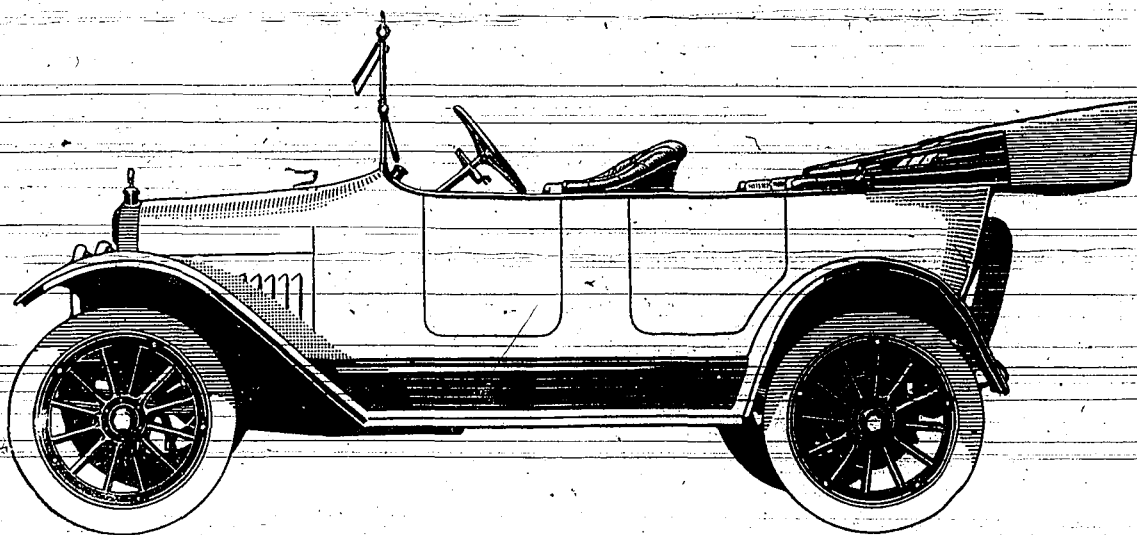

GERMAN SOLDIERS FEAR DEATH WHEN TAKEN BY ALLIES

BELIEVE THAT THEY WILL BE SHOT AS REPRISAL FOR ACTS OF TEUTON ARMS

FALSE INFORMATION GIVEN OUT BY HINDENBERG

Effort Made By Noted German General to Make Soldiers Believe That They Had Better Die Fighting Than Surrender.

BY HENRY WOOD

(Caled Press) WITH FRENCH ARMS, May 24.—One of the "imperative military necessities" for the incredible devastation and destruction being wrought by the Germans along the pathway of their retreat in France is to convince the German soldiers themselves that if they either desert or surrender to the French they will be instantly shot in reprisal. German soldiers now being taken prisoners by the French along the entire front between the Aisne and Sping, recently declared without exception to their captors that they realize they are going to be shot and are quite prepared for it. With the Germans manifestly having various aims in view in their system-

atic policy of reducing every inch of French soil occupied by them to a wasteful desert, the French military authorities have been able to establish definitely from the German prisoners captured that not the least of these objects is to inject the morale of desperation into the German army. The latter are told not only that they will be instantly killed if they fall into the hands of the French—but that unless they fight to the death in an effort to keep the Allied troops from reaching German soil their own homes, farms and villages will quite naturally suffer the same fate by way of reprisal that they have inflicted on the homes, farms and villages of France.

The need of desperate measures on the part of the German military authorities to keep their troops from surrendering on every possible occasion has for a long time past been fully established. One of the most striking evidences of this were the orders of Hindenberg himself issued after the French attacks at Verdun last November and December. The prisoners in these two affairs alone tallied nearly 29,000.

Hindenberg in his orders to his generals, copies of which have since fallen into the hands of the French, scathed in merciless terms the lack of morale on the part of the German troops which permitted them to surrender by thousands without the least bit of resistance. Imperative orders that all responsible officers take immediate steps to overcome this condition were given. Since then, however, this tendency of the Germans to surrender on every possible occasion has increased so steadily, that Hindenberg himself has forced to take heroic measures to overcome it. German soldiers now being taken prisoners as well as other sources confirm the fact that it was Hindenberg who conceived the idea for the wholesale devastation of all territory which the Germans are forced to abandon. It is under his orders that

all German regiments now falling back on the western front have regularly appointed crews whose sole business it is to destroy all property and to leave every inch of the ground that goes back into the hands of the French a veritable desert. The same sources confirm likewise that one of Hindenberg's principal objects in this is to place the entire German army now on the west in a position where it will realize that it is better to die fighting than to surrender and where it will realize that only fighting to the last will save their own homes from the same fate they have inflicted on France.

LOOKOUT MOUNTAIN TO HAVE MONUMENT

Bekeye State to Commemorate Work Her Troops in "Battle Above The Clouds."

(United Press)

LOOKOUT MOUNTAIN, Tenn., May 24.—The new monument erected by the state of Ohio commemorating the bravery of her sons who fought in the famous battle that took place here November 24, 1865, was formally dedicated today. The monument, in the form of a granite column located just below the summit of the mountain, is nearly 125 feet high. Executives were in charge of the Lookout Mountain memorial commission of Ohio, composed of soldiers of regiments which took part in the engagement. Members of the commission are Samuel H. Holton, McComb, chairman; Charles W. Wheeler, Roseburg; Charles H. Grosvenor, Athens; Alfred E. May, Bowling; Sigee Hill, Morrow and Benjamin Hurry, London. Governor James M. Cox was the principal speaker at the dedication; also attended with members of his military staff, including Adjutant General George H. Wood. Several regi-

ments and one Ohio battery of light artillery fought in the battle. In the face of almost certain defeat, the Buckeye soldiers made their way up the mountain side and finally were victorious.

The names of each organization and the commanders will be inscribed on tablets at the base of the monument.

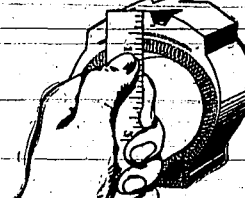

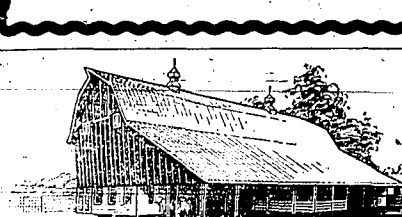
