MIGHT GET TWO EXTRA HOURS

Advocates of Daylight Saving Could Do It by Setting Alarms Ahead as Well as Clocks.

One good thing about compensations is that they are always ready to change to suit circumstances. That is, of course, what compensations are for. We have, therefore, no further to add to our minds that we shall have to stay at home with our back-yard gardens this summer than we are confronted by the suggestion that our clocks may be set ahead in order to give us an extra hour in the garden every evening. It is easy enough to understand that an hour in the garden every evening is worth thirty times as much as an hour in the morning. There is, to be sure, the question of getting up an hour earlier every morning, but it would not really seem an hour earlier. Most of us do not like getting up in the morning, no matter what time it is, and an hour of so makes no noticeable difference at that time of day. As far as all that is concerned there may be some difference of opinion as to whether the clocks should be set ahead in order to give us the hour in the evening or set them ahead in order to give us the extra hour in the morning. It looks on the face of it as though it might be possible to get two extra hours out of our days.

MINISTERS' SONS NOT BAD

Have Been Greatly Maligned by Old Saying, Says Investigator After Look Into Records.

A patient investigator has lately taken the trouble to inquire into the old saying that ministers' sons are likely to come to a bad end, and the result of his research seems to be the conviction that a heretofore unfounded charge is born into a minister's family. He finds that one-twelfth of all the men whose names appear in "Who's Who" are sons of preachers. Four of these were sons of ministers: Buchanan, Arthur, Cleveland and Wilson; three of the great Boston group of writers, Emerson, Lowell and Holmes, were of ministerial parentage; so were Parkman and Bancroft; and the remarkable Phila. Bradley, Cyrus W. David Dudley and Stephen J. The influence of the eminent Jonathan Edwards appears to have extended far down in the line of his descendants. For the list includes one vice president, three senators, thirty judges, sixty authors, twelve college presidents, and not one of the 1,314 who were traced was ever considered of a crime. The list of distinguished distinguished names could be greatly extended, for they are to be found in every line of activity.—Indianapolis Star.

Economic Situation of Russia.

The economic situation of Russia has become insupportable. The poverty of its population—that is the artisans and peasants—that is, there are millions of these latter whose annual expenses do not exceed a few more dollars per head. Villages are still numerous where the inhabitants make as of old, their own clothes by the most primitive methods, and only go to neighboring towns in order to buy necessities of hardware, such as nails, syringes, etc., indispensable for their household needs and for agricultural purposes.—A. Velmick, in Industrial Management.

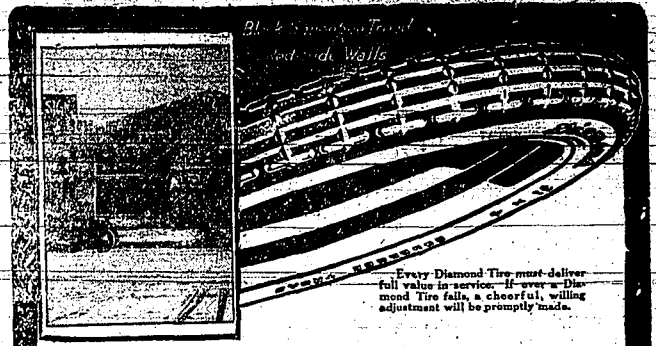

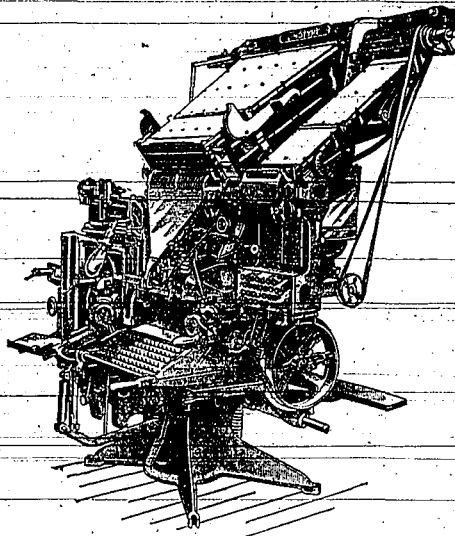

It is expected that the entire national guard will be in federal service before these training camps are opened. The applicant's organization is not in federal service at time of making application, he must include with his application a signed statement of approval of the state recommending the applicant as suitable for appointment as an officer and agreeing to discharge him, or furnish him for three months, beginning August 27, 1917, if not in federal service on that date.

AUXILIARY FORMED AND MORE THAN FORTY MEMBERS HAVE ALREADY JOINED ASSOCIATION

Road Over Summits Opened to Freighters

Elkoro Company Grades Hill Near Mill--Several New Strikes--Big Ice House Undermined and Ice Washed Away

JARBIDGE, July 4--The Jarbridge auxiliary of the Red Cross was organized here today. Over 40 persons part their dues and were enrolled as members. A temporary organization was formed two weeks ago, but a delay in the receipt of the necessary papers and instructions held up the regular organization until today. The first two Sundays there has been very enthusiastic meetings and now that the auxiliary is fully organized, it is expected that the number of members will increase rapidly. Mrs. Elsie S. Kraige was elected chairman and Mrs. Catherine B. Knight was elected secretary.

A volunteer committee was called for to make Red Cross badges to pin on applicants on July 10. There is a dozen ladies offering to make up a dozen badges each.

A large committee of the young ladies were appointed to act as distributors of these badges and "tag" all persons who were not already members of the Red Cross.

The committee of the ladies working with the entertainment committee of the commercial club gave a special dance on flag day, for the purpose of raising money to buy a new flag for the club. Our old flag has been with us a long time and plainly shows that it is a veteran of many winds.

The new flag will be unfurled from a new pole on the Fourth, with appropriate exercises.

A work shop meeting was held in the commercial club on Monday night attended and it was voted to send a team and ten men up to help open the road over Log Bear creek and Coon Creek summits. There is no communication started to the south.

Two days work opened it so that several wagon caravans are now on the trail. Still three drifts which are high and hard and will support a good load, but will have to be watched and shoveled for fear of a slide. The freight teams with an ordinary load can come right over them, and a whole string of teams are expected to come over on Monday.

More than a hundred tons of freight which has been lying along the road the other side of the summit all winter will now be rushed into camp. There will have to be considerable work done on the road, especially on the Pavlak and along the top of the hills. The unusually high water this year has done a lot of damage to the roads and bridges, although the citizens of Jarbridge have done a lot of work trying to save them.

The Elkoro company is grading on the hill also opposite the town for the mill although as yet they are but a few men at work and only tools, plows, scrapers, etc., but it surely is good to see even a start made on new work.

The Long Hill mine continues to add ore reserves to its already blocked off mill.

The Starlight has been encountering some pretty high grade ore recently which is very satisfactory.

On the Lighthouse mine the new shaft is staying with and some of the best values so far found are being opened. The mill will be rushed in just as soon as the shaft is open.

George Winger has been working for some time on the Single Jack ranch, in Big Lost Valley, and is making a large opening of quartz and has crossed it for 35 feet in width and has shown more ore than the pan from samples all the way across. This evidently means another big mine.

C. B. Patterson has installed a bottling works and is now putting up soda water of all flavors for the summer trade.

The high water undermined the ice house of "Harve" and he has moved and before he knew about it the house was nearly empty and 50 tons of ice, a public supply for the town, had gone down stream.

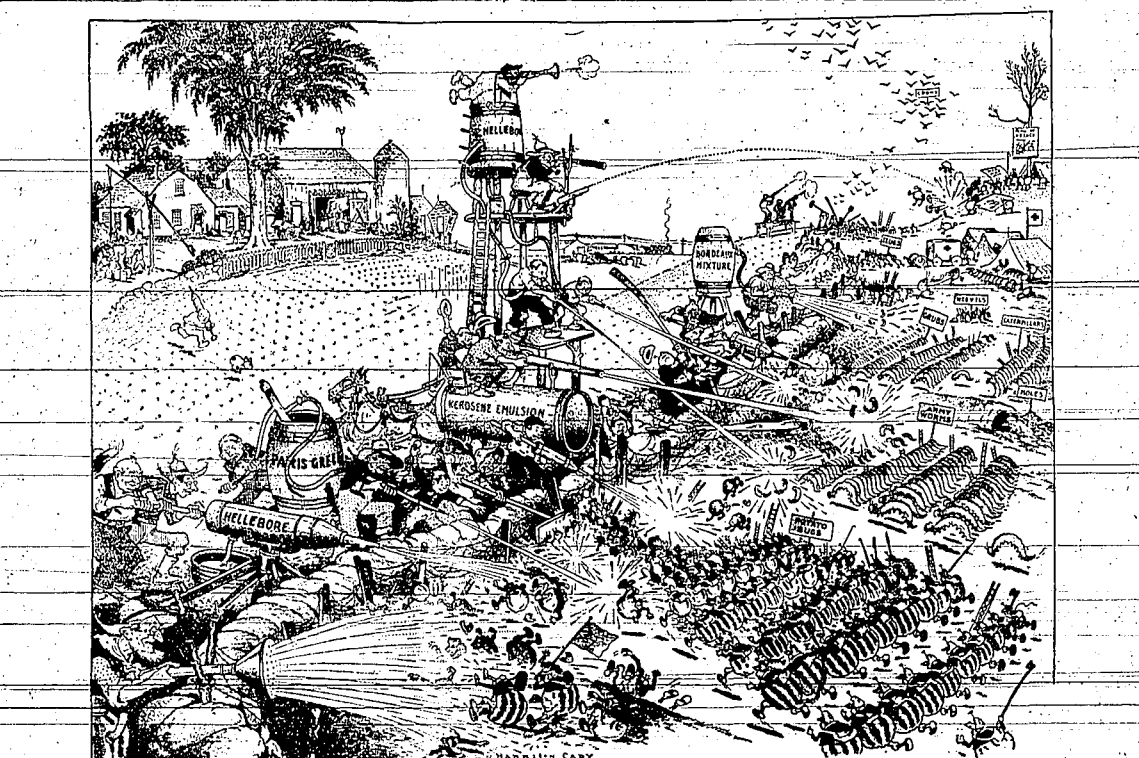
There are a few small private ice houses and there are lots of snow on the mountain so very far away from town.

IDAHO JOINS THE WORLD WAR

Now that so many undesirable foreigners have begun to infect the State of Idaho, the farmers are beginning to hammer away at them in the European style, making flanking movements with deadly gases and powerful spray batteries, throwing deadly irritant fluids upon the enemies of fruit and field crops.

Thus for some time, our local forces have been trained upon the fortified positions of the Chinese or Juan Jose Scale behind its wax-breast, the Spanish apple worm of Collins, such hideous insect centers, and many others. More recently, we have trained our cavalry charges against the Asiatic Afilwa weevil, sweeping him in the dust and wherever possible, or moving down his tanks

with the disc harrow. How unfortunate then, that we should have a sudden defection among our native inhabitants, in the shape of the clover aphid attacking our seed clover fields and endangering \$7,000 or more acres planted to red clover, to say nothing of white and alkali clover, short-legged clover aphid has marched forth upon us in countless billions, laying waste much of the \$700,000 crop of seed. This veritable multiplier that daubs friends and enemies alike with a sticky honey-dew in which they themselves often get entangled, hides more like Mexican guerrillas, which takes the most astute military methods to dislodge them from their entrenchments between the clover flowers and under the head of the same protected by the two main leaf

bract fitting against the base of the clover head. Here they live in invulnerable chambers, multiplying and garrisoning until a company of 50 per head, unknown and unseen by the farmer who inspects his fields regularly. At last, gaining confidence in numbers they rally forth among the flowers all over the top of the head, sneaking in the viscous honey-dew until no threshing device can sort seed from chaff.

And what are the deadly projectiles and streams of liquid fire which Idahoans spray with such unnatural ferocity upon the enemy? One of the most powerful alkaloidal poisons, nicotine, which lingers in the free air of the open fields without complete evaporation, in quantity sufficient to defeat the enemy in successive onslaughts; but without danger to

the domestic stock which eat the clover hay. Also, the soap such as used to coax mother's hands in the family wash tub, any yellow rosin soap being useful for the purpose to spread the poison spray on the clover heads and leaf bracts. Again, caustic lime sulphur may be used to put their "eyes out" in combination with the nicotine; or better, soluble oil in caustic potash and creolin to make them grasp for breath, or with fish oil concoctions to prevent their breathing at all.

False alarms have delayed the plans of battle at various times--attempts to defeat the enemy by spraying spraying of fruit trees to kill the new batch from the overwintering eggs, which the fall migrations of the clover aphid hide upon the tree buds belief in the efficiency of cutting for hay, which

does kill large numbers but not sufficient to stop the march of an invader; sweating the clover hay in the stack to save the huddled remains of our seed hosts, but failing to work completely to the eradication of the honey-dew; adherence to the bug-killing plan that the first crop will make the best seed crop, only to suffer worse defeat at the hands of the enemy; and many more. Under the circumstances, it would be well for the various units of our farm forces to consult with Professor A. C. Burrill at the headquarters of the Twin Falls Farm Bureau.

Austria Cruel Master to Little Montenegro

Concentration Camps and Military Excesses Features of Rule of Empire.

By Camillo Caimarra, International News Service Staff Correspondent.

ROME, July 5.--I have just learned details of the cruel regime Austria has maintained in the conquered Kingdom of Montenegro. An informant is a neutral diplomat of high standing, who, for obvious reasons, does not wish his name published. His account is as follows:

"The ruthless rule of Baron Otto, former Austrian Minister Plenipotentiary at Cetinje, together with the work of the hangman and the persecution on a large scale, have so far utterly failed in curbing the spirit of the courageous, liberty loving population of Montenegro.

What the Austrian authorities have done in Montenegro in the last eighteen months will make highly interesting reading some day. I have witnessed scenes of revolting cruelties and have first-hand opportunity for studying the barbarous methods by which Austria hoped to enslave the small people. Next, I think God, an hour ago, may say that the Austrians have failed.

First of all, Austria endeavored to destroy in the kingdom every suggestion of foreign influence, especially Serbian and Italian. As regards Serbia, Baron Otto kept a steady stream of literature in the Serbian language flowing into the little kingdom depicting in bright colors how happy and how prosperous the Serbian nation was under Austrian domination.

For Italy a radically different method was adopted. Italian newspapers containing defamatory articles concerning Montenegro and the parts its people had played in the war were introduced and circulated among the best class of Montenegrins.
