Twin Falls People in Big Oil Field

Over 100 Invest in Proposition at Fossil, Wyo., Which Looks Mighty Good to Them.

That an oil field of first rate magnitude is developing near Kemmerer, Wyoming, and that Twin Falls people are on the ground first is indicated by information contained in papers published in that city and by the statements of gentlemen from the city who have visited here.

These gentlemen feel very enthusiastic over the prospects of oil in the Fossil field and the fact that oil has been discovered at least some years ago when a comparatively shallow well was drilled they feel that by going a little deeper that oil is paying handsomely.

The Idaho-Wyoming Oil company is owned principally by business men and capitalists in the vicinity of Twin Falls, Idaho.

James A. Wisco, attorney from Twin Falls, Idaho, was a visitor in Kemmerer and the Fossil oil fields Wednesday and Thursday of this week.

Mr. Wisco represents a crop of Idaho capitalists and bankers who are very much interested in the Fossil field and have many large tracts of oil lands and have spent over \$20,000 in preliminary work.

A great deal of interest has been created in the Fossil field among business men and capitalists of Idaho, and it is expected that within a very short period several large companies will be organized to start drilling.

Mr. Wisco was in Kemmerer in connection with some legal matters and to confer with the engineers and geologists in such shape now that his syndicate would feel justified in going ahead with the work.

The editor of the Journal, who is a director in the Wyoming-Idaho company, with honoree of the Twin Falls, visited the field in company with W. T. Wood, the manager, on Sunday last. All he can say is that the cautious man who runs this company is bound to be a great success.

SOUNDNESS OF HORSE

One of the First Considerations of the Buyer.

Temporary Unfitness Should Be Distinguished from Permanent Unsoundness—Some of Common Faults and Remedies.

(By H. H. REESE) Selection of a horse must be based primarily on a thorough, systematic examination—the examination should be based on a clear knowledge of desirable and undesirable qualities.



Shoulders Lacking in Depth and in Good Seat for a Collar.

A hurried examination is likely to prove a disappointment. Obvious blemishes, vice, faulty conformation, unsoundness and general characteristics. Common blemishes are scars from old wounds, poll evil, scratches, shoe boils and small ruptures.

Common unsoundnesses are splints, thoroughpins, spavin, curb, extreme fast, ringbone, side bones, extreme atrophy of muscles, contracted tendons and broken wind.

Enlargements or scars (due to density, going plain, abscess or uncorrected disease) not conforming to any of those discussed should cause a horse to be rejected unless the nature of the cause and the detriment to the value and usefulness of the animal in a certain experience gained by examining large numbers of horses will aid in quickening the eye and judgment, thereby making it possible to perceive readily any unusual condition.

There is no international language of flags established by law but by common consent flags of a certain color are used for certain purposes. All over the world a yellow flag is a signal of contagious disease.

CAUSE OF SCOURS IN CALVES

Avoid Irregular Feeding and Dirty Milk or Pails—Best to Separate Affected Animal.

Scours in calves are caused by irregular feeding, including sudden change of feed, fermented feeds, feeding of sour milk or milk of diseased cows, the use of dirty milk pails or feed boxes, and damp, dirty stables.

FEED CALF SEPARATED MILK

This May Be Done Where Animals Are Especially Stocky at Birth—Change Gradually.

Calves especially strong at birth may be put on separated milk entirely at two weeks of age but this should not be done until the mother's milk is in the calf is in vigorous and thrifty condition.

SNAIL IS WELL PROTECTED

Withdraws into Shell at Hint of Danger and Tightly Closes the Only Opening.

Snails are most interesting creatures and are easily observed, especially if one has an aquarium. The big Japanese water snail, crawling up the side of the glass, shows all its parts and legs as virtually the same on all species.

"Above the flat, gray foot is a snout at the end of which we see a mouth opening and closing, doubtless like a winking eye, except that it opens laterally instead of up-and-down."

"The tubelike opening on one side above the foot forms a passageway for the water and air that gills through which this snail breathes."

"The foot and head of the snail are the only parts of the body we can see, for the rest of it is wound about spirally within the coils of the shell. Now if we fan the glass of the aquarium the snail suddenly drops to the bottom of the tank, pulling in its tentacles, its mouth, and finally its foot, and lightly closes the opening to its shell by means of a round lid of the same substance as the shell and fastened to the back of the foot."

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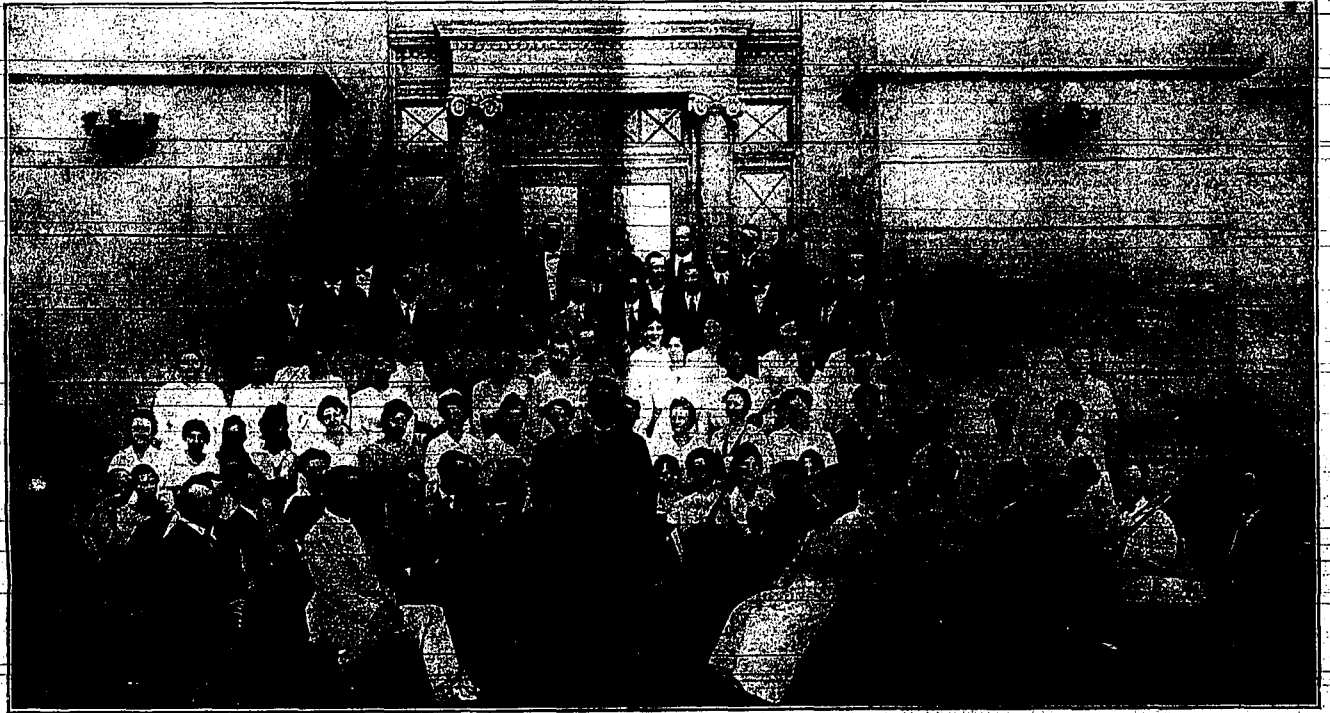

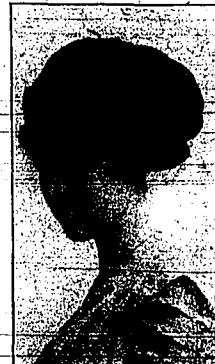

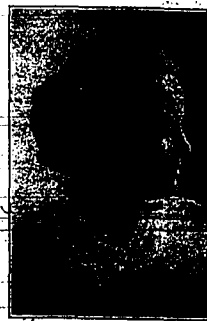
