Money to be Paid "When the War Is Won" America Will Ignore Suggestion of Maximilian Harden-Pope Benedict Said to be Preparing Another Note as Result of Private Assurance That Replies of Central Powers Were for Home Consumption and That They Will Offer More Reasonable Terms Soon.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 25.—The Pan-Gorman league has issued pamphlet telling the German people that the imperial government fill exact an indemnity of \$87,500,000,000 from the allies "when the ar is won."

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—An armistice before German and American troops meet on the battlefield, as suggested by Maximilian Harden is out of the question as matters now stand, state department and White House officials, declared today.

There will be no formal statement of this government's attitude since the suggestion comes from a private clitzen and not from the German government. But even should such a proposal come from Wilhelm Strasse itself no doubt was left today that it would be incomfilly rejected.

Maxmilian Harden is regarded by Washingon officials as one of the most enlightened of Germans and his views always are listened to with interest. Official Washington is willing to go a long way with Harden, since it is regarded as certain that he will play a prominent part in the Foforin movement that is expected to overturn the present system of government in Germany.

But today government officials believed Harden had been decived by the German reply to the pope's peace note when he said it reflected the honest will of a majority of the German pople. Officials said Harden's desire for peace evidently blinded him to the fluct that the German reply was penned to stimulate the present ideus of the German people for its possible effect on the United States and in reality was not a frank statement of their purpose and desires.




