



# HOW AVIATION IS TAUGHT ON FIELDS IN FRENCH NATION

### C. J. Younger, Twin Falls Boy, Writes Home of Experiences Since Joining the Aero Branch of Our National Army.

Having entered the aviation service, no more flying today, though we will have a lecture in a few minutes. C. J. Younger, whose interesting letters from the front to his parents have aroused great interest, now writes concerning experiences in his field to death—we're in the army now.

Sunday, Aug. 26, 1917. Aviation School, Tours, France. Dear Folks: It is raining and blowing considerably this afternoon, so there will be

but our training will only then be complete. For we train in jumps and stunts, machine gunning and bombing. This is a French school and I was one of the first Americans from the American army to arrive here. I'm glad to receive French training though some of our instructors speak English, they must know their wings very satisfactorily by numerous slaps, jabs and jerks on our clothing when we are in the air. I hope to do some flying alone in a week or so. At present I go up with an instructor in a dual control machine and whenever I make a mistake which I think I frequently do he corrects it. The quantity around here from the height of a few hundred meters is absolutely wonderful. My poor little vocabulary is entirely too inadequate to say where most describe the beauties of miniature looking lakes of glass, of lustrous blue, of numerous with beautiful hedges and gardens hidden away in the hazy-mistable mists of the air. And we are a most happy bunch—all Americans and soldiers men, with practically every interesting experience imaginable; and the government is doing us very well with pretty decent quarters—if we overlook the trouble caused by bed bugs; and the food is excellent. In the nature of our hours we have four meals a day and get sufficient sleep we must utilize part of the afternoon for sleeping. We do not touch the machines outside of flying them. We have mechanics for that purpose and for a few franc a month we receive fairly decent valet service.

For your information you are always possibilities, but that's all in the game and looked forward to as almost inevitable. Yesterday morning there were five suns and not one a man was so much as scratched. It looks funny to see a fellow crawl out from under a mosquito after a fall, which just about annihilates the machine and to have the fellow grin sheepishly and in most cases a little sickly, when he asks for a cigarette. I hope the men in Twin Falls are not suffering from cold feet and are not trying to be exempted; regardless of the outcome, don't think I can be called any kind of a slacker, and if I only make good in this work I shall certainly glory in being permitted to take so active a part in the war. I think in most any case you folks can have a more or less feeling of pride that I at least, gave my best.

Of course an old man like me, know what our future duties are to be. It is quite likely that some of us will be selected to act as instructors, both here and in the states. I don't suppose it's possible, but if I'm selected for duties at the front immediately on finishing my training, I'm going to make every effort to return to the states for a short visit. Our personal outfits consist of a flannel lined leather suit, a weather heavy gloves, head sweater and a very high and efficient cork helmet. Since the 7th of July I have received but one letter from you folks and I suppose that my new address and the new address of the army post office are here, that I'll still wait some time for the next letter. Please send my new address and did you attend to my insurance?

Tours is one of the four big cities of France, with many interesting cathedrals, buildings and historical places. As yet I have not gone to the city from camp, but I intend to get off for a day and do a regular job of sight-seeing. Just returned from a lecture and since there is to be no flying this afternoon we are to have supper at 7:30 instead of 9:00. It certainly was a relief to get away from Paris and I like it very much as a beautiful city. It's rather nice and there if one has nothing to do. Paris is arranged almost entirely for the foreigner and in that respect disagreeable. I will write again in a few days and I hope that in the meantime I receive a letter from you. ### CADILLAC COSTS LESS IN FARM PRODUCTS

Fewer Bushels of Wheat, Fewer Bushels of Cotton, Now Required to Equal Car's Price. According to data collected by the Cadillac Motor Car company and sent to Mangel Brothers of this city, the price of its cars is relatively lower today than it ever has been. While the materials entering into the car have advanced in cost from 60 to 100 per cent, and in some cases more than 150 per cent, to say nothing of increased labor cost, the price of the car has not been advanced even on a scale with the minimum increase before mentioned. The data shows that whereas it took about 1750 bushels of wheat to buy last year's car, it now takes only about 1200 bushels. Last year \$200 bushels of corn would buy a Cadillac, while this year 1400 bushels will do it. Last year 30 bales of cotton bought the car; this year about 20 bales serve the purpose. And so on, down the line—potatoes, pig iron and eggs; beans, leather and cheese; onions, lumber and hard, it requires one to two-thirds less of these products to perform the service they did a year ago.

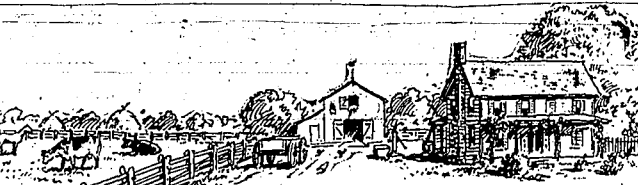
### Austria Prepares to Fight the Russians

### "SAVE MILCH COWS AND SAVE THE BABIES"

(International News Service) COLONNETT'S, O., Sept. 22.—"Save the milch cows." Officials in charge of the National Dairy Show to be held here October 18-27, have adopted this slogan. "Kill the cow and you will kill the babies. This truth is proven by the statistics on infant mortality in the countries at war," says W. E. Skinner, general manager of the proposed big show. "It is absolutely essential to the welfare of the nation that the sale of dairy cows for slaughter cease at once." "Since January 1 there has been a decrease of 15 per cent in the stock of milch cows in this country. With the price of cattle foods so high, that it is hard to make a profit on the sale of milk, the farmer has sold for from \$50 to \$100 the cow for which he paid \$60, and said 'I'll buy in again when the price goes down. But he won't be able to buy when he wants to if the slaughtering continues.' "The National Dairy Show association will this year impress upon the dairymen that it is their duty to keep their cows, even if they have to lose money to do so."

### BEAUTIFUL ACTRESS TAKES DEADLY POISON.

Leased Wire) NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—Mrs. Dolores Jamb, often referred to while a moving picture star in California as "The most beautiful woman in California," took bichloride of mercury at a Staten Island hotel today. Later she called the clerk, informed him of her act and said "she did not wish to die." Physicians say she cannot recover. She was registered under the name of Margaret Burpee. Jamb's father is a wealthy miner of Colorado. Detectives say she was recently divorced from her husband.

### CLAIMANTS ARE RELIEVED OF WORK DURING WAR.

NIP AND TUCK BETWEEN TEAMS SAYS VELOCK

SOME POINTS FAVOR GIANTS AND OTHERS LEAN TO THE WHITE SOX

Hard to Figure From Past Achievements

International News Service Export Gives Some Tips on Big Men in Coming Battle for the Championship.

By Jack Velock. (International News Sport Editor) NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—A comparison of the White Sox and Giants pitchers, who work in the coming world's series will be highly important, reveals that there is little to choose one way or the other if figures are to be taken as a basis for sizing them up.

Figures, however, we are told, yet no set of figures ever compiled has shown how ball players compare in anything else but mechanical ability.

At first base it appears to the writer that Holke may be counted on to stand off Chick Gandil. Holke is the poorer fielder of the two, but during the present season he has been a superior at the bat, for he has been hitting around .300 of late, while Gandil lurks around the .270 mark.

At second base the White Sox must give the edge to Eddie Collins, an all-around better player than Buck Herzog, and, though both men are quick thinkers, who know baseball and can manage it, Collins is a split-second the fastest in the use of gray matter.

Collins is also a better hitter. He has been outshooting Herzog by more than fifty points, and because of Herzog's spinal injury, which may eventually force him to retire from the game as a regular, his fielding effectiveness cannot be compared to that of the lightning-fast, sure-footed Collins.

The Giants will open up the count at shortstop, however. Artie Fletcher has over Swede Risberg in hitting by some fifty points and is practically as sure a fielder, though a step slower, than the Chicago youngster. Both players are peppery performers.

And now comes the closest comparison of all—that between Heinie Zimmerman and George Weaver, who is expected, will be fit as a fiddle and as full of fight and ginger as ever by the time the big series starts. Here are two players whose work around third base is both brilliant and consistent.

There are many critics who will say that Weaver is the better fielder, yet Zimmerman has performed better this year as a fielder than ever before, and makes some wonderfully timely stops. The only point against Zimmerman is that he is a bit of a player who is liable to go up in the air under fire from the opposing bench, because he is prone to lose his temper.

As a batsman—Zimmerman has shown himself to be some twenty-five points better than Weaver on the season, but the Chicagoan is always a dangerous man with the bat, and both players have taught the pitchers of opposing clubs to respect them in the pinches. Of the two Zimmerman hits the ball hardest and farthest when he gets a hot-rod.

In base-running the White Sox infielders are superior, but the Giants, as a whole, are perhaps better rough-and-ready hitters, and they lack nothing in the line of ginger. If Weaver does not play in the big series the Giants will have an edge, for Zimmerman is not to be compared with Zimmerman. Otherwise there seems to be no hitting to choose and most likely Old Dan Fortune will play her part in settling the question of which infield showed to better advantage when the series is over.

The attorney of whom you speak told me, as I recall it, that he came at the request of another attorney who was unable to be present. He did not claim to be that he represented the Twin Falls Commercial club, or make any other claims, as I recall it, than the one which I have told you.

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He added, however, that if anyone were anxious to know why he opposed the measure he would be glad to tell the stockholders his reasons at a meeting. It could be seen that he was not asked to go by the Commercial club or Mr. McMillan.

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—Mass meetings of all kinds and varieties are being held in New York City and vicinity to protest against the proposed policy of the government to compel the business men to begin grave digging. Doesn't sound possible, does it? If you don't believe it, write to the League of Conscientious Objectors and they will tell you it is true.

The "conscientious objectors" are willing to pray—without fighting, having a "conscientious objection" to war—but they certainly do object to being forced into service as grave diggers. And that is what the government proposes to do with them. They will be sent to France to dig the graves for and bury the brave men who have died for their country. Charles Southworth, head of the league, thinks the proposition is a public scandal.

"We consider it a national disgrace to be placed in the category of grave diggers," he said, with more show of rage than an all wool and a yard wide C. O. might care to. "The million of the objectors is keenly felt and their indignation knows no bounds. Every conscientious objector in the country will be given a chance to express his opinion about being classed as a grave digger.
