REIGNING OFFER NEW LEAGUE OF NATIONS, SAYS REPORT

LONDON, April 22.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Amsterdam asserts that the German peace delegates have been instructed to propose at Versailles a plan for a league of nations to replace the plan adopted by the peace conference in Paris. The dispatch adds that the German plan was drafted mainly by Count von Bernstorff, former ambassador to the United States; Matthias Erzberger, president of the German armistice commission; Professor Walter Meuschel and Carl Knautsky, one of the socialist leaders.

MAY BOTTLE BEER WITH 2-3-4 KICK

Revenue Authorities Back Up in Their Attitude in New York.

By the Associated Press. NEW YORK, April 23.—Coincident with an announcement by United States District Attorney Coffey that he had received no instructions from Washington to prosecute brewers distributing beer of 2-3-4 per cent alcoholic content in violation of food conservation regulations promulgated by the internal revenue department, government counsel stated here today that the department had taken steps to permit resumption of beer bottling. Collectors throughout the country have been directed, it was stated, to which have remained idle since brewing was forbidden by presidential proclamation December 1, last.

The two announcements were made in federal court in the course of an argument on the government's motion to dismiss the brewers' suit to restrain official interference with the production of a 2-3-4 per cent brew, alleged to be non-intoxicating. Speculation resulted as to whether the government's attitude, including authorization made early this week of the sale of revenue stamps hitherto denied the manufacturers, would continue after they had no knowledge of the course to be pursued when the emergency act forbidding manufacture after April 30 and the safe after June 30 of "beer, wine and other intoxicating, malt or vinous beverages" goes into operation.

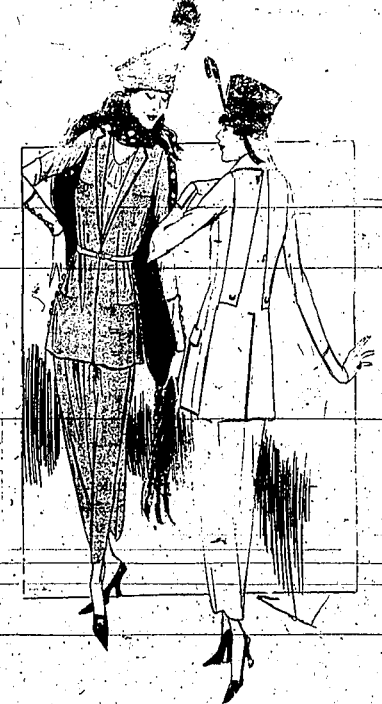
The internal revenue department's reversal of its earlier attitude, which had been based on a ruling that beer of half of one per cent or greater alcoholic content was intoxicating and so forbidden under the modified regulations effective early this year permitting production of "beer beer," was brought up during the argument before Judge A. N. Hand of William D. Guthrie, junior, counsel with Ellis Root for the United States Brewers' association.

Argument on the district attorney's motion to dismiss the suit brought in the interest of the country's brewers by the Jacob Hoffman Brewing company, to enjoin the district attorney and the collector of internal revenue from interfering with the production of 2-3-4 beer, will last throughout tomorrow, counsel advised Judge Hand.

WOULD GROUP ENGINEERING HUBBARD INTO ONE BODY Societies Represented Desire All Branches Under Department of the Interior.

CHICAGO, April 23.—Delegates representing engineering societies with an aggregate membership of more than 100,000 at a conference here today voted unanimously to recommend legislation which would group in a national department of public works many of the engineering bureaus of various government departments. It was the general sentiment of the delegates that such a department should be under the department of the interior.

The resolution adopted also called for availability of the proposed department of public works for use in connection with other government projects not included in the grouping and for special engineering and architectural work. It was further recommended that there be a systematic classification and organization of engineers, architects and other employees.

OPERATORS OPPOSE FURTHER CONTROL

Want to Limit Their Own Affairs After Peace Comes to Nation.

By the Associated Press. CLEVELAND, April 23.—Bituminous coal operators from virtually every producing field in the United States today unanimously disapproved proposals that the government continue to direct affairs of the industry after the proclamation of peace.

The plan, which was proposed by Fuel Administrator Garfield and submitted to operators and miners for ratification or rejection, came before directors of the National Coal association at today's meeting here, on referendum vote from approximately 2,600 bituminous operators producing three-fourths of the country's soft coal.

Provision was made in the rejected proposals for the administration of the industry's affairs after the proclamation of peace by an official to be designated by the president and to be elected by an advisory board of three members appointed by the operators and three members named as miners. The plan also proposed that the president ask congress to enact legislation necessary to regulate the industry during peace times somewhat of the manner in which it had been regulated during the war.

DEAL FOR AUSTRIAN SHIPS.

By the Associated Press. BELGRADE, April 23.—Surrendering peace terms somewhat of the nature in which it had been regulated during the war. 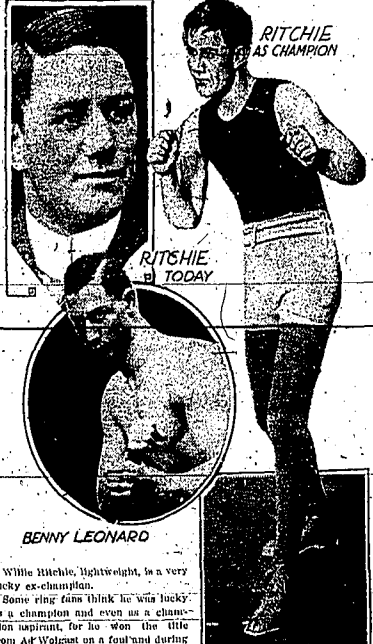

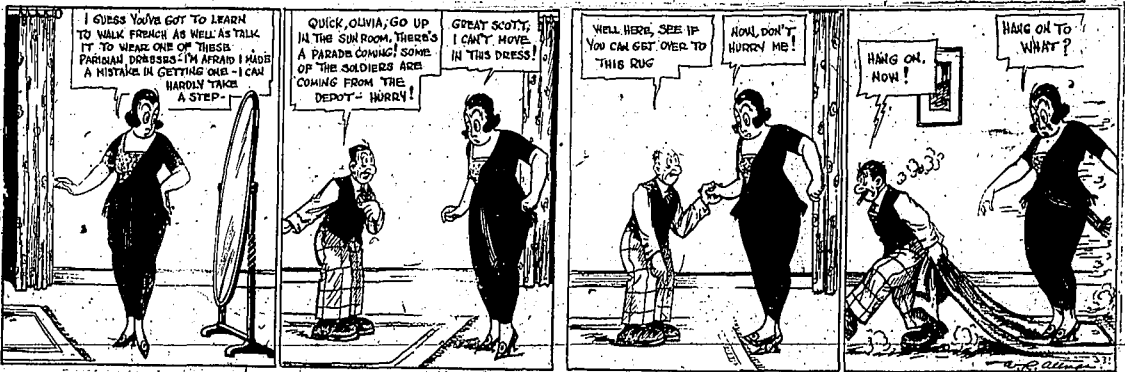
