FEW MINERS GOING BACK TO THE PITS

Reports From All Parts of County Indicate Famine's Grip Becomes Firmer.

OPERATORS TO GRANT 25 PER CENT INCREASE

But Also Want to Raise the Price of Coal 30 Cents a Ton, Says a Trade Publication.

CHICAGO, Dec. 4.—Another wildcat in plans looking to an end of the soft coal miners' strike marked the thirty-fourth day of non-production in most union mines as the government prepared for a grand jury investigation at Indianapolis and prosecution of miners, operators or others for violation of the federal injunction or for obstruction of production in violation of the sever act.

The mines that have been idle since the strike started continued so today although for two days there have been reports of return to work of small numbers of men in scattered localities. Production had increased somewhat, it appeared, but in much of the nation the reserve stocks were being reduced so rapidly that a virtual famine existed in many communities and

GROSVENOR FOUND GUILTY VOLUNTARY MANSLAUGHTER

The jury in the Grosvenor murder case last night returned a verdict of guilty of voluntary manslaughter. The verdict was returned shortly after 10 o'clock. The defendant and his attorney having been summoned by the court bailiff at the time the court was called. Sentence will be pronounced by Judge Buebeck Monday at 9 a. m.

The case went to the jury shortly after six o'clock, argument having been concluded in the late afternoon. Judge Buebeck held court a little late in order to give his instructions in order that the jury might take the time which the defense requested in summing up the argument to the jury.

The jury elected a foreman before going out to dinner, and went to the jury room at 8 o'clock. It reported at 9:30.

Testimony had been completed by the defense and the state in rebuttal during the forenoon. Arguments were held in the afternoon. Both

Judge James H. Dutchwell and W. P. Guthrie addressed the jury in behalf of the defense while Prosecutor Stephen Stephan represented the state.

The pleadings for the defense were remarkably strong. Judge Dutchwell, in clear and eloquent style, recounted the story told by the witness, discussed its weight and importance, took up the various phases of the legal questions involved, and closed with an eloquent appeal for acquittal.

W. P. Guthrie, also for the defense, dwelt upon the story of the tragedy as told upon the witness stand and brought tears to those in the audience by his eloquence in summing up the argument to the jury.

For the state, Prosecutor Stephan outlined the position of the prosecution, followed step by step the events leading to the tragedy, the statements made by the defendant, which he dwelt upon, and concluded with an appeal for law enforcement regardless of sentiment for the innocent who always suffer.

SUGAR Factories Have Sufficient Coal Supply

TO INTERVIEW WILSON OVER MEXICAN CASE

Two Senators Instructed to Visit President Before Formulating Policy.

EXECUTIVE IGNORANT OF PRESENT SITUATION

Information Starts Talk of Action Concerning President Wilson's Physical Capabilities.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Steps to obtain a personal interview with President Wilson before framing a senate policy in the strained relations with Mexico were decided on today by the foreign relations committee.

The decision was made after Secretary Lansing had appeared before the committee and "was sick by members," had disclosed that because of the president's illness, he had not been consulted by the state department in its handling of the recent developments which have brought relations between the two governments to a critical stage.

WILL NOT ATTEMPT TO CONTINUE

TAKE STEPS TO CONSERVE COAL

Dealers Want to Supervise Distribution of Fuel in Twin Falls.

As a result of resolutions by the governors of the chamber of commerce and the city council, coal dealers in Twin Falls have formulated a plan whereby the distribution of coal can be regulated.

In council's resolution it was planned to have a central station whereby permits or regulations could be obtained by consumers for coal to be sold at certain city check-mills to confer with dealers and work out the details. Coal dealers have met and decided that the "short plan" in their estimation would be to have the coal dealers sell coal, only in limited quantities and upon a sworn affidavit of the consumer giving the amount of coal on hand and the requirements. The coal dealers, under this plan proposed, would have the control of who should or should not have coal. In their plan they expect, if the present supply of coal continues, to give private families 1000 pounds of coal, 2000 pounds if there is a furnace in the house, while a bushel firm coal store can secure two tons.



COMPLAINTS FILED AGAINST PACKERS

Charged With Violating Anti-Trust Law by Buying Food Concerns.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4.—Formal complaints were issued today by the federal trade commission charging the five big Chicago meat packers with violations of the Clayton anti-trust act through the alleged purchase and control of 31 corporations handling food and other supplies. Written answer to the complaints must be made within 40 days and thereafter public hearing will be had before the commission.

Concerning which the packers are accused of absorbing include meat packers, fruit canners, dealers in eggs and poultry and dealers in and manufacturers of butter, cheese, oleomargarine, condensed milk and like products, extracts and condiments, and leather tanners.

The complaints, which it was announced, grew out of the investigation

of the meat packing industry ordered by Congress also were issued against the United Dressed Beef company, the Western Meat company of San Francisco and the Nevada Packing company.

WOULD SUSPEND JUDGMENT

CHICAGO, Dec. 4.—The public was asked to suspend judgment until a hearing was held and more facts developed, in a statement by Edward Morris, president of Morris and Company, which denied the charges of the federal trade commission that the big five packers had violated the Clayton act.

F. Marion White, vice president of Armour and Company declared that the action of the commission was in line with its established policy to strangle business and to prevent growth and development. The companies mentioned in the formal complaints, he said, voluntarily sold "to us the interest we acquired."

Mr. Morris in his statement said:

"None of the purchases referred to so far as Morris and Company is concerned, violated any law, either in fact or intent. The public was not deceived and no one has been injured."

On the contrary, many of these transactions aided in stimulating livestock production."



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INTELLIGENT ANNOTATIONS

The former Kaiser is unique. As well his frenzied disclosures of responsibility for the war, he proves his guilt. He becomes a witness against himself because, along with habit of reckless speech, he had vital vice of scribbling. The inquiry into the cause of the war conducted by the new German government has dragged to the light

hundreds of secret documents. There are briefs of dispatches and reports, apparently that were submitted to Wilhelm before and during the war, and annotated by him according to his custom and mining remarks.

Typical of them all is the comment presented on the margin of a report concerning the assassination of the Austrian archduke at Sarajevo, two days after that event occurred.

Ambassador Tschircheky, at Vienna, had written: "I have repeated to him here, even among serious people, that there must some day be a thorough reckoning with the Serbs." To this Wilhelm added the words "Now or never!"

When the ambassador wrote him he had "waded over occasion in order to be very firmly and seriously, but very firmly and seriously, to warn against any hasty steps." The intelligent and belligerent Kaiser added, "With unauthorized him to do this. This is very stupid. It is no business of his. It concerns the things in which we will be told Germany was unwilling. Tschircheky will please stop this nonsense. Accounts must be settled with Serbia, and that's that."



PENITIER EASILY DEFEATS BECKETT

London Times says: "Then came Round to both English Champion."

By the Associated Press.
ELGIN STADIUM, (Ringside) NOON Dec. 4.—Georges Carpenter, the French champion, knocked Joe Beckett, champion of England, in a brief and decidedly bloodless fight for the heavyweight championship of Europe.

Forty-four seconds, as announced by the official timer, sufficed to determine whether Carpenter or Beckett would meet Jack Dempsey, the American heavyweight, for the championship of the world next June. From the moment the referee, Dr. J. Arkle called time, Carpenter had the battle entirely in his own hands. Beckett never had a chance of hitting the wily Frenchman, who landed blows with enormous strength, which, however, he felt justified.

"Another absolute stumper most of the spectators could hear the terrific crack of the swing that put Beckett to sleep. There was a roar over the ring as Carpenter insisted Beckett go his corner, where the Englishman opened his astonished eyes and saw his opponent being carried on the shoulders of the enthusiasts around the ring—sild, the Frenchman was smiling happily."

The contestants presented a picture of indifference, if supersensitive, which they strip off and were introduced—Beckett swarthy and somewhat Carpenter white-skinned, with slight figure. Carpenter looked short him, though accustomed to his surroundings, Beckett seemed somewhat nervous.

Men and women, members of the house of commons, high officials of state, many women, most of them in evening gowns, and the prince of Wales joined the fighters over, evidently as they squared up.

As a fight, the contest was not spectacular. Carpenter was fast on his feet, dancing in and out and playing havoc with the Englishman from the first round.

With lightning swiftness, Carpenter's left landed first, and caught Beckett on the face, so a suppressed sigh was audible all over the house. A solid blow followed a short clinch and the Frenchman landed two more hard jabs.

Beckett, with a sort of bulging determination forced Carpenter almost to the ropes. But this was a blow for punishment only, for the Frenchman stepped back and then forward, and, with all his strength and the full weight of his body, driving his right to the Englishman's jaw and Beckett went down flat.

The betting was heavy before the contest, odds of seven to four being laid on Beckett, and most of those present were losers, although Carpenter had many supporters.

After the fight, Beckett said to the newspaper men:

"I didn't start to fight, when I got it. I didn't realize what had happened. I was just sitting in for the first round when he slipped in."

When the new three announced the decision, Londoners were unable to believe it; they thought a mistake had been made.

NO SURPRISE TO DEMPSEY.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 4.—Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion, said here tonight Georges Carpenter's victory over Joe Beckett in London was no surprise to him, as he and his manager, Jack Reardon, had picked the Frenchman as champion to win.

Dempsey said Carpenter was more scientific and hard-hitting than Beckett.

"I am ready to fight Carpenter or any other fighter in the world—if I don't say 'yes,'" said Dempsey.

Carpenter in all probability will receive his new equipment and the meeting probably will come off next spring."





Market News

Grain

CHICAGO, Dec. 4.—Corn averaged higher in price today, influenced chiefly by prospects of unfavorable weather. The crop was unmet, 1-8c not lower to 1-4c advance, with December 139 7-8 and May 134 to 134 1-8. Oats gained 1-8c to 6-1c. In provisions, the outcome varied from 45c decline to a rise of 10 cents.

Promising rain, and snow gave bulls in the corn market considerable advantage at the opening. Besides, foreign exchange rates were displaying power to rally. Advance of selling pressure resulted, and prices advanced sharply until attention began to focus on reports that the coal strike might soon be settled. Then a decided break in values took place, accelerated by the fact that receipts of corn here today were larger and hog values on the down grade. Goods that export sales of grain were being cancelled had also a temporary depressing effect. Offerings, however, were readily absorbed, and with a renewal of talk that supplies appeared inadequate, the market swung upward again the final.

Provisions were irregular. Weakness in the hog market led to some selling but was offset more or less by talk that the output of packing houses might be greatly lessened through meat shortage.
