

# Market News

## Live Stock

**CHICAGO, Nov. 3.**—Cattle 13,000; few yearling steers, hollers and best fat cows steady; others mostly 25c lower. Some medium and good native steers off more; top yearlings \$11.75; best heavy hogs \$17.50; bulk of hogs \$16.50 to \$16.50; butchers cows largely \$12.50 to \$13.50; canners steady to 25c lower; mostly \$4.00 to \$4.25; bologna hogs steady; calves firm; best vealers \$14.50 to \$14.75; stockers and feeders easier. Western receipts 2,500 head.

Hogs 8,000, active, 25¢ to 50¢ higher than yesterday's average; better grades up most; top \$12.25; bulk of sales \$11.50 to \$14.50; pigs 25¢ to 40¢ higher; bulk desirable 10¢ to 22¢ pound pigs \$14.25.

Sheep 18,000; fat lambs 25¢ to 50¢ lower; top natives \$13.50; bulk \$12 to \$14; fat sheep 15¢ to 25¢ lower; choice yearling wethers \$11.75; top wethers \$12 to \$14; top wethers \$7; bulk native wethers \$10.75; feeders steady.

## Grain

**CHICAGO, Nov. 3.**—Estimates that the supply of coarse grain is 23 per cent larger than last year with farm animals three per cent less numerous. A good deal today to lower the price of all cereals. Wheat closed unsettled at 1-1/2 to 2-3/4c not declining; corn off 1-3/4 to 2-3/4c and oats down 5/8 to 3-4c. In provisions the outcome varied from a setback of 50c to 10c advance.

Persistent commission house selling developed in the wheat market and there was no adequate support except some buying, early that, was credited to the seaboard. Bears contended that on the basis of current estimates the production of feed stuffs had been greatly excessive and that in view of downturns for other commodities no reason was apparent why wheat should be on a pedestal. Bulls urged on the other hand that this country is now feeding on a domestic basis regarding wheat. Reports of surpluses of feeding grain led to a sharp break in the corn market. An authority figured the 1920 yield at fifty-one million bushels more than the government's total last month. Oats sympathized with the weakness of corn.

Provisions showed lower chiefly as a result of grain market depression and notwithstanding higher quotations on hogs.

## Produce

**SUGAR MARKET QUIET.**

**NEW YORK, Nov. 3.**—The local market for raw sugar was quiet and unchanged with no sales reported. Offerings were liberal at the seven cent cost and freight basis for Cuban, equal to 99¢ for Centrifugal, but buyers were inclined to hold off.

## HOLLAND HAS KNUTTY PROBLEM TO DEAL WITH

**THE HAGUE, Nov. 3.**—Holland, which refused to surrender and for mer German emperor to the allies for his trial, has another knotty problem in a demand from the Belgian government for the extradition of Professor Dr. Vreese former librarian of Ghent university, a political refugee and now librarian at Rotterdam.

Professor Dr. Vreese is on of the Flemish Belgians who during the German occupation of their country sought, with German aid, to separate Flanders, from the French-speaking part. Many of them, when the armistice showed Germany beaten, fled to Holland. In their absence, they were convicted of treason and some of them are under sentence of death.

Professor Dr. Vreese is accused of a leading activist in the Flemish separatist movement. Considering this a political offense and therefore not extraditable, the Dutch government would not give him up.

Now at a time when relations between Holland and Belgium are strained because of commercial treaty complications and the renewed efforts of Belgian-Flemish activists toward the separatist movement, Belgium has demanded the extradition of Dr. Vreese, this time on the grounds, which, it grows, Holland might consider while it would not consider a political offense.

The charge, however, is only that Professor Dr. Vreese used for fuel at his house in Ghent, some government property, such as old boxes, old books and some coal which were on the premises of the library at Ghent.

It is hinted in Holland that this is only a subterfuge to get the professor across the frontier.

The Dutch government has named a commission to decide the case.
