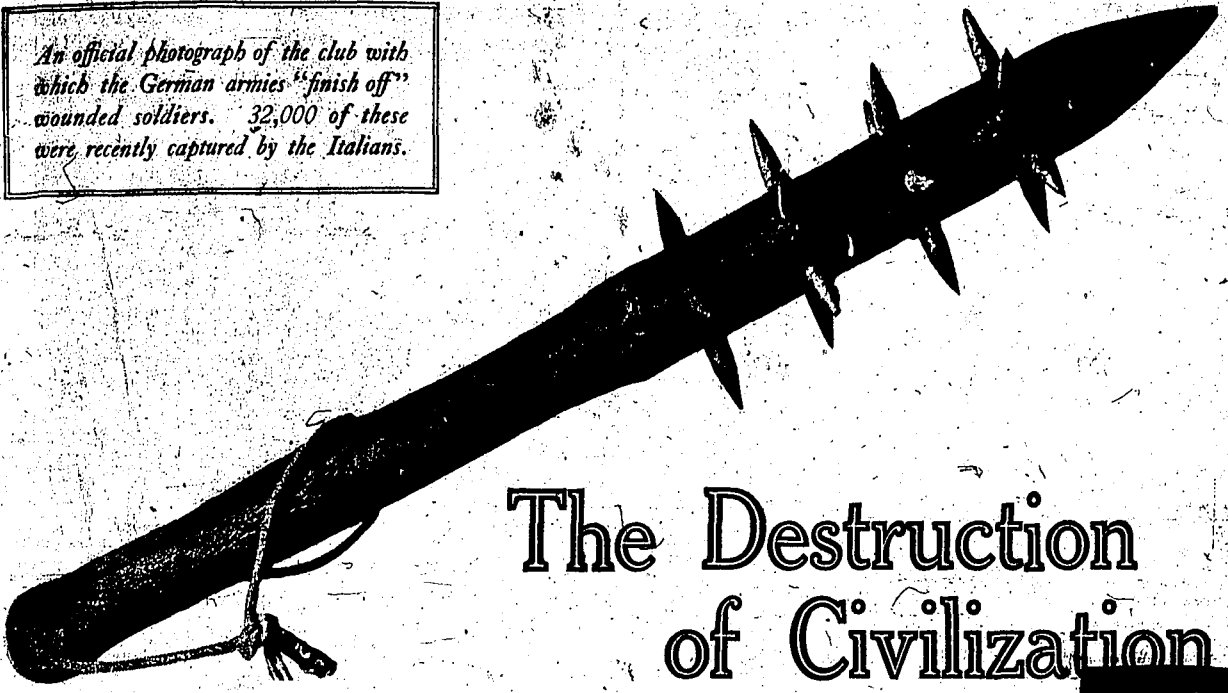


An official photograph of the club with which the German armies "finish off" wounded soldiers. 32,000 of these were recently captured by the Italians.

CAPITAL SCENES REMINDE VISITORS OF DAYS OF '63

WARTIME ACTIVITY PERMEATES EVERY NOOK AND CORNER—ARMY OF CLERKS OVER 40,000

(By United Press.)
WASHINGTON, April 8.—One year of war finds America's war government spreading its wings. One of the most remarkable facts of the last 12 months has been the establishment here of war offices and buildings for the clerks.
 Since congress accepted Germany's challenge approximately 40,000 new workers have come to Washington, accepting the country's call to service.
 The Council of National Defense employs 100 of these, 700 of whom are on a salary and approximately 300 of whom are "dollar-a-year patriots." These are housed in three huge office buildings.
 The food administration has 18,000 salaried employes in Washington alone, with 500 additional outside of Washington on salary, and 205,851 volunteers outside of Washington working full or part time.
 The fuel administration has 558 paid workers and 100 volunteers. These require two office buildings.
 The shipping board and emergency fleet corporation employ 720 workers whose offices are scattered through 16 buildings.
 The war trade board has 4500 employes with 12 office buildings distributed at widely separated points throughout the city.
 The treasury department with its new functions created as a result of the war now has a Washington payroll of 15,250 and occupies 14 buildings.
 The director general of railroads thus far is very moderate in housing those engaged in one of the greatest tasks of the war. He has only 145 employes and uses only three floors of one of the big government buildings here.
New Buildings Under Way
 Some idea of the war government's mushroom growth is seen in the fact that during the last five months six square blocks of new buildings—temporary stucco affairs quickly built—have sprung up in one part of the city alone. The war board will soon move into a new building occupying a solid square block and the railroad administration has a building under construction. In addition the department of justice is now encroaching in a large new building of many stories which has served to embrace most of its divisions under one roof.
 The war department and its sundry bureaus, such as ordnance, signal corps, and so forth, is widely scattered, some of the offices being a mile or more from the main war department building.

 The local officials a week ago petitioned the governor to intercede. Lister they withdrew their petition, saying they could handle the I. W. W. themselves. It was following this that the I. W. W. members were raided and many I. W. W. arrested.

S. S. SANTAMARIA HIT BY TORPEDO FOUGHT TO LAST

CREW REMAINS ABOARD UNTIL GUNS ARE RENDERED USELESS—END COMES RAPIDLY

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Torpedoed by an enemy submarine February 25, the Santa Maria, manned by an American gun crew, fought gamely until the sea enveloped her forward guns, the navy department announced today.
 John Weber, chief boatswain's mate of the S. N., who remained on board with the crew until the guns were rendered useless, was commended for bravery by Secretary Daniels. The torpedo which struck the vessel sank and a enemy submarine ship in a tank and the oil exploded.
 Engines refused to work
 When the ship was hit, it was not far from land, the navy statement said, "and the captain signalled full speed ahead, intending to beach it, but the engines refused to work and as the ship was sinking fast, the order to abandon was given. The entire crew took to their boats and the gun crew stood by their guns awaiting orders from the commander to leave their stations.
 "The gun crew stood by until the forward part of the ship was well under water, when they were told to man their boats.
 "They were picked up from the ship's rail by one of the canoes and had no sooner climbed aboard than the Santa Maria keeled to starboard and sank.
 "Speaking in behalf of the gun crew, one of them was excited and confessed and that all stood by their stations until the last minute."

RECLAMATION SERVICE OFFICIALS GIVE VIEW AT JEROME HEARING

SHEEP MEN PROTEST AGAINST AVERAGES WHICH WOULD GROUND BIRDS GLENDEN—OTHERS ALSO COMPLAIN

Representatives of the United States reclamation service, at a hearing in Jerome Saturday, suggested informally methods of solving problems that have arisen in connection with the leasing of grazing lands recently made by the reclamation service covering tracts north of the Minidoka and Twin Falls North Side projects.

Sheep interests represented at this hearing protested that the terms of the leases which had been made to cattlemen off their avenue of passage for their flocks between the Snake river and the Sawtooth range.

The reclamation service officials proposed informally that the roads should be made one-half mile wide so that they might be used in order to touch sources of water supply.

Sheep and Cattlemen—Oil and Water: A proposal of the reclamation officials that blanket lease of the area should be made alternately to the sheep and cattle interests was rejected by both interests.

300,000 Sheep Count Annually: The Minidoka extension grazing permit under which the area in question has been leased in 17 leases to cattlemen covers a territory 17 miles wide and extending from the Snake river north to the Sawtooth range.

MEAT SHORTAGE IS APT TO RESULT IN FAMINE

New Meat Commission Appointed by President Say Beef and Pork Production Must be Boosted Tremendously—Five Million Less Cattle on Hand Now Than Ten Years Ago—Allies Food Supply Steadily Waning.

(By United Press.)
WASHINGTON, April 9.—The new meat commission appointed by President Wilson at the request of Food Commissioner Hoover, met here today to plunge into twin problems of increasing meat production and holding down prices.

With prospect of actual government control of purchasing, more measures may be taken as a result of the probe recently made.

If meat famine in Europe and at home is to be averted, beef and pork production must be boosted tremendously and without delay, experts declare. Department of agriculture officials emphasize the most serious situation is in the factory, stock men declare they are losing money, and food administration officials are concerned with distribution and prices, especially for flinty or small pieces that will mean no meat for the laboring population who need it most.

Prompt Action Needed
Prompt action will avert danger, stockmen hold. Over 2,000,000 more animals were added to America's food resources last year, but the number of cattle is still five million head short of the ten year ago. Pork production has leaped thirty million and beef exports have tripled in the last decade. Per capita consumption of meat has increased. Pork exports are sixty per cent greater than pre-war shipments.

More Hogs Wanted
Hogs should be increased 15 per cent this year. Officials believe pork is the most rapidly depleted livestock herd in all countries growing less with each year of war, and requiring a constantly growing herds in America.

Food Administration Officials declare that unless production is increased and marketing facilities well be boosted, and each which can be increased as home because of heavy allied purchases.

GEORGE CREEL IS UNDER FIRE IN U. S. SENATE

IMMEDIATE REMOVAL FROM OFFICE OF CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC INFORMATION IS ASKED IN FORCEFUL TERMS

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Vehement demands for the immediate removal of George Creel, chairman of the committee on public information, coupled with violent assaults on his recent public utterances, were made on the floors of congress today.

Creel's statement in a speech yesterday that he was proud that the United States was "inadequately prepared at the outbreak of the war," drew heavy legislative fire.

Cher U. Germany
"The most craven pacifist never went so far," Representative Longworth said in the house, while Senator Robt. Penrose, in the senate, charged Creel was "general all over with treason."

Representative Madden, Illinois, thought Creel would be arrested if he made "a remark" as to private citizens.

"The only man to whom such a statement will bring cheer," added Longworth, are the Hindenburgs, the Ludendorfs, abroad, and the Bolshewiki and the I. W. W. at home."

"Can you imagine the feelings of the fathers and mothers who have sent their boys to the trenches?" said Senator Hiram Johnson, as the attack against Creel was "general all over with treason."

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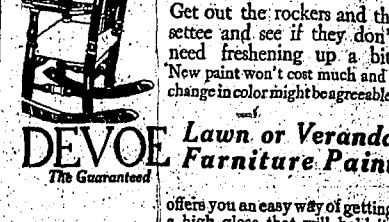
