NORTHERN OFFENSIVE IS CONTINUED BY RUPPRECHT

Fighting is Steady Along a Twenty Mile Front--British Evacuate Towns of No Strategic Importance--Many Places are Filled with Poisonous Gases.

CROWN Prince Rupprecht was continuing his northern offensive today on the entire twenty-mile front from the La Bassée canal to the Ypres-Comines canal. In making this announcement, Field Marshal Haig reported that there was particularly severe fighting along the Lawe and Lys rivers, from Leztreem to Armentieres. Leztreem is on the Lawe about a mile south of its confluence with the Lys, and is nine miles southwest of Armentieres. Armentieres, which is only a pile of stone and bricks and of no strategic consequence, has been abandoned because of its position at the apex of a dangerous salient. Haig said that the city was gas-filled when the British withdrew.

North of Armentieres, heavy fighting continued and late last night Haig said, in the neighborhood of Ploegsteert, Messines and Wytschaete. These three towns were taken by a mile front midway between Armentieres and Ypres.

The drive on this front has become within the last two days equal in importance to the original offensive farther to the south, which began on the 50-mile front from Arras to La Perle. The motive of the new drive is not believed to be the splitting of the British line along the Lys river, with the rolling back of the northern portion of Haig's forces to the West sea and the capture of the channel ports. The main objective--division of the allied forces--coincides with that of the southern offensive, but the latter had for its additional aim the taking of Amiens and Paris.

German Army Moves

British May Withdraw
This penetration on both sides of Armentieres, however, has been sufficient to sharpen the British and French salient at the point and make the abandonment of that city by the British practically certain. Confirms British Report
The German official report last night merely confirmed the British admission that the Lys had been crossed and that the British lines had been penetrated on both sides of Warenton two miles east of Messines. An earlier statement said that more than 200 British tanks and 100 guns had been taken in these operations.

CHICAGO, April 11--Armentieres, evacuated by the British and said to be a heap of ruins, was not far within the British lines. When I visited the place the first time I was puzzled by seeing banners strung across the streets in the style of election day banners, or "liberty loan" streamers. The banners, however, bore no mottoes. They were so grimy with dirt that my curiosity was aroused. The British officers told me that they had taken huge strips of white cloth and painted them with mud and string them across the streets to keep the Germans in the nearby trenches from seeing what was going on in the town.

FRANCO-AMERICAN LINES REPULSE HUN ATTACKS

United States Artillery Plays Important Part in Fighting--Enemy Driven Back After Severe Struggle--Dozens of Prisoners and One Machine Gun Captured.

LONDON, APRIL 11--Field Marshal Haig today announced the withdrawal of the British forces from Armentieres. The British forces from Armentieres were withdrawn in full, said Haig.

The battle is continuing on the whole front from the La Bassée canal to the Ypres-Comines canal. There is severe fighting in the neighborhood of the Lawe and Lys rivers, from about Leztreem to Armentieres.

North of Armentieres there is little fighting. In the neighborhood of Ploegsteert, Messines and Wytschaete, there was heavy fighting until a late hour last night.

In Finland, German forces occupied the Kari railway station. Clarkoff is a city of 175,000 inhabitants, situated 420 miles southwest of Moscow.

WASHINGTON, April 11--A new scale of wages for navy yard employees on the Atlantic coast approximating the so-called May board scale at private plants, has been adopted, the navy department stated today.

It will give mechanics about 45 a week, with an average amounting to around \$7 or \$8 a day and other trades about the same.

GERMAN ADVANCE CRUSH GALLANT DEFENSE ON NEW SALIENT OPENED BY ENEMY

PARIS, APRIL 11--The German advance on the new salient north of the St. Maur bridgehead Van Quast engaged his gains. One mile northeast of the La Bassée canal, Ploegsteert, Messines, and Wytschaete, the British counter-attacks were particularly heavy. These places were taken and re-taken several times in hand-to-hand struggles.

Some of the heaviest fighting was the scene of similar fighting. On the southern part of the battle front the fighting was desultory.

KAISER'S FOLLOWERS WOULD TAKE LONDON
Next Step Would be to Send an Army Across the Atlantic Ocean to Fight U. S.

WASHINGTON, April 11--That some of the Kaiser's extremists cherish the hope of conquering London and sending an army across the Atlantic to capture Washington, is indicated by information reaching officials here today. A military critic in predicting that Germany's logical move is a drive on the west front across the lines of expeditions to London and America, unwavering in a recent issue of the Bremen Burger Zeitung dated March 2.

EFFICIENCY IS NOT ALONE A PRODUCT OF GERMANY'S MILITARY INSTITUTIONS
(By United Press.)
NEW YORK, April 11--British official press--little advertised--is backing the German brand of the board, according to official statistics received here today. With this war well into its fourth year, British are preparing to outdo the Hun. In food production, Great Britain last year increased cereal by 850,000 tons and potato production, 6,000,000 tons. The cultivated area was increased one million acres. No estimates have been made for the coming year.

While 820,445 men were taken from the industrial organizations and placed in the army in 1917, the women replaced most of them, numbering 804,000 and increased production of 250,000 per cent; aircraft 250 per cent; guns 30 per cent and built 1,255,000 tons of shipping. Standardized is the keynote.

BARRED WIRE

If our esteemed contemporary, as recently stated in at least two of its semi-weekly, Sunday or other editions, really "discontinued the service of the United Press Association," there is no evidence to be found in the columns of that newspaper of the fact.

Possibly some sort of modified arrangement for such service at one time existed, but—let the newspaper in question were ever accused of making use of United Press dispatches it need only refer to its own columns to refute the charge.

The fact that any newspaper would discontinue United Press service in order to help swell the coffers of William Randolph Hearst, whose private property the so-called International News service is, may be accepted merely as evidence of ignorance of newspaper values on the part of the management.

We rather regret that our friends saw fit to breach the subject but we are willing to do what we can to reply to it.

Reference to the foreign strength of Mr. Hearst and his International News Service surely stir up an interesting line of reflection. Hearst's foreign connections, German especially, have always been interesting.

THE GERMAN IDEA

Hindenburg would bleed France white. With the tenacity and cold-bloodedness of a leech Germany hangs on in the hope of dragging enough of the lifeblood of a nation to compel a surrender before helpmen arrive from America.

There is nothing in the military movements of the last day or two to indicate the working out of any particular general offensive plan. Attacks upon towns of no military importance, capture of ground of no conceivable military value point to the conclusion that the Hun is beginning to catch at straws.

Those whose judgment is likely to be well founded count on the belief that Germany hasn't got another general offensive left. Germany to date has failed to make good in any single military project she ever undertook with the sole possible exception of her Italian campaign, and even here she has been unable to follow up her first startling success.

The cost to the Allies is tremendous, and the cost to America may be just as great. But the end lies certain as that night follows day, and signs are not lacking that the end, when it does come, will arrive with startling swiftness.

INTERESTING EXHIBITS ON GERMAN PREPARATION

Military and Government Orders Now in French Hands Prove Hun Perfidy—Begin Getting Rydy Months Before Declaration of War—Program Complete.

WITH THE FRENCH ARMIES IN THE FIELD—(By mail)—The French have today in their possession copies of an astounding series of military and government orders showing Germany's preparation for the present war from January 2, 1914—seven months before war actually was declared—down to the Kaiser's latest efforts to spread world-wide revolution and anarchy.

The first indication that the German general staff knew war would be forced in 1914 is given in an order addressed on January 2 to the commanders of all army regions. It reads: "The general staff are aware that you will be obliged to fight the present war, and the distribution of all military provisions which you have intact, and of all primary materials."

Germany's First Step

This was Germany's first step of military preparation. Her first step of financial preparation followed on February 16, 1914, when the Kaiser's agreement with the Austro-Hungarian government, sent to all the groups of German banks a secret circular which reads: "The directors of credit establishments are designated to establish, with urgency, agencies in the following places: London, Stockholm, Copenhagen, Legation and Varde on the Finland frontier; and at Bergen and Amsterdam. The establishment of these agencies is to be effected by the end of the month. In certain circumstances modifying the original financial and industrial market."

Start Military Census

On March 14, 1914, the German imperial staff began the census of mines and factories. This census, which was the first of its kind, was made in the following order of importance: (1) Mines and factories; (2) Iron and steel works; (3) Machine tools; (4) Textile mills; (5) Paper mills; (6) Glass works; (7) Chemical works; (8) Other industries.

From the very moment it became apparent that the world would be won by brute force of her military supremacy, there began a second "preparation" to win, if possible, by the means of sabotage, revolution, terrorism and corruption.

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Strike Army Handy Weapon

"While trying to bring about strikes, it is necessary to take steps for the sabotage of motors and machinery, for the destruction of vessels of transporting war material to the enemy's country, to burn the reserve stocks of primary materials and manufactured goods, and to cut off the grand manufacturing centers from their supplies of electricity, coal and food."

Agents Get Their Orders

A little later, on November 28, the general staff of the German marine also took a hand in laying orders to all "merit" agents to "mobilize all the agents of surveillance and agents of destruction in the military ports of the allies." Continuing, the circular reads: "It is indispensable by the intermediation of third persons having no relations with the German representatives in Germany to recruit progressively agents for the organization of explosions aboard allied vessels to enemy countries; for causing delays and confusion in the taking on of cargo and in the departure and unloading of these ships. To this end we recommend particularly to your attention the stevedores, among whom are many anarchists and escaped criminals."

Big Business Helps

Numerous documents showing the preparation of German "big business" in the "preparation of defection" that has had such a terrible result in Russia, are likewise of file. These include a copy of "Kamarski" announcing the remittance in Russia of 150,000 marks. Still other documents show the remittance of large sums, even to Trotsky and Lenin.

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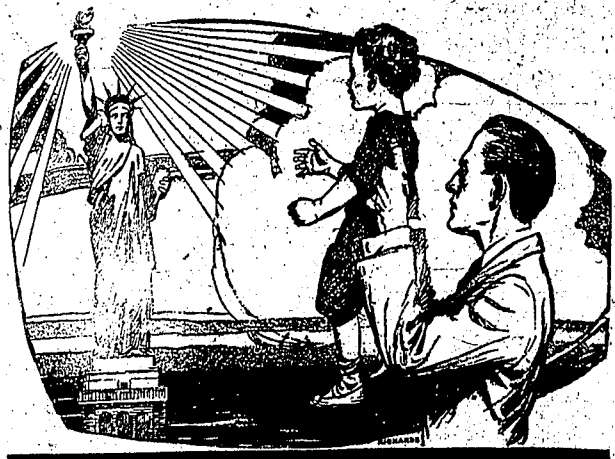

Injecting Ink into the Eye.

Sometimes when a scar has been left on the corner of the eye it is most unightly. Oculists used to tattoo these scars with India ink, but the method was not satisfactory and has almost been abandoned. Dr. F. H. Verbeek of Boston describes in the Journal of the American Medical Association the delicate operation by which he injects India ink with a hypodermic syringe such scars, and says the results are far superior to the old-fashioned tattooing.
