NEXT DRAFT TO TAKE OVER 40 FROM COUNTY

CALL FOR 233,742 MORE MEN TO MOBILIZE DURING MONTH OF MAY IS ISSUED BY CROWDER

The greatest draft call of the war for 233,742 men, sent out by Provost Marshal General Crowder late Friday, will take between 46 and 48 men from among the registrants of class one in Twin Falls county. The quota for the state of Idaho is 791. The mobilization has been ordered to take place between May 15 and May 30.

Friday's call brings the total number of men called into the national army during the month of May up to 455,777, or 60,000 more than during April.

On April 30 Twin Falls county sent 87 men into the national army camp at Camp Lewis, Washington, and a quota of 10 has been called to leave here on Friday, May 10, for Fort McDowell, California.

FAILS TO CONVINC JUDGE OF INNOCENCE

WILLIAM TARR PAYS FINE IN THE PROBATE COURT FOR SELLING CIGARETTES TO MINORS

William Tarr, proprietor of a confectionery store on Main avenue south, failed to convince Probate Judge O. P. Duval of his innocence of the charge of selling cigarettes to two 10 year old boys, at a hearing Friday, and was sentenced by the court to pay a fine and costs amounting to \$41.15. Complaint was made in the case by Probation Officer John R. Ault, and was filed in consequence of his discovery of the two boys smoking cigarettes on the streets. The boys admitted their offense and paid fines of \$10 each. They said Tarr had sold the cigarettes to them.

Tarr pleaded not guilty when arraigned Thursday, and signed in his own defense at his hearing the next day. Because the confessor had not previously been accused of selling tobacco to minors, the court assessed the minimum fine of \$25, costs which accrued through his resistance of prosecution amounting to \$18.15. The maximum penalty upon conviction of the offense is a fine of \$100.

JURY IN MURDER CASE DISAGREES

DOUBT IS RAISED AS TO GUILTY OF PEDRO FLORES, MEXICAN ACCUSED OF KILLING BURL MAN AT BURELY

Trial in district court at Albion in the case of Pedro Flores, Mexican accused of the murder of Frank E. A. Hittabaugh of Buhl, at Burely on the night of April 11, resulted Wednesday in the failure of the jury to agree upon a verdict. After fruitless deliberations that continued all through Tuesday night, and until 11 o'clock the next morning, the jury was dismissed by Judge W. A. Babcock, presiding.

Evidence against the Mexican was wholly circumstantial. The defense argued that any one of half a dozen Mexicans in whose company Hittabaugh had been on the day of his death might have committed the crime, and raised a doubt in the minds of the jurymen as to the guilt of Flores sufficient to prevent agreement upon a verdict. The final vote of the jury is said to have been six for conviction and six for acquittal.

DELEGATES DISCUSS COUNTRY'S WAR AIMS
