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AMERICAN ADVANCE LEAVES CHATEAU-THIERRY FIVE MILES IN REAR GERMANS CONCENTRATE DEFENSE SOUTH OF SOISSONS TO PROTECT WEST WING AND CENTER OF WITHDRAWAL

YANKEES FACE CAVALRY FOR FIRST TIME AND WIN

PROGRESS CONTINUES STEADY EXCEPT AT ONE SMALL POINT

FORMIDABLE FORCE OF GERMAN HORSEMEN UTTERLY WIPED OUT AND ATTEMPT TO OUT ALLIED LINES NIPPED IN THE BUD

(By JOHN DE GANDT) (United Press Staff Correspondent) PARIS, July 22—Allied forces are progressing everywhere on the Soissons-Bethune salient, except on a small front north of Chateau-Thierry, where the Germans have slowed down the Franco-American advance by a heavy rear guard action.

ADVANCE NOW BIG BATTLE OF ENTIRE CAMPAIGN

AMERICAN ADVANCE REACHES A POINT FIVE MILES NORTHEAST OF CHATEAU-THIERRY

ALLIED COUNTER OFFENSIVE GAINS STEADILY IN SCOPE AND IMPORTANCE AND MAY BE TURNING POINT OF WHOLE WAR

TAYLOR (United Press Staff Correspondent) WITH THE AMERICAN ARMIES IN FRANCE July 22—AMERICAN TROOPS FACING THE FIRST CAVALRY CHARGE OF THE WAR, UTTERLY WIPED OUT A FORMIDABLE FORCE OF GERMAN HORSEMEN EAST OF BETHUNE AND DEFEATED APPARENTLY WHAT WAS AN AMERICAN ATTEMPT TO OUT THE ALLIED LINES AND BRACE CHALONS.

(By United Press) LONDON, July 22—Contrary to the German offensive, the allied counter offensive instead of diminishing its progress is gaining in scope and power. From an apparently limited attack it has rapidly developed into one of the greatest battles of the war.

RUSSIANS TOLD HUNS HAVE WON

By FRED FERGUSON (United Press Staff Correspondent) WITH THE AMERICAN ARMIES IN FRANCE July 22—The Americans continue to advance from the Marne and are beyond Beau-St. German (five miles northeast of Chateau-Thierry) as this is cabled. In the meantime both ends of the Soissons-Rheims salient are being pinched in by combined French, American and British attacks.

Hard to Catch Up To The fighting is heavier on the west side of the salient than in the middle, the Americans are having difficulty in maintaining contact with the Boches owing to the rapidity of the latter's withdrawal.

YANKEE BOYS TURNING TIDE

Along the Marne, where thousands of Germans were slain in their retreat, Berlin declares the retreat was carried out without interference. Based on the official report of the French war office, the allied line now apparently extends from Soissons southward to the vicinity of Charleville, southward through Oulchy-Leotout to Rocourt, southeastward to Charleville, eastward along the north bank of the Marne to Reillyville north to St. Euphrasie, thence northward around Rheims in a semi-circle and eastward in a comparatively straight line to Mainz de Massiges. Unofficial reports place the number of enemy prisoners counted, at more than 20,000 with more than 400 guns captured.

WYANKEE BOYS TURNING TIDE

Woods Cleared Up American troops have completely cleared Barillonville wood of the enemy and have driven the German five miles northeast of Chateau-Thierry. (Barillonville wood extends from Chateau-Thierry eastward along the north bank of the Marne and extends about five miles northward.)

ENEMY RETREAT GENERAL ALONG WHOLE MARNE LINE

YANKEES PURSUE BOCHE OVER HUN-BUILT BRIDGES

ENEMY ARTILLERY FREELY USED IN FUTILE EFFORT TO STEM TIDE AND COVER WITHDRAWAL OPERATIONS—FIGHTING CONTINUES STEADILY ON SCALE UNPRECEDED IN ANNALS OF MODERN WARFARE—ALLIES ANTICIPATE GERMAN STAND ALONG THE OURGO, 12 MILES NORTH OF CHATEAU-THIERRY

The allied advance is continuing on the whole Soissons-Rheims salient, varying in speed with the degree of German resistance. The Germans apparently are concentrating their defense south of Soissons and north of Chateau-Thierry to protect the west wing and center of their retreat. Elsewhere the enemy is depending mostly upon its artillery to stem the allied attacks—probably employing the guns in covering further withdrawals of men and supplies. Admission by enemy prisoners that the retreat will continue to Fere-en-Tardenois means the Germans still attempt to make a stand along the Ourgo, 12 miles north of Chateau-Thierry.

SEA IS SCoured FOR TRACES OF HUN SUBMARINE

PROVINCE TOWN HARBOR CLOSED TO SHIPS FOLLOWING DESTRUCTION OF PERTH AMBOY

(By United Press) PROVINCE TOWN, Mass., July 22.—Heavy cannonading was heard off shore here at 11:45 a. m. today. Naval vessels have been out of this port hunting German submarines. Province Harbor is closed to ships. Explosions resembling those of depth bombs were heard shortly after 4 a. m. "A haze hid the origin of the firing, but it is believed that naval vessels may have located a submarine—possibly the one which attacked and destroyed the tug Perth Amboy and her barges yesterday.

AN ATLANTIC PORT

British steamer arriving here today reported having sighted a submarine fifty miles off Fire Island during the night.

YANKEE BOYS TURNING TIDE

ENGLISH PRESS SAYS GERMAN STARKED ALL UPON GAMBLER'S CHANCE AND LOST LONDON, July 22.—America's troops have "turned" the tide of war for the allies, the Daily Express believes. "Indications are the tide has been turned by America's sending in three months more than the Germans could produce," the paper says.

"In the pocket between Rheims and Soissons the Germans sought to make General Foch show his hand. It was a gambler's bluff which terrified the initiative. They now stand face to face with disaster."

HONDURAS IN WASHINGTON, July 22.—Honduras declared war on Germany July 19, the legation announced today.

WITHDRAWAL IS MILES AHEAD OF YANKEE ADVANCE

GROUND BEYOND CHATEAU-THIERRY IS OPEN FOR OPERATIONS, SAY LATEST REPORTS—ENEMY IS DESPERATE IN FACE OF ODDS

(By United Press) LONDON, July 22.—The Germans are burning villages inside the Soissons-Bethune salient and are believed to be preparing for a general withdrawal to the Vesle river. The news is based on authority from this afternoon.

The Vesle river forms practically a direct line between Rheims and Soissons. It flows eastward and slightly northward through Rheims, connecting with the Aisne about three-fourths of a mile from Soissons. The Aisne flows on westward through Soissons. This would represent a retreat of twenty miles north of Chateau-Thierry.

Growing in Intensity Fighting along the whole line from Soissons southward is growing in intensity, it was learned from an authoritative source this afternoon.

The Germans in a re-organized action the allied line half a mile by a fierce counter-attack at Orisoles. The battle is particularly violent just south of Soissons, where the opposing

GERMANY MUST AVOID POCKET

SOISSONS-RHEIMS SITUATION SPELLS GRAVE OF HUN HOPES

(United Press Staff Correspondent) LONDON, July 22.—Slowly and gradually it is dawning on the Huns that they are licked to a frazzle.
