WARM FIGHT ON ORDER BARRING AIRCRAFT NEWS

Republican Senators Charge War Department with Trying to Run War in Executive Session

FACTS CONCEALED FROM SOLDIERS IN FRANCE

Suppression of Newspapers for Overseas with News of Recent Investigations Stir Up Lively Skirmish

WASHINGTON, August 27.—Republican senators charged today that the administration is trying to keep certain information from the American people and that the war department is seeking to "run the war in executive session."

A veritable torrent of acid criticism was poured out against the official order barring from the foreign mails, of newspapers, letters or magazines, containing the report of the senate aircraft investigation committee and public law work.

"This was done probably on the theory that it would withhold information from the enemy," said Weeks, "but the enemy knows the situation with regard to aircraft. Therefore this drastic and ill-considered action is based on an argument that has no force."

Does not the wording of the order imply simply that this government is seeking to keep some information from our soldiers?" asked Senator Penrose.

"I'll tell you the purpose of it," said Senator Lodge. "It is perfectly plain. The only people in the world who do not know the facts regarding the aircraft situation are the American people. Our allies know it and our enemies know it. This order simply means that any paper publishing this report is caused to lose all the postage on its foreign circulation as well as the papers themselves. All the important newspapers daily send thousands of copies abroad. The expected result, of course, is that newspapers so debarred will not print such reports, and that means the American people would not get the information."

Senator Poindexter declared that while the war department does not deny the accuracy of the senate report, it still prevents its shipment abroad, but allows official bulletins containing "false schemes concerning the report to be circulated among our soldiers in France. We deny them the truth and send them false schemes. Brundage wanted to know whether newspapers publishing the foregoing details will be debarred from foreign mails.

U. S. CHASER IS MISTAKEN FOR A HUN SUBMARINE

Merchant Ship Fires Upon and Sinks Tiny Warship—Two Officers and Fifteen Men of Crew Are Missing

WASHINGTON, August 27.—Mistaken in the dark at 3:30 this a. m. for a German submarine, the U. S. chaser No. 209 was fired upon and sunk by the merchant ship Polk Tausig, the commander, executive officer and 15 men are missing from the chaser, while nine have been landed, eight in New York and one at Leno, N. Y., according to a dispatch received this afternoon.

The merchantman approached in the dark and barely making out the outline of the patrol boat, a small craft, it fired first. The chaser, thinking that she was a submarine and opened fire. Several shots were fired before the little craft, riddled by good marksman, sank beneath the waves.

Navy Department Makes Statement

WASHINGTON, August 27.—The navy department issued the following statement: "The navy department is informed that submarine chaser No. 209 was fired upon by the steamship Polk Tausig at 3:15 a. m. south of Long Island. In the darkness the guard of the steamship mistook the submarine chaser for an enemy submarine and opened fire. The commander and the executive officer and 15 members of the crew of the submarine chaser are reported missing.

GERMAN PEACE EFFORT IS NOT MERELY RUMOR

Forthcoming Campaign for Cessation of Hostilities a Part of Well Laid Plans of War Lords

PRUSSIAN AFTER THE WAR AMBITIONS ARE GROWING

Speech of Austrian Deputy, a Member of Radical Wing, Sheds Interesting Light on True Hun Intentions

WASHINGTON, August 27.—Germany hopes to negotiate an early peace that will give her an opportunity to reorganize her resources for another great war for world domination.

Diplomatic advisers recently have frequently quoted German references to the possibility of a truce in the west and of the after-war ambitions of military party. One of the boldest statements to reach outside lands is that of Austrian Deputy, Wehler, leader of the German radical party in the reichstag, in an address at Nuremberg, Germany.

Capo reports of his speech which is favoring such a close alliance between Germany and Austria that the two powers would be one politically, socially, economically and for military purposes.

Path of Germany Is Beseet With Trouble

Force of Forty Thousand Peasants Reported Fighting Hun Army Near Skivra

STOCKHOLM, August 27.—An army of 40,000 peasants is fighting against a combined force of Germans and Ukrainians near Skivra, according to the newspaper Precht. The fighting continues. Russian Bulgarians striking from "Kiev" report that as soon as German soldiers leave any district the peasants organize guerrilla warfare.

CONQUER OR PERISH IS AUSTRO-GERMAN PLAN

Conference at Headquarters Decides Peace Offers Are Useless at This Stage

ROME.—The recent Austro-German conference at general headquarters decided that peace offers are useless unless the allied powers acknowledge defeat, according to a report from Austrian sources received by the Epoch. The conference thereupon declared in favor of more intensified warfare upon the fronts, land and sea, and agreed that no concessions would be made to the allies.

Every Tenth Man Is Shot Down

AMSTERDAM, August 27.—A German battalion ordered to the front, unarmament refused to go, according to a dispatch from the front published in the Telegraf. The report said every tenth man was shot. The remainder fled.

Germany Lays Down to Spanish Conditions

BERNANDEZ, Spain, August 27.—Germany has accepted all conditions contained in the Spanish note regarding the submarine situation it was announced here today. German shipping interests in Spanish ports will be voluntarily turned over to Spain to replace any future losses from U-boats.

At the same time, foreign minister Hatto announced that the government would requisition all Spanish tonnage which will be apportioned according to vital necessities. Other governments, in whose trade course of this tonnage will be employed, will be asked to set a specified condition for exchange of cargoes such as iron, olive oil, etc.

Norway Follows Spain's Example

OSLOR, Norway, August 27.—Replying to Norway's protest against sinking of German ships in the Barents sea zone, Germany has offered compensation where it is proved a ship was sunk without warning, it was announced today.

TO FACILITATE WORK OF WAR

Creation of New Divisions of War Industries Board Announced by Chairman

WASHINGTON, August 27.—Bernard M. Baruch, chairman of the war industries board, today announced creation of a new division of the board—the facilities division—whose task will be to speed up war production throughout the country and supply essential needs of the civilian population through creation of new facilities.

M. F. Chese, director of the explosives division of the board, will assist the new division in chemical and electrical work. Other sections on specialized war facilities will be authorized. War demands of the government will be presented under the new council representing the army, the navy, the emergency fleet corporation and other agencies. In determining new facilities, capital, labor, supplies, housing accommodations, location and transportation will be considered.

STRIKE RIGHTS ARE RECOGNIZED

Senate Passes Amendment to Work or Fight Clause Cutting Both Ways

WASHINGTON, August 27.—By a vote of 73 to 0, the senate today adopted an amendment to the proposal which will give the man power bill or fight clause a strike. The amendment is designed to obtain the tying-up of war industries through strikes while at the same time recognizing the right of the workers to demand better conditions and to enforce those demands through a strike. Backing up the peace terms speech of Senator Lodge, Republican leader, Senator Hitchcock, chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, this afternoon declared the United States and its allies must make victory certain by means of a great military triumph. To do this, Hitchcock declared, we must create an army that will send down Prussia's biggest tank. He urged this in support of calling now the youth of 18.

USES MACHINE TO DIG TRENCHES HERE

A mechanical trenching device capable in Twin Falls soil of digging from 1,000 to 3,000 linear feet of trench four feet deep, and replacing between 75 and 100 men with shovels, was put in operation here this morning by C. H. Helmer, who has taken a sub-contract from William Harkins to complete the digging of 15,000 feet of trench, with feet of trench in connection with the improvement and extension of the Twin Falls water works system now under way.

BID FAREWELL TO MEN LEAVING TO GET THE HUN

Departure of Thirty-five More Registrants for Training Camps is Signal for Another Demonstration in Twin Falls

CROWDS ESCORT MEN IN MARCH TO DEPOT

Red Cross Women Serve Dinner and Supply Sandwiches and Melons for Consumption En Route to Camp

That the magnitude and fervor of a farewell demonstration for men leaving Twin Falls to enter the military service is not limited by the number of men entering was evidenced Monday evening when a crowd fully as large as has assembled here on previous similar occasions gathered to bid farewell to the 25 men who entrained here at that time for Camp Lewis.

Twenty-four of these men were registrants of this county, who, with 10 others leaving from other points, fulfill the quota under this call for men from Twin Falls county. Eleven were registrants of other districts who had been transferred to Twin Falls from the Twin Falls county party.

Flight Against Tears

Assembling at 5 o'clock in the intersection of Main avenue and E. Main street with the Twin Falls band and veterans of the G. A. R., who formed their center, the men leaving here to enter the service marched to the railway station. Among the crowds that lined the walks cheering and shouting words of encouragement to the men who are going to help destroy the Hun, there were stout hearts that fought bravely to keep back the tears that rose to the surface notwithstanding, and the hand of practically every man leaving to don the khaki was clutched by a relative or friend, so that it was difficult to distinguish, except for the red or white badges worn by the registrants, which were worn by the men entraining.

From the time they reported at 10 o'clock Monday morning at the office of the local board, these men were in the military service of the United States. Dinner was served to them at 12:00 o'clock by the women of the Twin Falls Red Cross branch, who also on board the car a box of sandwiches and three watermelons for the delectation of the men enroute.

Examinations Hold Two Back

Physical examinations of the men made Monday afternoon resulted in the disqualification of James H. D. Matthews of Twin Falls, for general military service, and the holding of Maxwell Morse Bowley of Mustang for further examination by the medical advisory board.

Four of the 1918 class registrants called to fill this quota, were not needed and will be called at a later date, while five of the 1918 registrants who had volunteered for induction at this time, were forwarded to Camp Lewis. The volunteers were Cecil B. Tucker, Hanson; William Martell, Twin Falls; Glenn W. Jones, Hanson; Leslie G. Blair, Hanson; Vernon Beeson, Dahl; Martin Miller of Castleford, was placed in charge of the party enroute and the following were named as squad leaders: Henry Howard Lamoreaux, Twin Falls; Grover Cleveland Jackson, Churchill; Amos Downes, Salt Lake; Roy Cozad, Hanson.
