Allied Forces Enlarging Pocket Surrounding German Troops By Drive Against La Fere

Press on St. Quentin

WOULD FORCE ENEMY TO CONTINUE HIS RETREAT

Entire Hindenburg Line Must Be Given Up if Present Movement Meets With Success Says Expert

By J. W. T. MASON (United Press Wire Report) NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—The Hindenburg has partly strangled the assault in his front west of St. Quentin and Marshal Foch is now engaged in digging the pocket deeper than it was before by driving against La Fere, fifteen miles south of St. Quentin. If La Fere falls to the allies, a threat to encircle St. Quentin from the south will begin to develop. This will necessitate a resumption of Von Hindenburg's retreat from the Somme all the way back to St. Quentin and eventually beyond. Only a decision by the Germans to give up the entire length of the Hindenburg line can justify their retreat beyond La Fere. It is here that the Hindenburg line begins to make its swing to the east. La Fere is a powerful fortress of the second class, constructed by the French as one of a series for the utmost defense of Paris.

Served Useful Purpose It has served the Germans admirably as a pivot for the Hindenburg line. No other position so well fitted to withstand the shock of a turning movement on the front exists between La Fere and the Belgian frontier. If the Germans intended to keep to the present formation of their west front, they would have to cling to La Fere with the utmost tenacity. FILER SOLDIER FEARING ENEMY TAKES OWN LIFE

WILL ENLARGE FACILITIES FOR OVERSEA WORK

Airplane, Medical and Transportation Departments to be Augmented to Fill Growing Needs of Service

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—Improvement and enlargement of airplane, medical and transportation service will be undertaken as a result of Secretary of War Baker's second trip abroad. With plans for a four million army by early summer of 1919, the scope of these branches must be vastly expanded. To this end, Baker, who is now in France, has taken with him Aeronautic Director Ryan and General Gorge, surgeon general. Their stay will be indefinite but it is assured that the secretary will return here despite renewed suggestions that he will establish semi-permanent headquarters for himself in France. In this connection it was recalled that President Wilson on Baker's first visit wrote him a letter expressing a hope for an early return. At the same time he expressed his full confidence in the war chief who was then under senatorial fire.
