LONDON, Sept. 13.—(7 p. m.)—The Americans have completely flattened out the St. Mihiel salient, according to battle front dispatches here tonight.

County Commissioners Get Date for Protests and Arguments on Petition for New Organization

SHORT LINE WANTS ITS RIGHT OF WAY LEFT OUT

Calling of Election Depends on Report of State Engineer and Decision of Board Settlers Would Own System

tion districts, the county commissioners will forward to the state engineer a copy of the petition and all maps. The state engineer is required to make further examination of the proposed district and its irrigation works and report at the hearing. If the report of the state engineer should be against the district, the commissioners will refuse to consider it further unless upon the request of three-fourths of the landholders affected.

May Extend Boundaries

The county commissioners are empowered, in their discretion, to include within the district lands susceptible of irrigation through the Salmon River irrigation system, upon application of the owner.

If the report of the state engineer is favorable to the proposed district, the commissioners will give notice of an election on the proposition. Two-thirds of the votes cast at the election must be in favor of the district to permit of its organization. The organization of the district will take place within 30 days after the election if it is carried, and the directors of the district, who are to be elected at the election, will meet at this time and elect their president and appoint a secretary and treasurer.

Guarantee Election Cost.

Guaranteeing to the county the expenses of the election in the event the district should not be voted, a bond in the sum of \$1500 has been filed with the county commissioners by the following landholders of the proposed district: W. E. Mikswell, R. A. Carter, Wm. Perboom, W. Weddle, W. E. Sanger, J. E. White, Hugh Doid, Chas. H. Robbins, C. A. McMaster, J. B. Conover, A. F. Caldwell, L. M. Simmons, W. P. Allen, Fred F. Horis.

Keep Partisanship and Politics Apart

Chairman Will E. Hays Replies to Charges of Democratic Workers

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—Keep partisanship out of the war and the war out of partisan politics. Let the political parties quit spreading their time accusing each other of disloyalty when both are loyal.

In this fashion Chairman Will Hays of the Republican national committee today wrote Secretary Tamm, denying alleged reports that he had told Republican chairmen in conclave at Chicago that the Democratic party would accept even a compromise of the war to assure re-election.

What he said at Chicago, Hays declared, was substantially as follows: "Disloyalty charges 'give a totally false impression to the enemy,' and those who launch them are 'guilty in that very act of the worst kind of disloyalty. Let us hitch up both our great political horses and have them both used unhampered, freely to pull this load, each striving to see which can pull the harder.'"

Bolsheviki Advocate Wholesale Killing

Press Suggests General Massacre Out of Revenge for Recent Troubles

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 13.—Massacres in revenge for the murder of Moses Uritski, Petrograd police chief, and the attack on Premier Lenin were demanded by the Bolsheviki newspaper Krasnaya Oazette, according to a dispatch received here today. The article was headed "Blood for blood" and said:

"We will turn our hearts to steel and without mercy we will kill our enemies by the scores and by the hundreds. Let them be killed by the thousands for the blood of Lenin and Uritski."

German Treachery Unearthed Aboard Interned Hun Craft

Naval Authorities Find Electrical Apparatus Designed to Destroy Ship

SANTAGO, Chile, Sept. 12.—Naval authorities of the Chilean port of Piqueza today surprised the Germans aboard the interned ship Caris, who had prepared electrical installation to blow up the vessel at any moment.

The captain of the Caris denied permission to the authorities to board the ship and they were forced to bring troops to exact obedience.

The occurrence caused a big sensation, due to the recent promise of the German minister not to allow any repetition of attempts to destroy or injure the interned vessels.

It was rumored that documents were found proving the Germans had ordered German captains to destroy their ships to avoid confiscation.

# FORMER MAYOR ENTERS SERVICE

### E. M. Sweeley Leaves for Camp Pike to Qualify as Army Officer

Having placed at the disposal of the government all the fruits of his investigations in the field of shotguns and explosives, E. M. Sweeley, at Twin Falls, and formerly mayor of Twin Falls, has himself entered the military service for the duration of the war. He left this morning for Camp Pike, Little Rock, Arkansas, from where he will be assigned to a training camp for qualification as an officer of the machine gun service. He applied for admission into an officers' training camp on August 26, was examined at Boise on August 31, and has been called now to report at Camp Pike on September 16.

#### In Noted as a Shot

Mr. Sweeley's investigations and achievements in the realm of firearms have won for him a national reputation. He has taken part with signal distinction in all of the more important trap shooting tournaments. He has discovered, he declares, a shot gun charge that can be produced at less cost and that will be more effective than the ordinary shotgun shell now used. This invention he offered to the army ordnance department. Upon receipt of advice from that department that his patents were not of value to the army at the present time, Mr. Sweeley resented that his offer be placed on file and that no be made of it at any time during the war without the consent of the government when they might be considered of value.

#### Served in 1908

In entering the officers' training camp at this time, Mr. Sweeley is re-entering the military service in which he enlisted in 1908 as a member of an infantry volunteer regiment formed to take part in the Spanish-American war. Mr. Sweeley and their daughter, Jean, aged eight, a third grade pupil in the Twin Falls schools, and Anna, aged five, will remain here for the present.

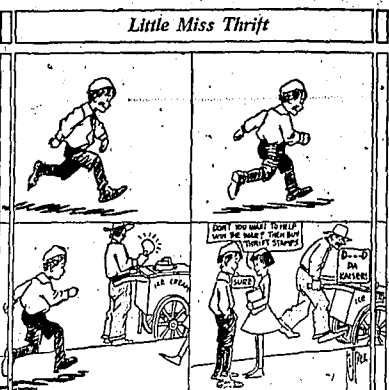

Made Careful Study French and American observers made a very careful study of St. Mihiel salient for a long time before the drive.

It was so planned that the certain success of the American offensive should more precisely and forcefully.

The plans for the Americans were well concealed even though the allied and American press had blatted from time to time of an American smash in Lorraine.

Information have indicated that Austrians held the salient. This is further indication of the German unpreparedness for a real offensive.

The front attacked yesterday was comparatively slight since the 8,000 prisoners reported last night equate to a tremendously large haul.

The number of Germans killed must have been much greater.

May Lock Huns Up The German has kept his line in position to avoid disaster in the Metz region.

Metz forms the base of the German industrial system and the loss will have vital effect on the outcome of the war.

Eight thousand prisoners had been taken by the Pershing forces up to the time that the commanding general sent his communique last night.

Remarkable Success The bag, taken with a maximum advance of five miles, the first day was a remarkable success.

Artillery and tanks appear to have swept the boche on the front. The tanks—100 of them were used, according to United Press dispatches—have struck terror to the heart of the boche and neither infantry or his machine guns can stand before them.

That the operations started yesterday can be designated as major was the general thought here today.

It covered too wide a front and appeared to have too strong a pressure behind to be simply a large local movement.

Besides making it possible to reach German soil by the shortest possible route this action is destined to relieve pressure on the allies farther north.

Leave By Same Gate Incidentally the present action may have a plan to run the Germans out of France and Belgium by the routes they took in entering four years ago.

Situation Changes Rapidly

LONDON, Sept. 12.—The advance of the Americans into the St. Mihiel salient from the south has now reached a depth of eight miles, according to information from the front this afternoon.

The enemy is blowing up ammunition dumps at Hattoville (in the middle of the pocket). Dispatches from the front report prisoners taken by the Americans now total 9,500.

The Americans are making progress so rapidly that the situation is changing momentously. They are reported to have captured Vigneulle (in the center of the salient, seven miles north-west of St. Baustant, where the offensive hit the German line), and the offensive (4 1/2 miles north and slightly east of St. Baustant).

The town of Zandoulet is also reported to have fallen.

The attack on the western side of the pocket has run into new difficulties and more serious resistance, but the Americans have advanced to the depth of three miles.

German ammunition dumps are also being blown up at Boncourt. This town does not show on available maps. There is a town of Bampuis, slightly north of the actual battle zone.

Latest reports of herbage taken by the Americans indicate the work of the salient has now increased to less than six miles. If two divisions still remain in the pocket their escape is decidedly impossible.

Reach All First Objectives

WITH THE AMERICANS ON THE METZ FRONT, Sept. 12.—All the American first objectives have been reached on schedule time.

Capture Sixty Guns

LONDON, Sept. 13.—In their offensive against the St. Mihiel salient the Americans have captured sixty guns, according to information from the battle front received here today.

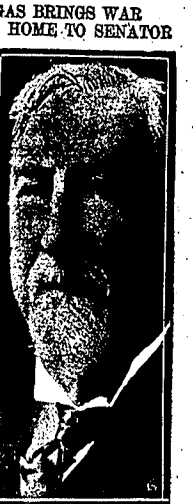
