SWITZERLAND TO THE NORTH SEA IS COMBED BY HUNS FOR FIGHTING MEN TO STEM ADVANCE OF THE ALLIES

PARIS, Oct. 1.—Like a vast omnipotent machine the Allied armies are rolling forward, crushing key point after key point, advances from the battle fronts showed this afternoon. In many places the Germans, recovering somewhat from their first dejection, are hurling desperate counter-attacks into the Allied tide, which are broken and swallowed up. In other sectors, the Germans, caught off their balance, are withdrawing stubbornly and putting up a bloody fight. At no place are the Allies advancing without bitter fighting. General Von Ludendorff is now draining his scanty reserves from depots situated all the way from Switzerland to the North Sea, and throwing them into the fighting in an attempt to stem the allies.

WITH THE BRITISH ARMIES IN FRANCE, Sept. 28 (Night)—The Belgian-British advance in Flanders is continuing rapidly, despite some of the most terrific fighting of the war. The British brought up guns and established them on a ridge facing the German batteries on another ridge only 600 yards away. Opposing artillery is blazed away at each other until the enemy guns were entirely silenced.

BOMBAY, Oct. 1.—The Veltan has received confidential information from Vienna that King Ferdinand of Bulgaria, probably will abdicate in favor of his son, Prince Boris.

Anglo-Belgian Drive Threatens Hun Bases in Flanders; Allenby Rounds Up Still Another Ten Thousand Turks

The Anglo-Belgian drive in Flanders is developing a double menace to the Germans. They face the loss of their submarine bases at Ostend, Zeebrugge and Bruges, and the railway and industrial centers of Lille, Roubaix, and Tourcoing. Unusually rapid progress was made in this region, despite the most stubborn resistance. The fighting front now extends from Dixmude southward to the region of La Bassée, a distance of nearly fifty miles. A penetration of more than eight miles has been made. The Anglo-Franco-American attack in the Cambrai-St. Quentin sector which also embraces a front about fifty miles had given the British virtual control of Cambrai, while the British and French have more than half circled St. Quentin. The great coal center of Donat also is in this circle, the British having passed beyond it on the south. The Americans in this region are fighting along the St. Quentin and Escaut canals astride LeCateau.

WAR SUMMARY

The French, however, operating on the American left, have made notable progress, carrying their lines north of Monthois a total advance of nearly ten miles. Between the Aisne and the Vesle, the French continue their progress along the Chemin Des Dames and to the southward, drawing nearer both to Laon and Craonne. Capture of ten thousand additional prisoners in Palestine announced by General Allenby has brought the total of Turkish prisoners to sixty thousand. This new bag was rounded up east of the Jordan, below Amman. Re-organization of the lines in the Balkans is expected to follow rapidly Bulgaria's withdrawal from the war. The Germans are reported to be pouring in great numbers of reinforcements from Rumania into northern Serbia. It is believed the allies will push rapidly northward to meet this army, utilizing the Bulgarian railways if necessary. The Austrian war office has officially admitted the withdrawal of its line northward, west of Lakeo Ohrida, which formed the left flank of the allied drive in Albania. A big retirement of the Austrians along the whole Albanian front is looked for, because of the danger of flanking operations resulting from extension of the allied lines northward in Serbia.

Authority Declares Surrender of Turkey May Be Anticipated. BOSTON, Mass., Oct. 1.—The unconditional surrender of Turkey may be expected at once, according to statement here from Dr. James L. Barton, head of the American board of commissioners for foreign missions, and an authority on Turkey. "Turkey's surrender, which in the face of recent events, is sure to come, will open the Dardanelles to an allied fleet—probably the Americans," Dr. Barton declared. "This will put the Black Sea at the service of the Allies for cleaning up, and give them full access to the Caucasus, the heart of Russia, the rear of Rumania, and Germany out of her eastern conquests, and open the way for completely overthrowing the empire. "When Turkey yields there is a strong probability that all Germany who have failed to accept will be short. You Sanders can't through Bulgaria in time; others may not be so successful. Quitting off these ports will leave Turkey absolutely unimpeded.

Political developments in Turkey may force her out of the war earlier. Enver Pasha's grip on his empire is loosening. The sultan is expected to be anti-German and in his earlier days was regarded as Francophile.

Grant Is Rampant

Internal conditions are desperate, according to reports here. Starvation, massacre and disease have wiped out more Turks than allied bullets. Grant has drained the treasury. Turkey would have revolted against Germany before this, diplomats believe, but all leaders have been killed as fast as they appeared.

Younger army officers were arrested, it is understood. Enver Pasha, the grand victor, jealous of Enver's usurpation of authority, may intrigue with the new sultan, who is ambitious to rule his own country and force the strongly pro-German Enver out. Reports reaching here today call for renewed riots in Constantinople, as the news of Bulgaria's collapse traveled by word of mouth. Strict censorship is in effect there now.

Francis Appeals for Aid

General Allenby's spectacular advance in Palestine has provoked frantic appeals from Constantinople to Berlin for aid, but little can be offered with the Black Sea fleet has been partially destroyed and can soon be used for an allied entrance through the Dardanelles and then no armistice can move Turkey before the Allies will be out of shells in six weeks, some observers here declare.

All Oppose Turkey

Armenians, subject to Greek, Jews and Arabs, held back by Turkey, are burying differences and forming a coalition to oppose Turkey. They will use their influence to give in to the allies, according to information here. The United Press learned authoritatively that at present there will be separate peace with Bulgaria, and no political decisions affecting that country's future will be taken. Only military matters follow the signing of the armistice.

Enemy Reinforcements Arrive

Missouri and Pennsylvania troops encountered stiff fighting shortly after noon yesterday. The Germans threw in a fresh division from the Metz region in addition to the usual resistance.

The Missourians, who were pushing over the hills south of Eberstadt, ran into overwhelming numbers of the enemy, obliging them to withdraw their advance line slightly to enable the artillery to lay down a barrage.

In the meantime, the Pennsylvania flankings the Germans from the right attacked eastward, inflicting great losses on the Boches. The Missourians and some Kansas troops co-operating, attacked again. The battle raged until 8 p. m., when the Americans regained their original positions.

Bombing squadrons attacked Grandpre and Marco successfully during the afternoon.

"The British captured Levergies, 5 miles north and slightly east of St. Quentin."

"English and Canadian forces, operating in Cambrai yesterday, capturing Proville, a mile southwest of the city, and Tilloy, a mile north of the city, despite strong hostile resistance," the statement said.

Bulgarian Winding Up of Ottoman

IN CONNECTION COMPLETELY SEVERED

Haste With Which Armistice Was Signed Accepted as Indicating Whole Country's Willingness to Quit

PARIS, Oct. 1.—Effects of the Bulgarian armistice upon Austria and Turkey will probably soon be noticeable. The possibilities are opened by the elimination of Bulgaria. The most immediate result is expected by many to be a separate peace with Turkey, due to the severance of Turkey's communications with Germany.

Announcement of Bulgaria's Downfall

The United Press learned authoritatively that at present there will be separate peace with Bulgaria, and no political decisions affecting that country's future will be taken. Only military matters follow the signing of the armistice.

"The Bulgarians are beaten. That explains and clarifies the situation at present," one authority stated. The victorious advance of the allies toward Uskub led the Bulgarians to throw down their arms with such sudden fervor. Before hostilities ceased yesterday noon, even German reinforcements were unable to prevent capture of many Boche positions and immense booty.
