All the efforts of our opponents have been in the direction of covering up the real issues—they dare not discuss the principles for which the Nonpartisans are working—because all sane men must recognize the fact that the enactment of such legislation as is outlined by the Nonpartisan Platform is indispensable to the future welfare of our citizens and the continued development of the wonderful resources of Idaho. There will be great changes demanded in industrial conditions after the war is over. It is to meet the demands for changes that we must prepare. Read our platform below, and decide for yourself whether we are right.

Vote With Us Cheap Power, but—

Do Not VOTE for Nonpartisan Candidates IF YOU ARE SATISFIED WITH paying the Present Exorbitant Rates charged by the Power Trust for Power and Light; do not vote for our candidates if you are satisfied with burning coal and wood, when in all factories you are entitled to have ELECTRICITY at a cost of less than one-half what other classes of fuel cost. VOTE FOR NONPARTISAN CANDIDATES if you want the water powers of the state to be owned and distributed by the state. VOTE FOR THE NONPARTISAN CANDIDATES if you want the power rates reduced and electricity furnished you for heating and lighting and all classes of power about the home at a very small cost.

Idaho Nonpartisan Platform, 1918

1. The paramount issue is to win the war.
2. The chief qualification for office is loyalty—100 per cent Americanism.
3. Greater food production and better distribution being absolutely essential toward winning the war, we therefore pledge our candidates, one and all, to the carrying out of legislation for the following as fast as safe progress will permit:
 - State-owned packing plants, terminal elevators, flour mills and sugar factories.
 - State-owned warehouses and storage plants for farm products.
 - Rural credit banks operated at cost.
 - State ownership and distribution of the water power.
4. We pledge our candidates, one and all, to the carrying out of legislation for labor laws which will not merely protect capital but which will amply protect labor as well, in accordance with the just demands of organized labor.
 - The taxation of all property upon an equitable basis.
 - The taxation of idle property at a higher rate in order to force such property to more largely assist in the financing of the war.
 - A workable initiative, referendum and recall.
 - Other principles and plans included in the supplementary statement are as follows:
 - Woman Suffrage

We urge the immediate enfranchisement of the women of America. We hold that to deny the mothers of this nation the right of suffrage is inconsistent with the professions of equality set forth in our national declarations of democratic principles and a government in which the question of sex determines the right of participation is not a government in which the fundamentals of human liberty are dominant.

One man operation of street cars in any city is dangerous to public safety. An eight-hour day with a minimum pay of \$15 per week for women and girl workers.

An amendment of the lien law giving collection of wages preference over all other claims.

Protection of American barbers from Asiatic competition by regulating hours for opening and closing of all barber shops.

Compulsory state fund insurance under the workmen's compensation law, with a larger minimum weekly payment.

Demands of congress that it accede to the request of the president and grant authority for regulating prices of farm products and other commodities in which there is excessive profit-taking.

Keep Control of Markets

Petition the federal government to shape his plans that it will not relinquish control of the grain markets after the war, but keep them open and free from the excessive practices of monopoly.

Indorse the taking over by the federal government of the railroads and suggest:

- Government seizure and operation of all factories in which industrial dispute profit-sharing takes place.
- Government seizure and operation of all factories in which industrial disputes do not yield to mediation.

Government operation of all mines and all shipyards on government work. Direct contracts between the government and all workers on government supplies and work, through their organizations.

Short-time loans to the farmers by the government on crop security, whether owned or leased land.

Government control of the prices of commodities necessary for the farmers' use.

Imposition of penalties in the shape of idle taxes for the holding of land out of use.

ROOSEVELT AND TAFT RAISE WAR ISSUES AS BASIS FOR CAMPAIGN

Object to Fourteen Point Program—Declare President Should Consider Nothing But Unconditional Surrender—Foreign Policy is Weak and Reconstruction Period Unsafe in Hands of Democrats—Ex-Presidents Slam Wilson

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—Urging election of a republican congress, Ex-President Roosevelt and Ex-President Taft today issued a joint, signed statement in reply to the appeal of President Wilson for election of a democratic congress.

The statement, which was made public by the republican national committee, laid stress on the present peace conversation and declared "the president has indicated a willingness to make a peace negotiation. He has not demanded, as we might have done, in three lines, that which the American people demand, an unconditional surrender."

Defeat One Man Control
Roosevelt and Taft declared the war was being fought to suppress one man control. President Wilson's 14 peace terms were called general and vague and "were expressed in such a way as not to lead to a real peace treaty."

The statement follows:
"We approach this subject as Americans and only as Americans. When this war broke out, we would have welcomed settlement by the president which would have eliminated all questions of party politics. It would have enabled us all to stand behind him to the end, without regard to anything except national consideration. Instead of this, partisan lines have been strictly drawn from the first and now the president announces that only democrats can be entrusted with the future, power and only those democrats who do his will. Because of this reflection on other patriotic Americans we appeal for fair play."

Lay Down Issues
"The next congress will serve from March 1919, to March 4, 1921. It is that period."
"The war must be fought to unconditional surrender unless this is achieved before."

"The terms of world peace must be decided by the people of the United States in that treaty must be taken by the house as part of the congress. The present democratic majority in the house has been subservient to the will of the president in every respect except when critical issues in the conduct of the war have been involved. The president has not hesitated publicly to discipline those of his party who have disagreed with him and the lesson has been made plain to the democratic congress with its old leaders thus chastened will offer no opposition to his will. In a democratic congress the American people will not have the service of an independent, uncorrupted, or outside branch of the government to moderate his will, uncontrolled will. It is not safe to entrust to one man such power. It is not in accord with the belief of the republicans."

Give Money Liberally
"The republicans voted without objection billions to be expended by this administration. Six hundred and forty millions for aviation were given to the executive to build airplanes without a single limitation as to the manner or method of its expenditure. A senator (Continued on Page 8)

NO MERCY SHOWN IN ENGLAND FULL OF AMERICANS BY HUN JAILERS

Conditions in German Prison Camps Said to Be Little Short of Barbarous

LONDON, Oct. 31.—(British admiral wires).—"The rules of international law which were also the rules of humanity, have been observed in this country, but have been over and over and over again flagrantly broken by our enemy." Sir George Gave, some secretary, declared in addressing the house of commons on the barbarous treatment of British prisoners of war. "Some of the German infernal camps are reasonably well organized, but there are other camps where conditions were almost unendurable and inhumanly cruel on which almost were past belief. "These things go on today, and evidence the government had got from returned-prisoners is very much on the same lines as previously. "It is estimated that the number of deaths in prisoner war camps since November, 1916, is 2,000 of all nations."

No Mercy Shown
With regard to working he said the men were beaten and made to work when they were ill. They were underfed and overworked. In fact, everything was done to break their spirits, but Sir George said he checked that in most cases it was not broken. Sir George said he had the best reason for believing that in any armistice with either Austria or Germany the government should insure that, as an essential and primary condition, all prisoners of war in enemy countries be immediately and unconditionally released.

He threatened reprisals, for cruelty. "It is no good talking to the people who old these things," he declared. "We have got to take them by the throat and punish them so that it will be an example for generations to come."

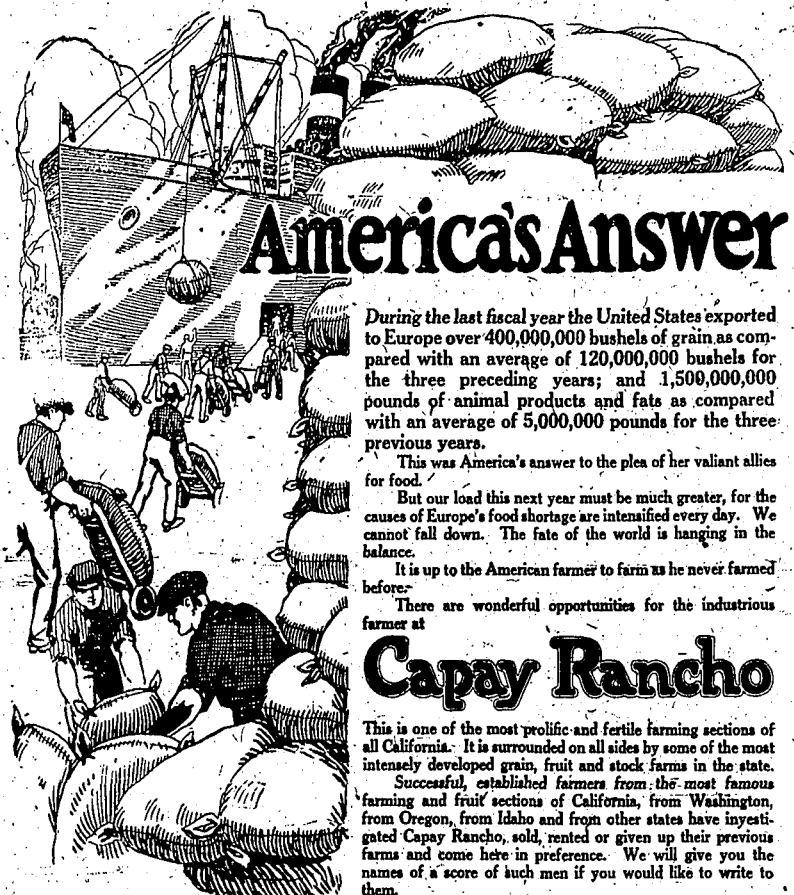

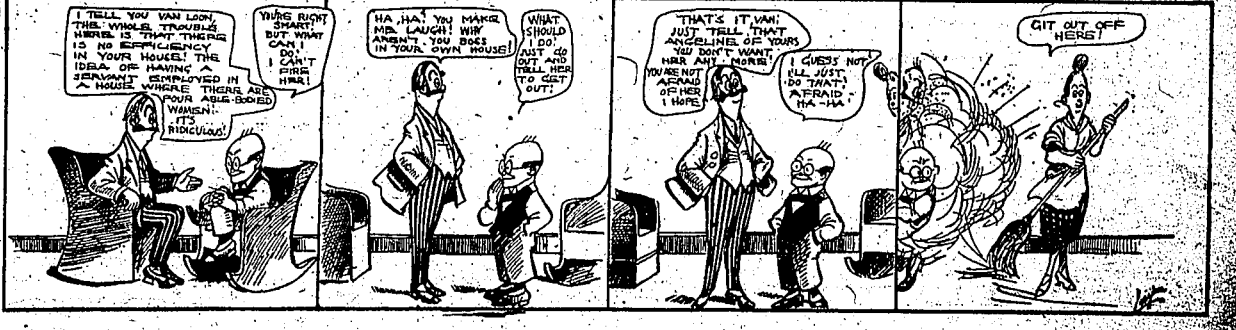
