Allies Get Free Passage of the Dardanelles-Supervise the Demobilization of Turkish Troops and Try Persons to Blame for Terrible Atrocities

LONDON, Oct. 31.-British representatives concluded an ar mistice with Turkey at Salonika at noon today, according to authoritative information received here.

It is understood that the Turkish armistice includes unconditional surrender.

The terms are said to include free passage of the Dardanelles and to be such that it will be impossible for Turkey to resume hostilities. Turkey is thus definitely out of the war,

Turkey approached Great Britain for the purpose of bringing about an early separate peace. The armistice was the result.


