Unhesitatingly Accepts Conditions of Unparalleled Rigor Imposed by Victorious Allies

ARMISTICE TERMS STRIP AUSTRIA OF LAST SHRED OF HER MILITARY POWER

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—Complete, effective surrender of Austria-Hungary is provided by the United States-Allied armistice terms, now operative, and made public by the state department today.

The terms, stripping her of her last shred of military power, provide for total demobilization, including withdrawal of Austro-Hungarian troops from the west front; for surrender of half her divisional, corps and army artillery and equipment for withdrawal from all invaded territories; for Allied occupation of strategic points in Austria-Hungary; for surrender of stipulated numbers of submarines, battle ships, cruisers, etc.; for United States-Allied supervision of the balance of her fleet, and United States-Allied occupation of the big Austrian naval base at Pola.

These terms, and others, put an iron clamp on Austria. From them may be deducted the nature of terms to be meted out to Germany, it was stated authoritatively today.

Germany will have to meet requirements equally as strong in the matter of demobilization, surrender of material, surrender of submarines and major craft and occupation of strategic points.

The text of the armistice terms follows:

MILITARY CLAUSE

"1.—Immediate cessation of hostilities by land, sea and air.
"2.—Total demobilization of the Austro-Hungarian army, and immediate withdrawal of all Austro-Hungarian forces operating on the front from the North Sea to Switzerland.

"3.—Within Austro-Hungarian territory, limited as in clause three below, there shall be only maintained as an organized military force reduced to peace-time effectiveness.
"4.—Half the divisional, corps and army artillery and equipment shall be collected at points to be indicated by the Allies and the United States of America for delivery to them, beginning with all such material as exists in the territories to be evacuated by the Austro-Hungarian forces.

"5.—Evacuation of all territories invaded by Austro-Hungarians since the beginning of the war. Withdrawal within such periods as shall be determined by the commander in chief of the Allied forces on each front of the Austro-Hungarian armies behind a line fixed as follows:
"From Pic-Ombrial to the north of the St. Etienne, it will follow the crest of the Ebnethal Alps up to the sources of the Adige and the Etsch; and thence south by Merano, Bolzano, Trento and Brenner and the heights of Ortis and Zoellner; the line thence turns south crossing Mount Toblach and meeting the present frontier Garle Alps. It follows this frontier up to Mount Tauris and after Mount Tauris, the water shed of the Julian Alps by the Col of Predil, Mount Mangart, the Tirolo (Terzole) and the watershed of the Cols di Podgora, Podlisciano and Idria. BRITISH PUSH TO WITHIN 13 MILES OF MONS

Launch New Attack on Thirty-five Mile Front South of the Scheldt River—Make Rapid Progress at All Points

FRENCH AND AMERICANS ESTABLISH BRIDGEHEADS

Belgians Advance Seventeen Miles Along Dutch Frontier—Official Statements Show Progress Everywhere

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The British opened a new attack on a wide front, south of the Scheldt this morning, it was announced by Field Marshal Haig. In today's drive before Valenciennes and Guise, a front of 35 miles, they have reached the Annelle river, ten miles from Mons, according to battle front dispatches.

Yanks in Fight
French and American troops have established bridgeheads across the Scheldt at Zelken and Wessensme, northeast of Audenarde, Haig announced in his special Belgian communique today.

The British crossed the river at Pottes, eight miles north of Tournai, this morning, it was announced on a wide front south of the Scheldt, the statement said.
Belgians Advance Rapidly
"The attack is reported to have been launched satisfactorily.
"The Belgians advanced fifteen kilometers along the Dutch frontier, north of Ghent, the statement was attacked.
"Their lines were established east of Basvelde and Dovershem, touching the Tournouise canal at Langerbrugge, and reaching the approaches of Ghent.
"French-Americans established bridgeheads at Walden and Needer-Enname.
"The British crossed the Scheldt at Pottes."

GERMAN FRONTIER OPEN TO INVASION

Austria-Hungary Goes Out of the War at 3 O'Clock This Afternoon

PARIS, Nov. 4.—From 3 o'clock this afternoon, when Austria-Hungary goes out of the war, the entire eastern German frontier will be open to the invasion of an Allied invasion. Munich, Dresden, Bavaria, Saxony and Prussia will then be directly menaced.
The Inter-Allied diplomatic council is watching the swift turn of events, with grim satisfaction. There is widespread and awaiting the next step in the central European debacle—publication of the terms to Germany.

ENEMY ARMIES ENTIRELY SEPARATED BY AMERICAN GAINS WEST OF STENAY

AMERICANS DRIVE IN SECURE WEDGE

Lines Pushed Forward to Within One and a Quarter Miles of Beaumont, Northwest of Stenay—Confusion and Congestion Reigns Behind the German Lines as Result of Important Strategic Move of Pershing's Men

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The Stenay gap through which the German armies expected to pass in their retirement south of the Ardennes has been rendered untenable by the American advance, it was indicated in the American official communique today.

American troops have passed Stenay on the west, cutting the line of communication between Stenay and Beaumont. The German armies have thus been virtually split, so far as freedom of maneuver is concerned.
American infantry and light artillery resumed their pursuit of the retreating Germans this morning. Our heavy artillery and airplanes are bombarding the roads in the rear of the enemy, which are jammed with men, guns and material. Yankee gunners are bringing up monster cannons over newly built railroads to hammer the boche's vital centers behind the Meuse.

The Americans extended their attack to the east of the Meuse this morning, it was announced in the official American communique. The attack is progressing favorably.

Emperor Karl Says He Will Abdicate

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 4.—Emperor Karl has informed the members of his cabinet and party leaders that he intends to abdicate and reside in Switzerland, says a Vienna dispatch to the Tagblatt.
County Repoli's cabinet has decided to submit the question of a Hungarian republic to a referendum, it is reported. Complying with their request Emperor Karl has absolved Count Karolyi and his associates of their oath of office.

Demonstrations and Looting Continues

ZURICH, Nov. 4.—The garrison at Vienna has pledged support of the new Austro-German state, according to advices received here today. In the neighborhood of Budapest, several county seats have been looted and burned. Violent demonstrations and the looting of shops continues in Vienna.

GERMANY RUSHING TROOPS TO AUSTRIAN FRONTIER

WAR SUMMARY

THE Austrian armistice is now in effect and Germany is alone against the Allies. When the fighting ceased, it was apparent that the Austrians had been driven almost entirely out of Italy, and that the important enemy cities of Trieste and Trent had been occupied.

In the Balkans, practically all of Serbia and Montenegro had been won back and the Serbs had taken Belgrade, their capital. The Germans are reported to be rushing troops to Austro-German frontiers, where Germany is now open to Allied invasion.

The German defenses on the west front are again crumbling under the fierce hammering of the Allies on various important sectors from the Dutch border to Verdun.

The Americans are rapidly closing the narrow gap in the Meuse region, through which the Germans must pass in their retirement south of the Ardennes. They are reported within less than four miles of Stenay, the historic Meuse crossing. Seizure of this point will eventually split the German armies.

The Germans are reported to be withdrawing their heavy artillery through Metz and great activity is discerned back of the enemy lines in the Woerze region, indicating that a new retirement is about to be effected from the front established after the St. Mihiel salient was wiped out. The important German railway line through Metziers is now under fire from American field artillery, while naval units are rushing up their monster guns to bombard enemy positions in the whole region from Metz to Metziers.

Military experts forecast the use of veteran Italian mountain troops in an immediate trip through Alsace and Lorraine. The British opened a new attack this morning on a wide front south of the Scheldt, where they are driving toward Maubauge and Mons, astride the Franco-Belgian frontier.

The Belgians have pushed their lines nearly fifteen miles farther eastward along the Holland boundary to within twenty-six miles of Antwerp. They are unofficially reported to have captured Ghent. On the right wing of this advance, French and Americans have crossed the Scheldt, and established bridgeheads north of Audenarde, where they are twenty-nine miles from Brussels. The British are across the Scheldt north of Tournai.

The French bombarded the German lines last night along the whole Alsace front from Reibel to Senuy, apparently in preparation for resumption of the advance on the left of the American first army.

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YANKS DRIVE AT STENAY TO HEAD OFF RETIREMENT

Are Within Four Miles of That Strategic Point Possession of Which Will Cut Main Avenue of Escape for Germans

GERMANS REBELLIOUS AND DEMAND RELIEF

Enemy Military Command Gathers Greatest Airplane Concentration Along the Meuse River Made

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, Nov. 4.—The Germans, in addition to their retreat before the French and Americans, west of the Meuse, are reported to be withdrawing their heavy artillery and material through Metz. There is unusual activity behind the enemy lines in the whole Woevre region, east of Verdun.

Yanks Use Big Guns
The Americans and French are continuing their advance on the whole front from the region of Attigny eastward to the Meuse. American big guns are bombarding the positions of Conflans, Montmedy, Longuey and Domremy. The Franco-American advance has brought many important German positions in the range of our 75's, which will add their voice to the artillery chorus as soon as they can be established on the new line heights.

The doughboys are now less than four miles from Stenay, the all-important point, the possession of which will render most difficult the German retirement along the southern borders of the Ardennes.

The Germans are now facing the most serious problem of morale since the beginning of the war. This does not mean their morale is completely broken. On the contrary, it is being broken. On the contrary, it will have a lot of hard fighting left in them, but their commanders are resorting to statements that the allies commit complete destruction and devastation in Germany and consequently the troops must fight harder and over.

Troops Demand Relief.
These statements are being made with the idea of bucking up the boche soldiers.

Many enemy divisions have had no relief for weeks, owing to the constant allied assaults. Fighting has broken out. The Seventy-third division, opposing the Americans at one point, presented a petition to the commanding general, demanding to be taken out. As evidence of the vast change in discipline, the general replied to the petition, stating that the allies' politicians are planning the destruction of Germany and that the troops must fight on. He also revealed their desperate situation, telling the soldiers that if they are taken from the line here they must be put in clear lines.

"Leave or Liberty," is a cry. The commanding officer of another unit, which recently arrived from Russia, was relieved because the men wrote on the railway cars in which they traveled:

"Leave or Liberty."
A movement apparently is well under way to convince the soldiers that unless an armistice comes they must fight to prevent devastation of their homes.

In making his preparations to fight it out along the Meuse, the boches in gathering one of the greatest concentrations of airplanes has ever made. Three new fighting circuses were identified during yesterday's bitter air fighting, in which twelve enemy planes and four American machines were brought down.

"Rick" Dodge's Matrimony
Captain Hickenbacker scored his twenty-third and twenty-fourth victory, shooting down a fokker and setting fire to a balloon. The pilot of the fokker was identified as a member of Baron Hickenbacker's aid circle.

Lieutenant Cook, Indiana, brought down another boche, and Lieutenant Howley with Lieutenant Holder destroyed a balloon.

During a single flight, 200 allied planes dropped tons of bombs on the villages, shot up roads and trenches and cleared the air of boche planes, which were conducting an active propaganda by flying over the American lines, and dropping big packages of leaflets with such headlines as "Why are we fighting for?" and "The German people offer peace," with the German arguments taking the nature of an appeal for terms of an armistice.

Captain Hickenbacker, by the way, is the story called "Paris that he is engaged to a movie star, who he says, apparently is seeking publicity.

ALLIES LAND ON TURK SOIL

Forces Reported in Constantinople — Others Occupy Prince's Islands

PARIS, Nov. 4.—Allied forces are reported to have arrived in Constantinople and to have landed on the Prince's Islands, according to an Athens dispatch to the Petit Journal dated Sunday. The newspaper says that while there is no confirmation of the report, its realization apparently is only a question of hours in any event.

The Prince's Islands are situated in the sea of Marmora, near the coast of Asia Minor, 10 to 16 miles southeast of Constantinople. They are situated in number.

Use Fortresses As Bait for Tourists

String of Defenses Across Europe Will Be No Good Except to Sightseers

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, Oct. 6 (By Mail).—Everybody wonders what they will do with the two chains of fortresses between northern France and southern Germany, now that modern warfare has made them good for practically nothing except sights for sightseers.

With the American advance beyond the Rhine, it is seen the Germans have built up use of fortresses, except as observation posts. Mont Sec, supposedly a stronghold, had practically nothing in it. The reason is plain.

Fortresses mean nothing in the way of defense except as machine gun nests. The infantry can go around them, however, and with gas and artillery and other means of influencing holders of forts, sieges would be short. They don't even put guns in fortresses any more, and probably the former formidable structures on flat hills surrounded by moats soon will be used only as relics of olden days.

STAMP IS REMINDER OF LUSITANIA CRIME

American Defense Society Says Remembrance, Use Nothing German

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—"Remember! Use Nothing German." These words appear on a new stamp, commemorating a postage stamp, being circulated by the American Defense Society.

The stamps are sold, and profits go to the Fatherless Children of France, a society of which Marshal Joffre is president.

On the stamp appears a design painted by R. H. Blandford, New York. It represents humanity, shielding her eyes from the sight of the sinking of the Lusitania, and justice, with sword drawn, in vengeance.

The society reports receiving thousands of signatures to its pledge to use no German made goods after the war.

HUNGARY STARTS FOOD BLOCKADE AGAINST BERLIN

Disarms Homewardbound Germans and Ties Up Twenty Thousand Tons of Foodstuffs — Endeavor to Hasten Peace

GENEVA, Nov. 4.—The Hungarians have declared a food blockade against Germany, in an effort to hasten peace, it was reported in dispatches received here today.

All railway and boat traffic to Germany has been stopped. The Berlin National Tidende says the blockade holds up 20,000 tons of foodstuffs, large quantities of petrol, and prevents the return of German soldiers.

A dispatch from Vienna says that German soldiers and sailors passing through Ljubecz have been disarmed.

I am watching with interest your fight against Townley. In order to introduce myself, will state that I am the trustee of A. G. Townley, bankrupt, and have been connected with that estate for over one year and am having a stiff fight to investigate that fellow and bring him to paying his creditors. Personally I am not in politics.

But what I wish to write you about was that was McKaig. HE IS NO GOOD. Formerly I understand he was a minister and a wild cat in every respect.

The best thing about him was that during the trial of Kate O'Hare he returned to Bismarck to be at her trial and comfort and soothe her.

In open court he rushed up to her and lovingly placed his arm on her shoulder. He greeted her most affectionately and also said, "Massey needs his love." I understand this Massey was a Socialist working for the league in Idaho. Perhaps you know who he was. At any rate, he was an old friend of Kate Richard O'Hare, who was sentenced by Judge Wade to five years at Leavenworth.

These are the states where close contests, the president's appeal or complications due to state issues, have made the decision in doubt.

The senate is composed of 52 democrats and 44 republicans. With four unexpired terms to be filled, 50 senators are to be elected.

"Get out the vote," was the order flashed today to political workers everywhere on the eve of the most important war-time congressional election ever held in the United States.

Expect Close Result
Both democratic and republican leaders expect the result to be close. For this reason they will make unusual efforts to register the views of every voter it is possible to reach.

Final forecasts and statements were in preparation here early today by both parties. The last minute reports from the doubtful and pivotal points poured in.

Both parties are putting in their strongest eleventh hour efforts in Rhode Island, West Virginia, Nebraska and South Dakota. The Nebraska report showed a close contest, the optimistic party people admit.

Although some professed to gauge the effect of President Wilson's appeal to the country, those best qualified to judge declared today it is the real doubtful factor in the election. The effect has not become clearly apparent and will not, say these men, until the vote is cast tomorrow.

ARMISTICE TERMS SET BY TERMS OF LAST HEADQUARTERS MILITARY POWER

surrendered to the Allies, according to special orders given by the commander-in-chief of the forces of the associated powers on the different fronts. No new destruction, pillage or requisition to be done by them and occupied by the forces of the associated powers.

"The Allies shall have the right to free movement over all road and rail and waterways in Austria-Hungary territory, and of the use of the necessary Austrian and Hungarian means of transportation, the armies of the associated powers shall occupy such strategic points in Austria-Hungary as times as they may deem necessary to enable them to conduct military operations or to maintain order."

"They shall have the right of requisition on payment for the troops of the associated powers whenever they can be satisfied."

"Complete evacuation of the German troops within fifteen days not only from the Italian and Balkan fronts, but from all Austro-Hungarian territory."

"Withdrawal of all German troops which have not left Austria-Hungary within the date."

"The administration of the evacuated territories of Austria-Hungary will be entrusted to the local authorities under the control of the Allied and associated armies of occupation."

"Freedom of navigation without reciprocity of Allied prisoners of war and interned subjects and civil populations established from their homes on conditions to be laid down by the commander-in-chief of the forces of the associated powers on the various fronts. Sick and wounded who cannot be removed from occupied territory will be cared for by Austria-Hungary personnel who will be left on the spot with the medical material required."

Naval Conditions
"1.—Immediate cessation of all hostilities at sea and definite information to be given as to the location and movements of all Austro-Hungarian ships on conditions of neutrality being waived."

"Notification to be made to neutralize that freedom of navigation in all territorial waters is given to the naval and mercantile marine of the Allied and associated powers, all questions of neutrality being waived."

"Surrender to allies and the United States of America of fifteen Austro-Hungarian submarines completed between the years 1910 and 1918, and of all German submarines which are or may hereafter be on Austro-Hungarian territorial waters. All other Austro-Hungarian submarines to be paid off and completely dismantled and to remain under the supervision of the Allies and the United States."

"Surrender to Allies and United States with their complete armament and equipment of three battleships, three light cruisers, nine destroyers, twelve torpedo boats, one mine layer, six Danube monitors, to be designated by the Allies and United States of America."

monitors, to be designated by the Allies and United States of America. All other surface warships, including river craft, are to be concentrated in Austro-Hungarian naval bases to be designated by the Allies and United States of America and are to be paid off and completely dismantled and placed under the supervision of Allies and the United States of America.

"Freedom of navigation to all warships and merchant ships of Allied and associated powers to be given in the Adriatic and in the Aegean, the Bosphorus and the Dardanelles, and the territorial waters and territory of Austro-Hungary."

"The Allies and associated powers shall have the right to sweep up all mine fields and obstruction and the positions of these are to be indicated."

"In order to insure the freedom of navigation on the Danube, the Allies and the United States of America shall be empowered to occupy or to dismantle all fortification or defense works."

"The existing blockade conditions set up by the Allied and associated powers are to remain unchanged and all Austro-Hungarian merchant ships found at sea are to remain liable to capture save exceptions which may be made by a commission constituted by the Allies and the United States of America."

"All naval aircraft are to be concentrated and impounded in Austro-Hungarian bases to be designated by the Allies and United States of America."

"Occupation by the Allies and the United States of America, of the land and sea fortifications and islands which form the defenses

point the line turns southeast towards the Schmeberg, includes the whole basin of the Baro and its tributaries. From Schmeberg it goes down towards the coast in such a way as to include Gatusa, Matuggia and Volosca in the evacuated territory."

"It will also follow the administrative limits of the present province of Dalmatia, including to the north Slavonia and Trivania and to the south territory limited by a line from the semirange of Capetuzza to the summit of the Vapuzza eastwards, so as to include in the evacuated area all the valleys and water courses flowing towards Sebenico, such as the Ciocka, Durvica, Butimica and their tributaries. It will also include all the islands in the north and west of Dalmatia and Franska, Solva, Ulbo, Scharda, Mazon, Pago and Punta Dura, in the north up to Maleda in the south embracing Banderona, Suda, Laska, Perosca, Omrolo, Gasa and Lagosta, as well as the neighboring rocks and islets and passages, only excepting the islands of Gress and Small Zircoca, Bus, Zolta and Brassa. All territory thus evacuated shall be occupied by the forces of the Allies and the United States of America."

"All military and railway equipments of all kinds, including coal belonging to, or within those territories to be left in situation and used for the stocks and arsenal at Pola."

"All merchant vessels held by Austria-Hungary belonging to the Allied powers to be returned."

"No destruction of ships or materials to be permitted before evacuation, surrender or restoration."

"All naval and mercantile marine prisoners of Allies or United States of America to be returned without reciprocation."

Hint As to German's Terms
From the basis of the Austrian armistice it may be assumed that Germany will be called upon to evacuate all occupied territories, give up all railway and military equipment, without evacuation territories, surrender a portion of her artillery and equipment within Germany, surrender a portion of her grand fleet, and probably permit occupation of Heligoland or Kiel by United States-Allied units. This latter would be comparable to the occupation of Pola demanded by Austria.

By the Austrian armistice, the Allies are given military and naval privileges within Austria, making it easier for them to strike at Germany's back door, if that nation decides not to be satisfied.

Yanks Get 5,000 Huns in Late Drives
WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—Capture of seventeen towns and villages by Americans operating west of the Meuse was reported today by General Pershing in his bi-magazine for Sunday evening. General Pershing identified troops from the following states as participating in the drive: Arkansas, Kansas, Louisiana, Missouri, Nebraska, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Texas, Maryland, West Virginia, District of Columbia and Virginia.
