

HOUSE SAFELY REPUBLICAN, SENATE STILL IN DOUBT

Late Returns Indicate Situation Which Only Recount Will Decide

Nonpartisan League Decisively Defeated at Polls--Davis and Borah Lead Ticket

ALLIES AND YANKEES MAKE STEADY GAINS

MIDDLE WEST IS REPUBLICAN FOR THE MOST PART

Defeat of J. Hamilton Lewis Marks Main Important Shift as to House and Senate Shake-up

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Republican gains in middle western states were indicated by congressional and senatorial returns today.

Representative Modell McCormick's victory over Senator James Hamilton Lewis provides the only important shift in the national legislative balance in Illinois.

The status of Speaker Clark was uncertain today. Republican leaders jointly claimed that Judge Dyer, Republican, has defeated the Speaker.

Former Representative Victor Berger, indicted in Chicago and Milwaukee for alleged violation of the espionage act, upset the hopes of Wisconsin Republicans for a clean congressional sweep by riding to congress as Representative Blafroth by a 2000 plurality.

Colorado Returns Republican Head

Oliver H. Shoup, Colorado, Springs Apparently Elected Governor

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 6.—With a Republican, Oliver H. Shoup, Colorado Springs millionaire, apparently elected governor, interest today centered in the close race between Senator John H. Shafer, Democratic incumbent, and the Republican, Lawrence Phillips, philanthropist, for the U. S. senate.

Berger Elected From Wisconsin

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 6.—Former Representative Victor L. Berger, socialist, has been elected to congress in the fifth Wisconsin district by a plurality of approximately 7,000 votes.

CALIFORNIA STILL WET EARLY FIGURES SHOW

Both Measures Aimed at Control of Liquor Traffic Defeated Decisively

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6.—Both the bond-drug prohibition bill and the Bondinger measure, which would permit the sale of wine and beer, but would close the saloons, were defeated in California yesterday, returns early today indicated.

Even Los Angeles, incomplete returns show, voted against both measures, and San Francisco returned decisive majorities against them.

GERMANY MUST SUBMIT OR TAKE THE CONSEQUENCES

WAR SUMMARY

GERMANY must wave the white flag on the field immediately, or submit to even more drastic terms than contained in the armistice drawn up at the Versailles conference.

That is the impression prevailing in Europe, according to a dispatch from Paris today.

An Amsterdam advices said the German government had two admirals and two generals to deal with armistice negotiations.

A proclamation issued by the German government urged people to remain orderly, if they do not wish to delay peace.

The British, during the night, advanced to within four miles and a half of Maubeuge.

The French, after maintaining contact with the German rear guards during the night, resumed the attack along the whole front from the Sambre to the Ardennes canal this morning.

Italian troops co-operating with the French, took Le Thuat and advanced to the Pertuisat river.

On the left of the American first army, the French crossed the Aisne between Rehel and Attigny virtually isolating those towns, and carried their lines to within eight miles of Sedan and the seven miles of Metziers.

The Americans, enlarging their gains along the east bank of the Meuse, captured Duu and advanced to within five miles of the Sedan-Metz railway.

West of the river they passed Stonne.

LAST AVAILABLE FIGURES ARE NOT DEFINITE AS TO DETAIL

Both Sides Claim Senate By Narrow Margin With Odds in Favor of Republicans--House Will Show Majority of Around Twenty Although Democrats Refuse to Concede Defeat

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—With Republican and Democratic headquarters both claiming the house and senate, election figures collected from all over the United States by the United Press this afternoon indicated that the result in the senate is in doubt, while the house is apparently Republican.

IDAHO CITIZENS DEFEAT LEAGUE BY HEAVY VOTE

Davis Beats Samuels By Around Twenty Thousand--Borah Said Gooding in Doubt With Odds in His Favor

BOISE, Ida., Nov. 6.—The Nonpartisan League was overwhelmingly defeated in Idaho. Davis, Republican for governor, beat Samuels, nominated by the Nonpartisan League, by 20,000.

Senator Borah, Republican, has been re-elected by around 25,000. Congressman Smith and French, Republicans, re-elected by large majorities.

Frank B. Gooding, Republican, who may be defeated by a small majority by Senator Nugent, Democratic, endorsed by the Nonpartisan League. The entire Republican state ticket is elected with a legitimacy that is overwhelmingly against the Nonpartisan League.

ELECTION MAY AFFECT PEACE POSSIBILITIES

Republicans Inclined to Constructive Result at Polls as Endorsement of Views as to Fourteen Points

POINT OUT INTERESTING CHANCE FOR NEW PROGRAM

Not All Are Agreed Upon Details of Present Status and Ratification of President Wilson's Plans

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Tuesday's congressional election on the face of early returns, bids fair to inject a new and interesting element into the American Allied year program.

A Republican victory, in the face of President Wilson's direct appeal to the people for a vote of confidence, in contrast with Republican leaders and endorsement of his views on the president's formula.

Republicans claim 50 senators, 49 being a majority.

"We expect to have at least 50 senators and a majority of not less than 60 in the house," said James M. Barksdale, secretary of the Republican national committee.

Democratic Bill Hopewell at Democratic headquarters early today denied senate control was claimed with a majority of "from 2 to 4."

In a Republican senate, Lodge, Massachusetts, leader, would head the foreign relations committee, which handles all treaties and reports on them to the senate.

Other Republicans on this committee, who, like Lodge, have registered violent opposition to some of the president's peace terms, include Brandegee.

CLEAN SWEEP ON COUNTY OFFICES

Entire Republican Ticket in Control Here, by Various Majorities

The result of the election in Twin Falls county, a sweeping victory for the candidates on the Republican ticket, is regarded generally as a sharp rebuke administered by both Republicans and Democrats to the Towlely organization in its contest with the Democratic party.

Approximately 60 per cent of the registered voters in the Twin Falls precinct cast their ballots at the polls Tuesday, and the same proportion holds good through most of the other precincts of the county.

# HUNS NOTIFIED AS TO WAY OF GAINING PEACE

### Full Text of President's Note Sets Forth Willingness to Grant Armistice Under Certain Conditions

(From News Election Edition)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—President Wilson late Tuesday afternoon notified Germany that she can get terms of an armistice from General Poch.

At the same time in a note which Secretary Lansing gave the Swiss minister for transmission to Germany, it was revealed that the Allies accepted President Wilson's 14 peace principles with two reservations.

These reservations were:

The Allies must reserve to themselves complete freedom of interpretation in the peace conference of Wilson's clause on freedom of the seas.

Germany must make compensation for all damages she has done to the Allied civilian population and their property.

This latter is an addition to President Wilson's provision that all invaded territories must be restored as well as evacuated and freed.

President Wilson, it was stated, agreed with the modification and addition to the two respective points in question in his peace formula.

### MEMOR REPEALS KULTUR

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—The Deutches Verein, or German Club of New York, in now the Lafayette House, where wounded American soldiers are being nursed and entertained while recuperating. Fourth district—J. S. Benham, who defeated Dixon, Democrat.

Thirteenth district—A. J. Hickey, who defeated H. A. Barnhart, Democrat.

### Medill McCormick Beats Senator Lewis

Practically Complete Returns From Chicago and Outside Counties Are In

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—Representative Medill McCormick, republican, has been elected senator from Illinois over Senator Jas. Hamilton Lewis, it seemed certain early today on the basis of practically complete returns from Chicago and representative returns from downstate districts.

The same returns indicated that Illinois has sent 17 republicans to the house and 6 democrats. The results in four other districts were close, with republican candidates leading.

Representative Mason and former Governor Richard, republican, have been elected congressmen at large.

On the basis of these returns, Illinois quota in the house will remain unchanged, while the senate goes one republican through the election of McCormick.

### Looks Like Finish Of Speaker Clark

Republicans Gain Two Seats in House and One in Senate in Faoe of Early Returns

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Nov. 6.—Republicans have gained two seats in the house and one in the senate from Missouri, returns early today indicated.

Speaker Champ Clark, democrat, apparently has been defeated by H. B. Dyer, and Selden Spencer, republican, was believed to have won from Joseph Folk in the senatorial race by 10,000 votes.

L. C. Dyers republican, has defeated Representative Rosenfall, democrat, in the twelfth district, Ed N. Hayes, republican, defeated Representative Russell Democrat, in the fourteenth, and J. V. McPherson, republican, defeated Representative Decker, democrat, in the fifteenth.

Prohibition was defeated by 76,000.

### UNION HAN RECRUITS ARMY OF CIVILIAN ENGINEERS

Among the present urgent needs of the construction division of the army are 50 chiefs of survey parties at \$700 to \$900 per year; 50 transit men at \$200 a year; 25 levelmen at \$210 a year; 125 rodmen at \$180 a year, and 50 topographic draughtsmen at \$3100 a year. These positions are open to men only, except the drafting positions, which are open to both men and women. All of the positions are in the civil, not the military, service. The civil service commission is in charge of appointments to this service.

### Name Committee to Deal With Allies

German Government Appoints Men Who Will Take Up Armistice Terms

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 5.—The German government has appointed a commission to deal with armistice negotiations, according to reports received here today. It includes Admiral Von Hintze, former foreign minister; Admiral Moers, General Gruedell and General Winterfeldt.

The government has issued a proclamation urging the people to maintain order. They do not wish to delay peace. The proclamation recites the reforms undertaken since the new government was created, and appeals to the people to unite for an honorable peace.

MUST SAY YES OR NO

PARIS, Nov. 6.—Germany is expected to indicate soon, perhaps tomorrow, whether she will ask Marshal Poch for terms of the armistice formulated at the Versailles conference, was the belief expressed here today.

The Germans, it was said, must answer "yes" or "no" immediately if the present conditions are not to be made even more severe.

### Willing to Make Peace

The Allied governments have given careful consideration to the correspondence which has passed between the President of the United States and the German government. Subject to the qualifications which follow, they declare their willingness to make peace with the government of Germany on the terms of peace laid down in the President's address to congress of January, 1918, and the principles of settlement pronounced in his subsequent addresses.

They must point out, however, that clause two, relating to what is usually described as the freedom of the seas, is open to various interpretations, some of which they could not accept. They must, therefore, reserve to themselves complete freedom on this subject when they enter the peace conference.

Further, in the conditions of peace laid down in his address to congress of January 1918, the President declared that invaded territories must be restored as well as evacuated and freed. The Allied governments feel that no doubt ought to be allowed to exist as to what this provision implies. By it that understood, that compensation will be made by Germany in all injustice done to the civilian population of the Allies, and their property by land, by sea and from the air.

# GIVING TO WAR WORK CITIZEN'S BIG PRIVILEGE

### County Executive Committee Issues Statement Explanatory of Purposes of Coming United War Work Campaign

Twin Falls county citizens will have a glorious privilege of again contributing for War Relief Work among "our boys" in the great United War Work campaign during the week of November 11 to 18, to carry out the purposes and plan of this campaign the executive committee for Twin Falls county has issued the following introductory statement:

It is a privilege to give a little of our means to make our boys happy and more comfortable over there. They are giving their all freely—most of us in any way withhold from them anything that will make life better and more cheerful than while fighting our battles over there.

The seven great soldier's welfare and war relief organizations will make a joint campaign for \$170,000,000 during the week of November 11 to 18, to carry out the good work among our boys. Every cent of the money raised is spent for the pleasure of the boys. We do not give them some of the home influence they desire and need.

One of the seven organizations doing welfare work for the soldiers over seas shipped to the men over there during the period from July, 1917, to August, 1918, 1,058,169 cans of fruit; 510,000 packages of shaving gum; 849,785,802 cigarettes; 463,824 pounds of cocoa; 10,222,736 pounds of sugar; 251,322 tubes of tooth paste; 31,279,202 pounds of flour; 2,557,491 packages of tobacco; 32,358,700 cigars and 1,005,190 cans of condensed milk. These figures show the need of raising funds to maintain the work of the welfare organizations which serve to keep the morale of the Allied armies at its topmost point.

The influence of the American home follows the American fighting men clear to the front line trenches. It is the first time in the world's history that this is the case. This influence is carried overseas by the seven great welfare organizations doing work among the soldiers; the Y. M. C. A., K. of O., Y. W. C. A., Jewish Welfare League, War Camp Community Service, American Liberty Association and the Salvation Army. Huts are established where the soldier may spend his leisure and time. Entertainment is furnished him and he is given that care and attention that he would have received in a greater measure at home. These huts overseas are the nearest thing to home that the soldier knows.

You may not agree religiously with some of these organizations in their drive, but that is no reason you should not give liberally to the campaign. The different organizations doing welfare and relief work over there do not ask a boy his religious views before offering him a cigarette or doughnut; and if he does not belong to their particular organization—first, his religion, his eye race, creed or color is gladly welcomed at any hut, building or headquarters of any of the different organizations and made to feel at home. Have you any right to draw any lines over here if it is the greatest work ever undertaken, exclusive of the Red Cross. Support it liberally. They certainly need your money.

## CANTEEN FEEDS 10,000 IN ONE DAY

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN FRANCE, Oct. 5. (By Mail)—More than 78,000 American soldiers were fed at one American Red Cross canteen along the lines of communication in France last month. On one day of that month 10,000 passing troops were given hot coffee and food to cheer them on their way. This is a record in service for American troops.

It was performed by a squad of eight American women and girls. And to make their task more difficult, they served this food at three different points, each almost three miles away from the other.

When the American people showed their loyalty and appreciation of the Red Cross last May by subscribing nearly double the amount of money asked for, it had a wonderful effect upon the members of the organization in France. They interpreted it as meaning that nothing was too good or too effort to do for the fighting men of America in Europe.

So, from the sanatoria to the battle front, the American soldiers are met at intervening stations by Red Cross workers distributing hot drinks, food and tobacco. The troop trains are stopped outside of these Red Cross centers, and most of them remain until every soldier has been served.

If a train does not pull into the terminus where the canteen is located, the Red Cross workers pile their food and hot drinks upon a truck or caissonette and hustle it to the place where the train does stop. Where the wait of the troop train is an hour, the soldiers are served a full meal. Last month, 6,000 full meals were served at this particular canteen.

## SHOW YOUR CARD, DOBBIN

LONDON, Oct. 16 (By Mail)—Here after Old Dobbin is going to register and have a food card just like his master.

The new ration law requires registration of horses. The daily ration is two-thirds hay and one-third straw. The quantity varies according to weight of the horse and his "dry" or "filled," for instance, is allowed 16 pounds a day.

## Soldiers of Italy To Learn to Spell

ROME, Oct. 5.—(By Mail)—Italy is taking advantage of the fact that she has all of her young sons mobilized and under immediate control to lessen the percentage of illiteracy in Italy.

Previous to the war the large percentage of Italians who could not read and write was not so much due to the fact that Italy did not have sufficient educational facilities as to constitutional objection on a certain part of her population to being educated. This was especially the case with districts in the extreme southern portion of Italy.

With all of these people under arms and under military discipline now, Italy hopes before demobilization can take place to have them all at least capable of reading and writing.

One of the last steps to this end has been an order by the Italian government for 1,000,000 copy books and 100,000 spelling books. These will be placed in all of the recreation rooms that have been set aside for the use of the soldiers both at the front and in repose locations. Other assistance and inducements will also be offered to the soldiers to see that the copy books and spellers are utilized to the fullest extent.

The election of the entire Republican state and county ticket is indicated by returns available at a late hour this morning. With the rapid gains made by Senator Borah for long term senator and D. W. Davis for governor, an early return, interest in the state election quickly centered in the contest between Frank R. Gooding, Republican candidate for short term senator, and John F. Nugent, Democratic candidate to succeed himself. Borah was endorsed by the Nonpartisan league, while Gooding has for several weeks waged a strenuous campaign against league leaders.

Ford Is Picking Up In Michigan Contest

Both Sides Claim Victory With Odds Apparently in Favor of Newberry

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 6.—Heavy gains made by Henry Ford in late counts in and around Detroit are rapidly eating off Newberry's upstate majority. Ford managers claim he is elected by five to ten thousand. Newberry men maintain he will win by 25,000. Ford workers say their candidate is leading by nearly 2,000 on their private count.

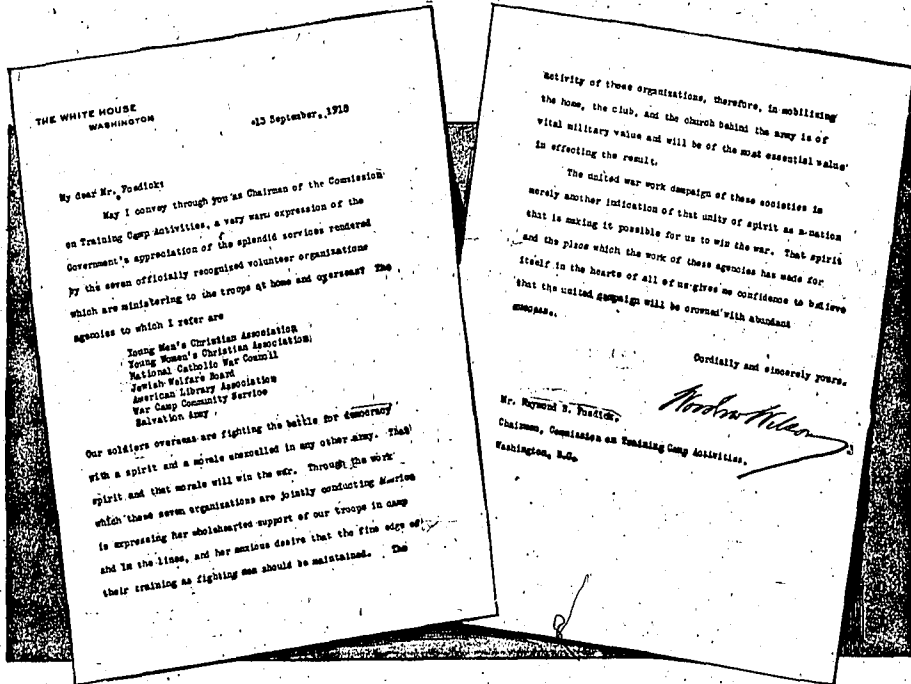

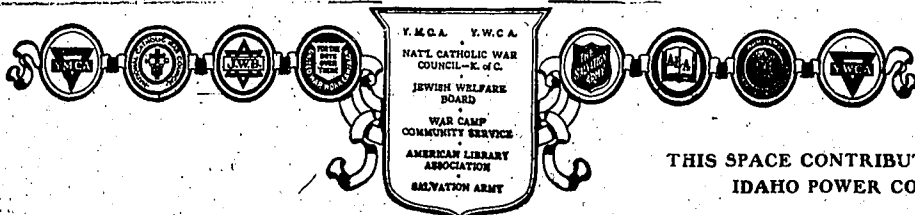

## Rumania's Separate Peace Will Not Prejudice Her Standing in Europe

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—The United States government has notified Rumania that her separate peace with the central powers would not prejudice her interests at the peace table.

Secretary Lansing wrote the Rumanian charge that the United States would exert its influence toward fulfillment of Rumania's just ambitions. Rumania had feared that her rights would be overlooked, so a few days ago the Rumanian charge presented a memorandum outlining her aims and suggesting they would be recognized.

Lansing's reply today said: "The government of the United States has consistently held in hand the future welfare and integrity of Rumania as a free and independent country and prior to the existence of a state of war between the United States and Austria-Hungary, a message of sympathy and appreciation was sent by the president to the king of Rumania."

"Conditions have changed since that time and, the president, accordingly declines to inform you that the government of the United States is not unopposed of the animosities of the Rumanian people without, as well as within the boundaries of the kingdom."

"It has witnessed their struggles and sacrifices in the cause of freedom and their enemies and their oppressors. With the spirit of national unity and the aspirations of the Rumanian people, the government of the United States deeply sympathizes and will not neglect at the proper time to exert its influence that the just political and territorial rights of the Rumanian people may be obtained and made secure from all foreign aggression."

The department also asked the American legation at Jassy to present a duplicate to the Rumanian government.

Affects Committee Head

Borah will win his contest for re-election over MOORE by a heavy margin; and that Frank E. Gooding has a shade of the advantage over his opponent, Nugent.

D. W. Davis, who probably will carry this county by approximately 200 votes, for governor, will be elected by a two to one majority in the state, according to reports from the state capital.

One Possible Exception.

With the exception of the possible defeat of Gooding, the election of the Republican congressional and state tickets in the state is assured.

In Twin Falls county, the only exception in a clean sweep for the Republican candidates for the legislative and county offices is in the case of James A. Dyboe, Democratic candidate for reelection as county surveyor, who has won out, on the face of reported returns by a margin of about 300 votes over his opponent, E. V. Borg.

Judge W. A. Babcock, candidate for reelection to the district bench, polled from 75 to 80 per cent of the vote cast in Twin Falls county, and is apparently the high candidate among the four runners for the bench to be filled in the fall. Babcock probably has lost the election to the second place on the bench, and reports received here are to the effect that Box V. Wilcox will crowd W. A. Stafford for third place.

two in Michigan; one in Minnesota; eight in Mississippi; twelve in Missouri; one in Montana; two in Nebraska; one in Nevada; six in New Jersey; one in New Mexico; twenty in New York; ten in North Carolina; eight in Ohio; six in Oklahoma; five in Pennsylvania; seven in South Carolina; one in South Dakota; eight in Tennessee; eighteen in Texas; two in Utah; nine in Virginia; one in Washington; two in West Virginia—a total of 214.

Walk from Massachusetts

The Republicans appeared to have lost to former Governor Walsh, the place now held by Senator Weeks of Massachusetts. Reports of the contest in Nevada, which has been hotly contested by the Republicans, were not conclusive up to an early hour.

On the most definite figures obtainable, the Republicans will have control of the senate by a majority of four, the indicated party division being fifty Republicans and forty-six Democrats. The present senate contains fifty-two Democrats and forty-four Republicans.

In the contest for the house of representatives, the Republicans have apparently gained twenty-four seats from the Democrats and the Democrats eight seats from the Republicans. These figures make the next house stand: Republicans, 224; Democrats, 200; with eleven seats still in doubt.

Four Seats in Kansas

Gains by the Republicans include four seats in Kansas; three in Indiana; two in Pennsylvania; two in West Virginia; two in Ohio; two in Nebraska; one in New York; one in Kentucky; one in Missouri, where Champ Clark, Democrat, was apparently defeated; one in Maryland; one in New Jersey; one in Rhode Island; one in Colorado; and one in Delaware, making twenty-four in all. The Republicans, however, appeared to have lost the Republican seat held by Stafford of Wisconsin to Victor Berger, the socialist leader who is under indictment for violating the espionage law.

Gains by the Democrats in the lower house include five from New York, two in New Jersey and one in Massachusetts.

In the senate fight, the Republicans had doubtful states which were West Virginia, South Dakota and Nebraska.

May Be Up to Soldiers

In New York, the governorship contest is so close that the soldier vote, yet to be counted, may be the deciding factor.

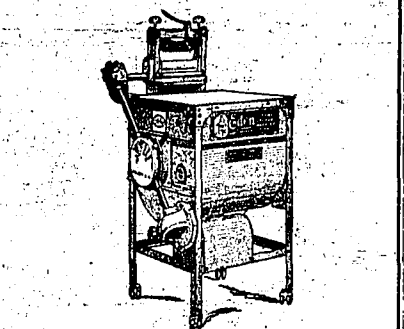
