GERMANY MUST SUBMIT OR TAKE THE CONSEQUENCES

WAR SUMMARY

ERMANY must wave the white flag on the field im-mediately, or submit to even more drastic terms than contained in the armistice drawn up at the Versailles

conference.

That is the impression prevailing in Europe, according to a dispatch from Paris today.

Amsterdam advices said the German government had two admirals and two generals to deal with armistice negotiations. These included General You Hintz, former German foreign secretary and General Winterfelt, former military attache at Paris.

With German action on the armistice pending, the Allied armies continued forward again today in the great battle which is expected to force the enemy into quick acceptance of the armistice, or result in trapping a great portion of the German armies along the southwestern edge of the Ardennes, from the Muthenge-Hirson region southeastward to the vicinity of Sedan and Montmedy.


