ESSEN, Dec. 23.—Bloody street fighting at Essen between the forces of the workmen and soldiers' council and Spartacides was reported in a dispatch received today.

The Spartacides obtained reinforcements, attacked the prison, released their comrades and imprisoned the soviet representatives.

Shortly afterward an armed mob marched upon the Muller mine and attempted to destroy the plant.

Workmen and soldiers' force planting machine guns at strategic points near the rioters with a deadly fire and dispersed them.

AMERICAN AVIATORS ACCOUNT FOR OVER 800 ENEMY PLANES IN WAR

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—American aviators downed 845 enemy planes during the war, of which 491 were confirmed and 354 were not, according to information reaching the war department today.

Major General Harbord, in a cable to the director of the air service this summarized the work of United States flyers and the scope of the operations of the air service.

On the day the armistice was signed, thirty-nine American aero squadrons were in operation on the west front.

Casualties suffered by the service total 448; of these 109 were killed, 103 wounded, 200 missing, 27 prisoners and 3 interned.

Big Food Shipment On Way to Europe

More Than Ten Million Pounds Sent to Relieve Distress in Scandinavia

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—More than ten million pounds of foodstuffs to meet the acute shortage in the Scandinavian countries are now on their way from the United States, the war department announced today.

"This shipment is not the result of any super abundance of supplies," the war trade board officials stated.

The war trade board today authorized the shipment to Finland for civilian relief of 10,000 tons of cereals, 2,500 tons of pork products, 1,000 tons of industrial fats and 3,000 tons of sugar.
