THINKS BRITISH DESIRE CONTROL OF WORLD TRADE

Officials Charge Unfair Competition of the English in Obtaining Cargoes for Their Ships

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—British shipping interests have come into the open in their fight for control of world shipping. Indications today were that the great economic war which has been threatened is now on in earnest.

Shipping board circles were startled by what officials term unfair competition by the British in obtaining cargoes for their bottoms. High Rate Contracts On the heels of an announcement of a reduction of 66.25 per cent in rates to Great Britain, it was asserted here that British shipping interests have garnered cargoes sufficient for three months ahead. In addition to this it was asserted among officials, British interests have begun chartering American-owned vessels. It was evident from reports received here that this chartering of American owned ships was being done by the British to provide space for all cargoes offered under the new rates.

American Vessels Handicapped The shipping board immediately met the British rate reduction. But in British shipping circles it was said that when American vessels obtain cargoes many handicaps in the way of foreign port facilities are found to be in their path. On the other hand, when the consignment is shipped in British vessels the "ways are greased," reports indicate.

SMALL NATIONS WILL ORGANIZE

"Little Five" Form Block to Look After Interests of Nations at Conference

PARIS, Jan. 29.—Establishment of the "big five" block for the purpose of wielding the "big stick" on the peace conference has resulted in formation of a "little five" block which will seek to swing a "little stick."

The United States, Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan constitute the "big five." The "little five" have been organized by Belgium, Serbia, Greece, Poland and China. These "neutral" nations agree out of the fight by the smaller nations for greater representation on the special committee, which will work out the details of the peace settlement. The lines thus drawn will be wiped out, it is believed, when the question of representation is amicably adjusted. Work toward this end is progressing rapidly. Although it would be inadvisable for the nineteen smaller nations to have one representative, each among the twenty which can be chosen for a committee, the final list of memberships on the committee so far formed, leaves eight small nations entirely unrepresented. Fourteen members of the twenty chosen by the small nations go to the "little five." Belgium, which led the open revolt in Saturday's plenary session, against the "big five," dictating representation, obtained five of these delegates, Serbia three, China two, Greece two and Poland two. The other small nations outside the "little five," which succeeded in landing one membership each, are Brazil, Portugal, Rumania, Cuba, Uruguay and the Czechoslovak republic.

YOUTHFUL OUTLAW KILLS GANG'S YOUNGEST MEMBER

Two Year Old Child Beats Another to Death With Bottle for Breaking His Cosh

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—Because Waddie Widekiss, 9, broke his oath to "divide all spoils, share and share alike," he paid the secret gang's penalty of death. The story of how Stephen Dink, 10, while two 15-year-old accomplices looted, manned Waddie's head with whiskey and beat bottle while the boy was asleep in the shanty used as the gang's headquarters, was made public today following Stephen's dispassionate confession. Stephen, the police said, declared that he was appointed to kill "Waddie" before the gang had decided his fate for not dividing 99 with other members. "Waddie" had appropriated the money his mother had given him with which to pay a bill.

Work Suspended On Steel Hulls In Five Yards

California Plants are Ordered to Work on Thirty-four Ships

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29.—Work on thirty-four steel hulls in the California district was ordered suspended in a telegram received today by Captain Pillsbury of the emergency fleet corporation from Charles Pizer, general manager of the corporation. The plants affected are: Lone Star, six hulls. Western Pipe and Steel Company, South San Francisco, four hulls. Southwestern Shipbuilding Company, East San Pedro, eight hulls. Los Angeles Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company, ten hulls. Pacific Coast Ship and Shipbuilding Company, Oakland, six hulls.

Soldiers Weddings Take a New Form

Marriage by Mail is Now Declared Legal by a War Department Ruling

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Marriage by mail for soldiers overseas and their dependents in this country is permissible under a war department ruling today. The only limitation is that the proxy weddings shall not be countenanced where state laws make the contracts invalid. Commanding officers, suggests the decision, can aid in case the soldiers are anxious to wed before their return. The proxy wedding of Wales T. Hawes, Cambridge, Mass., soldier overseas, to Miss Annie Hiscok of Roxbury, Mass., 191, to the ruling. At first, the office of acting Judge Advocate General J. T. Ansell Curtly dismissed the proposition, but such marriages could be contracted, but later reversed his decision.

Battleship Returns Troops to America

Another Vessel is Reported Delayed on Way by Engine Trouble

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., Jan. 29.—One hundred and twenty-nine veterans arrived here today on the battleship Nebraska, thirteen days out from Brest. The Nebraska brought news that the battleship New Jersey was forced to put into the Azores as a result of engine trouble. On board the Nebraska was the 311th field signal battalion, 421st telephone battalion, 422nd telephone battalion, casual company 223, three casual officers and 25 sailors. Many of the men will be sent to Camp Meade, Maryland, for demobilization. Others will be taken to Elgin, New York; Funston, Kansas; Dodge, Iowa, and Grant, Illinois.

INTERNS YOUNG WOMAN FOR DISLOYAL REMARKS

Returned Veteran Tells of the Wonderful Fight in the Argonne Region

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—Lieutenant H. M. Meyer of the 364th artillery, San Francisco, who arrived on the transport Atenas, said today that the ninety-first division, composed of troops from California, Washington, Montana and Oregon, "fought the German lines in the Argonne to the greatest depth during the American drive. Meyer is recovering from the effects of being gassed when a bomb exploded at his feet.

Made Wonderful Showing The ninety-first division had never been under fire before they entered the Argonne battle and the way they went to it was certainly wonderful," said Meyer. "They simply couldn't be stopped. The Pacific coast and Northwest have much to be proud of in the boys they sent over. They are on their way to the front in the Argonne and should be back in the United States in a month or so."

Girl Veteran Arrives Miss K. Usher, former illustrator of Chicago, arrived here today on the transport Minnesota. She is on her way to visit her sisters at Hollywood, California.

Miss Usher is a "green"—a lieutenant in the woman's royal naval service of Great Britain. Other officers on the Minnesota were T. M. Stack of San Diego, who went over as General Feghling's personal field clerk; Lieutenant L. A. Morrill, 2124 Lincoln Park West, Chicago, who was connected with the 38th and 4th infantry and returned with three wounds.

WIRE BILL HAS A SLIM CHANCE

Favorable Action at This Session of Congress is Not Very Likely

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Chance for any action favorable to government ownership of the wireless is not very likely at this session of congress, it was generally agreed today. While government ownership advocates were planning a fight on the floor of the house to put back into the Moon resolution the provisions stricken out in the house postoffice committee, they admitted that their chance of success was slim. The Moon resolution originally gave power to the postmaster general to contract by telegraph and telephone systems, but as reported out of committee, it merely extends government wire control until next December 31. When the bill was taken over last July it was provided that they were to be turned back at the proclamation of peace.

The bill for government ownership of the wireless has already been strangled in committee and democrats have decided to make no move for or against government ownership of railroads this session.

REPORTS SUCCESSFUL RETARIAT BY THE ALLIES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Allied-American evacuation of Shekuret was successfully completed with receipt of supplies and 500 Lithuanian refugees, Consul Poole, at Archangel, cabled the state department today. He also sent an unconfirmed report that the Bolshevik revolutionaries had destroyed part of the town and murdered many of the inhabitants. Captain of Kevno and Liban, a Baltic port, by the Bolsheviks was reported from Lithuanian sources.

WESTERN LEAGUE MEET IS POSTPONED FEW DAYS

DES MOINES, Ia., Jan. 29.—The meeting of the Western League scheduled for February 1 at St. Joseph, Mo., has been postponed until February 22. It was announced by Mayor Tom Fehrweather, owner of the local franchise today. A president will be selected at this meeting and a schedule worked out. Tulsa also will be formally admitted to the league.

FEATHERWEIGHT DIES

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—Eddy Santry, 42, former state representative and famous featherweight boxer, died here today. Physicians declared he died from a nervous breakdown following his defeat for a second term in the legislature last August. Santry was a pupil of Harry Gilmore and was in the ring at around 122 pounds from 1895 to 1911.

FAVORS FRESH PRIZE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—S. D. Snyder, acting chief of the meat division, food administration, recommended continuance of the price of \$17.50 on hogs for February at the conference of packers and swine producers this afternoon. Snyder said Herbert Hoover had called his approval of this step.

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Two Boxing Bills Show Up in Oregon

Both Allow Ten Rounds to Fight and One Would Help Charity Organizations

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 29.—Two boxing bills are to be considered by the Oregon legislators, both allowing ten-round fights. Senator Pierce is the author of one which provides for the regulation of boxing by a state commission, modeled after the Wisconsin law.

The other measure, which Dr. McFarland introduced in the house, authorizes mayors of cities to appoint boxing commissions to conduct fights with referee decisions. The net receipts of the fights are to go to charity. The Pierce act stipulates that ten per cent of the gross receipts shall go to the general fund of the state. Both bills are still before committees.

Former Professor Is Shot in Election Fight

Spartacan Mob Attacks Man and Victim is Dangerously Wounded

BERLIN, Jan. 25 (delayed).—Lowell Thomas, formerly professor at Princeton University, was shot below the heart and dangerously wounded at Bremen last Sunday, it was learned here today. He was saved from the wrath of a Spartacan mob which had attacked him, by Webb Waldon of Collier's Weekly. Both had been accused of attempting to cause a split in the Spartacan organization.
