

GROWDER GIVES ANNUAL REPORT ON ARMY FORCE

Provost Marshal General Presents His Facts on the Army Organization to Congress With Interesting Figures

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—The United States was ready to increase its force to 7,131,172 men during 1918 if the war had continued, Provost Marshal General Crowder today stated in his annual report to congress.

A reserve of 2,340,000 class one men was waiting to be mobilized when the armistice was signed, the report stated, the armed strength of the nation then being 4,791,172 men. When war was declared the armed strength was 378,610 men.

Two Thirds Drafted.
Two out of every three men in uniform were raised through the draft, Crowder stated, the total number inducted during the war being 2,810,296. Every one was taken from class one.

Only 18 per cent of the men of military age, 16 to 45, were in the service, the report stated, while England contributed 62 per cent of her available fighters.

In all 24,284,921 men were registered by the great draft system for military service.

No Industry Suffered.
Seven per cent was the maximum per cent of men taken from any one industry. The farmers were treated better than any workers, 69 per cent of those registered being granted deferred classification. Comparatively few married men were taken, the records showing that 89 per cent of them were deferred.

Physically the nation is 70 per cent perfect, according to the draft examiners. This is the per cent of the men found fit. This does not include the limited service men or those whose defects could be remedied.

Middle West Shows Fitness
The highest per centages of physical fitness come from the middle-west. Oklahoma led the nation with 92 per cent, closely followed by Arkansas, Kansas, Nebraska, Wyoming, Texas and North Dakota. Rhode Island and Arizona show the largest per cent of physically unfit with Connecticut, Massachusetts, Vermont, New York and Washington close. Rhode Island had only 22 per cent fit, and New York 90 per cent.

Liquor was the smallest factor in causing physical rejections, the per cent being only one tenth of one per cent. Heart troubles, eyes, tuberculosis and mental defects brought the largest number of rejections, each claiming more than 10 per cent of the total disqualified. Flat feet took only 1.3 per cent.

"It helped save Paris, helped reduce the St. Mihiel salient, helped reduce Rheims and helped reach Sedan. Some think it is the best division in any army in France."

CALLS FOR INVESTIGATION
WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.—A congressional investigation of charges of misconduct against army officers, looking to their removal, was demanded by Representative McCullough, Ohio, after he had read a letter charging that Ohio troops in Dalmatia are ill fed and ill clothed.
"If the secretary of war refuses to remove these men after their misconduct is established, I am in favor of impeaching him," McCullough said.

WON'T TAKE CIVILIAN JOBS
LONDON, Feb. 6.—Four thousand members of the royal army service corps, employed in three London depots, refused duty, claiming the work was being done by civilian labor under such conditions. Most of them were engaged in mechanical repairing.

MAKE PLAN FOR 250 MILES OF BETTER ROADS

Twin Falls Highway District Commissioners Decide on Tentative Program—Wait Estimates of Cost

Commissioners of the Twin Falls highway district, created last fall to include all of the county except those sections included in the Bull and proposed Filer highway district have decided upon a tentative program for road building to be prosecuted in the district during the coming season. The program provides for building of approximately 250 miles of hard surfaced roads forming a network over the district and serving practically every community.
Detailed estimates of the cost of carrying the program into execution are being prepared by W. L. Johnson, district director of highways, for the consideration of the commissioners at their meeting here on Saturday next.

The program to be determined upon by the commissioners after their consideration of the engineer's estimates is to be submitted for the approval of the electors of the district at a bond election to be called within the next 90 days.

FIXES DAMAGES DONE BY STRAYING SWINE

Jury in Probate Court Renders Verdict for Defendant Holding Hogs Which Ate His Spuds

A jury in probate court here Wednesday decided in the case of C. G. Gingham against Clarence Bees, that 11 head of hogs owned by Bringham destroyed \$20 worth of potatoes when they broke their confines and helped themselves to the contents of Bees' potato cellar about January 29.

The action was brought by Bringham, a suit in claim and delivery, to recover the offensive swine, which were held by Bees under a claim of lien for \$50 for damage sustained.
The trial occupied all day Wednesday in the probate court. H. C. Hazel appeared as attorney for the plaintiff, and W. Orr Chapman represented the defendant.

CATTLEMEN TO MEET IN BOISE

State Control of Grazing and Advance in Forest Fees for Consideration

The fourth annual convention of the Idaho Cattle and Horse Growers' association, of which Clay Vance is president and L. E. Dillingham secretary, is set for February 19 and 20 at Boise. The association is composed largely of cattle and horse growers of the state who run their livestock upon the public domain and the national forests and has a membership of about 1,200.

The association was organized at Pocatello in 1914 and has held conventions in Pocatello, Boise and Idaho Falls.
"Owing to the fact that a very material increase in grazing fees on the forests is being considered, owing to the fact that legislative matters affecting the industry are up for consideration, there is an indication that the attendance at the fourth annual convention in Boise will be the largest one in the history of the association."
During the existence of this association it has been instrumental in keeping down grazing fees on the forests and in securing a five-year term permit for grazing stock on the forests instead of one, as heretofore. It has advocated and has brought about a rule attaching the right to graze livestock on forests to the ownership of ranch property instead of to the ownership of a live stock permit.
The association has also been instrumental, co-operating with the American Livestock association, in bringing about an investigation of the packers—the big question of which we see so much now in the press.

Better breeding, increased market facilities, distribution of care, freedom of contagious rants, and disease among cattle and horses, etc., are matters to which the association give strict attention and brain results. This association represents the man engaged in the industry owning nearly a million head of cattle and horses in the state—one of the most important industries with our borders.
The fourth annual convention will have a program of great interest to every man engaged in the industry. Federal, district and state officials are scheduled to appear upon the program, and discuss topics of lively interest.

CLAMPS LID ON SHEEP OF SOUTH

Text of Quarantine Order Issued By State Veterinarian Is Received By Deputies

Copies of the order issued January 25 by Dr. J. B. Adams, state veterinarian, declaring a quarantine in the southern Idaho counties on account of prevalence of sheep scabies have been received here by Dr. W. B. Decker, deputy veterinarian and others. The order is as follows:

The fact has been determined by the live stock sanitary board that sheep scabies is prevalent in certain sections of the state. Therefore, in accordance with section 146 of the revised codes of Idaho and under the authority of the state live stock sanitary board, it is hereby

Ordered, that the following counties be placed under quarantine until such order is revoked: Bear Lake, Franklin, Oneida, Cassia, Twin Falls, Gooding, Lincoln, Malheur, Elmore, Blaine, Bonneville, Bligh, Blaine, Canyon, Butte, Jefferson, Madison, Teton, Owyhee, Elmore, Custer, Lemhi and Ada.

It is further ordered, that all sheep found to be infected or exposed in any manner must be dipped according to the regulations of the bureau of animal industry and under the supervision of state or federal inspectors. The following regulations for the movement of sheep within and from the quarantined area will be effective:

The owner or caretaker of sheep located in the quarantined area shall not slip, haul, drive or in any other manner move any sheep from the quarantined area or from premises therein unless accompanied by an inspection certificate issued by a state or federal inspector covering the sheep to be moved, nor shall any transportation company accept for shipment sheep in or from the quarantined area unless a slipper first delivered by said transportation company the original permit or certificate covering said sheep.

The London Times.

Uses for Tape.

A California commentator on the project for the interchange of territory between the state of Utah and Arizona for correction of their common boundary suggests a principle in the matter of fixing state boundaries that is of equal force and value in connection with the boundaries of subdivisions of each state and particularly in respect to irrigation countries.

This commentator says "every river basin with agricultural possibilities ought to be developed as a whole under a single state supervision and not divided up between two states, or as the case in many instances in the arid west, parcelled off among several states."

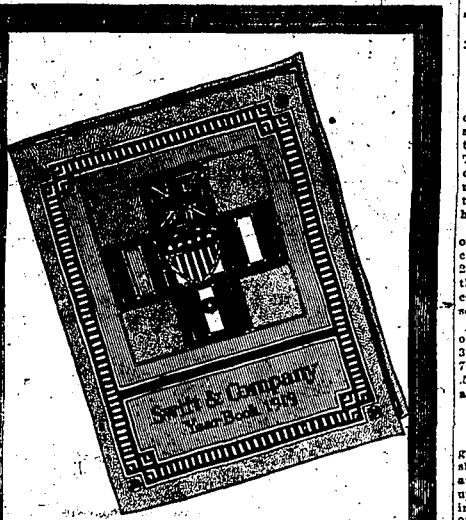
