

WILSON STRONG FOR INCLUDING LEAGUE PLANS

American Official Circles Deny Reports of French Minister that Constitution Will Not Be Part of Treaty

PARIS, March 17.—Foreign Minister Pichon's claim that the league of nations will not be included in the preliminary peace treaty was emphatically denied today in American official circles.

President Wilson and the other American commissioners are standing pat on its inclusion, it was stated. Surplus was expressed that Pichon should hold views to the contrary.

Europe's Need Great
The president, it is known, intends to make a strong fight for inclusion of the league. He feels that France and Great Britain need the league even more than America. Hence, Pichon's statement sounded and somewhat piqued the Americans.

An early peace is desired by President Wilson it was stated, and he holds that inclusion of the league in the pact is vital to America. He was said to be especially surprised at Pichon's action in view of the fact that the French, along with the others, signed the preliminary resolution in January for the league's inclusion.

To Attend Conference
The president planned to attend this afternoon's meeting of the supreme war council, and those close to him believed that a re-statement of his position might be forthcoming.

Pichon, who made his statement yesterday in his weekly conversation with correspondents, declared that although fundamental principles of the final peace are laid down in the preliminary treaty, the league of nations probably will not be included. He said that Wilson had not asked that it be included. The question is yet to be decided, he said, but inasmuch as neutral countries will be asked to submit their opinions regarding the league before final adoption of the treaty, he believed the preliminary pact would be signed before the league is completed.

The preliminary peace, according to Pichon, will not permit Germany to resume full relations with other countries. The blockade will not be lifted completely before the final treaty. He said the question of Germany and Austria has not been taken up but that the allies may offer certain advantages to that country if it remains independent, which will not be asked if it persists in uniting with Germany.

CROWDS DEMAND RELEASE OF CALIFORNIA PRISONER

About Five Thousand Protest Against Holding Mooney and Vote Strike

DETROIT, Mich., March 17.—About 5,000 men roared out their demand for the release of Thomas Mooney at a meeting here last night addressed by Max Eastman. In one voice they also endorsed a call for a general strike of workers in the United States on July 4th.

Eastman was applauded when he denounced the espionage act and deplored the jailing of Debs.

Scenes of girls and women circulated through the crowd selling red badges and were themselves decked out in the flaming color.

SENDS APPEAL TO GOVERNORS FOR THEIR AID

Every Executive and Official of the Entire Country Must Help Find Work for Unemployed

WASHINGTON, March 17.—To provide employment for returned soldiers and sailors, an emergency committee of the council of national defense was organized today.

With the unemployment again increasing, the committee was believed to be necessary because of the 80 per cent reduction of the United States employment service. It will take over the soldiers' and sailors' work of the service.

Telegraph Appeals

Appeals were telegraphed today to all governors, mayors of the principal cities and chairmen of all state councils of defense asking assistance in the work and suggesting the immediate opening of state and municipal employment offices to succeed the ones of the federal government that will be closed March 22. The board will take over the 2,000 branch agencies of the welfare association, which have been directed by the soldiers' and sailors' bureau of the employment service.

"It will be the task of the committee," said the organization's first statement, "to secure the continuance of every such bureau and establishment of them in communities where they are needed."

Soldier Employment

Colonel Arthur Woods of New York, liaison officer of the war department in charge of soldiers' employment, is chairman of the committee.

Other members are Chairman Hurley of the shipping board; assistant Secretary of the Navy Roosevelt; Nathan A. Smyth, department of labor; C. I. Christie, assistant secretary of agriculture; B. S. Cutler, commerce department; C. F. Bush, industrial board; E. J. Ayers, interior department; Elliott Goodwin, United States Chamber of Commerce; Matthew Wool, American Federation of Labor; Directors Clarkson, council of national defense and John W. Halliwell of Boston.

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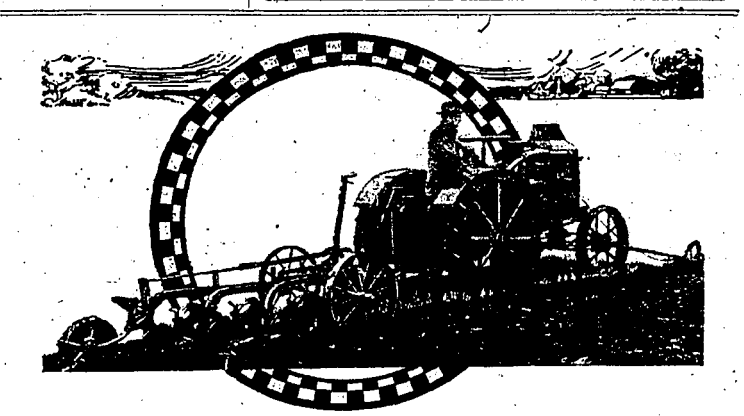

We Must Have Better Roads in Twin Falls County

We certainly must have good roads, you readily agree, but what is the best way to bring about this condition. Year after year thousands of dollars are expended in work on the roads without permanent results. Now it is proposed to build hard surfaced roads that will be of great benefit to everyone and at the same time will not cost nearly so much money for upkeep.

Help the Proposed Highway Bond Issue to Carry at the Election Tomorrow and Good Roads Will Be a Reality for Twin Falls County

You are asking, How much will this Bond Issue cost me individually? Here is your answer—The Twin Falls highway district includes in its boundaries 196,942 acres of tillable land. If the whole bond issue were charged directly to the land it would only amount to \$6.50 an acre. This would be further reduced by the property in the towns of the district which is not included in the acreage. Are not good roads worth \$6.50 an acre to any farmer on the tract? Then, taking into consideration the assessed valuation of the towns and villages in the Twin Falls highway district, which amounts to about \$5,000,000, this cost an acre will be reduced to about \$4.50. Twin Falls City, with its assessed valuation of \$4,071,132, will pay for one-fourth the cost of this road improvement. Furthermore, the Oregon Short Line Railroad has 54 1-10 miles of track in this district which will be assessed for the road improvement the same as any other property.

How Many Miles of Roads Will Be Improved?

About 240 miles of road would be improved—this would include the paving of 14 miles of State Highway; the macadamizing, by the penetration method, of 105 miles of main thoroughfares; the balance would be gravel and graded roads.

Qualifications for Voters

(22 Idaho, Page 109, Sec. 59)

"By reference to section 344 of the Revised Codes, we find that the legislature has declared, that the provisions of the statute with reference to elections, do not apply to school elections and such other elections as are not in these codes elsewhere specifically provided. This section clearly accept elections held for school districts and other elections, specifically provided for from the provisions of the statute requiring registration for election of officers, provided by the constitution and the laws of the state, and therefore, no registration is required for a bond election, under the highway district law."

The only requirement is, that a person offering to vote at such election, must be *Twenty-one years* of age, and must have resided in the state for a period of *six months*, and the county, *thirty days*. Any returned soldier, whose residence before entering the service was established here, and who is otherwise qualified as a voter.
