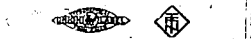

FACTS AND PROMISES

Citizens of Burley and of Rupert and of the Minidoka project generally are pretty much exercised over the probable effect of the new contract proposed by the Government doubling the charge previously collected for heating purposes.

With cheap electric power for heating available from the Government owned and operated plant, the disposition to eliminate other methods of heating has been fostered in the Minidoka country in the past.

The apparent solution through Government ownership and operation of the power question in the Minidoka county has long served as an ideal in the theories of government ownership advocates.

No blame attaches to the agents of the Government in their conclusion that the rates charged for power for heating in the past have been too low.

The sore spot comes in the recollection of promises made by Government agents to purchasers of power for this purpose, and in consideration of the investments, now likely to become use-

less, made on the strength of these promises.

On the whole the Government power agents have bettered their position by giving to the people the facts in relation to the production of power for heating, but the facts should have been made known sooner.

GREAT EFFORT UNDER WAY TO CONVICT MOODY

Trial of Former Adjutant General in District Court Promises to Be Hard-Fought Legal Battle

(Special to The News) BOISE—Binding over to the district court this week of C. S. Moody, state representative in the last legislature from Banner county, and for four years previous adjutant general of Idaho, to the district court on the charge of swearing falsely to a voucher for traveling expenses while he was in the latter office has become a conviction in his case.

Strong efforts were made to secure the pardon of O. V. Allen, former state legislator, who had been sentenced to the penitentiary for an indefinite period. There is a possibility that his term may be completed in a few days.

One of the acts of a pardon board two years ago was to pardon Fred Coleman, deputy state treasurer at the time of the recent election, who had been indicted on the charge of embezzling \$22,000.

Allen in a sense is looked upon as a political prisoner due to the fact his defalcation had a great bearing on a political contest in the county.

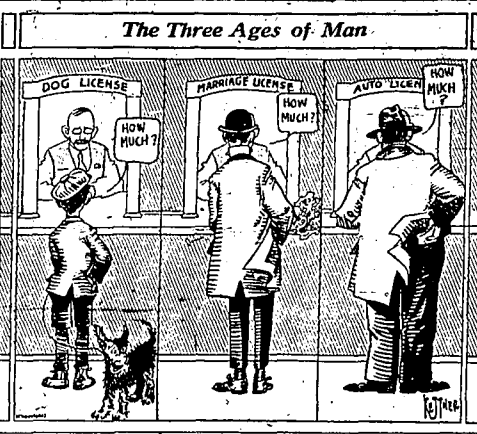
It is believed that he can put the loan over without difficulty and their plans for financial assistance for the Government will be headed while others would not be.

Carriers Checked Up The public utilities commission of this state has served notice on all carriers operating throughout the state that they expect to put into force and effect their tariffs they must file them properly and in compliance with the public utility law and the rules and regulations of the commission.

In serving notice on the carriers to cease this practice the commission sets forth that Walker D. Hines, director general of railroads, served notice in an order issued, that before rates could be changed by the carriers they must first be submitted to the commission of the state wherein the carriers operate, for approval or rejection.

It is ordered that all public utilities classified and designated as common carriers operated within the state of Idaho shall file with the public utilities commission of Idaho schedules and tariffs showing rates, tolls, rentals, charges and classifications for the collection and enforcement, or to be collected and enforced, and schedules and tariffs showing the changes in same in conformity with the provisions of the law.

Head of New State Department of Agriculture Confers With Twin Falls Agriculturists in Get-Together Session

What is good for the farmer and producer is always good for everybody. We have proposed the state and nation join in protecting and assisting both producer and consumer.

An important conference was held yesterday afternoon between Hon. Miles Cannon, the newly appointed head of the newly made state department of agriculture, and representatives of farm interests.

Names Farmers' Troubles In beginning his practical talk Mr. Cannon set out the handicaps under which the Idaho producer has been laboring.

Purpose of New Law The object and purpose of the new law, he explained, was that, in conjunction with the federal authorities, a system of home inspection and grading would be established.

Method of Work As the first step in securing such a law was appealing to local commissions like those before him.

Work Starts at Once The commission named, all of whom were present but one, began their work of investigation and reply at once.

28. Give your views as to the best means in detail of inspecting hay and potatoes.

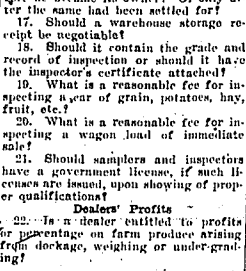
