

TRAINMEN GET BIG ADVANCES IN WAGE SCALE

Big Four Brotherhood of Rail Employees Is Given Raise in Salaries Dating Since January First of This Year

(City Associated Press) WASHINGTON—Wage advances aggregating \$65,000,000 were ordered today by Director General Hines for four hundred thousand railroad engineers, firemen, trainmen and conductors in both passenger and freight service—members of the big four railway brotherhoods—retroactive since Jan. 1, 1919. The brotherhood demands for time and a half pay for overtime was granted only for men engaged in yard service and for the others this question was referred to the railroad administration's board of adjustment Number 1, already created for consideration of disputes relating to trainmen and engineers.

Restore Old Schedule
The increases were arranged according to a contemplated schedule, one of the aims of which was to restore the wage relationship existing before the railroad's increase in wages last year. The average advance in pay per man per year will be about \$160.

This action practically completed the war cycle of wage increases granted railroad men since the government took over management of the roads fifteen months ago. Only a few minor requests for more pay remain to be acted upon.

Raises Total Pay Roll
Including today's order the aggregate pay increases allowed by the railroad administration to the two million railroad employees is at the rate of \$822,311,000 a year, more than \$400 average per man. Thus the total payroll of America's railroads is raised nearly to three billion dollars a year from the basis of approximately two billion dollars on January 1, 1918, when the roads passed into the government's hands.

Vast Total
The sixty-five million dollars added to the payrolls of members of the "big four" brotherhoods brings the total granted this class of employees in the last three years to approximately \$275,000,000, or approximately \$690 per man. This takes into consideration the \$140,000,000 estimated as the brotherhood's share of the general wage increase last year and seventy million dollars estimated as the fruit for these men from the Adamson act which established a basic eight-hour day but did not put into effect the brotherhoods' plea for time and a half for overtime.

Back pay for work since January 1st will be given the brotherhood men as well as railway paymasters can work out the amount due. This may take a month or even more to complete.

First Advance
In the first general wage advance made by the railroad administration, following the recommendations of the railroad wage commission, approximately four hundred million dollars a year was distributed among the railroad employees. About \$140,000,000 of this went to trainmen and engineers and about \$260,000,000 to other employees. On supplemental orders about \$160,000,000 was added to payrolls of the shopmen, about the same to maintenance of way men and clerks and about \$45,000,000 to telegraphers and station agents. Railway accountants calculated that 1918 and 1917, the years immediately preceding government control, the railroad companies increased wages \$300,000,000. With the \$322,000,000 added by the railroad administration, the aggregate advance of railroad men's wages in three years is set at approximately \$1,172,000,000, or about \$390 per man. The railroad payroll in 1917 was calculated at \$1,750,000,000, in 1918 at \$2,538,000,000 and this year at \$2,822,000,000.

Other Employees
Comparatively small increases in pay are expected soon for dining car and sleeping car employees. The actual payment under increased wage orders last year was \$338,000,000, according to Mr. Hines' calculations. Railroad companies estimate the wage increase at nearly \$100,000,000 more than the railroad administration.

Effect of Raise
Discussing the effect of wages on operating costs this year Mr. Hines said in making public the order that "through the elimination of overtime which will be unnecessary under peace conditions and through ability to gain experienced employees who were lost during the war, the total increase in wages would be substantially less on the same volume of business than the average based on the calendar year 1918 would indicate and of course the increase will be less if the volume of business is less."

SOLDIER NAMES SHOW TENDENCY FOR GREATNESS

Namesakes of Famous Men Vie With Each Other for Supremacy in Lists of American Expeditionary Forces

(By Associated Press) PARIS (Correspondence of the Associated Press).—The first name on the alphabetical list of the American expeditionary force is Private Asa and the last is Corporal Zepfenhaft. Between the two names are more than 5,000 others.

George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, General Ulysses S. Grant, Robert E. Lee, Woodrow Wilson, several Castes and a few Bismarcks adorn the ranks with intermittent frequency.

Excluding the commander-in-chief of the army and navy, there is but one Woodrow Wilson. He is a private, and according to Stars and Stripes has just been placed in the working personnel of base hospital No. 27, which was organized in Pittsburgh.

There is an abundance of the names of great men including 74 George Washingtons. The name of the first president is surpassed by 79 Robert E. Lees, who holds the record for bearers of the name of great men. There are but two Abraham Lincolns and seven Grants; twice Caesars and four Bismarcks.

Among the "common people" there are about 51,000 Smiths. True to their traditional predominance of the directories of most cities, they dominate the American army. There are 39,000 Johnsons, 25,500 Joneses and a like number of Greens. Sullivan's aggregate 10,500, Browns 9000 and Cohens 4500.

ADVISES CARE IN MATTER OF LEASING LAND

Secretary Lansing Says Japanese Question Is Delicate Subject and Needs Wise and Careful Handling.

(By Associated Press) SACRAMENTO, Calif.—Introduction of an amendment to the California legislature would be "extremely unfortunate at this time," said Robert Lansing, secretary of state, in a cablegram to the senate received today.

The contents of the cablegram have not been made known but it was announced the cablegram would be read today when Senator Imbrie called up the rules report flaying him permission to introduce a bill prohibiting Japanese leasing agricultural land in California, for further consideration.

"Paris, France, April 8, 1919. To Hon. Joseph A. Beck, Secretary of Senate of California, Sacramento, Cal. Your considerate cablegram in relation to the proposed land legislation in the state of California and in regard to the landing of so-called picture brides has been received. I wish to express to you on behalf of the president and myself our appreciation for your thoughtful and wise bills which will be introduced in the state senate; in view of the present situation in international affairs here in Paris it would be particularly unfortunate to have these bills introduced or passed at the present time.

"There are other problems which would make such a step embarrassing. I sincerely hope you will inform the senate of the contents of this cablegram and the earnest plea on the part of the president that such legislation as proposed could be introduced or considered at this time. Expressing my thanks to you for this opportunity to consider the advisability of legislation affecting our foreign relations, I am with respect, Yours very truly, ROBERT LANSING."

RED CROSS AIDS WAR SUFFERERS

Mercy Organization Sends Tons of Food and Clothing to Stricken People

(By Associated Press) SALONKI (Correspondence of The Associated Press).—To meet the great need of clothing throughout the Balkan states, the American Red Cross commission to the Balkans is sending to Serbia, Rumania, Montenegro, and Albania millions of yards of cloth, thousands of sewing machines, large quantities of thread, needles and buttons and hundreds of tons of old clothing. These things will be apportioned among the countries according to the extent of destitution. The commission is also shipping large amounts of food to various points in the Balkans which have suffered from the German occupation.

"It will be only because we lack the transportation facilities to reach the remotest or interior sections. We have gathered up millions of pieces of clothing and thousands of tons of food from every nook and corner of Europe and will rush them to these sections of the Balkan states which are most in need. We have taken over the surplus stock of relief supplies held by the American Red Cross commission in Italy. We have also had diverted to our use, for distribution in the Balkan states, large quantities of material intended for use in France and other countries during the war. One of the principal items is condensed milk, of which we are shipping more than three million cans. This doubtless will save thousands of starving children."

Scots Want Queen's Farewell Message

Museum of Edinburgh Is in Possession of Last Letter of Beheaded Ruler

(By Associated Press) LONDON.—The national art collection fund has loaned to the Royal Scottish museum in Edinburgh, pending its final disposition, the last letter of Mary, Queen of Scots, addressed to her brother-in-law, Henry III, of France, and written the night before her execution. This letter was acquired from the Morrison collection by a number of persons for presentation to the Scottish people. It is in a perfect state of preservation, and a beautiful specimen of calligraphy.

In the letter, Queen Mary told King Henry that having passed nearly 20 years in the captivity of Queen Elizabeth who had at last been condemned to death and had been ordered to be executed as a criminal at 8 o'clock the following morning, she commended her son to Henry's care. She signed the letter "at two hours after midnight. 'Your most loving and very good sister.'"

FRENCH TAKE PALACE

(By Associated Press) STRASBURG, France.—Former Emperor William's chateau at Hloh-Koenigsburg in Alsace has been taken over by the French authorities. It is reported that the city of Schlettstadt was forced to give up this medieval castle to William II who restored it at a cost of \$1,750,000 and then made the people of Alsace-Lorraine foot the bill.

OVERRULES PLEA OF COMMISSION

Court Sets Aside Complaints of Colorado Public Utilities Company on Unjust Rates

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON.—All specifications except those affecting a few class rates cited in a complaint of the Colorado public utilities commission against the Atchison Topeka and Santa Fe and other railroads were overruled today by a decision of the interstate commerce commission. The Utah Traffic bureau attacked virtually all class and commodity rates between Colorado and points to the west, south and east and attracted unusual interest because of interference by several other complainants, including the New Mexico commission, the Utah Traffic bureau and various civic organizations.

CROWDS STAGE DEMONSTRATION

Spartacans Start Parade Which Is Quickly Broken Up by Loyal Citizens

(By Associated Press) ROME.—A group of men styled Spartacans, carrying a red flag, attempted a demonstration here today, but the people attacked the crowd and dispersed it. Several of the Spartacans were hurt and others arrested. There ensued an enthusiastic demonstration in honor of the army and the victory of the allies. Many cries were heard of "Long live the king," "We live our Italian Emperor!"

A Rome dispatch on April 9 said the socialists there had decided upon a general strike for 24 hours on Thursday in memory of Dr. Karl Liebknecht and Rosa Luxemburg, killed during the winter demonstrations in Berlin, and also in honor of the birthday of Nikolai Lenin, the Russian Bolshevik premier. It was stated that the government had forbidden meetings by both the anti-war and pro-war socialists, fearing grave clashes would result.

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SCHOOL EXTENSION.

The carrying into execution of the building plans of the trustees of the Twin Falls Independent School District, beginning with popular approval of the \$100,000 bond issue at the election on Saturday next, will solve three important problems in the local educational sphere and place the Twin Falls district in the van of national educational progress.

It will, in the first place, provide for a permanent broadening and expansion of the high school vocational training courses, placing the school in a position where it may best apply and make use of the lessons which the war has taught the educational world.

It will provide a richer curriculum for the seventh and eighth grades, which under this plan will be incorporated with the first year high school class in the Junior high school, affording to the Junior high school, all of the advantages of increased facilities for vocational training, including household economics and manual training, besides giving to it the benefits of the use of the high school library, auditorium and gymnasium and participation on a broader scale in student activities.

And lastly, it will relieve congestion existing now in the Twin Falls school system to a point where the capacity has been reached and at the Hinkel and Lincoln schools where "shacks are being used to accommodate the pupils.

The chief importance of the proposed school expansion plan inheres in its provision for making the schools of wider usefulness to pupils of adolescent age and affording a plan of education which will better equip its graduates to meet with and solve the problems of everyday life.

These are the things which a school system is primarily expected to do.

DEBS.

Undoubtedly the utterances of Eugene V. Debs during the closing months of the war constituted a distinct obstacle in the path of the government in

the work of successfully prosecuting the war program of America. Debs openly advised men of military age to resist the draft. He held up the proposition of Bolshevism in Russia as the best example of pure democracy which the world had ever seen, at a time when the streets of Petrograd ran red with the blood of innocent men, women and children. Debs set himself up in opposition to the government at a time when the government needed every ounce of support of which the American people were capable. He chose to embarrass rather than assist America in the war. His influence was on the side of America's enemies instead of America. A few more of him and it might be that the war would have had an entirely different ending to that which actually came.

Of course there are many men and women who will applaud the course of Debs. But to the clean minded, straight thinking every day citizen, the man who is prepared to accept the proposition that the foundations of every government rest largely on the confidence of the body politic in the man in charge of the working out of the country's destiny in times of stress, Debs and his program simply won't do.

And yet there is an interesting contrast to be found in the record and its results in the case of Debs and the same as applied to slackers, pro-Germans, avowed alien enemies and the host of other small fry filed away in various federal and military prisons for cause during the period of the war.

Debs has been advised by the courts that his only show to escape a long prison sentence is by an appeal for pardon to the President. Hundreds of miserable little plotters, who deliberately went out of their way to do on a small scale the thing which Debs did on a large, are now being released from custody and actually paid in cash at army rates, for the time they have spent in prison.

If the degree of Debs' guilt is sufficient to warrant a prison term of years, so is that of the others. If the others are to be given private's pay for the time spent in prison Debs should receive that of a Brigadier General—and on top of that should go an iron cross with bells on it.

But there is such a thing as consistency.

Strongest Institution of City Is Given Test by Customers Last Night

CHICAGO—Investigation of rumors which caused a run on the Garfield Park State Savings bank was started today. The run began about closing time yesterday and as soon as officials of the bank realized the situation they arranged to keep open until all claimants were satisfied. When the doors were closed last night 500 accounts had been closed and \$200,000 withdrawn. The bank is considered one of the strongest of the city's outlying institutions.



SOCIALIZATION OF SOVIETS IS PLAYING HAVOC

Palaces Are Turned Into Cooks' Club Rooms and Guests Put Out of Hotels to Make Room for Guards of Red Army

SHOW DECIDED RESPECT FOR AMERICAN MISSION

Once Wealthy Women Are Now Forced to Do Menial Work for Their Existence While Laborers Enjoy Prosperity

BUDAPEST.—The elections in Hungary for the creation of soviet councils passed off without reported incidents, soviet organizations being formed in the country districts by means of this balloting. The whole process was carried out under the coercion of the Red army, with the majority of the voters in many places not appearing to know why they were voting.

No Lasting Success
Notwithstanding the desperate earnestness of the soviet outsiders now in Hungary are still inclined to take the economic view of the experiment which they feel will not develop into a lasting success, though whether conditions will become worse before they grow better, is a debatable question.

The work of organizing the country is being feverishly continued, the trial feature of the plan is to apply the trust idea to all industries, putting each group of factories—textiles, glass ware, hardware, etc.—under one expert who is made responsible for its operations.

Socialize Clubs
All clubs and fashionable exclusive resorts have been socialized, including the Park club. The Jockey club has been converted into a laborers' home and the splendid race course, which cost a year's time and five million dollars to make, is being plowed up for potatoes.

Reduced to Want
There is an organization of women's red guard functions, now but its 100 members are occupying themselves for the most part with propaganda work. Many of the aristocratic women of the city have been reduced to want. Baroness Schoesberger, once having property worth a million dollars or more, now is playing a harp in a cheap restaurant for her food.

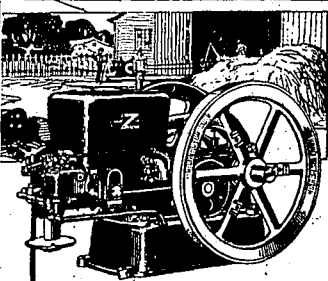
All the palaces have been converted into resorts for working men's social and clubs. From the home of Count Jules Andrássy has been removed a youthful portrait of Raphael, an art work of great value. Madame Margaret Karolyi, the widow of Stephen Karolyi, the living in the room of her palace, the remainder is occupied by a society of photographers.

Count Andrew Tschomi lives in two rooms of his palace with a chef de hotel cooks occupying the rest of his home. Red guards are living in Archduke Joseph's palace, opposite the royal castle, while a musicians' club occupies the palace of Count Nemes.

A leading fashionable hotel was originally designated by the Red guards as a barracks and city gates were notified to quit within a few hours. When Bela Kun, the communist leader, was informed of what was going on, he remarked irascibly from the bed, "What do I care?" "But the American mission is still living there," his informant explained.

On hearing this, Bela Kun sprang to a telephone and told the Red guard to find quarters elsewhere. The attempted exit of the white class is continuing and there is a flourishing trade in foreign passports, American passports are bringing as high as \$100, while there are incidents of bold efforts to steal such passports, some of the attempts even being upon American officers and couriers.

An Anglo-American train will leave Saturday for West Hungary by way of Vienna. The Americans on the train are to be mostly women, the wives of Hungarians, who, by courtesy of the Hungarians, are permitted to class themselves as aliens. Difficulties are arising, however, over the amount of money they will be permitted to take with them as they will have to depend on the banks for their funds and the limit permitted to be taken from these institutions is ordinarily only \$100 monthly.

LONDON.—With the signing of the armistice it was expected that building operations in London, suspended by the war, would be quickly resumed. But so far there are no signs of a renewal of work on a dozen or more huge unfinished structures in various parts of the city.

SHORTHORN CATTLE FOR DESTITUTE OF EUROPE

Handsome Gifts of Livestock From British Farmers to French and Belgian

(By Associated Press)
LONDON.—Six hundred Shorthorn cattle of the very best breed have been presented by the Royal Agricultural Society of Great Britain to the people of Belgium, and 300 of them have already reached farms in the vicinity of Bruges. The remainder will follow in a few weeks.

Labor unrest is the cause assigned by a big contractor for this state of affairs. "If it were not for the labor unrest," he said, "I believe we should be so busy that we could employ the services of every man available. The unrest is not confined to the building world. Manufacturers, banks, insurance companies and other large corporations which have been thinking of rebuilding are for the present holding their hands."

The cattle, which are valued at \$300,000, will be supplemented in the near future with additional gifts, after which more cattle are to be sent to Serbia and France to take the places of the livestock killed or carried away by the German invaders. Money for the gifts is being collected in all the English cattle raising countries, and leaders of the movement expect the fund to reach \$1,250,000 within the next few months.

RAILROAD EARNINGS

WASHINGTON.—Railroad net earnings for February reported officially today by the interstate commerce commission were \$106,000,000 with revenues at \$351,040,000 and expenses at \$245,000,000, and net revenue of \$207,040,000. These figures are only slightly different from the unofficial report made available last week.

POSSESSOR OF RUBBISH HEAP HELD TO BLAME

W. C. Golden Pays Fine and Stands Responsibility for Accidental Injury in Runaway to Miss DesRuisseaux

Responsibility for a runaway accident Thursday morning near the South Park Grocery store which resulted in painful injuries being sustained by Miss E. S. DesRuisseaux, aged 33, sister of J. L. DesRuisseaux, residing three miles west of Twin Falls, has been laid at the door of W. C. Golden, owner of a pile of rubbish and junk at the roadside which frightened a team of colts driven by a man named Crockett, so that they got beyond control and plunged into the buggy ahead in which Miss DesRuisseaux was driving, one of the animals striking her from the rear and breaking her shoulder blade and inflicting other injuries.

Injuries Not Serious.
Miss DesRuisseaux was taken to the Boyd hospital where her injuries were attended, and where she is resting easily today. Determination as to the extent of her injuries has not been reached, but it is believed that while painful, they are not serious.

Golden was arrested Thursday afternoon by Chief of Police William Taylor and held before City Clerk W. A. Minnick, acting police judge. After the circumstances had been related he was asked if he had any reason why judgment compelling him to pay a fine in the sum of \$25 and assumption of liability of the expense incident to treatment Miss DesRuisseaux' injuries should not be passed upon him. He stated that he had not anticipated the possible effect of the junk heap at the roadside in starting a runaway, but that he would endeavor to raise the money. He agreed also to obey the magistrate's injunction to remove the rubbish heap within two hours time.

Moving Was Delayed.

Golden, who is a bachelor, has lived for some months in a tent house on the P. B. Johnston farm near which place he had accumulated the heap of junk. He said that he had been directed by the owner of the property to remove his tent house and other possessions, but that he had been unable to do so in a week's time. He said that he was unable to find any other means of livelihood by work at the carpenter's trade. He was absent when the accident occurred.

The driver of the runaway colts evidenced grave concern over the accident, taking Miss DesRuisseaux to the hospital and offering every possible assistance. Miss DesRuisseaux makes her home with her brother, and was driving alone to Twin Falls when the accident occurred.
