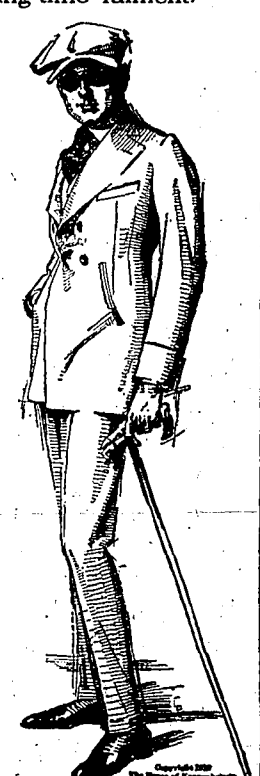

CHINESE YOUNG MEN ARE SUCCESSFUL PUBLISHERS

(By Associated Press)

SAN FRANCISCO—Four Chinese schoolboys, the oldest 17 years and the youngest 15, are the publishers of the Chinese Youths' Magazine, which has a circulation of 2,000 copies which are read, not only in all sections of the United States, but also in South and Central America and China.

It was in November, 1917, that Lum Jing Chwee Chee, then 14 years old, and James Gar Bein, aged 15, decided that fiction and good verse was a long felt want which they should supply their countrymen in America. Acting on the decision they issued in December, an eight-page edition which was produced on a mimeograph. This happened in Marianna, Arkansas, and the magazine was an instant success.

Since then the two editors have moved to San Francisco. The Chinese Youths' Magazine now has forty-eight pages, plenty of advertising and an augmented staff. The new members of the staff are Raymond Jung, 13 years old, circulation manager; Samuel Ng, 13 years old, delivery chief, and Low Gong, 17 years old, mail superintendent.

The magazine now boasts a printed cover, for a hand press and a stitchee have reinforced the mimeograph. Editor Lum has announced that by July he expects to have a regular press and plenty of type of all sizes. The latter has been ordered from China—for the Chinese Youths' Magazine is printed in Chinese.

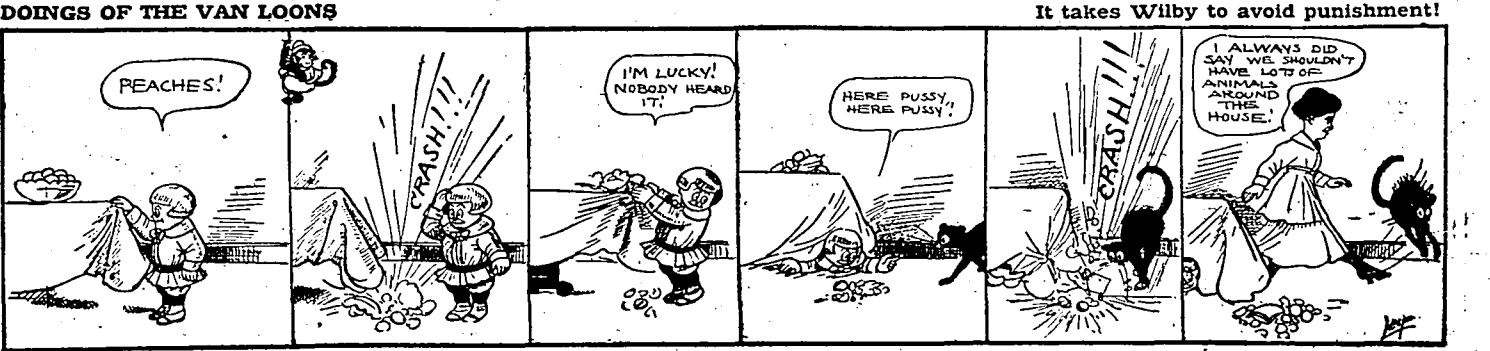

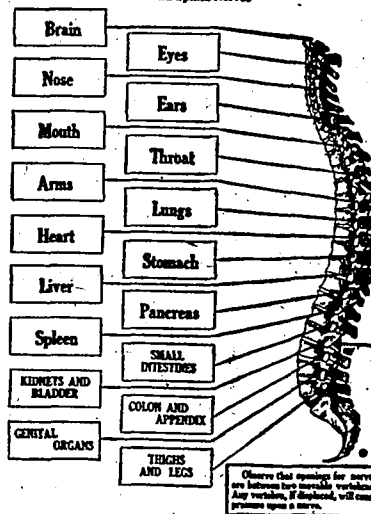

ENTHUSIASM IS BOUNDLESS AT EVERY STATION

Victory Loan Special, Due Here Tonight Draws Enormous Crowds—Relics Attract From Far and Near

HILL CITY—Immense crowds greeted the Victory special touring Idaho with relics from the battlefields of Europe at every stop today. Ketchum, the first town on the day's itinerary turned out a big crowd at 7 o'clock this morning and the same intense and heartfelt interest in the trophies drew thousands from every community in which the train stopped. Without exception the towns visited pledged unanimous support of the Victory Loan in the interest of which the train is being sent over the state.

State Chairman Monte B. Gwin, who is with the train, received a wire at Richfield from Captain Albert H. Conner, former speaker of the Idaho legislature and who was badly injured in action overseas, stating that he would leave Washington, D. C., immediately and would join the trophy special at Malian April 20, and tour the northern part of the state with it. Captain Conner volunteered his services some time ago for the Victory train but duties in Washington prevented him participating until now. Governor D. W. Davis delivered ad-

resses in behalf of the Victory Loan at every stop the train made today. The people invariably responded unanimously when he asked them to pledge their subscriptions on the first day of the drive and put Idaho's quota of the bond issue across on that day, giving the state the honor of being one of the first over the top.

Haley was out in mass formation when the train stopped there. In addition to the talks made by the regular train speakers Major Fred R. Reed spoke briefly and effectively to the Haley audience. One of the most beautiful and affecting demonstrations on the entire trip of the special so far was at Bellevue where the school children of the town marched in line to the train, the procession headed by the Bellevue band which played patriotic airs during the stay of the train in that city.

Governor Addresses Children

In addition to his main address to the throng of adults that gathered at the train at Bellevue Governor Davis spoke directly to the children for a few minutes, urging the standards of American patriotism as the foundation on which to build their life characters. State Chairman Gwin personally appeals to the people at every town visited to get behind their county Victory Loan chairman and not wait for solicitation but make up their minds on the amount of bonds they can each buy, go to the designated place of purchase and make their subscriptions at the earliest moment possible the morning of the 21st when the drive starts. Almost without exception the people pledged to do this. Gannett had the special from 11:00 to 11:45 a. m., and many had driven miles from the surrounding country to give themselves and their children a close-up view of the gigantic German and French cannon and other trophies.

Great Crowds on Hand
Picabo, Richfield, Hill City and

Fairfield put on enthusiastic demonstrations when the trophy train pulled in and great crowds gathered at the stations. In each of these cities there isn't an idle moment from the time the gang planks are dropped to let the people board the baggage car and file past the relics carried on the train until the special leaves. Soldiers and sailors in uniform explain the trophies, give brief histories of their capture or action as the case may be and supply answers for any questions that may be asked. Governor Davis, Chairman Gwin, Captain Edgar T. Hawley, Lieutenants Boon, Sergeants Lundy Fay and Story and Private Bert Bates, Train Auditor and "cooche" expert, were the speakers today.

Wants Service Men

Sergeant Mark Shields, who is accompanying the train and working with service men of all branches in organizing veterans of the world war asks particularly that soldiers, sailors and marines in the towns visited be at the train to meet the train when it visits their towns. The trophy special will show at Wendell, Jerome, Hazelton, Burley, Murtough, Kimberly, Buhl, Elgin and Twin Falls Tuesday. So far southern Idaho has turned out record crowds at all towns visited and shown the deepest interest in the special message the trophy train brings to them. That message summed up by one of the speakers today is tersely this: "Put the Victory Loan over the first-day-of-the-drive."
