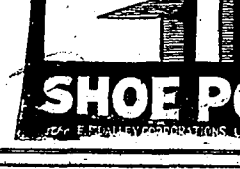

THE MARCH OF PROGRESS

The March of the Twin Falls people these pleasant days—Sundays especially, is the site of the bridge across Snake river which is now under construction and known as the Hansen bridge.

This bridge is located in section 12, township 10, range 18. It is just two and one-fourth miles north along an extension of the main street of the village of Hansen, and nine miles east on Addison avenue from Main street in Twin Falls, with the one-fourth mile north from the section line in addition.

Modern bridge structures have become high types of architecture, but none of them appeal to the imagination like those of the cable-suspension construction—especially when they swing high above the water level.

As the bridge is itself of no small or mean dimensions or cost, its floor already noted as 370 feet above the waters of the Snake, is 638 feet in unbroken length, 608 feet being between cable towers, and 30 feet a shore extension on the north side.

Earl Deuman, Nevada, Seriously Hurt in Accident at Ranch, Undergoes Successful Operation

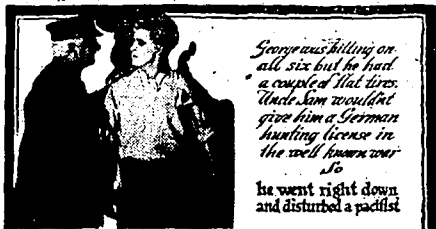

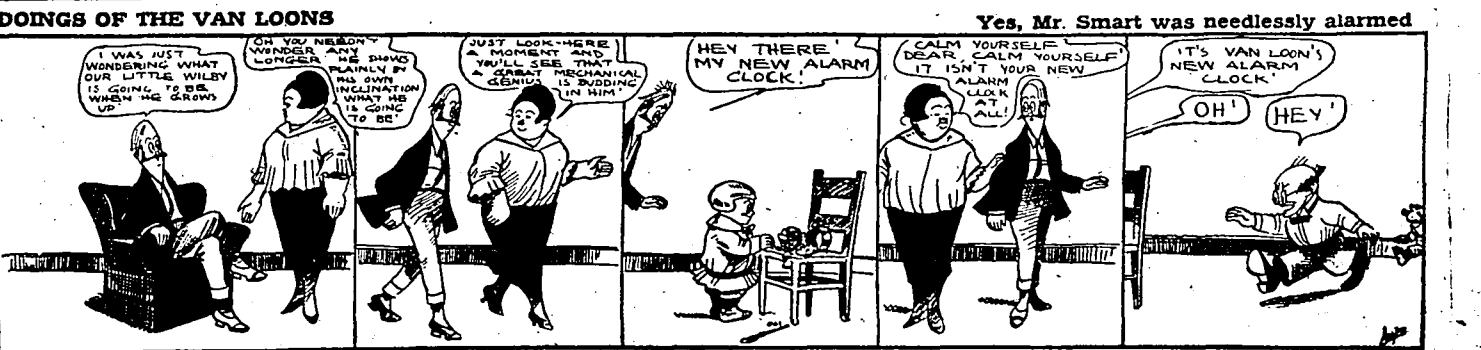
