THE GRAND JURY.

The petition for the convening of a special grand jury in Twin Falls county to investigate and punish alleged violators of the prohibition laws and officials who are said to have failed in the performance of their official duties, besides whatever else may come before such grand jury is deserving of but short shift at the hands of the district court.

In the first place, the petitioners do not represent, it may be safely estimated, one per cent of the population of Twin Falls county; and in the second place, it is difficult to discern just how the grand jury probe could ameliorate condition if they exist here as they are depicted in the text of the petition and in the minds of the petitioners.

It cannot be argued, even in view of the relatively small number of signers of the petition, that abundant opportunity was not given every person who wished to do so to sign the petition, because, while it was circulated only on one Sunday in some of the local churches and personally presented to only a few of the intimates of the authors of the petition, there appeared in several issues of a local newspaper coupons to be signed and submitted by persons in sympathy with the proposed investigation. It is perhaps worthy of note that out of the three hundred odd signatures to the petition less than a dozen were made on these coupons.

In the consideration of any demand for the convening of a grand jury, entailing no small expense, it is desirable that such demand should represent no small proportion of the residents of the county—and of the taxpayers.

As to whether or not any benefit could come from the proposed investigation there is room for skepticism. James A. Crom, principle author of the petition, made the statement recently that he hoped, as a result of the proposed investigation that several places where intoxicants were believed to be sold would be jnt out of business, that certain open gambling games would be closed and that members of a jury in the last term here of district court might be called to account for what appeared to be a violation of their oaths as jurors manifested in their verdict in the trial of certain cases.

It is apparent that neither Mr. Crom nor any other citizen is barred from instituting prosecutions through the regular and ordinary official channels against any person or institution whom he knows or has reason to believe is guilty of violation of any law, and neither Mr. Crom nor any other citizen has any justification for questioning the integrity or the efficiency of the regularly constituted officials whose duty it is to administer the law in the carrying out of such prosecution.

There is little ground for the argument that the extraordinary powers with which the grand jury is vested would make it more effective than prosecuting lawlessness than a prosecution ordinarily instituted and carried through. In the history of the county there has been held only one inquisition, under the provision of the prohibition law giving to the prosecuting attorney the power to summon any and all witnesses in respect to possible violation of the liquor law. That was of so recent date that its details are fresh in the popular memory, and there is no disposition to question that the in-

quisition in this case was as effective as the investigation of a grand jury could possibly have been.

In view of the fact that the first day of July next will witness what is bound to be practically the abolition of the liquor industry in the United States, complaints in general over an occasional present violation of the prohibition law fall, even in Twin Falls county where the offense is so exceptional as to attract a generous measure of attention and so thoroughly under the ban of public disapproval that a charge of bootlegging is one of the most dangerous which a defendant in a criminal case can face.

Taken by and large from the standpoint of the average citizen and taxpayer, the grand jury question perhaps can best be solved by assessment of the cost of such investigation against the individual signers of the petition. Nor is this suggestion entirely outrageous in view of the remembered fact that previous investigations with a similar purpose have been launched, and financed by individuals in Twin Falls. The date of the filing of the petition is unfortunate. It must always give rise to the question whether or not, in the event the author of the movement had been elected mayor in place of W. H. Eldridge, it would ever have been filed at all.

JAPANESE SAY REPORTS WERE EXAGGERATED

Charges of Cruel Treatment of Koreans Denied Officially, But Casualty List Admittedly Large

WASHINGTON—An official statement by the Japanese embassy today, characterizing as exaggerated current reports of cruel measures employed by the Japanese authorities in suppressing disturbances in the provinces, says one person was killed and six wounded in outbreaks at Seoul, and that the total number of casualties in the provinces has been 281 killed and 725 wounded.

The embassy's statement follows: current reports about the cruelty of the measures employed by the Japanese authorities in suppressing disturbances in the provinces is more than borne out by an official dispatch reaching the Japanese embassy today.

Casualties Over Thousand—Only one person was killed and six wounded in Seoul from the start of the disturbance until very recently. The number of casualties in the provinces is, all told, 331 killed and 725 wounded. That is an amount of the fact that the riots in the provinces were more truculent and extravagant than those in the capital. In many instances the police and garrisons were forced to resort to arms to prevent the destruction of and incendiary attacks upon the offices and residences of provincial officials, schools, postoffices and means of communication.

SEPARATE PEACE IS ASKED BY ITALY

(Continued from page one) representatives to remain. There was no indication, however, of the success of this effort.

It was announced at Italian headquarters that Premier Orlando and General Amadori Diaz of the Italian delegation would leave Paris this afternoon, Baron Sonnino, the foreign minister and the others following tomorrow.

Premier Clemenceau, Premier Lloyd George and President Wilson met at the usual hour this forenoon but no outline of the topics under discussion was made public although the China-Japanese question, reparations and possibly the Italian crisis may have been considered.

The French foreign office today confirmed the report that Premier Orlando's letter of yesterday to Premier Clemenceau and Lloyd George instead of announcing a complete rupture, asked whether in view of the circumstances the two premiers considered further Italian participation in the conference be useful.

Complaint Withdrawn—A complaint in an action entitled Luena A. Malone against Leelle F. Malone filed Wednesday in the district court here, was immediately withdrawn by the attorney for the plaintiff.

COMPANY ELECTS NEW BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Stockholders of Railroad Concern Meet to Choose Members to Position

(By Associated Press) TOPEKA — At the annual stockholders meeting of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad company held here today, four directors—Edward P. Ripley, Chicago; Charles Steele, New York; Henry Pritchett, New York, and Howell Jones, Topeka—were re-elected. More than 2,000,000 shares of stock were represented, almost entirely by proxies brought to the meeting by W. H. Diehl, of New York. Treasurer Copeland stated that the 3,400,000 shares of the company are owned by more than 50,000 persons.

TRADE MEETING ADOPTS POLICY FOR BUSINESS

Legislative Program to Be Presented Includes Merchant Marine, Lower Cost of Manufacturing and Freight Rates

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO.—A national policy for the guidance of business in extending the country's export and import trade together with a legislative program for presentation to congress will be adopted by the sixth national trade convention which began a three day session here this morning under the auspices of the national foreign trade council. The general subject discussed by the speakers was how best to develop foreign trade essential to the success of American industry.

Makes Recommendations Included in the committee's report on a national business policy and legislative program will be recommendations for a merchant marine, lower cost of manufacture, revision of freight and shipping rates on scientific principles so as to meet the competition of other countries and the creation of a demand in this country for foreign securities.

Has No Preparation

"Probably no one of the great powers which participated in the war, has made less preparation than ourselves for the solution of the problems of peace," said Chairman Johnson. "As with open eyes we drifted into war unprepared so peace would come, and perhaps suddenly, we have also failed to make any preparation therefor. Meanwhile, those with whom we must compete for trade have carefully studied their problems and are ready with policies intended to solve them."
