

AUSTRIANS TO GET TERMS OF PEACE MONDAY

Indemnity Calls for Five Billion Marks in Gold; Art Treasures Expected to Go Back to the Italians.

PARIS, (AP)—The exchange of credentials between the Austrian peace delegation and the representatives of allied and associated powers will take place Monday next. The function is set for 3:30 o'clock p. m.

Ask Goodly Sum.

PARIS, (AP)—The indemnity clause of the Austrian peace treaty provides for a payment of one-twentieth as large as that demanded from Germany. The sum asked for is 5,000,000,000 gold marks, without bond.

Art to Be Returned.

It has been requested by the Italians that the Austrian treaty provides for the return to Rome of the many priceless art treasures taken by Austria as booty in previous wars.

CHRISTIAN SABBATH IS STRONGLY URGED

Presbyterians Denounce Sunday Games and Newspapers.

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP)—Reports of the committee on various church activities, including recommendations striking at Sunday sports and amusements, and routine business marked the third day's session of the 111st general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America today.

Again Legalized Games

Unqualified condemnation of "desecration of the Sabbath" through the legalization of Sunday baseball and motion pictures was contained in the report of the special committee on Sabbath observance, which recommended that a determined campaign be carried on to bring about a "Christian Sabbath."

Against Sunday Papers

The report recorded emphatic disapproval of the Sunday newspaper, endorsed the Saturday half holiday and urged colleges to eliminate recitations on Monday mornings to relieve students of the necessity of Sunday study.

FAST SHIPS ON PACIFIC OCEAN

Japanese Will Start Line of Modern Vessels from Tokio to America.

TOKIO, (Correspondence of the Associated Press).—The construction of three fast passenger steamers to be placed on the American run has been decided upon by the Nippon Yusen Kaisha. The ships will have a speed of 20 knots and a gross tonnage of 20,000. The first of the boats will probably be built in England, the remaining two later in Japan.

Turn to America.

During the war the European market was regarded as the most important by Japanese shippers, but the management of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha is of the opinion that the American service will assume great importance hereafter and this is the reason for the proposed construction of three new passenger boats.

Arctic Ship Sold by Commerce Dept

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The famous arctic ship Roosevelt soon will be sold for commercial purposes by the department of commerce. The vessel recently was sent for repairs to the Bremerton navy yard on Puget Sound, where it was discovered that the alternate freezing and thawing in northern latitudes had sapied the huge oak timbers of their strength and that repairs would cost more than the original price of the ship.

New Type

Until congress authorizes a new especially constructed vessel, the department will use a wooden steamer supplied by the shipping board, but this craft will not be capable of making the late voyages when the ice sets in, which were undertaken by the Roosevelt.

ITALY YIELDS ISLAND CLAIM

Controversy with Greece Settled Amicably; Debate; Continues; Outlook Better.

PARIS, (AP)—Italy has relinquished her claims to the Dodecanese islands, off the Asia Minor coast, in favor of Greece. This ends one of the most acute controversies before the peace conference.

Adriatic Question Discussed

Premier Orlando, Count Marchi di Colere, Italian ambassador to the United States, and Col. E. M. House of the American peace mission, continued today their conferences looking toward a settlement of the Adriatic question. It was said that the outlook was hopeful but it was stated in official circles that over-optimism at present should be discouraged.

PARIS, (AP)—The question of the future of the Dodecanese islands involved the question of self-determination. Italy has held the islands since the Tripolitan war, but now retires under the terms of the treaty of Lucerne which provided that the islands should be held until the Italian prisoners in Tripoli were delivered by the Turks.

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Rebel forces which recently raided Guzman, Sonora, were defeated Wednesday by federal troops under Major Meza, the Mexican embassy was advised today.

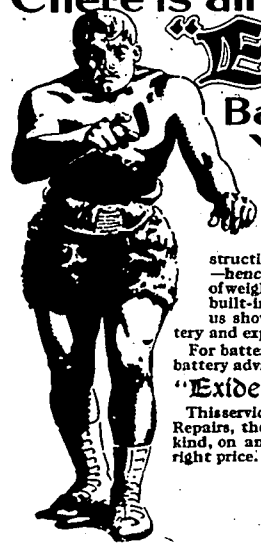

FARMERS BACK PLAN TO MAKE POWER AT LAKE

Organization of \$500,000 Mutual Project to Develop Electric Resources Looms with Big Stook Values.

With a view to developing Clear Lakes power site on Snake River north of Buhl, claimed by W. L. Hazard, and making electric current from this source immediately available to the Buhl and Clover districts, farmers of this county are subscribing liberally to stock in the Farmers Mutual Light, Heat and Power company, according to statements given out by the promoters among whom are J. A. Cron, D. M. Denton and J. W. Ely.

\$100,000 Enough to Start
This concern is to be capitalized at \$500,000, it is reported. Stock subscriptions amounting to \$80,000 were reported Friday and the statement was made that the sale of \$1,000 worth of stock would insure the inauguration of the undertaking. Installation of the power plant and the extension of the distribution system through Buhl to the Clover district where the current would be used in operating pumping plants for the irrigation of lands. Current also would be delivered to farmers who are stockholders residing in the vicinity of the transmission line.

It is pronounced that the proposed new corporation would take over the interests of the stockholders in the Mutual Power, Heat and Light company formed among citizens of Buhl, Filer and Twin Falls some two years ago for the purpose of developing the Clear Lakes site.

Cities May Be Served
While the immediate plans of the concern provide for the extension of the distribution system through Buhl and to the Clover district, it is stated that ultimately the company expects to operate throughout several counties in southern Idaho, and that current will be supplied to cities and villages where franchises are granted.

MASS MEETINGS HELD TO DENOUNCE TREATY

Germans Denounce Pact; Diet at Stettin; Allies Stand by Terms.

BERLIN, (P)—Mass demonstrations are the order of the day both in Berlin and the provinces. A huge crowd assembled on Thursday at the Reichstag building, and adopted strongly worded resolutions against the peace terms. The neighborhood of the Hotel Anlon, the headquarters of the allied missions, has been placed under guard of a cordon of police.

Rioting at Stettin
Serious rioting occurred at Stettin on Thursday night, according to the Lokal Anzeiger. A crowd stormed the prison and liberated all under detention there and attacked the barracks. Roads and railways leading to the city have been occupied by the mob to prevent the arrival of government reinforcements.

Terms Will Stand
LONDON, (P)—Speaking at the Primrose league today, Earl Curzon of Kedleston, government leader in the house of lords, said that if Germany refused to sign the treaty of peace the "allies were not unprepared for every emergency." No substantial modification of the treaty will be permitted, he added.

WASHINGTON, (P)—Methods of procedure to prevent the seating of Victor Berger, socialist from Wisconsin, who is under conviction for violation of the espionage act, also were discussed today by the W. W. committee, but final decision was deferred.

Former Candidate for Governor Expected to Take Up His Old Occupation Soon.

Olson of Buhl, was named to investigate the case of Jesse Simpson of Buhl, a veteran with a record of nearly two years service in the present war, who was arrested recently at the request of P. H. Morrison of Boise, agent for the department of the Interior in the investigation of a draft. He was released from custody on instructions of Adjutant General Wilson, when he presented his honorable discharge showing his service record.

With view to securing lists of all returned service men, registration places were designated at which returned soldiers, sailors and marines will be examined together with their names and addresses together with the organization with which they served.
