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GERMANY NOTE TOOK BLAME AND LIABILITY

Clemenceau Answers Request of Delegates Regarding Responsibility for the Beginning.

ACQUIRED IN CHARGE MADE IN LANSING NOTE

Claim That Germany is Released by Change of Government Pronounced Violation of International Law. PARIS, (AP)—The peace conference has made the best of the German note regarding reparations and the reply made by Premier Clemenceau as president of the conference.

World Release People. The representatives of the allied and associated states have, however, declared several times that the German people should not be held responsible for the faults committed by their government.

Former Government Blamed. The German delegates also do not share the view of the allied and associated governments regarding the origin of the war.

Approved Lansing Charges. "You in the German secretary of state Lansing of November 5, 1918, which you approve of and advise in favor of your contention, it is stated that the obligation to make reparations arises out of Germany's aggression by land, sea and air."

Made No Protest. "As the German government did not at the time make any protest against this allegation, it thereby recognized it as well founded. Therefore, Germany recognized in 1918, implicitly but not explicitly, the aggression and her responsibility."

Washing Post Adds. "Finally, you ask that the report of the commission on reparations be recommended to the peace conference. In reply we beg to say the allied and associated powers consider the reports of the commission set up by the peace conference as a statement of the facts which cannot be transmitted to you."

HISTORIC SETBACK HELD FOR RED CROSS WORK

PARIS, (AP)—The Cuban minister of public instruction, acting for the Cuban Red Cross, has acquired the historic estate of Epiphane in the department of Seine-et-Oise, near Paris, which will be turned into an orphanage for French children who lost their parents during the war.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., (AP)—Hops for the safety of Harry G. Hawker and Commander MacKenzie Grieve, missing since they set out eastward through the air on Sunday in their Sopwith biplane for Ireland, was virtually abandoned today by the British fliers preparing here to take wing in their wake.

PARIS, (AP)—The French government is considering the expulsion from France of Herr Frischauer, correspondent with the Austrian delegation at St. Germain, of the Neue Freie Presse, Vienna. It is reported that after one of his dispatches had been censored Frischauer succeeded in getting possession of it, and in sending it off after he had modified the effect of the censor's action.

NEW YORK, (AP)—New York's society leaders, after spending most of the night cooking doughnuts in Mrs. Vincent Astor's kitchen in her Fifth avenue home, peddled them up and down Broadway today as voluntary recruits in the Salvation Army's drive for a \$13,000,000 fund.

SAN DIEGO TEACHERS REQUEST BETTER PAY

SAN DIEGO, Cal., (AP)—Resolutions requesting that the board of education increase salaries of teachers of the San Diego public schools were adopted at a meeting last night of the San Diego Federation of Teachers. The resolutions call for an increase of \$100 a year for teachers in elementary schools, making a minimum of \$1,000 and a maximum of \$1,800, and for high school teachers a minimum of \$1,500 and a maximum of \$2,000 a year.

LABOR UNIONS VOTE TO STRIKE

ST. PAUL, Minn., (AP)—Members of sixteen different labor unions here went on a strike at 8 a. m. today in sympathy with common laborers, who are on strike here. The strike will last an hour, a raise of ten cents an hour, with a nine hour day and recognition of the union.

FRIDIE LIABLE UNDER INDEMNITY SAYS LAW

LONDON, (AP)—Frederick William Johnstone, the former German crown prince, will be liable to trial under the terms of the German peace treaty, it was declared by Andrew Bonar Law, the government leader in the House of Commons today. Contributions of the commandants of prison camps also would be liable under the treaty's terms.

ANACONDA COPPER ELECTS ITS BOARD OF DIRECTORS

ANACONDA, Mont., (AP)—John D. Thayer were re-elected directors of the Anaconda Copper Mining company at the annual meeting of the corporation here today. Contributions of the company to the Red Cross and to the United War Work campaigns were ratified and the report of Mr. Ryan as chairman of the board was ratified.

Informal Statement Given Associated Press Declares American Newspapers Admit German Acceptance Would Mean National Ruin for Generations to Come.

BERLIN, (AP)—Germany declines to sign the peace terms laid before it because they spell the "economic destruction, political dishonor and moral degradation of the entire German nation, not only for the present but also for still unborn generations," was a statement authorized by the cabinet this morning through the Associated Press.

SOFFRAGE GOES THROUGH HOUSE WITH A WHOOP

Great Majority Rolled Up for Amendment; Leaders of Both Parties Make Eloquent Talks in Behalf of its Submission.

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The woman suffrage constitutional amendment resolution was passed today by the house after less than three hours debate. The vote was 304 to 88, or 42 more than the necessary two thirds majority.

Republican Leaders Close Debate. Representative Mann asked ratification of his merits regardless of the attitude of President Wilson.

Only two amendments to the resolution were offered in the house and each was defeated without a roll call. Representative Clark proposed that it be made necessary for state legislatures to complete ratification within seven years while Representative Saunders, a republican, proposed that ratification be by the voters of the state instead of the assemblies.

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Consolidation of the equal suffrage constitutional amendment resolution began in the house shortly after noon today under the leadership of Representative Clark, republican, who led with leaders expecting a vote immediately afterwards.

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# BUILDING UP OF EUROPE HAS BEGUN ON ROADS

## Lines of Railways to Connect All the Allied Capitals and Help Build Up the Trade Between the Nations.

PARIS.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—What is characterized as one of the most vital steps toward the speedy reconstruction of war-torn Europe is being taken in the inauguration of the through, transcontinental train service between Paris, Belgrade and Bucharest via Pankov, Milan, Trieste, Agrani and Vintarof. This line will insure the most direct circumstances to be a great boon to the traveler and to the business man, but now, on the eve of the signing of peace, its assumed an incalculable importance to the welfare of many countries.

**Capitals Will Be Linked**  
The allied capitals will now be linked up once more by a rapid service which will permit of easy communication. The new line is being constructed for the numerous governmental missions, which will play a great part in the reconstruction. In numerous other ways the new line will facilitate the process of rebuilding the fortunes of the allies.

**Takes Away German Trade**  
That this railway avoids Germany and undoubtedly will take away much of the trade of the German railways finds little adverse criticism in Paris. The French are quite content to see the railways of their late enemies lie dormant for a time. Whether the new allied line will ultimately become the great trade artery for the continent, replacing the German lines between the North-Sea ports and the East, is a matter of much discussion. There are arguments on both sides of the question. Certainly its immediate effect is expected to be to lessen the German prospects. Whether there are any advantages in trade, which will influence future developments, remains to be seen.

**Trains De Luxe**  
The new service will provide through trains de luxe between Paris and Bucharest three times each week, according to present plan. One train a week will go to Bucharest. Thus with a good train service between Paris and the English channel port, England will again be brought into close touch with her eastern allies.

**On to Athens**  
As soon as possible the line will be extended to Constantinople and Athens, but the running of trains to those places is now impossible owing to the destruction of railways during the war. It will take several months to repair the damage. In addition, rolling stock is very scarce. Even now it is necessary to make a wide detour to get to Bucharest from Belgrade.

**Steam Traffic Unaffected**  
While the transcontinental train service will be important for relief work and for traders who wish to visit the East to re-establish commercial relations, it is believed that regular steam traffic will not be materially affected by the innovation. Goods will still continue to pass through the Mediterranean as of old.

# RETAIL GROCERS WILL CONVENE IN SALT LAKE

## Special Rates Become Effective on June 1; Meeting Three Weeks Later.

**SALT LAKE CITY, (AP)—**The National Association of Retail Grocers will convene in this city June 23-26, inclusive. Approximately 200 delegates and an equal number of alternates are expected to attend and an energetic publicity campaign is now being inaugurated to bring here for the convention representative grocers from the entire country. At least 2000 are expected. The Utah Retail Grocers' association program will be host to the grocers and a program of entertainment is being planned that promises "not a dull moment during the gathering. Among the entertainments planned are an "Asparagus" banquet, for the first night of the convention.

**Special Rates Announced**  
Announcement that special railroad rates to western points would become effective June 1 has added zest to the work of the local committee and efforts are to be made to bring many more to the convention than it was originally expected would attend.

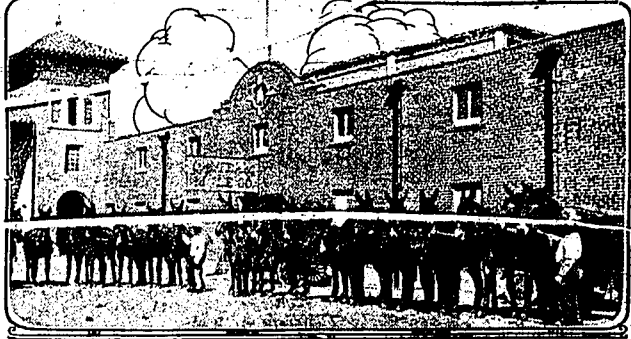
# PRICE OF PARIS MEALS A PUZZLE TO EXPERTS

PARIS, (AP)—Cheap meals can still be obtained in Paris but it is given to few to solve the problem. It consists of an hour's omelette or soup, meat with a vegetable, one vegetable as a course, and a desert. Unlimited bread, and a service are given but no wine. # ROMANIAN CHILDREN IN NEED OF CLOTHES

## Appeal Sent to America for Help —Prices of Clothing There Is Prohibitive.

BUCHAREST, (AP)—Twenty thousand Rumanian war orphans sent out to the children of America an appeal for old clothes and shoes. A pair of shoes costs a fabulous amount in Bucharest and the price of a suit of clothing prohibitive. Thread is at a premium. Underclothing costs \$15 a suit. The cheapest pair of shoes costs \$100 and for a suit of shoddy material \$150 is asked. Wool cloth is \$24 a yard.

**Demand Unmet.**  
The American Red Cross commission to Rumania is totally unable to meet the demand for clothing. Col. H. Gideon Wells, of the American Red Cross who is co-operating with the War Orphan society, has appealed to American school children to sort out their old clothes and old shoes for eventual shipment to their needy little allies in far-off Rumania.

**Royal Family Interested.**  
Queen Marie and Prince Carol of Rumania are intensely interested in the work being done by the American Red Cross for the war orphans of Rumania. Prince Carol is actively co-operating with the Red Cross which has distributed tens of thousands of cans of condensed milk to the babies.

**Doctors Make Fight.**  
American doctors are having a hard fight to overcome the epidemic of small pox which has broken out in all parts of Rumania and which is taking heavy toll of the children. The war orphans are being vaccinated wholesale.

# MRS. WILSON RIDER OF SKY

## Denial Issued to Statement That She Took Flight in an Aeroplane.

PARIS, (AP)—A statement appeared in one of the Paris morning newspapers today to the effect that Mrs. Wilson, wife of the president, had made a trip yesterday in an airplane over Verdun, Meuse and its suburbs. This statement was authoritatively denied this morning at President Wilson's Paris residence.

**GRATEFUL TO JAPAN.**  
TOKIO, (AP)—The Russian authorities in Siberia have expressed gratitude for the gift from the Japanese commission for economic relief in Siberia, consisting of 1200 cases of medicine, surgical and other supplies for relieving the sick and destitute.

# KERENSKY ASKS AID OF ALLIES FOR RUSSIANS

## Wants Governments to Repudiate Idea of Intervention That Would Infringe on Rights of People of His Country.

PARIS, (AP)—A. F. Kerensky, former premier of Russia and seven other members of the Russian constituent assembly and members of the Parisian Union for the regeneration of Russia today issued an appeal to the democracies of the world for prompt action with a view to helping Russia out of her present chaotic condition. It proposes the organization of a mission composed of delegates from all the powers and including representatives of organized labor which will go to Russia to explain to the people and the different Russian governments the democratic aims they are pursuing.

**Appeal Issued.**  
It should be stated categorically that the different governments repudiate the idea of any intervention likely to infringe upon the sovereign rights of Russia.

# MESSAGES WRITTEN IN BIBLE BY SPIES

## Testimony Shows That German Secret Service Used Many Instruments for Purposes

NEW YORK, (AP)—Messages written in invisible ink on the "bible" passages of a Bible were one way in which the German spy system in this country endeavored during the war to communicate secretly with the German imperial government, Madame Victoria testified today in the trial of Willard J. Robinson, charged with treason.

Called by the government in its effort to prove that Robinson sent to Holland to carry information to the German consul there on behalf of German agents here, Madame Victoria testified she was introduced to Robinson by Joseph A. O'Leary, that Robinson consented to carry her messages to Germany and that she gave to Robinson a Bible containing secretly inscribed messages which she said were in code and which were developed with the aid of lozine tablets. Madame Victoria said she brought the invisible ink from German in white neck ties from which she subsequently had it extracted.

# SUGAR BEET SEED OF REGION IS VERY BEST

## Intermountain Crops Will Soon Render United States Independent of Europe.

LOGAN, Utah, (AP)—Sugar beet seed, equal, and frequently superior to European seed, is being supplied to sugar beet companies in this section by the experiment station of the Utah Agricultural college here. Originally, the seed came from a strain of the best sugar beet seed produced in Europe and it has been carefully cultivated by the experiment station for 15 years.

**War Conditions Forced Production.**  
Due to the fact that war conditions cut off the supply of European seed it became necessary for farmers in this country to cultivate their own seed and the efforts of the experiment station have been in this direction for some time and there has been developed a strain of pedigreed sugar beet seed that is hardy and in every way suited to the western conditions. Sugar companies in Idaho, Utah and other western states have been purchasing the seed produced by the experiment station of the college and in some instances have developed new strains from those purchased.

**Becoming Independent.**  
Authorities at the college declare that the United States is rapidly becoming independent of Europe for its sugar beet seed supply.

# WALLACE MINES GIVE BIG RAISE IN WAGES

## Fifty Cents Extra Daily Added in Coeur d'Alene District Yesterday.

WALLACE, (AP)—An increase of 50 cents a day, from \$4.25 to \$4.75 became effective in mines of the Coeur d'Alene district Tuesday, according to bulletins posted in the principal mines. Operators of the district met here yesterday but made no announcement following the meeting. A reduction of a day from former wages was made in the mines of the district last March, when mines were reopened after the holiday shutdown.

# FARM LOAN FIGURES OUT

## Statistics of This Department Show That Loans Are Very Widely Distributed.

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Registered bonds of farm loan banks were held, 1,702 individuals and institutions of whom 1,350 each had less than \$25,000 worth, according to the latest tabulation by the United States farm loan board. Only three holders had more than \$500,000 in registered bonds, 30 between \$25,000 and \$100,000, and 13 between \$100,000 and \$500,000. Average holdings of coupon bonds were believed to be even less than the \$9,800 average of the registered bonds being more preferred by small investors.

**Interest Charges.**  
Interest charges on the \$10,821,425 total of outstanding registered bonds amount to \$510,080 annually, most of the bonds paying 4 1/2 per cent and some five per cent. Most of the bonds have been issued in the middle west.

# EXPORT TRADE MAKE RECORD

## More Goods Sent Out Than Ever Before in History of Nation.

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Exports from the United States in April surpassed the previous high record of last January by nearly \$100,000,000. The department of commerce announced the total today as \$715,000,000, compared with \$623,000,000 in January.

**Imports Less.**  
Imports in April were valued at \$273,000,000, or \$6,000,000 less than in April, 1918. The trade balance for the month in favor of the United States was \$442,000,000 and for ten months ending with April it was \$3,231,000,000. Exports for the ten months were valued at \$5,705,000,000 and imports at \$2,474,000,000.

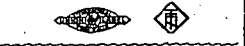

GERMANY'S FALSE PLEA

The authoritative statement of the position of Germany given to the Associated Press today by the German cabinet begins with a deliberate misstatement. It asserts that the American press has recognized without question the alleged fact that the acceptance of the peace terms would spell the economic destruction, political dishonor and moral degradation of the entire German nation, not only for the present but for still unborn generations.

Nothing could be farther from the truth. The American press has generally recognized the fact that the terms provide for reparation as far as compatible with the functioning of German industry.

The council has not acted in a spirit of revenge. It showed none of the malignity displayed by Bismarck in dictating terms to a crushed and broken French people whom he had tricked into war through the instrumentality of a forged telegram.

The reply of the council yesterday to the charge that the treaty crushed Germany economically would seem to be conclusive. And it should be recalled that many leading journalists of that nation as well as leading neutral statesmen, whose sympathies rather leaned toward Germany during the war, have declared the conditions to be by no means unreasonable.

The fourteen points have been pretty generally adhered to though not to the letter, which was, after all, impossible. The reducing of general statements to concrete definitions always involves some contrasts that appear startling at first sight.

Whether the peace conditions are to be adopted or not, it is certain that they should be considered on their merits and not as a partisan issue. In fact, while Republican senators should vote against the treaty in the event that it should be found too unsatisfactory to support, it should be recalled that in so doing they would lose the credit now pretty generally acknowledged to be theirs, for bringing about changes in the covenant as originally drafted.

On this ground and because it believes that as amended the treaty is worthy of support the Spokesman-Review of Spokane is favoring the ratification of the league constitution as part of the treaty of peace.

INDIA SILVER SENDING ENDS

Vast Quantity of White Metal Passed Through Without Loss of An Ounce.

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Now that the government has ended its war time shipments to India, of silver from melted dollars, Director of the Mint Baker has disclosed how thousands of tons of the metal were melted from the Philadelphia mint to San Francisco in special trains guarded by armed men with loss of an ounce and without general knowledge.

Eighteen of these treasure trains made the trip across the continent in the week ending last April 23, with the silver like big bricks piled high in each of the five express cars composing a special train.

Each silver brick weighed about 42 pounds and was worth \$1,000 and each train carried between \$5,000,000 and \$10,000,000 of the bricks. General shipments of silver dollars also were made from the United States treasury in Washington and from the New Orleans mint to San Francisco.

### PENITENTIARY SHOULD ELEVATE THE INMATE

#### Judge McCarthy Denounces Idea That People Should Keep Down Criminals.

(Special to The News) BOISE — Inmates in the Idaho state penitentiary should be given greater consideration and extended a helping hand rather than condemned at every turn. This is the opinion of Judge Charles P. McCarthy of the third judicial district court as expressed in an address given here this week. "People," he said, "tend to insist upon visiting upon the unfortunate man who has been discharged or paroled not only the punishment by a term in prison, but also fastens upon him the stigma of a life of ostracism, suspicion and lack of kindly feeling. We have sentenced our instruments of torture, but our attitude is much the same as in olden times. We save the by-products in industry and secure wonderful results. How much more precious is a human life. Waste products of human life may be made an asset in the finished product, as the waste product of industry. Penalties must be administered to be remedial, not as punishment. In Egypt, thousands of years ago criminals were put to work by the Ethiopian rulers. Recently Idaho has in some degree adopted the same methods. People forget that the man who goes to prison comes out a better man and is entitled to a new start in life."

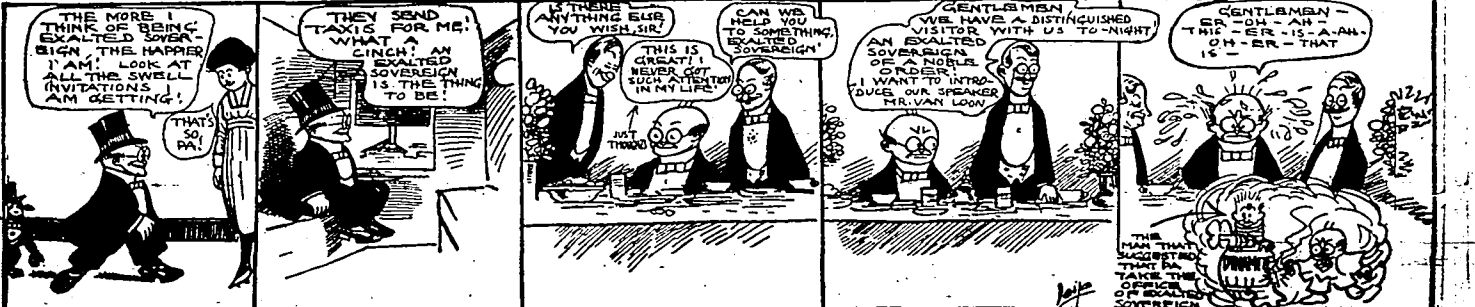

PARIS, (AP)—Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau, head of the German peace delegation, has asked an extension of time for Germany to present her reply regarding the peace terms.

Cannot Get Ready.

The count stated that further notes were being prepared and that it would be impossible to complete them by 1 p. m. Thursday when the time limit is up.

It is believed, says the Havas agency that the request for the extension will be granted.

Associated Press Summary.

The definite statement that Germany will not sign the peace terms in their present form is made by the German cabinet through the Associated Press.

Former Statements Less Clear.

Statements along a somewhat similar line by President Ebert, Premier Scheidemann and other Germans in high place have proceeded this one. Another note was sent yesterday by the German peace mission at Versailles to the secretariat of the peace congress.

Will Transmit An Answer.

Today or tomorrow the German representatives are expected to transmit to the allies a somewhat clearer statement on Germany's attitude towards the peace treaty, specifying what points they accept and what they desire to have modified.

Orlando Goes Home.

Premier Orlando has returned to Rome for a conference with members of his cabinet on "certain interior and foreign questions," according to a Paris dispatch.

In view of the fact that the settlement of the Italian and Jugoslav claims to Fiume and parts of Dalmatia are still unsettled and that every effort has been made to bring about an agreement before the peace terms are sent before Austria's peace mission it may be assured that Signor Orlando's trip to Rome indicates some new development in the work of adjusting the situation.
