





# 14 INCH GUN FLEET FEATURE

### Twelve Big Rifles Have Place on Flagship of New Pacific Armada

SAN FRANCISCO, (P)—Not the least interesting feature of the new Pacific fleet is its largest 14-inch gun, twelve of which are mounted on Admiral Hugh Rodman's flagship, the New Mexico and several other ships of the fleet.

Design and construction of the 14-inch naval gun on railway mountings on the western front was one of the great accomplishments of the American navy during the war. The guns hurled 1600 pound projectiles far behind the German lines and were a strong factor in reducing the St. Mihiel salient.

The gun was designed, built and delivered in less than four months. On December 23, 1917 Secretary Daniels' official report not a drawing had been started. On April 25, 1918, a completed gun was rolled on its own wheels to Sandy Hook Proving ground for long range tests.

Recommended for Land  
The guns, Secretary Daniels, said, originally were intended for the new battle cruisers, but a change in design of the vessels made the guns suitable for other use and it was recommended they be mounted for land service.

The guns were mounted on carriages which would be moved freely over the French railroads. With them went their navy crews. Twelve cars were required for each gun—machine shops, cars, ammunition cars, kitchen, dining cars and wireless cars. The batteries were sufficiently mobile that if an order came to move while in action they could be on their way in an hour.

### Biggest Mobile Gun

The fourteen-inch has greater range than any gun ever before placed on mobile mountings. The German guns which fired on Paris were "breakers." They were built on permanent steel and concrete foundations. Their projectile was small and specially built for long flight. This reduced their efficiency and with it had moral effect their military value was small. Because of their permanent position their location was discovered by allied aviators and the guns silenced. The German 14-inch gun in France also became famous for its long range bombardment of Dunkirk and other allied bases, but neither could be shifted from place to place without many weeks. The American 14-inch gun could move from one end of France to another and hold a range of thirty miles. At a range of 22,000 yards it fires armor sufficient.

### Two Transports Dock at New York with Overseas Veterans on Board

NEW YORK, (P)—Several units of the Fourth (regular army) division arrived here today from Brest on the transports Von Steuben and Tiger. Most of the men are from the middle west. On the Von Steuben were the Fourth engineers complete, Fourth engineer train, Twelfth machine gun battalion complete, and cavalry.

The Tiger brought back the 77th regiment of field artillery, eleventh machine gun battalion, and scattered units.

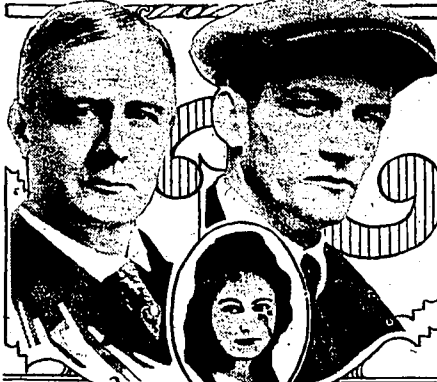

## Lawyers Baffled Over Question of Right to the Air

### Court is Called Upon to Determine Mooted Question in Litigation

KANSAS CITY, (P)—Whether a property owner is also owner of the air above his land is to be determined through a court action brought by Frederick Hoenemann, a farmer. He seeks to restrain a company owning airplanes from flying the air above his farm. Hoenemann contends that sight of the machines and the noise of their engines disturb the livestock.

There is said to be no direct precedent to guide the court, and the case is causing wide discussion in legal circles. Legal experts of England have discussed the matter from the standpoint of national ownership of the air, it is said.

Some lawyers contend that freedom of the sea and freedom of the air are the same, while others assert the courts have held that ownership carries with it light and air above the property as well as the earth beneath.

It is pointed out that when the steam engine came there were many lawsuits, the plaintiffs contending that the noise as well as the fumes polluted their stock. The Massachusetts Supreme Court, however, rendered the opinion that the locomotive was lawful and in keeping with progress. Attorneys are a similar condition arose when motor cars came into use, but the highest court of Indiana ruled in their favor on the grounds that the law must keep pace with progress.

## DEOLARES GERMANY IS STRIPPED OF POTASH

WASHINGTON, (P)—White S. Gale of the Geological survey, who returned recently from Europe, told the house yesterday in a committee hearing that the American potash industry need not fear much competition from the Germans, but that the French had potash available for export to sell at New York from \$150 to \$175 a ton.

Lack of shipping facilities and labor unrest were said by Gale to be the important factors in the German situation. The committee is considering a tariff for protection of the American industry.

### Cardinal Mercier to Visit Many Cities on Trip to the United States

NEW YORK, (P)—Cardinal Mercier's secretary, the Rev. Dr. Peter Joseph Strzykover arrived here Monday from France to arrange for the coming visit to the United States of the famous Belgian prelate. Dr. Strzykover said Cardinal Mercier would land here September 15 or 20 and would visit Philadelphia, Baltimore, Chicago, Washington, Portland, Ore., and other cities.

"Cardinal Mercier," said Dr. Strzykover, "is coming to the United States as a representative of Belgium for the purpose of thanking the American people for the part they took in the war. He will visit as many parts of the country as possible and particularly the northwest, a region he has been greatly interested in through the Indian stories told him as a boy by his uncle, Monsignor Croquet."

Monsieur Croquet was a missionary in the northwest when that district was mainly inhabited by Indians.

## WASHINGTON LICENSES WILD GAME PROPOGATION

SEATTLE, Wash., (P)—It now is lawful in the state of Washington, under a law passed by the recent legislature to raise for sale and serve at public meals various kinds of wild game. Raising of wild birds or animals and serving of them at restaurants is under state license, a fee of \$10 for the first year being charged and \$5 annually thereafter. Thus, for the first time in the state, the fastidious diner may call for fried China pheasant or roast duck or venison—provided persons are found who see a profit in raising the wild game for such purposes.

ADOPT METERS TO STOP WASTAGE OF WATER SUPPLY AND REVENUES

City Council Determines to Make Business Men and Residents Pay For All the Flow They Consume—Report Shows Twin Falls People Careless in Methods—Plumbing Allowed to Leak Needlessly

Under the present scheme of operation the Twin Falls waterworks system is a money-losing operation, besides being unjust and unsatisfactory to a wide range of the citizenry. This is the general charge made by C. E. Painter, representative in Twin Falls of the Burns & O'Donnell engineering concern of Kansas City, Mr. Painter's original charge of the installation of the filtration plant.

Losses Money. The operating cost of the Twin Falls water plant, as shown in Mr. Painter's statement, is \$52,000 per annum. Against revenues of last year this is a net loss of \$10,000. Mr. Painter opines that the loss is due to several methods in business houses and by residents. This waste, he points out, can only be checked by the meter system.

Owners to Pay. It is expected that the meter cost and cost of installation will be something like \$1,000 for residences, and about \$10, for business houses. This cost is to be charged in entirety against the property, the business house paying the lump sum down, while the residence will pay in installments of \$10 per month until the full amount is collected. Meters are to be sunk in the parking in front of residence property, and which will be connected with the water main.

Mr. Painter's report, showing the benefits the city will derive from the adoption of the water measuring system, is herewith presented in part: "The City of Twin Falls is using four million five hundred thousand gallons of water every twenty-four hours. This means four hundred and fifty gallons per capita per day. The average per capita consumption of water in the United States runs a little over 100 gallons per day."

"Taking the total income of the waterworks fire hydrants and sewers included and estimated according to present rates, we find that the city is receiving payment for about twenty per cent of the water that leaves the plant. This does not take care of itself financially under present conditions and cannot be expected to, if we estimate the operating cost of the plant under present conditions, to be \$48,000 a year. The receipts last year were \$48,000. This shows that the plant will not pay expenses by \$4,000. The present time is due to the fact that as an example there have been meters placed where the bill would run up to several dollars for a couple of months and the owner has no way of knowing where the bill would run up to get to the place. The only permanent cure for such a condition is a one hundred per cent metered system."

As an illustration of the equitable basis produced by the meter between the consumer and the water company, show in the following table the variation between flat rates on the old system and the metered system on the first twenty-five meters installed in Twin Falls:

These statistics show 12 rates decreased and 13 increased under the meter system. Out of twenty-five customers the city was overcharging half of them and presenting water free of charge to half.

A vigorous effort will be made by the American Legion, the national organization of American veterans of the great war, to aid relatives to receive as quickly as possible the personal effects of soldiers who died in the service. State branches of the American Legion have been instructed to obtain by investigation through local offices all available information in cases in which there has been prolonged delay in forwarding deceased soldiers' effects and the Legion Headquarters in New York will be of the assistance of the Legion is desired.

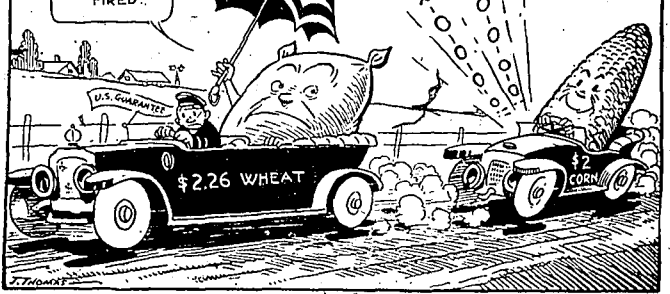

# WARNS AGAINST TYPHOID FEVER

### County Physician Urges Adoption of Precautionary Measures by Citizens

Directing attention to the recent appearance of typhoid fever in Twin Falls, Dr. C. Q. McGinnis, county physician, has issued an appeal to the citizens to take ample precautionary measures against the spread of the disease. This warning is contained in the following statement:

**Urges Inoculation.**  
"While the returning service man is immune from taking the disease," said Dr. McGinnis, "those who stayed at home are not. We can not have compulsory inoculation in civil life because they had in the army."

"The best method of combating the disease at this time would be to have oneself inoculated. The efficacy of this method was proven in the late war, where there were only 2328 typhoid cases reported out of a total population of nearly five million men and of that number only 237 deaths were reported."

**Fatal in 1908 War.**  
Nearly 85 per cent of the deaths in the Spanish-American war were from typhoid fever alone."

Dr. McGinnis also announced that the county commissioners would cooperate with him in fighting the spread of the disease here.

### WILSON ARGUES FOR ACCEPTANCE OF FRENCH TREATY

meet with your cordial approval and will receive an early ratification at your hands along with the treaty of peace with Germany. Now that you have had an opportunity to examine the great document I presented to you two weeks ago, it seems opportune to lay before you this treaty, which is meant to be in effect a part of it.

### Supplements Peace Treaty.

It was signed on the same day with the treaty of peace and is intended as a temporary supplement to it. It is believed that the treaty of peace with Germany will provide adequate protection for France against aggression from her recent enemy on the east; but she remains immediately ahead of all other nations in the matter of possible aggression. The covenant of the league of nations provides for military action for the protection of its members only upon the advice of the council of the league—advice given, it is presumed, only upon deliberation and acted upon by each of the governments of the member states only if its own judgment indicates such action. The object of the special treaty with France, which I now submit to you, is to provide for immediate military assistance to France by the United States in case of any unprovoked movement of aggression against her by Germany without waiting for the advice of the council of the league of nations that such action will be taken. It is to be an arrangement, not independent of the league of nations, but under it.

### League Must Approve

It is therefore expressly provided that this treaty shall be made the subject of consideration at the same time with the treaty of peace with Germany; that this special arrangement shall receive the approval of the council of the league; and that this special provision for the safety of France shall remain in force only until, upon the application of one of the parties to it, the council of the league, acting if necessary, by a majority vote, shall agree that the provisions of the covenant of the league afford her sufficient protection.

### Compromise to France

I was moved to sign this treaty by considerations which, I hope, seem as persuasive and as irresistible to you as they seemed to me. We are bound to France by ties of friendship which we have always regarded, and shall always regard, as peculiarly sacred. She assisted us to win our freedom as a nation. It is scarcely to be doubted whether we could have won it without her gallant and timely aid. We have recently had the privilege of assisting in driving enemies, who were also enemies of the world, from her soil; but that does not pay our debt to her. Nothing can pay such a debt. She now desires that we should compromise to lend our great force to keep her safe against the power she has had most reason to fear. Another great nation volunteers the same promise. It is one of the fine reversals of history that that other nation should be the very power whom France fought to set us free. A new day has dawned. Old antagonisms are forgotten. The common cause of freedom and enlightenment has created new comradeship and a new perception of what it is wise and necessary for great nations to do to free the world of intolerable fear. Two governments who wish to be members of the league of nations ask leave of the council of the league to be permitted to go to the assistance of a friend whose situation has been found to be one of peculiar peril, without awaiting the advice of the league to act.

### Honor Before Peace

It is by taking such pledges as this that we prove ourselves faithful. We do the utmost to the obligations of gratitude and tested friendship. Such an act as this seems to me one of the proofs that we are a people that sees the true heart of duty and prefers honor to its own separate course of peace.

Mr. Prentice was in Nevada when his wife died, but returned to Buhl yesterday.

# BUHL YOUTH IS HELD ON SERIOUS CHARGE

### Roy Cagle Alleged to Have Shot at Passengers in Automobile —Denies Charge

The statement was morosely and more or less nonchalantly made by Roy Cagle, 14 years of age, who is accused of shooting at a passing automobile near Buhl.

Cagle made the announcement to Juvenile Officer John R. Ault during the course of an examination aiming to discover the motive of the boy in shooting at the automobile, an offense admitted by two of his companions.

The boy is the son of a Buhl farmer and is said to be of average intelligence, although deficient in academic knowledge, being at least three years in arrears of school classes. He is said to have just reached the fifth grade.

According to Juvenile Officer Ault young Cagle, with Bert Eustis and Jack Warner, all the same age, spent some time shooting jack rabbits last Sunday afternoon a distance out of Buhl. Their sport ended they halted an automobile occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Ed Hayes and two members of their family as the car was headed toward Buhl, demanding a ride to town. Mr. Hayes did not stop and it is asserted, a shot from a 22 calibre rifle through the back of the car. The missile struck Mrs. Hayes on the lobe of the left ear and then sped through the windshield.

Hayes, who is a rancher recently came to the Buhl district from Nevada. He reported the adventure upon reaching Buhl and the arrest of the boys followed soon after.


Eustis and Warner declare they attempted to stop Cagle in his avowed intention of shooting, but the shot was fired before they could effectively intervene. Cagle's companions have been released from custody. Cagle is held in the county jail pending a hearing.
