

FEEDING 1,000 CHILDREN TASK FOR AMERICANS

Waifs of Petrograd. Made the Wards of Red Cross, Look to Head of Refugee Work as Benevolent Foster Father

OMSK, Siberia, (AP)—How to care for 1,000 children from Petrograd, who became wards of the American Red Cross, is a question which Dr. Doremus Sanders, head of the refugee work at that organization, is trying to solve as a benevolent foster father.

Separated from Parents
The youngsters were sent to Siberia last summer by the Russian government because of the food shortage in Russia, and were cut off from any possible communication with their parents by the outbreak of hostilities between the Czechs and the Bolsheviks. They arrived in a body at Omsk, sixty miles west of Cheliabinsk, in charge of teachers, and thereafter scattered in groups to Cheliabinsk, Troitsk, Ekaterinburg, Tiumen and other towns. Their teachers deserted them and they were left to charity.

The desperate plight of 300 of the waifs at Omsk came to the attention of Y. H. C. A. Secretary Compton, who came through from Samara. After doing what he could for them and enlisting the aid of his friends among the Czechs, Compton appealed to the Red Cross to look after the children at the Dolzinsk Mountain Resort.

The result has been that the Red Cross has colonized this group of children at Turgayak, a mountain resort fifteen miles from Omsk after much negotiation with the Bolsheviks. They are twenty-five "datchas" or summer cottages, and is planning to consolidate with them various other groups to the number of 300 to 500 more. In addition there are 500 colonized at Timan.

The actual work of organizing the Turgayak colony has been done by Gregory Welch of the British committee of Friends. Alfred J. Swan and Mrs. Swan, also Britishers, are looking after educational work among the children, and Miss Lillian Welch, an American, is devoting her time to teaching agriculture and to teaching English.

Want to Learn English
Miss Welch, who came to Omsk to try to assist more help, describing her work in the colony, said:

"The children are very anxious to learn English and are eager to hear all about America. A group of girls have been in the street motioning and when they learned that I had been an organizer in Honolulu they begged me to come and live with them and teach them. Every American who visits the camp is besieged with questions."

USE HAND GRENADES FOR SAVINGS BANKS

Twelfth Reserve District Puts To Novel Use Material Intended for War

SAN FRANCISCO, (Special).—Banks of the Twelfth Federal Reserve District have ordered 400,000 hand grenades which were ready for shipment to the American expeditionary forces when the armistice was signed and which have been turned over to the necessary department for use as savings banks to stimulate thrift. The only alteration made in the hand grenades to convert them into savings banks was the removal of the TNT charge and the cutting of a slot as a coin slot.

The Federal Reserve bank of San Francisco, which is handling the distribution of the grenades to the banks and trust companies, anticipates orders aggregating 100,000 of the war souvenirs. Robert E. Smith, director of the war loan organization for the Twelfth Federal Reserve District, said: "These American-made hand grenades constitute one of the best souvenirs of the war one could possibly get. Some months ago an eastern firm managed to get some of them and disposed of them readily at one dollar each.

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ENGLISH IRON MAKERS WORRY OVER PROSPECT

Anxiety Over Ability to Retain Home Trade Expressed; Americans Advise Adoption of Modern Methods

LONDON, (AP)—British iron and steel manufacturers are seriously wondering whether they will be able to retain their home trade, and to speak of extending their export business, in the face of steadily increasing prices of materials and labor. Americans who have looked over the situation, declare the British need not worry if they will adopt modern methods, for wages in the industry are much higher in America than they are in England.

Workmen Make Trouble
Anxiety is chiefly confined to makers of railway materials, tools, machinery, engines, and those things which go to fit out the completed ship's power plant.

The British workman not only demands high wages, but he is charged with refusing to give his equivalent in labor, thus cutting down production and making it impossible for his employers to compete with the United States. America, unavailing to the demands of Europe, is getting the bulk of the business, while Japan is a close second, according to high trade authorities. Even Germany, with its rioting workmen and lack of raw materials, is after trade, and if report can be believed, is getting it.

Handicapped in Competition
As an instance of the trials which beset British manufacturers it is pointed out that one company whose products had a world-wide sale before the war has been able to obtain only one contract out of 30 in competition with German and United States bidders.

NEW HUNGARIAN CABINET IS CALLED REACTIONARY

Reports from Budapest Say Present Government is Losing Favor

VIENNA, (AP)—The press of this city describes the new Hungarian cabinet as "unreservedly reactionary" and speculates upon the reception which will be given it by the extreme and the probable course of Hungarian socialists and working men.

Count Oskany, the foreign minister, was formerly a diplomatic officer and was a member of the entourage of former Emperor Charles in Switzerland. He is said to be still in that country.

Reports from Budapest say that the support of the new cabinet is gradually falling away and predict that Paris has or will indicate its disfavor of the present government and insist upon a more popular cabinet. Vienna papers continue to print lists of Jewish victims of pogroms despite the Hungarian government's denials that they occurred.

SAYS FRANCE LOST MANY YOUNGER MEN

PARIS, (AP)—Captain Andre Tardieu, speaking for the government during the debate in the chamber of deputies Tuesday afternoon on ratification of the German peace treaty, said the French war losses constituted twenty-six per cent of the men mobilized. Fifty-seven per cent of all men with the colors under 31 years of age, were killed.

COTTON PROSPECT BETTER

Department of Agriculture Reports Improved over Previous Forecasts

WASHINGTON, (AP)—An increase during August of 214,000 bales in the prospective cotton crop this year was shown in today's cotton report of the department of agriculture which forecast a total of 11,230,000 bales. The condition of the crop, 61.4 per cent of a normal, shows a decline of .57 points from July 25 to August 25, compared with an average decline during the last ten years of 7.7 points.

Boll weevils, boll worms, army worms and red spider continue with almost continuous gains over considerable areas of the belt with dry hot weather, following the heavy rains caused the deterioration of the crop.

SENDS RADEK TO RUSSIA

German Government Permits Departure of Bolshevik Agitator

LONDON, (AP)—The German government has given permission for Karl Radek, one of the leaders in the Spartacist rising in Germany to return to Russia, according to a Russian soviet wireless dispatch which quotes the Russian language newspaper Russkaja Zhisn, published in Berlin.

Karl Radek was a member of the Russian commission which negotiated the peace of Brest-Litovsk with Germany. Later he visited Berlin to agitate the cause of Bolshevism and became one of the leaders in the Spartacist movement in the German capital.

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SAYS PURPOSE OF COMMITTEE TO KILL PACT

Senator Hitchcock Inveighs Against Amendments to Treaty; Declares Majority Will Not Accept Changes

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Declaring the real purpose of the foreign relations committee majority in amending the peace treaty was to kill the treaty entirely and that such a course would be suicidal to the United States, Senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, democratic leader, asserted in a senate speech today that the majority of the senators never would accept any of the committee changes.

On Ground With Microscope The treaty opponents, he said, "crawl on the ground with a microscope searching for pitfalls in the language of nations and overlook substantial benefits which the treaty would bring the nation. The proposal of Senator Knox, republican of Pennsylvania, that the treaty be rejected and a separate peace made with Germany was characterized by the speaker as an insane "mixture of patriotism and folly."

"By a vote of nine to eight," said Senator Hitchcock, "the committee on foreign relations is to bring suddenly before the senate the question of forsaking the pending treaty. Suppose the senate should vote in favor of the Shantung amendment or any other? What would happen?"

"Either the president would refuse to go further with the treaty, or he would submit the amendment to the nations associated with the United States. Does any one believe they would accept it? Does anyone suppose that Japan would submit to this humiliation before the eyes of the world?"

"Then where would the United States find itself in this international settlement? We would find ourselves out in the cold, isolated from the rest of the world. The work of ratifying the treaty would proceed without us."

Overlooking Benefits The treaty itself provides that when three nations in addition to Germany have signed, it shall go into effect. It is easy to see the enormous benefits which Great Britain and France will derive from this treaty. They will not take any chances. It is not hard to suppose that Japan will delay its ratification. The result is beyond all question.

"What then will the United States do? Some say that congress will pass a joint resolution declaring a state of peace with Germany. Others say the United States can negotiate an independent treaty with Germany. This is evidently having no conception of the enormous benefits which the United States derive from this treaty."

"In article 231 Germany is compelled to accept full responsibility for the damages caused by the war. Does anyone think if we undertook to negotiate a separate treaty with Germany, Germany would make any such concession to the United States; that it was the United States which forced war upon her."

Vindicated Custodian's Acts. "Take the matter of German property in the United States. Under this treaty all acts of the United States and of the alien property custodian with regard to that property are vindicated. Germany cannot show actual fraud. Is anyone insane enough to suppose that Germany will voluntarily make that concession to us if we give the hint upon her which this treaty gives?"

"This treaty creates a commission called the reparations commission. It receives from Germany all reparations paid and distributed there to various injured nations. Does anyone think under the circumstances the United States can afford not to have a representative on the reparations commission?"

Defeat of the treaty by means of proposed amendments to it is the real program and hope of the majority of the committee on foreign relations. It is for this purpose that the treaty has been locked up in cold storage for so many weeks.

COLUMBUS IN GRIP OF STREET RAILWAY STRIKE Motormen and Conductors Hold Out for Better Working Conditions COLUMBUS, O., (AP)—Columbus awoke this morning to find a unexpected strike of motormen and conductors on its street car lines. Thousands of workers were forced to walk or ride on wagons and trucks.

The union cars were started the strike had been called to obtain better working conditions and higher pay, but their demands were not made public early today.

Committee to Meet American Commander On Arrival at New York

WASHINGTON, (AP)—General John A. Pershing, who is returning home after a tour of duty in Europe, will be met here by a committee of more than two years' service in France as the commander of the American expeditionary force, will be formally welcomed at New York by a congressional committee.

This was decided upon today by the joint committee of the house and senate arranging to welcome the general home. The committee will consult with him regarding plans for his reception at the capitol. Composing it will be Senators Wadsworth, New York, chairman of the senate military committee; Warren, Wyoming, General Pershing's father in law, and Representative Kahn, California, chairman of the house military committee; Republican Leader Mondell, Wyoming, and Democratic Leader Clark, Missouri.

FARMERS LOSE ON SPUD CROP

Railroads Charged with Discrimination, Allegation

That the failure of the railroad company to supply cars necessary to move the early potato crop from Twin Falls has retarded to the serious disadvantage of the producers in the Twin Falls county, the west complaint of local produce merchants. Less than ten percent of the number of cars ordered to transport spuds to eastern markets have been provided since this year.

Complaint is being against the transportation department by merchants not only in Twin Falls but in all other district centers of eastern Idaho where produce marketing comprises one of the big items of industry at this season of the year. While many of these merchants are inclined to be conservative in their charges, they agree that there seems to be a certain degree of discrimination by the railroads against this district in the question of supplying the demand for refrigerator cars. Inducing this feeling, a local commission merchant this morning declared the conviction that main line points are getting all the advantage of the good markets at this time. He also vigorously derided the alleged disposition of the railroad to keep yards on the coast filled with cars for the immediate movement of fruit crops to the detriment of branch line places such as Twin Falls.

Favor Main Line Points There is little chance for the Twin Falls producer to get any benefit from the high eastern market for early potatoes now, a commission dealer announced this morning while discussing the recent trend of commercial affairs as the car situation affects them. He said that though the railroad company immediately supplies the full demand for this district for refrigerator cars to move the early spud crop, few if any consignments could be put on the market in time to get advantage of the early high prices. He told of an apparent disposition on part of the railroad company to supply the demand at Caldwell, and predicted that the farmers of that section will profit well through this discrimination in favor of main line points.

Many Cars at Caldwell Reports reaching here this morning that all nearly 60 refrigerator cars on hand in the Caldwell yards last Sunday alone to fill produce merchant's orders for the movement of the Caldwell district early potato crop. Two cars for shipment to eastern markets in that section is estimated at about 2000 carloads. The Twin Falls district will have about 500 carloads of early potatoes of potatoes.

Wheat Shipments to Kansas City Stopped

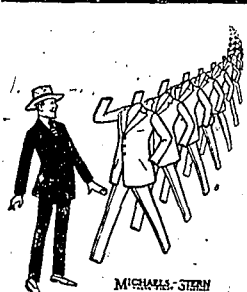
FULTON IS WINNER

IRELAND BIDS FOR U. S. TRADE

Cork Industrial Development Association to Send Commission to America

DUBLIN, (Correspondence of The Associated Press)—The Cork Industrial Development Association has decided to send a commission to the United States to promote Irish trade interests there, and Irish manufacturers and other buyers or sellers in the American market are showing keen interest in the enterprise.

Bank Reports Published

In this connection the reports of five Irish banks are made public. They show that the amounts they hold on deposit and credit accounts total 90,000,000 pounds, being an increase of nearly 25,000,000 pounds over last year. It is estimated that when the results of the Royal Bank and of the three Belfast banks are known, and added the total Irish bank deposits will be seen to be about 150,000,000 pounds.

The project of making Galway a great trans-Atlantic port has been received. The scheme proposed would cost 2,000,000 pounds of which parties interested would put up seven hundred thousand and ask the government to supply the balance. Application to the government has been arranged.

Housing More Rooms

Since the Irish housing bill has passed through parliament, local authorities have submitted for the approval of the local government board proposals for 224 sites comprising more than 1,034 acres. Of these 114 have been approved already covering 799 acres and affording for 5,586 houses. The chief housing activity so far is in Munster which has put forward more than half of the projects.

FINDS NOTHING ABROAD TO COMPARE WITH HOME

Judge Walters Says Twin Falls and Country Beats Anything There Is in West

Tinno roads are as good as any in the west, and Twin Falls looks better than any town in the west here to Seattle, including Weiser, La Grande, Pendleton, The Dalles, Portland and Astoria. So declares Judge E. A. Walters, who has just returned from a three weeks' auto tour in the west.

There is nothing in any district in the route of travel to the Pacific coast that compares with the Twin Falls country in natural beauty, climate and scenic grandeur, Judge Walters declares. He found a discouraging condition in the non-irrigated sections, noting the most favorable situation in The Dalles, where the apple crop this season is good. The grain is nothing like a full crop anywhere, and is particularly poor in the Pendleton and La Grande sections.

Portland, Astoria and Judge Walters says, are feeling the effects of a business slump, a sort of reaction from the extraordinarily heavy commercial boom experienced in the past two years.

The west is suffering from drought similar to that in this district, even cranberry growers complaining against the lack of water in the cranberry marshes.

Judge Walters left here by car three weeks ago, going direct to the coast, where he picked up Mrs. Walters, sons, Vernon and Edward Jr., who returned with him.

JAP ATTACKED: LOSES DIAMOND

Two Men and Girl Alleged to Have Assaulted Restaurant for Robbery

BURLEY, (Special)—Ray Martin and J. H. Passon, two young men of Burley, together with Bob Young, a young woman well known here, are under arrest on charges of assault and robbery. They are alleged to have intimidated Hani Yajima, a Japanese restaurant man of Duhl. The latter is held as a witness.

Martin, Passon and the girl were all arrested early Monday after the Japanese had been found unconscious on the road at Hevlyern. Yajima was bleeding profusely from a bad wound in the head. He reported, when he regained consciousness, that he had been in company of the girl late the night before and had been attacked by four men who beat him about the head. He reported, too, the loss of a diamond valued at \$200.

When the arrests were made Martin and the girl occupied the room together. The diamond, according to Sheriff Hollenbeck, was found in Martin's possession. All are in jail at Burget.

LIVING CONDITIONS IN GERMANY ARE IMPROVING

COBLENZ, (AP)—Living conditions in the interior of Germany are rapidly adjusting themselves as a result of the lifting of the blockade by the allies. According to the German newspapers, however, it may be years before food prices become normal or vituals the same as they were before the war.

COUNTRY'S POTATO CROP BELOW OTHER YEARS' GENERAL AVERAGE

Washington Bureau Sends Out Detailed Statement of Tuber Condition in All Leading Growing States of the Union—Idaho Falls Off

BERLIN, (Correspondence of The Associated Press)—Count Ottokar von Czernin, formerly Austrian foreign minister, is shown as a prophet who foretold the coming events and the collapse of the Central Powers with almost uncanny correctness, according to his now famous letter to the Emperor Charles, written early in April 1917, in which he urged the emperor to "make peace at all hazards or suffer the loss of your throne."

Published by Germans

Parts of the text of Count Czernin's historic missive have been published, but the complete text, as presented to the assembly at Weimar by Finance Minister Erzberger, has now appeared for the first time in the Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, the official German organ.

It shows among other things, that Czernin, abate of all Austrian statesmen, prophesied the entrance, two years before, of humanity into the war on the side of the allies and predicted "almost the day of its outbreak." The letter also said the count "expected" immediate French, British and Italian offensives and his forecast was borne out by what happened. Within a fortnight after the note to the ruler had been drafted, on April 16, 1917, the French began the great Soissons-Rheims "drive" along a 25-mile front, and the British had started the battle of Arras on a front extending to Lens. The Italians, a few weeks later, plunged across the Isonzo in the Carso sector for a distance of 27 miles, crushing the Austrians in their own rush.

Counseled Sacrifice

In view of the reverses to the armies of the Central Powers and on the eve of America's entry into the war, Czernin urged the emperor to "make" another detailed peace proposal and not be afraid to make great, even heavy, sacrifices. "Russia, he thought had lost its offensive power but the Eagle of the West, he feared, might hit a stronger adversary than the prostrate bear.

"In Germany great hope is laid in the submarine warfare," he wrote. "I hold this attitude in contempt. I do not for an instant deny the fabulous results of the German heroes of the sea. I admit admiringly that the monthly list of sunken tons is something akin to fable, but I go on record as declaring that the result expected and predicted by the Germans will not follow."

It must be remembered at this time that German U-boats were at the height of their depredations on the sea. On October 29, 1918 the German admiralty admitted the failure of the submarine warfare by recalling all the "tigers of the deep" to Kiel and Wilhelmshaven.

Bursts Utopian Dreams

"I hope that the thought, unfortunately incorrect, that England could be compelled within a few months to make peace, will lose ground in Berlin," wrote Count Czernin. "Nothing is more dangerous than to believe those things one wants to believe, nothing is more fatal than not wanting to see the principle of truth, and to succumb to utopian illusions from which sooner or later there must come a fearful awakening."

Stations at Every Highway Outlet from San Francisco to House Wolf Equipment Officers

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—The first of a series of automobile thief catching stations to be erected at every highway outlet from this city has been built and equipped on the Junipero Boulevard, at the southern boundary of San Francisco.

It will house officers armed with high powered shotguns and equipped with high powered automobiles and motorcycles. Whenever an automobile thief is reported the news will be flashed to all sub-stations guarding ingress and egress to the city. If the thief occurs at night an electric sign bearing the word "STOP" will be swung over the road and all motor cars will be inspected before being allowed to proceed.

PEDAGOGUES OF JAPAN DEMAND INCREASED PAY.

Police Break Up Meeting in Yokohama of Teachers who Anticipate Alleged Aim of League of Nations

YOKOHAMA, (AP)—Public school teachers of Japan are insistently demanding an increase in salaries to meet the increased cost of living. The police recently prevented the holding of a mass meeting, called by the primary teachers of Yokohama. All teachers received a circular declaring that with the League of Nations about to be framed, the leading nations were endeavoring to promote the welfare and happiness of mankind. Teachers, therefore, it said, "should assemble to discuss the changing thought of the nations and interests of education." The newspapers announce that the government will raise the teachers' salaries.

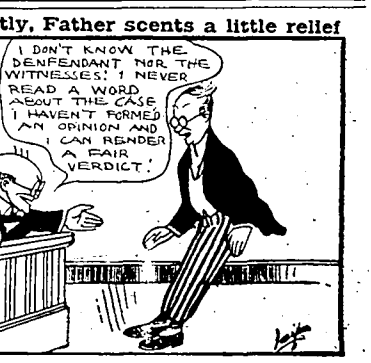
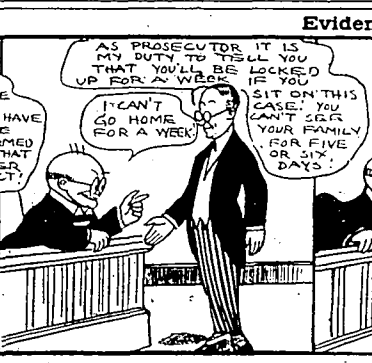
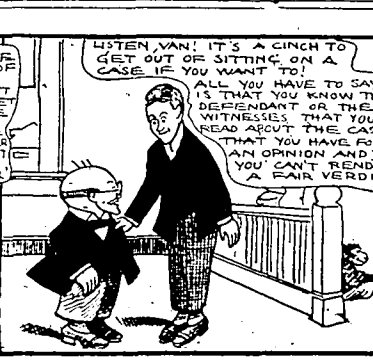
