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# AMERICA AND FRANCE JOIN IN MEMORIAL

Ambassador Jusserand, France, is Principal Speaker at the Franco-American Exercises in New York

## FELICITATIONS MARK IMPRESSIVE SERVICES

Diplomat Paints Picture of French Courage and Indomitable Will, Not Disheartened by Sight of Ruins

NEW YORK (AP)—Ambassador Jusserand, of France, was the principal speaker at Franco-American exercises held here today in New York's historic city hall in commemoration of the 43rd anniversary of the birth of La Fayette and the fifth anniversary of the first battle of the Marne. Amid the impressive services, messages of felicitation and congratulations upon the victory of allied arms, which had been brought to pass since the last celebration of the La Fayette day nation committee were read from President Wilson, Major General Wood, Secretary of State Lansing.

Foreign Representatives Attend  
Representatives of a number of foreign governments were present at the ceremonies which were held in the grand chamber. Other speakers were Myron T. Herrick, former governor of Ohio and ex-United States ambassador to France and Dr. John H. Finley, state commissioner of education. The governments represented included, besides France and the United States, Great Britain, Canada, Italy, Japan, Belgium, Russia, Poland and Greece. In the afternoon, services were held at the La Fayette monument in Union Square, which were participated in by the society of the Cincinnati, Sons of the Revolution, G. A. R., Society of the Colonial Wars and the Society of Founders and Patriots of America.

Similar exercises were held at the same time in San Francisco, Milwaukee, Philadelphia, Fayetteville, N. C., Louisville, Ky., the messages being read to the assemblies in those cities.

In Philadelphia, in addition, a cable message also was read from the president of the Paris municipal council. "I am proud to be asked to associate myself with your celebration," wired the Prince of Wales. "The British empire can never forget its debt to France for the immortal victory of the Marne, the first great action of the war, in which the French and British armies, side by side, imposed their will upon the enemy." Field Marshal Haig, Admiral Denny, Premier Clemenceau of France, Andrew Tardieu and A. J. Balfour also sent characteristic greetings.

Tribute to Roosevelt  
Ambassador Jusserand in his address said that "the war has shown us that it should" and that the peace which has been signed was not a peace of "vengeance" but a peace of reparation. He also paid a fitting tribute to the memory of Theodore Roosevelt, both nations mourning the absence of one man and hearing no more a voice which, on one side of the world or the other, teaching men how to attain better days through courage, sense of duty and good citizenship, a voice now hushed forever.

Referring to the horrors of German warfare and the devastation wrought throughout northern France, Mr. Jusserand painted a picture of courage and indomitable will in the following words: "In spite of misdeeds and imperfections France is being built again. Hearty are the hearts of those sturdy men who in company with you stopped the onrush of the Germans, now stand against and disheartened at the sight of their ruins, the undamaged buildings are a store for them, peace or of their peace. They are busy clearing the wreckage, filling the shell holes and the trenches and removing the barbed wire and exploded shells (several millions at Lens alone) preparing future wars."

America's Response  
Touching upon La Fayette's devotion to the American cause and America's first response he said: "When La Fayette heard of American independence his heart quickened. When you heard of the danger of France, your hearts enlisted the severest claims on you; the widening of the limits of military aid for your population and the increase of war taxes passed by a unanimous vote in the two houses. Your descendants to the end of time will be proud of this sacrifice of theirs who acted thus and fought so well in the great crisis."

## PHILANTHROPIC MOTIVE BACK OF THIS SCHEME

Onondaga County Business Men and Farmers Will Help Embarrassed Agriculturists

MALAD, IDA. (Special)—Bankers, business men and farmers of Onondaga county have formed a seed loan association to finance the purchasing of seed for farmers who are financially embarrassed by reason of the loss of wheat crops by this season's drought. In many cases the farmers have their land all ready to plant to fall grain and have no money with which to purchase seed.

Through the activity of the county farm bureau, organization of the seed loan association was agreed upon and a pool will be formed by assessment of business men and farmers who are able to pay. The fund will be turned over to one of the banks, under charge of a business manager, and loans will be made to farmers. Farmers who have had a standing credit at the bank will be able to borrow this money individually; others will be required to sign joint notes.

# ACTORS STRIKE COMES TO CLOSE

Equity Wins Recognition and Theatres Affected Will Re-open at Once

NEW YORK (AP)—The actors strike which began about a month ago and after forcing the majority of legitimate theatres in New York, spread to other cities, was settled early today. All theatres affected by the strike will be opened at once.

The settlement followed a four hour conference between producing managers and representatives of the Actors' Equity Association and other labor organizations of the theater workers.

Open Shop Agreed On  
Augustus Thayer, playwright, chairman of the mediation committee of the Authors' League of America, stated that an open shop had been agreed upon. Francis Wilson, president of the Actors' Equity association, said all differences had been settled to the satisfaction of both sides. A statement it was said, would be issued during the day setting forth the terms of the agreement.

Settlement of the strike came directly after officials of the International Alliance of Stage employees and motion picture operators had ordered members employ in 100 theaters throughout the country where Shubert productions are being played to strike immediately. Both the stage hands organization and the actors' association are affiliated with the American Federation of Labor.

Fidelity League Left Out  
The new Actors' Fidelity League, organized since the strike began by George M. Cohan, in an attempt to force the equity association to a settlement, had no part in the final conference and agreement. It was intimated that the Fidelity workers' association since the striking actors refused to recognize it. Mr. Thomas announced in his statement that "full recognition is given to the equity."

## PERUVIAN WORKERS STRIKE

## BRITISH SITUATION BETTER

Industrial Conditions Improve Since Threat of Complete Upheaval

LONDON (AP)—The industrial situation in Great Britain at the present moment appears far less grave than a few months ago, when there was a threat of a complete upheaval of labor. Since the settlement of the Yorkshire strike there has been no trouble of great magnitude although small strikes in various industries are still frequent and tramway workers are threatening a national walkout if a wage advance is not granted.

Generally, however, unrest throughout the country has been lessened since ministerial revelations of the nation's grave financial position, which seemed to have had a moderating influence.

## LONDON TO SPEND BIG SUM ON GARDEN CITIES

Project Attempted to Solve Housing Problem and Prevent Overwhelming Congestion

LONDON (Correspondence of The Associated Press)—Millions of pounds are to be spent in the creation of a system of industrial garden cities which ultimately will rim metropolitan London. The scheme, just outlined, is the most elaborate city-building project ever undertaken in England and is an adaptation of the model industrial town idea originated some years ago in the United States.

Building on the first of these "flow or garden" suburb cities is to begin next year north of London, according to newspaper announcements. The town will be self-supporting and will cover several thousand acres. Within its precincts will be an agricultural area. Its population will be supported by several engineering industries to be located there.

The project is an attempt not only to solve London's housing problem, which has become a grievous one, but to prevent an overwhelming congestion of the city's industries and other commercial activities.

# FRENCH SPIRIT IS TRIUMPHANT OVER WAR BLOW

## Speaker Declares France Will Arise from Present Afflictions Greater and Stronger Than Ever Before

MILWAUKEE, Wis., (AP)—France has "gone back to work with a spirit of virile courage, the spirit that brought recuperation to the country after the war of 1870 and that paid an enormous debt so quickly as to gain the admiration of the world," according to Maurice Cazenave, minister plenipotentiary and director general of the French public services, in an address here today at the celebration of the anniversary of La Fayette and the first battle of the Marne.

Mr. Cazenave, who spoke at the City club said that the false legend of "a frivolous and corrupt France" which Marshal Lefevre had destroyed by the victory of the Marne had been succeeded by an equally false legend, advanced by her enemies, that France was, blind white beyond the hope of resurrection. He declared the progress made in his country since the armistice was a proof that France would arise from her present afflictions greater and stronger than ever.

A ray picture of French prosperity with increased outputs of metals, textiles, coal, potash and farm products was drawn by the speaker. He said that France's colonies, often ignored, were larger than the whole of the United States including Alaska, the Philippines, Porto Rico and other possessions, that she was rich in mineral and agricultural wealth and possessed a population of more than fifty million, "nearly all hard workers who have given their lives to the mother country by fighting bravely for her in the present war."

(Continued from page one) been misled about the treaty by men who look at it "with the jaundiced eyes of those who have been deceived by interests of their own." When those men were "glibbed" by public opinion, he said, they will regret that the glibbed is so high.

"If anybody dare to defeat this great instrument," he continued, "then they will have to gather together their enemies for the world and do something better. I say it with a full heart, up or shut up. A negotiation will not save the world."

The president said some men opposed the treaty enthusiastically and he would thank them for that. But these men, he added, based their opposition on "language" of what was in the treaty.

Germany, said the president, would be the only great nation left out of the league, "unless we decide to stay out and come in later with Germany."

Alfing to the American people of the Philippines, said Mr. Wilson said the league would solve the "very perplexing" problem of how they were to be kept free, after their independence had been granted. Mr. Wilson said he could imagine the shades of the fathers looking on with astonishment "that the American spirit has made a compromise of the world."

Disclaimers Person of the World. "I tell you," he added, "the war was won by the American spirit. And America in this treaty has realized what those gallant boys fought for. The men who make this speech or difficulty will have a life-long reckoning with the men who won the war."

The president asked the audience not to think he had come out to "fight or antagonize" any great respect," he said, "for the senate of the United States. But I have come out to fight a cause that is greater than the senate and I intend to fight it to the end, in office or out, as long as I live."

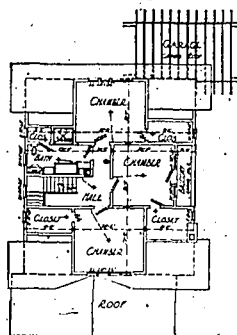

On the second floor are three bedrooms and bath, with an extraordinary amount of closet space, and a central hall.

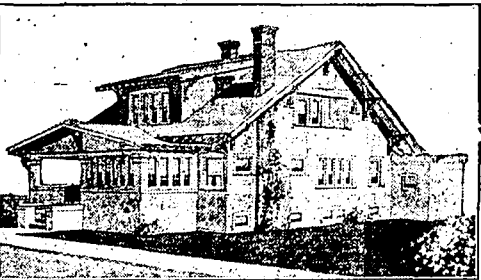

Under the whole of the house proper is a basement with concrete floor and walls. This is divided so as to keep the heating plant separate from the food and other storage rooms.

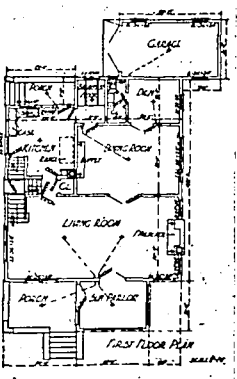

# PEACHES ROT IN ORCHARDS

### Farm Bureau Officers Tell of Waste Through Over-Abundant Crop in District

Sufficient peaches to supply Twin Falls city for months are going to waste at the Crystal Springs orchard, according to word received at the county farm bureau. Great piles of Ellberta, too ripe to eat, are piled up to rot, it is reported.

The same condition exists in most of the orchards herabouts, peaches this year being so abundant a crop that they ripen faster than they can be picked and packed. Choice fruit, without bruise or blemish, is being offered to purchasers for \$1 a bushel bushel. With this condition in mind officials of the county farm bureau urge home-keepers to procure all the peaches they can from local orchards for canning purposes, explaining that this fruit, at the present price for the raw product can be packed for 12 1/2 cents per quart, including sugar. One bushel will make from 14 to 16 quarts of the finished product. Miss Edna M. Ludwig, home demonstrator of the county farm bureau, explains that by home canning a saving of more than 50 cents per quart can be made over the store grade. The Co-operative Orchard company has 150 baskets of peaches now at the Earl Pruitt company in Twin Falls that will be given away to persons willing for them. The fruit is slightly too ripe to warrant transit to outside markets.
