PREVENTION OF HOSTILITIES IS AMERICANS' JOB

Secretary Daniels Reports to Senate on Intervention of the United States Naval Forces at Trau

THREATENED JUGO-SLAV-ITALIAN WAR IS AVERTED

Sailors Land at Request of the Italian Admiral in Command of Dalmatian Coast, and are Later Withdrawn

WASHINGTON, (AP)—

Intervention by the American naval forces at Trau, Dalmatia, prevented bloodshed which would have resulted in a state of actual war between Italy and Jugoslavia, according to a report from Admiral Knapp, commanding American naval forces in European waters, transmitted to the senate today by Secretary Daniels.

American sailors were not landed, Admiral Knapp said, until after American and Italian officers who had been sent to Trau had induced the Italian raiders to withdraw after they had surprised and captured the small Serbian garrison. One Italian officer and fifteen men were taken and the Serbian gunboats were driven ashore to protect them and police the town until Serbian troops could arrive, the admiral said.

Italian Requests Move

The admirals acted, Admiral Knapp continued, at the request of the Italian admiral in command on the Dalmatian coast and the force was withdrawn immediately after the Serbians arrived.

Meanwhile the commander of the Italian raiders was ordered to trial by court martial by the Italian admiral.

Defines Armistice Line

The report, transmitted to the senate in response to a resolution by Senators "Republican," "Polymetivants," follows:

"The armistice line extends from Cape Planka inland, north and west of this line Italian troops in occupation of the south and east coast of the Adriatic are retained, there being no hostilities along this line."

SENATE REJECTS FALL PROPOSAL

Deletes Amendment to Eliminate United States from Boundary Committee

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Taking its first action on committee changes in the peace treaty the senate today rejected an amendment by Senator Fall, republican, to eliminate the United States from membership on the committee to determine the boundary between Germany and Belgium.

SAN DIEGO, CAL., (AP)—Belief that the two bodies reported found on the beach of the bay of Los Angeles, in lower California, are those of Lieutenants F. B. Waterhouse and C. H. Connolly, United States army aviators, who were missing for seven weeks, was expressed today by officers at North Island. The mother of Lieutenant Connolly stated that her son had a pair of golf clubs with him engraved with the initial "C" as described in the dispatches on the finding of the bodies.

STATEMENT IS ISSUED EXPRESSING GRATITUDE

Monarch Declares Happiness in Prospect of Visiting Americans who "Powerfully Served Ideal"

NEW YORK. —Albert of Belgium, water king of the brave little nation to which honor was done yesterday, after a stop today to the first reigning monarch of Europe to set foot on American soil.

They were welcomed with the dignity which the nation greets her distinguished guests. Companies of regulars and marine presented arms as they descended the gangplank of the transport George Washington to be received by Vice President Kitchell and other representatives of the government.

Testifies to Gratitude

Upon his arrival King Albert issued the following message to the American people:

"At the moment of setting foot on American soil, the King of the Belgians desires to express to the people of the United States the great pleasure with which the queen and himself are coming to his shores at the invitation of President Wilson.

"The king rejoices at the prospect of visiting the cities whose hearts fought with the cities of Belgium, and whose noble sacrifices knew no number. He happily will be able to meet the eminent citizens who, animated by the highest thoughts, placed themselves at the head of the organization for relieving the sufferings of the war."

"The American people, their splendid army and their courageous navy, powerfully served a great ideal."

Casualty Lists Grow as Fighting is Resumed in Elaine Race Riots after Arrival of 500 Soldiers from Camp Pike; Several Negroes Taken Prisoner with One White Man in Possession of Quantity of Questionable Literature

ELAINE, Ark., (AP)—Governor C. H. Brough and Col. Isaac Jenks, commanding the troops here, were fired upon but neither was hit; O. L. Johnson, a white real estate dealer at Helena, was shot three times and probably fatally wounded; Dr. D. A. Johnson, a negro druggist of Helena and his three brothers were all killed; Corporal Luther Earles, company H, Fourth infantry, had his lower jaw shot off and probably will die; and Corporal Berl B. Gay, headquarters company, Fourth infantry, was shot in the chest in the renewal of race trouble here shortly before noon.

FRENCH PUBLIC VIEWS GERMANS WITH MISGIVING

Enemy of Yesterday Must Come Back in Recognizable Shape and Not Disguised in General Opinion

PARIS, (AP)—The impending resumption of commercial relations with the enemy of yesterday is causing the French public at large a good deal of misgiving. Many would keep the Germans out of all contact, but cooler heads realize that France cannot afford to close the door upon a customer of a billion francs annually. There is, however, a fairly unanimous feeling that if the German is to come back to France, he must come back in some recognizable shape and not disguised as too often before.

Incidents such as the following do not serve to put the public mind at ease. A woman of good social standing of Lille recognized recently, in the person of a cashier in one of the big department stores of Paris, a former German officer. She had good reason to remember him as one of the invaders who had been quartered upon her home in Lille.

Challenged as to his identity, the man stoutly denied his Teutonic nationality. He spoke French perfectly, and a fairly convincing story of his department store work in the person of the former German Emperor was tattooed. The cashier officer was dismissed and the newspapers are now demanding that employers shall be held responsible for the civil status of their employes.

PROPOSES RECORDING BIBLE SCENES IN MOTION PICTURES

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—Plans are being made here by a local motion picture producer to make moving pictures of scenes in the bible from cover to cover. The Bible will be filmed in 100 reels, two to be shown at a time. It is expected the work will require two years and that in some scenes the largest number of persons ever appearing in a motion picture will be assembled.

OPTIMISM MARKS WILLIAMS' VIEWS

Comptroller of Treasury Addresses Bankers on World Financial Conditions

ST. LOUIS, Mo., (AP)—Optimism for the future of Europe and the financial condition of the world, despite the terrible losses occasioned by war, was expressed before the national bank section of the American Bankers association, here Wednesday by John Skilton Williams, comptroller of the currency. "Ninety-eight years ago Europe was considered as we now consider Europe," Mr. Williams said. "Of course, the situation was on a small scale as compared with the present, but areas, populations and capital then were small as compared with now. We owed Europe \$35,000,000 and had no way to pay it. Balances of trade were hope-

HUN ATTEMPT TO BOTTLE UP FLEET SHOWN

Scheme Aimed at Blocking Off Entrance of Forth by Sowing Big Mine-Field Blocked by Minesweepers

LONDON, (AP)—German U-boats tried to bottle up the British Grand Fleet in the Firth of Forth during the latter part of the war, says a London paper which describes this as the most ambitious tactical operation undertaken by enemy submarines.

The scheme aimed at the blocking off of the entrance to the Forth by the sowing of a big minefield. Three months of hard work were devoted to the task by a considerable fleet of submarines, the mines being laid in the shape of a half moon. But minesweepers had discovered the plan, and, as fast as the mines were planted, they were cleared away.

It is recalled that other similar attempts to trap the fleet were made in 1915 in the Moray Firth when over 400 mines were laid, and in 1916 at the Orkneys. In round numbers, on these three occasions, the Germans laid 1,100 mines at a cost of \$1,000 each. The King Edward was the only fighting ship that fell victim in these operations.

Enormous numbers of mines were laid by the Germans off Harwich. It was found that these fields were spread regularly at ten day intervals, so that the British sweepers occasionally left portions of these waters un swept so that when the next batch of submarines came along they ran afoul of their own mines. The task of clearing British waters of mines is almost completed.

MANY CHANGES CONSIDERED BY EPISCOPALIANS

Revision of Book of Common Prayer and Canon on Matrimony with New Rule on the Church Unity

DETROIT, Mich., (AP)—Revision of the Book of Common Prayer of the Episcopal church, adoption of a new canon touching church unity, and revision of the canon on matrimony are three of the most important matters to be brought to the attention of the delegates at the triennial convention of the church that will open here October 8. It is anticipated that upwards of 3,000 delegates and many of the leading churchmen of this and other countries will attend the convention, which will last two weeks or longer.

Would Recognize Divorce

The proposed revision of the canon on matrimony would make it impossible for an Episcopal clergyman to marry divorced persons, even the innocent party to a divorce. It has been anticipated that this question will provoke much debate. The proposed new canon on church unity, it is stated, would make it possible for a minister of another communion to be ordained in the Episcopal church without first giving up his original affiliation. The revision and modernization of the prayer book is expected to take much of the time of the gathering. During the convention daily meetings

on social service are to be held, and the Church League for Social and Industrial Democracy will complete its organization with Bishop Charles D. Williams of Detroit, its leader.

Capital and Labor to Be Heard
Representatives of capital and labor will be invited to give their views in the open forum meetings on social service, preliminary to the launching of the new league. The purpose of the league is to create in a country-wide educational propaganda for better cooperation of all walks of human life "for a state of society in which man will get all he earns and earn all he gets, where no man will live on the fruits of another man's labor and no man will be denied the fruits of his own labor."
Church leaders anticipate that the question of open sessions of the house of bishops will again come before the convention as it has the past score of years. The proposal lost by a recent convention of the bishops.

BRITISH MAIL PLANES TRANSFERT HEAVY LOADS

LONDON, (AP)—In one week, the Royal Air Force aerial mail service from Fulkestone to Cologne has carried 7,900 pounds of letters and parcels, the air ministry announces. Two squadrons are conducting this service. One of them is equipped with planes having Liberty motors. They average time for a one-way journey is three hours, eighteen minutes.

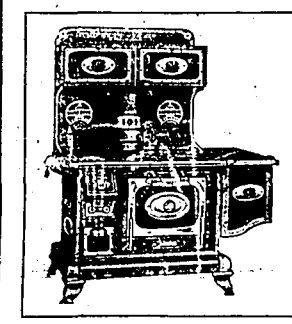

CICOTTE WENT CRAZY AFTER HITTING RATH

Sox Flinger Tells of Reaction Following Injury to Opposing Player

CINCINNATI, O. (AP)—Eddie Cicotte, the master pitcher of the American league, who was driven out of the opening game of the world series yesterday under a hail of hits, today expressed confidence in his ability to come back at the Reds when ever called upon. Cicotte with nearly thirty victories to his credit this season, carrying the hopes of the Chicago fans on his shoulders and they have every confidence that he will pitch the Sox to victory in two and possibly more of the remaining games. The master of the "shine" and "knuckle" ball declared today that he was completely unnerfed when he hit Rath, the first man up in the game yesterday and lost all control of the ball in the fourth inning. "It is hard to explain," Cicotte said, "but I was in no condition to pitch in a game that I had expected. I felt perfectly confident before the game started and appeared to have 'everything' when I was warming up, but when I hit Rath it seemed to me a strange effect on me. I felt so dizzy about it that I trotted with him along the first base line to see if his ball had hurt him. When he passed me that he was all right I went back to the pitcher's mound, but I did not seem to be right."

RIVER OF LAVA FLOWS FROM VOLCANO CRATER

Stream of Molten Rock Pours from Mauna Loa into the Boiling Sea

HILO, T. H. (AP)—A stream of lava one thousand feet wide is flowing in to the sea at the rate of from twenty to thirty miles an hour from the crater of volcano Mauna Loa which first threw forth lava Saturday. The stream of lava is now a virtual river from twenty to thirty feet high. Where the lava flows into the sea the waters are boiling for half a mile and are strewn with dead fish.

The sides of the flow are banked up by cooled lava and red hot boulders carried in by the stream, igniting when they hit the sea. Property damage resulting from the activity of Mauna Loa has not been large although some forests and a few houses have been destroyed. The lava flow is mostly through a barren country covered by previous flows from the crater.

Several herds of cattle are reported perished in by the lava. Near the source of the flow the volcano remains normal and is seemingly unaffected although great clouds of steam can be seen coming from the peak. Volcano-Kilauea, on an adjacent peak remains unaffected by Mauna Loa's activity. Thousands of people are going from Hiloe to witness the flow on the island to witness the flow which is visible from the sea to a newly made crater twenty miles up the mountain.

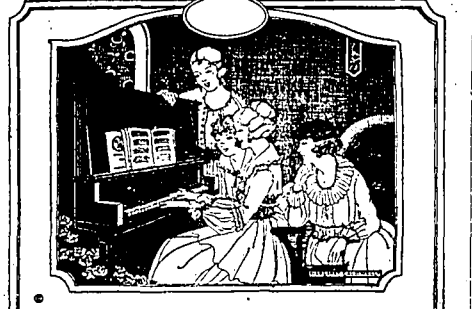

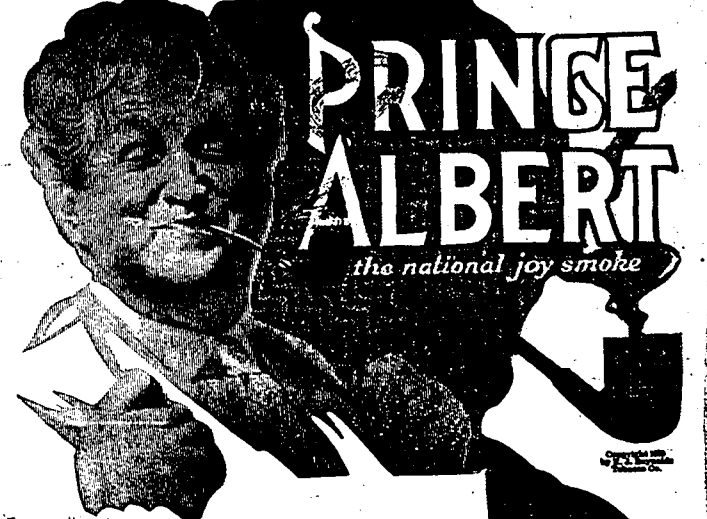

AMERICAN HOLDS UP RIFLES SENT TO KOLCHAK MEN

Major General Graves Takes Summary Action in Refutation for Alleged Scurrilous Articles in Newspaper

OMSK. (AP)—Major General Wm. H. Graves, commander of American forces in Siberia, in retaliation for alleged scurrilous articles published in a Vladivostok newspaper and hostile acts of Cosack chiefs in the Far East, has held up shipments of 14,000 rifles which recently arrived at Vladivostok from America consigned to the all-Russian government at Omsk.

Gives Notice of Action Giving notice of his action by telegraph throughout Major Slaughter, his representative here, General Graves, in direct and forceful language declares he will personally cause the arrest of the offending editor and the suppression of the newspaper—the Omsk Bulletin—unless the Omsk government does so. He asserts further that unless the activity of the Cosack chiefs is curtailed he will recommend that America refuse to render further assistance to Russia. General Graves says he will retain the arms until advised as to what action the Omsk government proposes to take.

Omsk Waits on Washington In replying, the Omsk government says that in its view the subject constitutes a diplomatic and not a military problem, and should be approached through recognized diplomatic channels, and that the government therefore awaits a communication from the state department at Washington. It says that "not wishing to formulate any recriminations, it will not enter into an argument which might inflame the lively sympathy which it believes has been awakened in America for the cause of Admiral Kolchak."

Expresses Astonishment In respect to the holding up of the shipment of rifles, astonishment is expressed by the government that local troubles in the Far East, which the government regards as an international problem, and not a purely Russian one, should impel General Graves to take steps which might jeopardize a far-reaching and more vital undertaking, namely, the suppression of Bolshevism at the critical moment when Siberian troops are conducting a successful offensive.

Rifles Paid For It is pointed out that General Graves course is "peculiarly astonishing in view of the fact that the rifles were bought and paid for by the Russian government."

The threatened suppression of the newspaper, it is added, could certainly be construed as a matter not subject to American military jurisdiction.

LONDON. (AP)—Men's clothes for coming winter will be dear and hard to come by, is the cryptic, gloomy forecast of a clothier's trade journal in discussing the prospects of the forthcoming season. Increased production costs and a sharp drop in demand for wool, are the causes assigned.

A WELCOME REPORT

Admiral Knapp's report submitted today by Secretary Daniels to the senate on the intervention by American naval forces at Trau, Dalmatia...

It is small wonder, in view of this lack of information, that there should have been misunderstandings and unfortunate incriminations such as were placed upon the records of the senate lately when the fact became known that American bluejackets had been landed to evict Italians from the Dalmatian coast city.

Admiral Knapp says that the intervention of the American naval forces at Trau prevented bloodshed "which would perhaps have resulted in a state of actual warfare between Italy and Yugo-Slavia."

The report makes known the fact a certain section of the Dalmatian coast, by agreement after the armistice, has been given in charge to American naval forces and has since been called an American zone.

We are apprised thus that it is a part of the business of the United States for the present at least, to maintain order in a region very close to the Balkans.

There remains yet to be answered the question as to whether, after the treaty is ratified and in effect, this obligation will still apply as against the United States, or whether "fire on sight," allegorically referred to by President Wilson, will be brought from sources nearer to the present scene of threatened conflagration, and American men released there to stand in readiness to quell possible disturbance near at hand.

Further light on this question would be welcome.

ARMY DRAFT DISCLOSED ABUNDANT TUBERCULOSIS

Large Percentage of America's Youth Suffering from the Disease

When the United States asked the young men of the country to rally to the national standard during the war, the draft was found to be one of the best medical detectives that could be imagined. Through it the standard of health among the young men of the country was quickly and surely ascertained.

Altogether, out of the nearly 3,000,000 men who were picked by the draft, 69,000 were found to be tuberculous. These men, enough to make up more than two divisions of soldiers, had to be rejected. They were unfit to take up arms for their country and, in fact, were a danger to their comrades.

Tuberculosis is one of the gravest problems America has to solve today. Its death toll is enormous. Every year at least 150,000 die of tuberculosis in the United States. For every death there are 8 open tuberculosis cases reported. That means over 1,200,000 persons have the disease.

Tuberculosis can be prevented and it can be cured. That is the burden of the great educational campaign now being waged by the National Tuberculosis Association and the 1,000 state and local organizations affiliated with it. The rapid growth of tuberculosis in the country, especially with the reaction from the war at hand, means that more extensive educational work is required. It must be forthcoming and such a campaign has been planned. To obtain funds to teach every one that tuberculosis can be prevented more than 650,000,000 Red Cross seals are to be sold just before Christmas.

TAX ASSESSOR HAS NO HELP IN CENSUS FACTS

Penalty Provided for Violation of the Provision for Secrecy

WASHINGTON (Special)—"That the facts and figures gathered by the enumerators, supervisors and special agents of the fourteenth decennial census will have absolutely nothing to do with valuation of property for taxation purposes is a point I desire to emphasize with all possible vigor," said Director of the Census, Sam L. Rogers in speaking of the forthcoming 1920 enumeration.

Some difficulty has been experienced in the past," continued Mr. Rogers, "in getting absolutely accurate values of land and other property because of a certain amount of confusion over this point. Many people were erroneously inclined to connect the census with taxation. We hope to avoid any such confusion this time."

The act of congress which, under the constitution, provides for the taking of the fourteenth decennial census makes it unlawful for any enumerator, special agent, supervisor or other employee of the census bureau to divulge any information whatsoever concerning

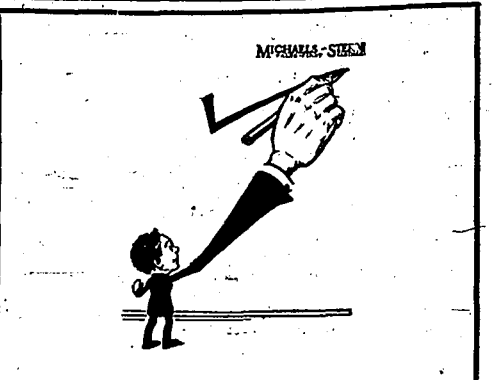
the census returns. A heavy fine and possible imprisonment, or both, is the penalty prescribed for violation of this provision of the law.

Actual work by the enumerators in the various census districts will begin on January 2, 1920. It is expected that the population statistics of all cities and towns will be gathered in approximately two weeks. Final figures for rural districts, however, can hardly be gathered in less than a month.

D'ANNUNZIO TO COMPLETE TASK

Declares Purpose to Stand Fast Until Fiume is Annexed to Italy

FUME, (AP)—Gabriele D'Annunzio, the poet leader of the Italian forces in Fiume, received the correspondence of the Associated Press Sunday afternoon and gave to him a statement expressing his unalterable determination to hold Fiume until it is annexed to Italy.

"We are glad to see you in Fiume," he told the American correspondent. "We are here to stay until we are through with our task of having Fiume annexed to Italy. We will not leave under any consideration until our object is accomplished."

"You see the enthusiasm of the people of Fiume to be annexed. You see that the people of Fiume are Italian. Our motto remains today as since the beginning of this enterprise—Fiume or death."

"We are willing to sacrifice all in our effort to gain what we believe to be just and right. The last few days have imposed the severest strain upon him. He has been rising at 6:30 in the morning to commence the work of answering letters and drafting proclamations. This has been his task in addition to attending to staff work in connection with the forces of occupation under his command."

At the interview D'Annunzio wore the uniform of a lieutenant colonel, with five rows of ribbons, including those of sixteen medals for valor. The staff of the poet consists mainly of young men. There are no officers in Fiume above the rank of lieutenant colonel. Out of nineteen officers of the staff of D'Annunzio, seven won the Italian gold medal for valor, of which only 25 were bestowed during the war.

Demonstrations occur virtually every evening in Fiume. Some times it is the Alpine mountaineers, some times the Arditi or Bersaglieri, who get up a parade and march through town singing and cheering the D'Annunzio cause. The D'Annunzio troops are quartered in the schools of the city.

MORMONS READY FOR AUTUMN CONVENTION

The Nineteenth Semi Annual Church Convolve Soon to Convene

SAULT LAKE CITY, (AP)—The nineteenth semi-annual conference of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (Mormon) was convened in the tabernacle here today, members of the church from all parts of the world being in attendance. Close to 10,000 visitors were present, it was estimated.

This year's semi annual conference will end Sunday evening, October 5, marking an epoch in the history of church conferences for it is the first time that the anniversary of the forming of the church has not been observed by including the sixth day of the month in the conference dates. The church was founded April 6, 1836, at Seneca, Fayette County, New York, by

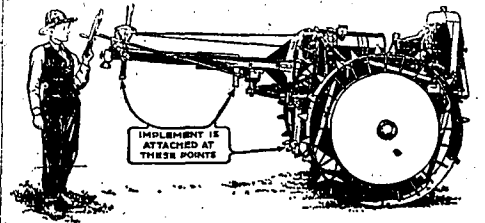

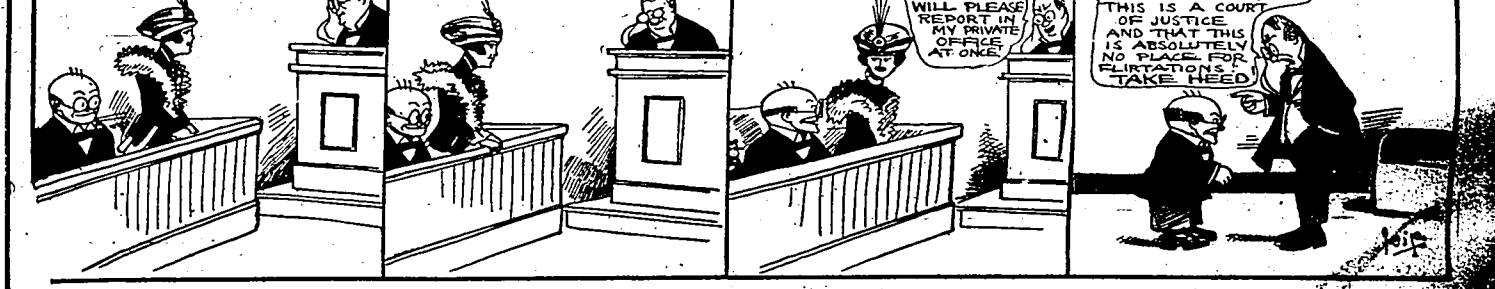
