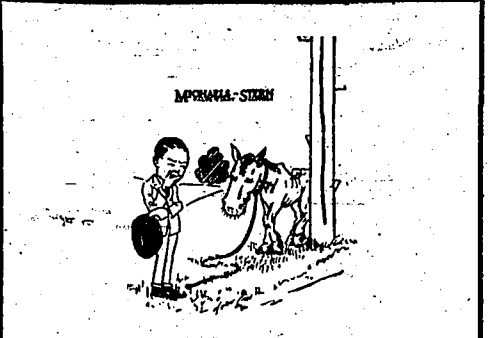

# DAVIS BACKS PEACE PACT IN PRESENT FORM

## Idaho Governor Warns Against Acceptance of Proposals Which Might Contaminate Constitution

(Continued from Page One.)  
Federal government would undertake the building of the Brancuza reclamation project, but that any government assistance in this work had been promised.

### Results the Criterion

Referring to the operation of the cabinet form of government, Governor Davis said the business of the state is like that of the business of a corporation but that it has not been conducted that way heretofore. The cabinet form has consolidated 48 departments, boards and bureaus into nine departments, the executive positions in which are filled by state officials, answerable to the governor who assumes under this arrangement, entire responsibility for the state government. Governor Davis argued for a higher degree of appreciation and responsibility in the government; suggested that instruction in the raising and disposition of tax money should be elemental in the public schools and asked that the present state authorization be judged by the results it obtained.

### Charges Incendiary

Declaring for a policy of disposing of state lands and investing the money in interest bearing securities, Governor Davis argued that such a course would relieve the state of many of its other destructive agencies. He said that many of the forest fires this year were of incendiary origin, and stated that much information concerning the L. W. W. tactics had been revealed to state officials through members of that organization confined in the state prison.

### Incendiary, revolution and rebellion has been preached throughout the country," Governor Davis declared, "and many good citizens have unconsciously absorbed this propaganda. "The time has come," he added, "when sentiment in the United States must be crystallized into a firm and not by foreigners who refuse naturalization and allegiance to the flag."

### On Non-Political Basis

Launching into a discussion of the proposed league of nations, Governor Davis stated that he proceeded in accordance with President Wilson's injunctions, announced at Genoa, where the president was introduced by the governor, that "this is not a political issue, but one to be discussed by the American people."

Replying to the president's challenge to "put up or shut up," Governor Davis said he would put up the constitution of the United States and rest the case there until a better interpretation of the league of nations covenant were forthcoming.

Declaring that the president had asserted that the covenant now contains all of the previous covenants, contemplated in proposed reservations, but that they could not understand it, Governor Davis asked "Why, if this is true, cannot reservations be included so that you and I can understand it?"

Branding the Shantung award as "an outrage this nation can never live long enough to wipe out," Governor Davis said that this award belied the American principle of protection for the weak and unarmed nations and created the family of 400,000,000 people who had heretofore always been protected by the United States as to an older brother for protection. He characterized the Japanese regime in Korea as murderous and parallel only inferior in the crimes committed in France and Belgium, and declared that the Shantung award gave over a great Chinese province to a regime of this character.

## SEES REACTION IN MORAL TONE

### Former President Taft Tells the Unitarians America Has Re- lapsed to Old Status

BALTIMORE, MD., (AP)—The moral tone, the sacrificial spirit of all the people which was distinctly elevated during the war, has suffered a reaction, declared former president, Wm. Howard Taft in his address as president of the Unitarian general conference here today. "And we are back again in the old region of the 'dollars' where progress to better things seems as slow as it was before this war."

"We should not be discouraged, however," Mr. Taft said. "It is the frailty of human nature. It is to be expected that there will be occasional long periods of its adherence to the highest ideals. Real progress in the world is through a course of action and reaction. This reaction will be corrected again by upward and upward movement, and we shall find the world better because of its sacrifices and the lessons they taught. We shall not make the mistake of saying that we stop here, but we shall step up and on. It is the duty of all those whose disappointment in the present stage of affairs is great, to buckle on their armor and to push toward better things, to take their places in the ranks of those who would stir the religious spirit of the community. We should preach as part of their lives the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man, and the willingness to sacrifice in order to preserve these great principles of unitarian christianity. Let us hope that this annual meeting will rouse the Unitarians of the country to a recollection of themselves in the faith which Channing preached and to living the life which Channing lived."

### CHEAP FEED NECESSARY FOR GROWING HEIFERS

#### Federal Dairy Division Tells of Better Methods for Growing Herds

The importance of providing cheap feed for growing heifers and practicing thorough culling is brought out by the results of feeding experiments recently completed by the dairy division of the United States department of agriculture. In these experiments groups of calves were fed from birth to 1 year and 2 years of age and a record was kept of all feed consumed.

In one experiment, 11 heifer calves were raised to the age of 1 year. The average amount of feed consumed by each calf was as follows: Hay, 571.8 pounds; grain, 856.5 pounds; silage, 3,033.3 pounds; milk, 110 pounds; skim milk, 2,414 pounds. Estimating the hay at \$30 per ton, grain at \$60, and silage at \$4 a ton, milk at 4 cents, and skim milk at 3.4 cents per pound, the cost of raising each heifer to one year of age was \$72.42.

Five of the calves from the first experiment were then fed for one more year. During this second year each calf consumed on the average 1,117.8 pounds of hay; 1,221.6 pounds of grain; 3,021 pounds of silage. Using the same prices for computing the value of the feeds consumed during this second year the total cost of raising a heifer from birth until two years of age was \$137.95. These figures emphasize the necessity of providing a cheap and cheap feed such as pasture and silage, and bring out the importance of carefully culling the heifers to avoid raising those which will prove to be inferior cows.

### DEPARTMENT TEACHERS ALIEN WOMEN COOKERY

#### Housekeepers of Foreign Birth Given Benefit U. S. Culinary Study

Many of the foreigners who come to these shores do not know how to make the best use of American foods. In their own land they have eaten a fairly well-balanced ration. In America, due to lack of knowledge of many of our foods, their diet is prone to be confined to a few articles and to be unvaried. The home-demonstration agents working under the supervision of the department of agriculture, and the state agricultural colleges are endeavoring to remedy this condition and to teach these people American methods of food selection and preparation.

St. Louis County, Minn., has many Finnish people who heretofore have eaten very few vegetables in the summer and practically none in the winter. The home-demonstration agent of the county spent much time last summer teaching the use of American fruit and vegetables to these people.

Many mistakes were made by them at first because of their lack of knowledge of certain vegetables and their uses. One Finnish gardener planted squash in a solid row through the center of his garden and was astonished and disgusted that the vines spread over most of his small garden. "Must wait until a cucumber is all yellow before I eat it," and "What part and how do you cook squash?" are typical questions the agent answered daily. Some Finnish communities have developed such a liking for American pickles that the home-demonstration agent has daily calls for directions for making them. The recipes are given if their recipients promise that only the oldest and proudest of the family eat them and that they learn how to prepare carrots and greens for the young children. In most cases they comply willingly.

At the county fair this fall a large number of foreign women—most just learned to can were induced to enter samples of their work. They were delighted at receiving a number of premiums. The Finnish women also made an exhibit of homemade soup and of food products peculiar to their country. This exhibit was given a prominent place, and the interest of the crowd caused the foreign women much pride and delight.

### NORTHWESTERN WHEAT SHOWS BETTER GRADE

#### Improvement is Shown in First Shipments from Seattle and Tacoma

Of the first thousand cars of new wheat received at Seattle and Tacoma this year, 36.8 per cent graded No. 1, as compared to 19.9 per cent of last year's receipts, the United States department of agriculture announces.

Of the new crop—White Club receipts 50.4 per cent graded No. 1, as compared to 26.6 per cent of the receipts of last year. Of the Hard Red Winter wheats, 56.8 per cent graded No. 1, while 34.3 per cent of the receipts of last year received a No. 1 grade.

The figures for Common White wheats show 11.6 per cent No. 1 this year as compared to 8.5 per cent for last year's crop. These figures were obtained from reports made by licensed inspectors to the Bureau of Markets of the department.

An increase is also shown in the percentage of the new crop grading No. 2, 46.1 per cent falling into this grade as compared to 39.2 per cent for last year. A large increase is shown in Common White wheats, while slight decreases are shown in wheats of the other classes. Combining the first two grades, the figures show 80.9 per cent graded No. 1 or better this year, as compared with 59.2 per cent of last year's receipts.

A general increase is noted in the average test weight per bushel of the various classes, and a marked decrease in the percentage of the crop carrying dockage. Slight dockage increase in the Common White and White Club wheats and decreased in the No. 1 wheats.

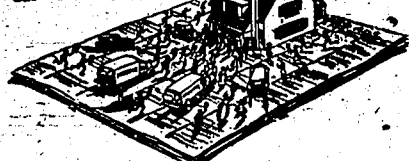

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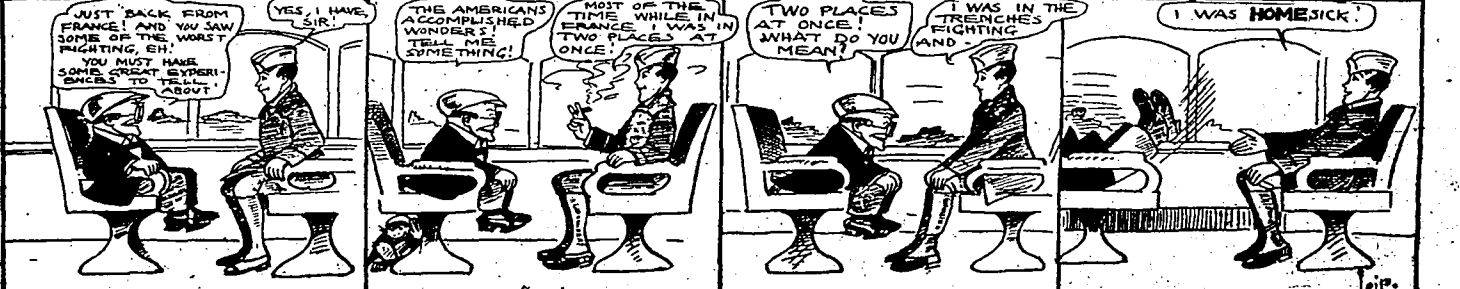
