

GERMAN'S VIEW OF THE FUTURE IS PESSIMISTIC

Director General of North German Lloyd Line Declares Destruction of Shipping Result of Peace Document

HAMBURG, (AP)—A very pessimistic view of the future of German seafaring drawn by Herr Heinekin, director general of the North German Lloyd, in the new year book of the line.

"Out of the destruction of the whole German economic situation as it is determined by the peace document, the destruction of Germany's shipping follows as a matter of course," he writes. As two of the chief losses sustained by German shipping, he cites the reduction of German territory and "the transfer of German railroads to foreign interests," so that, he says, the Rhine shipping in part, the Vistula shipping entirely, come under foreign control.

Loss of industries such as the potash works in Alsace, the textile factories and iron mines in Lorraine and Luxembourg, he declares, will be heavily felt by German shipping because these industries will direct their imports and exports via Antwerp or French harbors, and will be taken care of by Belgian or French firms, which makes it out of the question to use German ships. Herr Heinekin adds:

"Then there must be figured the huge material sacrifices that Germany has had burdened upon her by giving up all her overseas possessions and rights, by the provisions of the armistice by which she must make reparations, by the foreign prize-court verdicts, and finally by the clause that all German property abroad need be reckoned at the peace rate.

"Germany has been robbed of all its overseas facilities and shipping quarters abroad. When all privileges, advantages and concessions which Germany had in China have been annulled, when the German rights in Siam, Liberia, Morocco and Egypt have been declared void, when German property is liquidated in these countries, when finally the urgently necessary foreign news service is crippled by taking away the German cable, it is the German shipping that is the chief sufferer."

TO SUPPRESS SMUGGLING

Berlin Government Established Rhine Control to Combat Illicit Traffic

COBLENZ, (AP)—German newspapers announced recently that the Berlin government had established a so-called Rhine control designed to combat the wild smuggling in foodstuffs, which has been carried on for months all along the occupied territory border from the North Sea to Lake Geneva. The state police department, which is connected with the state commissioner for food, has opened an office in Frankfurt-on-Main, the chief entry point for foreign goods, and will seize all material coming in without proper authority. All food seized in this manner will be turned over to certain committees for proper distribution.

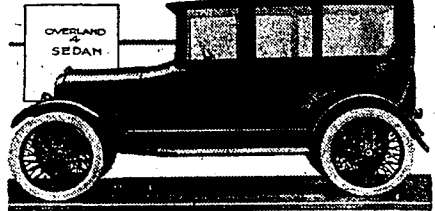
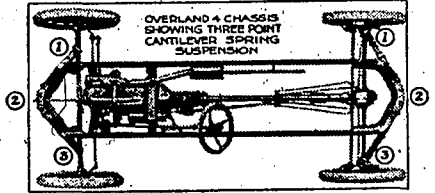
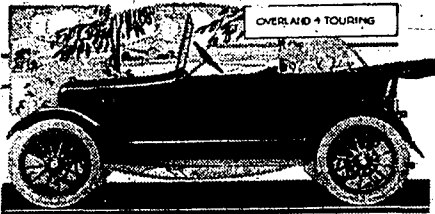

BUILDS "BAD ROAD" TO TEST NEW OVERLAND

Novel Course Constructed in Los Angeles to Demonstrate Capabilities of Overland 4

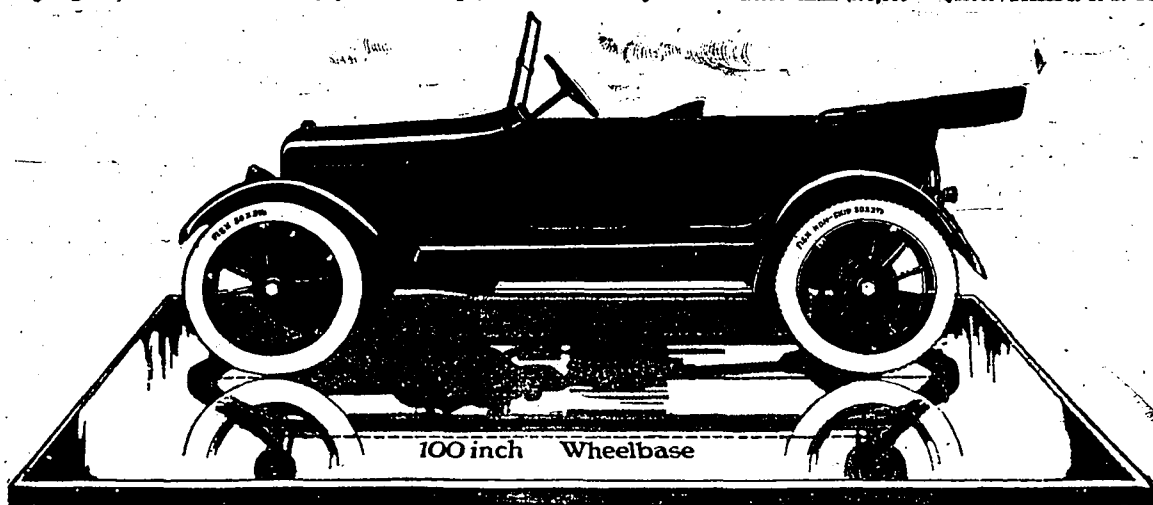

BERLIN, (AP)—The German train service has become so inadequate that it is common for everyone to travel second class because the train is sure to fill up half an hour before the time of departure, and those second class ticket holders who can find no places are then entitled to go into first class. The second class under those circumstances is better than first because it has just

six definite seats barred by arm rests, whereas in first class eight can squeeze into the room ordinarily meant for four.

The railroad authorities have introduced a system of arbitrary fines for the man who deliberately sits in a class above his ticket.

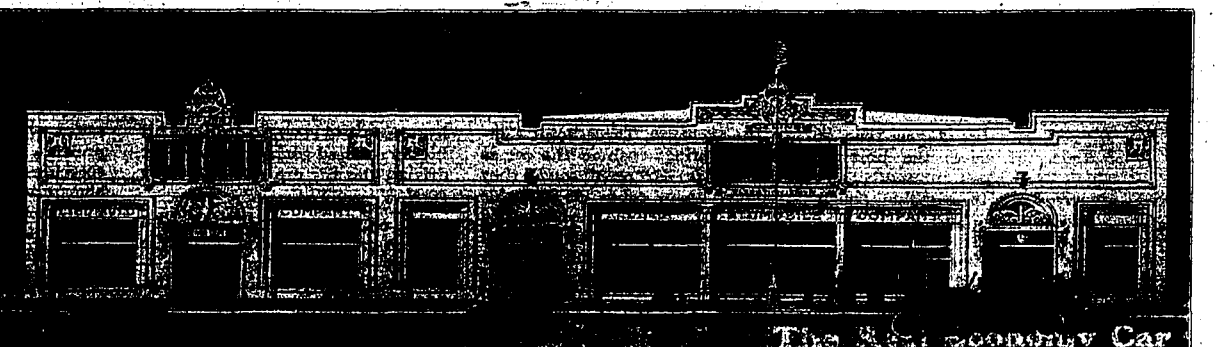

RECLAMATION SOCIETY SEEKING MORE MEMBERS

Major Reed Tells of Plans to Build Up Booster Association of Idaho

From a humble start last March with funds and no members The Idaho Reclamation association with Mr. Fred E. Reed its managing secretary, has developed into one of the strongest state booster societies in the west. It now numbers 13,000 members and has in its treasury an satisfactory balance as a working capital. The goal is 100,000 members next year.

Major Reed, who is in Twin Falls today in the interest of reclamation throughout the entire far west, announces that a big meeting of Idaho reclamation supporters will be called immediately after the beginning of the coming year for the purpose of agreeing upon a co-operative plan of action to bring about the irrigation of as much arid land in this state as can be put under the ditch.

In addition to boosting for further irrigation in Idaho while in Twin Falls, Major Reed is rounding up forces for the general meeting of reclamation representatives of 11 far western states. This meeting is to be held in Salt Lake November 31 and 22, the conference having been brought about through the efforts of Governor D. W. Davis of Idaho.

According to Major Reed a plan will be inaugurated at the Idaho reclamation meeting in January for the operation of every reclamation system in Idaho from the base of the Teton to the Oregon state lines. There are now 2,800,000 acres under water in this state, with a possible 5,000,000 more to be watered.

"We live in an age of big things," said Major Reed as he contemplated a map showing the arid tracts in southern Idaho, "and Idaho will come into its own." He added that it will cost approximately \$140,000,000 to complete the reclamation program in southern Idaho, but said that money will be well invested in the land reclaimed. He told of sufficient water in this section annually going to waste to irrigate 3,000,000 acres of land.

County Property to Be Assessed Near \$1,500,000

ASSESSMENT rolls, certified by the county auditor yesterday to the county treasurer, show a valuation of \$1,269,333.75 real property in Twin Falls county.

An estimate of assessable personal property in the county shows the mark at \$100,000, bringing the total to \$1,369,333.75. Last year personal and real property, taxable, was \$966,703.85.

City assessments expunged from the county rolls by order of the district court, amount to \$69,749.11. Including this in the county, both real and personal, would approximate \$1,464,000.
