

CALIFORNIA IS NEWEST VESSEL IN U. S. NAVY

Third Electrically Driven Super-dreadnaught is Added to the American Forces on Sea with Launching at Vallejo

VALLEJO, Cal. (AP)—The third electrically driven super-dreadnaught was added to the United States navy fleet today when the California was launched at the Mare Island navy yard here.

In the use of electricity as a means of propulsion, the new fighting ship follows the example set in the building of the New Mexico.

The California is expected to cost more than \$15,000,000 and will carry twelve 14-inch guns. Besides being electrically driven, the new warship will be electrically operated from guns to her potato-planting machine.

Occupant for Birth

As the great craft slid into the water she was cheered by Governor William D. Stephens, of California, his daughter, Mrs. Randolph T. Zano, who sponsored the war vessel and thousands of spectators. While her birth was still warm the keel of the great companion super-dreadnaught, the Montana was laid within it.

Designed by master minds sharpened by the urge of war, the California represents the ultimate in fighting fitness. Bulked alongside the fretwork of the ways where she had been pulled by tugs after the launching, the great vessel showed her beauty in the floating city that she is. All that has been learned in the war in regard to the fitting up of dreadnaughts has been put in this latest addition to the American navy.

Work Suspended Two Years

The California's keel was laid October 16, 1916, but during the war the men who fabricated her turned their tools to the knocking out of other and smaller warcraft designed to fight the submarine. For two years not a rivet was driven but upon the signing of the armistice the great hull again awakened, clanked and rang with life and it was hunted, beaten and turned into the mighty craft that was launched today.

In commission, the California will have a crew of 1,022 men and 55 officers, full complement. She has a length over all of 624 feet, a breadth of 96 feet and a draft of 47 1/2 feet. Her displacement at her mean draught of 30.4 feet would be 32,000 tons. She has an estimated speed of 21 knots an hour and a normal fuel capacity of 1,000 tons.

It is estimated that she is fully thirty per cent better protected than any other vessel in the United States navy, not excluding the New Mexico.

Turbines of 28,000 Horsepower

Her great turbines of 28,000 horsepower are the principal unit of the California's electric system. The guns will be fired by electricity. Her ventilation, steering, supplying of power to the drive shaft, launching, printing, ice-cream freezing, cake-making and dishwashing all will be electrically operated. Although this has brought her total cost to something in excess of \$15,000,000, a saving in fuel is expected quickly to offset this cost. Her hull alone cost \$7,800,000.

In armament the California will rank high. Besides her twelve 14-inch guns, she will carry four submerged torpedo tubes, 25 two-inch rapid fire guns, four six-pounders, two one-pounders, four three-inch anti-aircraft guns, one 3-inch landing gun and two 30-calibre machine guns. She will be a fitting example of the "last word" in battleship designing and fitting, and will be the first ship of her class to be turned out in a Pacific Coast shipyard.

The award for the California was made at the same time the Tennessee was contracted for. The Tennessee, built in an eastern shipyard, was to be a sister ship of the California, but she was launched before many of the improvements going into the California were reduced to the efficiency that they hold today.

BRITISH LABOR PARTY TO PRESS SCHOOL REFORMS

Representatives in Parliament Take Exception to Educational Act Provisions

LONDON, (AP)—The labor party intends to make educational reforms one of the problems to which its legislators will direct attention during the forthcoming session of parliament.

Some provisions of the education act of 1918 have roused opposition from labor representatives in the house of commons. Chief among these is authority given local officials to recognize "works schools" organized by private firms and conducted on the firm's premises which are approved in the act as offering "suitable and efficient part time instruction." These schools are designed for boys and girls between fourteen and sixteen years of age.

Labor party representatives object to the "works schools" on the ground that they may mean that instruction there "will be biased by the commercial interests of the firm conducting them." A demand is also made that instruction, as far as possible, shall be in the morning hours, it being contended that "it is useless to compel boys and girls to attend school when they are tired out by a day's work."

Labor party candidates are making their party's stand on this subject prominent among their campaign arguments.

TWO FOREST RESERVES IN IDAHO ARE UNITED

Thunder Mountain Region Set Aside by Federal Government to Be Joined with Payette District

ODDEN, Utah, (AP)—The Thunder Mountain forest region of Idaho, lying approximately 100 miles northeast of Boise, has been set aside as a national forest and will be joined with the Payette forest which borders it on the east and south, according to an announcement by forestry officials here.

The Thunder Mountain district comprises approximately 1,110,000 acres and is estimated to be less than one per cent of this is suitable for agricultural purposes. Vast mineral deposits are said to exist in the region and much of the land is suitable for grazing. Public opinion in Idaho, it is declared, unanimously favors placing this tract under government charge.

The region last fall was swept by serious forest fires, and during the last twelve years approximately 12,000,000 feet of timber have been burned as a result of them. There are no towns or villages in the whole Thunder Mountain area and it is expected the government will improve the trails and roads in the regions which are now reported in very bad shape.

BRITISH FREIGHT RATES TO BE BOOSTED 60 PER CENT

LONDON, (AP)—Freight rates in Great Britain will soon be increased by approximately fifty per cent, it is stated. Passenger rates were increased by a like percentage during the war and have remained at that level ever since.

USES CARGO OF COPRA AS FUEL IN EMERGENCY

Schooner Arrives in Honolulu Just Fifty-Eight Days After Leaving Samoa for Frisco

HONOLULU, T. H., (AP)—The three-masted schooner S. N. Castle, 58 days out from Apia, Samoa, with copra for San Francisco, came into this port recently using her cargo as fuel for the donkey engine which was fighting a junkage at the rate of 12 feet daily.

Aboard the Castle, besides her skipper, Captain Edward Anderson, were his captain's wife and 12 year old son Harry, two mates and a crew of seven.

Both officers and crew stated that had the donkey engine would have been unable to keep the craft from foundering. At it was, the fresh water had to be preserved for human consumption and salt water used in the boiler of the "donkey" that kept the life-saving pumps going.

Just ten months ago the Castle left San Francisco for Sydney, Australia. From Sydney to Apia she made a record run of 3,900 miles in 17 days. The boat already had been sprung and at Apia "sheeting" was nailed to the schooner's bottom, but shortly after leaving the Samoan port matters grew worse and the anxious trip to Honolulu dragged out to 58 days with the pumps working top speed.

ISLAND WEALTHY FROM RUM TRADE

Exports of Beverage from Martinique Reach Big Proportions During War

ST. PIERRE, Martinique, (AP)—The manufacture and sale of rum brought unusual prosperity to the little island of Martinique during the war. Hidden away among the West Indies this little French colony of 200,000 people, so small that it is found with difficulty on most maps of the world, sent its rum overseas to fight for the motherland while the folks at home prospered by raising sugar, coffee, cocoa and manufacturing rum.

This took place, too, during a period when prohibition was sweeping over America.

Not only did the exports of this beverage increase from approximately 4,000,000 gallons in 1913 to 5,800,000 gallons in 1917, a gain of more than 40 per cent, but the value of the exports increased from approximately \$2,285,000 in 1913 to \$9,935,000 in 1917, a gain of about 315 per cent.

STATE OF OKLAHOMA IS MAKING MONEY IN OIL

Profits Accruing to Commonwealth During Year Exceed Returns to Any Two Corporations

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., (AP)—The state of Oklahoma made more money on oil during the last fiscal year than any two oil companies in the state according to S. J. Shaw, secretary to the commissioners of the state land office.

Shaw recently compiled figures to show that from rentals, royalties and bonuses on oil from state school lands Oklahoma received a total of \$1,715,416.95 during the fiscal year just past. No two oil companies in the state can show like results, Mr. Shaw asserts.

Why Mexicans Know Americans Can and Will Fight

SOME of the members of congress from the border states are all "hot up" over the Mexican situation and say some forcible things in debate. Representative Hudspeth of Texas, a Democrat, made a speech the other day and said among other things, in connection with the Emerson resolution, which directs intervention.

"You may say it means war. I say it does not mean war. They have not forgotten, gentlemen, when Zachary Taylor went almost to the City of Mexico with 6,000 troops and whipped Santa Anna at Buena Vista. They have not forgotten when Gen. Winfield Scott visited Mexico and whipped Santa Anna at Chapultepec. Santa Anna had 25,000 troops and Scott had only 6,000. They have not forgotten that the 'gringos' can and will fight. They have not forgotten that Sam Houston and his 630 conskita cap and flintlock frontiersmen vanquished Santa Anna with 1,300 of picked troops at San Jacinto, where a union was born in the short space of 18 minutes. They have not forgotten the time when old Sam Houston rode his white horse, leading those unconquerable frontiersmen against Santa Anna at San Jacinto slung that love song, 'Come to the bowler I have sluded for thee.' When he put the fear of God into them with the miale balls from the muzzle of the flintlocks and the craven cowards, when they saw death approaching, fell upon their knees in front of Houston and his gallant frontiersmen and pleaded, 'me no fight, me no fight, where their hands at that time were red with the blood of the dead heroes of both places. No! They have not forgotten the Alamo, where Crockett died, where Fannin died, where Bowie died, where Travis drew his line and said, 'Every man who wants to die for the liberty of Texas come across this line,' and every man crossed. No; they know Americans will fight."

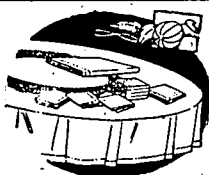

Action of the senate last night in respect to the treaty brings to a halt a debate on the most momentous problem that has confronted the nation since the issue that resulted in the civil war.

When the fight for Americanization of the treaty opened there was some justification for the belief that this struggle was against the preponderance of public opinion. Very many people were disposed to accept without question the word of one man as to the content of the compact.

It required no small degree of courage to stand in the face of this condition. It took a long time for many of us to see that the treaty cradled so great an iniquity as the unwarranted grant of the homes of 40,000,000 Chinese to Japan, or that American acceptance in good faith of all of the provisions of the covenant of the league of nations would bind this country to assist in maintenance of a status quo charged with dynamite.

The hope of the world is not blasted; and it must be generally apparent that the interests of all concerned are to be better served by American endorsement of a contract by which America can subscribe in good faith, with clear conscience and with full intention of carrying out its provisions in letter and in spirit, than could possibly result from an assent given reluctantly and under duress.

SENATE DEFERS PEACE WITH GERMANY

(Continued from Page One) lar officers who are in charge of the local end of international trade. A contrary view is held, however, by some of the senators who oppose ratification of the treaty. Notable in this connection is the stand taken by Senator Knox, republican, Pennsylvania, a former secretary of state, who holds that by the language of the treaty full commercial and diplomatic intercourse can be resumed with Germany by all of her former agents as soon as three countries ratify.

Cites Existing Trade... Various other senators have taken a similar view, and Senator Fall, republican, New Mexico, has declared repeatedly in the senate that the United States already is trading with Germany in the full sense of that term and that American assent might be in itself without overstepping international law.

There seems little prospect, however, that the state department will accept such a construction and officials say American trade will have to accommodate itself to the facilities of the Spanish agents in Germany until a state of peace has been defined directly between that country and the United States.

Figures with America's trade with Germany, New Mexico, has declared fully compiled, but during September the United States imported nearly \$2,000,000 worth of goods from that country and sent it goods valued at about \$8,000,000. For the nine months ending with September, the import trade totaled nearly \$3,000,000, and exports about \$3,000,000. This compared with previous exports of about \$25,000,000 for a nine-month period. A further increase was to be looked for in the figures for October.

Leave No Knotty Problems... The senate's failure to act left on the hands of the administration a big collection of knotty problems, chief among which is the question of property rights in the German ships and other property of enemy aliens seized by the government in this country. The state department expects any three or four weeks for retention of this property unless the treaty, which contains a provision legalizing it, is ratified.

There is every evidence, however, that the republican leaders in congress, anxious to get the country to an actual peace basis so that the many war time legislative provisions may be granted and a more normal legal foundation placed under the country's trade, are going ahead with their plan of declaring peace by resolution as soon as the new congress meets. A resolution making such a declaration was introduced last night by Republican senators and after three attempts to ratify the treaty had failed. Not only is it expected to start another bitter fight in the new session, but it is expected to start a bitter treaty controversy, but if it is passed the constitutional authority of congress to take such a step is sure to be questioned. In the opinion of some officials a situation will result which only the supreme court can untangle. The republicans claim that the sole

right of congress to declare war carries with it the right to declare peace. May Turn on Court Decision... It is that situation, many officials view a possibility that the president and congress may soon find themselves in a disagreement which will have to be thrown into the courts to be decided.

On such a question the courts would be without precedent and it is taken for granted that only a ruling from the highest tribunal in the land would be accepted as final.

Foremost of all the domestic problems waiting on some sort of peace declaration is prohibition. The hope of many appeared for an end of the war time act which begins to look almost equally inaccessibility.

War Powers Continue... But liquor is by no means the only consideration involved in the continuation of a technical state of war. Un-31 peace is declared formally the war time food and fuel control powers of the espionage act operates unimpaird.

No Military Effect... It was pointed out that the effect of the senate's failure to act would be of a negative character only with regard to the American troops in occupied portions of Germany. War department officials said it would mean no change in the present disposition which had been based entirely on the terms of the armistice and which did not depend in any respect on the terms of the treaty.

Although a large number of American soldiers have been sent to Coblenz with a view to their possible use ultimately to help police the Rhineland in Upper Silesia, Secretary Baker has announced that they will remain a part of the Coblenz garrison unless the senate, by ratifying the treaty, makes American participation in the plebiscite the executives are in full force, and strictly legal.

SIXTH STREET WEST: Beginning at the Southwest line of Main Avenue West thence Southwest a distance of 920 feet to the Northern line of Third Avenue West, width, 30 feet—west curb.

MINDOKA STREET: Beginning at the Southeast line of Third Street South thence Southeast a distance of 300 feet to a point where the Southwest line of alley in Block 147, extends, interests Mindoka Street, width 30 feet—west curb.

SECTION 2. The property to be included in said district and assessed as herein provided, shall include all the property fronting or abutting on, contiguous or tributary to the streets, avenues and alleys to be improved, and between the points hereinbefore specified, and to the distance back from such streets and alleys, if platted in blocks to the center of the block; if platted in lots to the center of the lots; and if not platted, to the distance of 125 feet.

City Engineer and the City Clerk, and the construction of a concrete curb along the side of the said portion of the said streets as hereinbefore specified where a concrete curb is not already constructed, extending the concrete curbs which are already constructed, along the said portion of the said streets downward where they are found to be not deep enough for the purpose of paving, except across roadways or intersecting streets. Said improvement is an original improvement.

Full plans and specifications for said proposed improvement to be filed in the office of the City Clerk of said City on or before the day on which the Mayor and Council will receive protests against making the said proposed improvements.

SECTION 4. The cost and expense of said proposed improvement shall be levied and assessed upon all property in said improvement district in proportion to the number of feet of such lands and lots fronting thereon, or abutting, contiguous or tributary thereon, or the space formed by the junction of two or more streets, or the space formed by the junction of a street and alley, or the space formed by the junction of alleys, or spaces opposite alleys, or where one main street terminates or crosses another main street, and also all necessary street crossings or crosswalks at corners and intersections of streets, and the expense of making and repairing sewers, shall not be included in said assessment but shall be paid by the City of Twin Falls. When work is done on one side of the street, on

one side of the center line, the property on that side only shall be assessed. The total cost and expense of said improvement, according to the estimate returned by the City Engineer, is the sum of Ninety-nine Thousand Two Hundred Fifty-three and Ninety-eight One Hundredths Dollars, (\$99,253.98), divided as follows:

Front footage of property owners \$31,411.24 Twin Falls intersections, 17,842.74 Total \$49,253.98

SECTION 5. The 1st day of December, 1919, at 8 o'clock P. M. is hereby designated as the date on which the Mayor and Council of said City, of Twin Falls will receive protests against the making of the said proposed improvement and all persons affected by the same are hereby notified to file their protests in writing with the City Clerk of said City, on or before or at the time of said meeting. Place where protests will be received and heard will be at the office of the City Clerk of said City.

SECTION 6. That the City Clerk be, and he is hereby ordered to forthwith cause publication of this ordinance to be made in the official newspaper of said City in at least two consecutive issues thereof, after which protests may be filed against the creation of said improvement district, as hereinbefore set forth.

The vote on straight ratification recorded only 48 for and 13 against.

WILSON WITHHOLDS STATEMENT

President Wilson will have no statement to make on the failure of the senate to ratify the peace treaty, it was said today at the White House.

Three Exhaust Time

Complete records today showed that only three senators, La Follette, republican, Wisconsin; Mcumber, republican, North Dakota; and Eshel, democrat, Tennessee, used the entire hour given each senator under the cloture rule which was applied to bring action on the treaty.

Rejects New Treaty Idea

The president has considered the possibility of negotiating a new treaty in the event of the rejection of the present treaty, administration officials said, but he virtually has rejected that alternative as impracticable and now probably will take up with the principal signatories what compromise reservations would be acceptable to them.

Senator Hitchcock said he expected the president, upon coming out of the congress, December 1, to withdraw the treaty and later re-submit it, possibly with suggestions for acceptable reservations.
