

OBERAMMERGAU FACES FAMINE

Crop Failures and Hard Winter Add to Sufferings of Pas- sion Players

OBERAMMERGAU, Bavaria, (P)—Crop failures and a hard winter have added to the war sufferings of the little group of villagers here known to the world as actors in the Passion play, portraying the crucifixion of Christ, which is presented every ten years.

Because of food restrictions imposed by the Bavarian government, it will not be possible to give the far-famed allegory next year, according to those who have taken leading roles, postponement being imperative until 1921.

E. Harvey Radlock, of Los Angeles, who brought Red Cross relief supplies from Vienna, found conditions bordering on starvation in some instances.

Anton Lang, familiar as Christus in the play, met Mr. Radlock at the trial Sunday last and together they visited the homes of many players who need of food and clothing was furnished, among others to Lang's own family, augmented by three since 1910, and also to the families of John W. Zinek, who assumed the role of Jesus Christ in the 1900 cast at St. John, and Otello Zenk and Annie Flunger, who represented the Virgin in former presentations.

Sweet chocolate for the children was furnished as a personal gift from Lieutenant Stockton, head of the American food commission in Austria.

Lieutenant Stockton learned of the severe conditions here when he visited the village last August to investigate a report that Lang had been killed in the war.

FORMER HUSBAND HELD AS WOMAN'S MURDERER

Issuance of Warrant for Joseph C. Virgo Follows Inquest in Case of Maude Tabor

LAWTON, Mich., (P)—A warrant charging murder was served Thursday at Paw Paw, where he has been confined for nearly ten days as a material witness in the investigation into the death of Maude Tabor.

Issuance of the warrant followed the inquest Wednesday at which Dr. A. S. Swarthin, University of Michigan pathologist, testified that the woman died as the result of hemorrhages during forced child birth.

Virgo, who admitted that he was married to Miss Tabor at La Grange, Ind., in 1915, declared that he had advised against an illegal operation and maintained that he knew nothing of how she came to her death.

Morris, the American minister to Japan, pointed out that everything possible had been done in this country to manifest good will toward the United States.

MARTENS NOT AGAINST COMMUNIST PRINCIPLES

Self-Styled Russian Soviet Ambassador is Recalled as a Witness

NEW YORK, (P)—Ludwig C. A. K. Martens, self-styled Russian soviet ambassador to the United States, recalled as a witness before the joint legislative committee investigating radical activities Thursday testified that Frank P. Walsh, former joint chairman of the national war labor board, had accepted a position as his counsel. Mr. Walsh did not appear at the hearing.

Martens was asked whether he favored the principles of the communist party of America. He replied that he was "not against those principles." He declared that he had nothing to do with the communist party in America and that his interest was solely in Russian politics. He expressed the opinion that the application of the principles of the Russian communist party would be good for the rest of the world, but refused to answer directly a question as to whether he favored their application in this country. He said he understood the principles of the Russian communist party and those of the American communist party were virtually identical.

TO DRILL NAVAL RESERVE

Navy Department Calls for Immediate Organization of Each District

WASHINGTON, (P)—Immediate organization of the inactive naval reserve force in each naval district, with provision for periodical drill and instruction, will be carried out by district commanders under instructions from the bureau of navigation announced Thursday at the navy department.

With each district organized into a brigade composed of battalions, divisions and sections located throughout the district, every effort will be made, it was said, to preserve and build up the efficiency of the organization recruited during the war.

ESTIMATES COTTON CROP

WASHINGTON, (P)—Total cotton production in the United States for the 1919-20 season will amount to 5,275,000,000 pounds, exclusive of lint, which is equivalent to 11,000,000 bales of 500 pounds gross weight, the department of agriculture announced Thursday in its final estimate of this year's crop.

ARMOUR AND COMPANY PLAN REORGANIZATION

Division of Interests into Separate Corporations Under Discussion

CHICAGO, (P)—Plans for re-organization of the various interests of Armour and company into a large number of separate corporations are under discussion, according to E. J. Dunham, vice president of the company. Mr. Dunham said that the plan had been under consideration for some time but he declined to give any details. He also declined to state whether the proposed segregation of the different properties was in accordance with orders from the attorney general's office in Washington.

According to reports in Chicago financial circles it is understood that some assurance has been given the Armour interests that if the segregative plans are carried out the government will feel that occasion for action against the company will disappear. Swift and company have already begun the division of its large business into smaller units. Whether the other large packers contemplate similar action could not be ascertained.

Of the \$100,000,000 common stock outstanding of Armour and company, 70 per cent is said to be held by J. Ogden Armour. The remainder of the stock is owned either by members of the Armour family or by men connected with the concern for many years.

BRITISH AMBASSADOR TO USE LEAVE OF ABSENCE

Viscount Grey to Go Back to England with Return Conditional

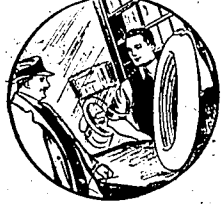
WASHINGTON, (P)—Viscount Grey of Falladen, British ambassador to the United States, notified Secretary Lansing Thursday that he was returning to England very soon on leave of absence.

Whether Lord Grey will return to Washington is dependent upon the possibility of his being able to arrange his private business interests and up on the decision of the British foreign office as to whether he alone can carry forward the great projects for common action by America and Great Britain in the re-organization of finances and commerce and international relations.

Lord Grey has been in America less than three months and expects to leave about the beginning of next year. Because of his personal interest in American affairs, Lord Grey desires to make another visit to America, in a private capacity if he does not return in an official status.

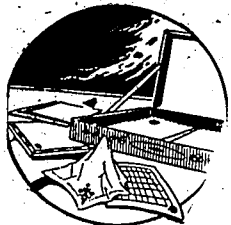

It is the direct result of the world war, for it is doubtful if Wilde ever would have crossed the water to mingle in the ring with American bantamweights were it not for the army created by mutual hate for world supremacy in which England and America, along with France and Italy, were interested.

There has been much harping in this country on the subject of boxing training. Service Boxing Boosts Sport

It was service boxing that started the ball rolling which resulted in Wilde coming to America. One may look back not a great many months to the time when Great Britain, France and America engaged in the international service championships at London to discover the cause for it was in that tournament that some of the greatest fighters in the world traded punches. Jimmy Wilde was one of them. He was mentioned in the final round by Moore of Memphis, one of the greatest bantam this country boasts, was a representative of the United States navy and it happened that these two clashed.

Pal Moore was in decision in three rounds over Wilde, whom the Britishers considered a world bunter if permitted to box this country. Wilde's opponents for the little flyweight from Portlifford in a Simon Pure flyweight, who lutties around 106 pounds. It was the great victory while many who saw it have protested that an injustice was done Moore in giving the verdict to Wilde, there is no way to change the referee's decision, and it must stand.

Those two bouts in which the principals were boys who fought for their country against Germany has had its effect, in an effort to give the sport to greatly help the glove sport all over the world, principally in America, where we go in for it stronger than in other countries in the world. It is discovered where Wilde stands, and there was created a desire for future mingling of the boxers of this country, Great Britain and France.

Always Danger of Knockout

What Wilde may accomplish in this country against the best of our bantams is problematical, but it really will make no difference if he is out-punched as long as he has won that he is a great fighter and there is plenty of evidence of that in his performance in London. Of course were he to be knocked out, it would give the impression that he is not up to the standard claimed for him by his brethren across the water, but there aren't many people who look for this to happen in ten-round bouts.

It is a good thing, this visit of Wilde, because it will be an incentive in the way of development of more sport boxers in other European countries. The chance is ahead for world championships and with many great foreign boxers in the game America might not find it quite so easy to keep its strangle hold on titles.

The organization of the International Sporting club of New York was effected with international matches in mind and a club of the greatest about go a long way toward boosting the glove-wielding game.

INSURGENTS STILL DEFY B. JOHNSON

President of American League Victim of Further Legal Action in Gotham

NEW YORK, (AP)—Retaliating for what it termed the "steam roller" tactics of Ban Johnson, president of the American League, and the club owners supporting him, the New York club of the American League yesterday started legal machinery in motion to oust Johnson from the league presidency.

A preliminary step, a telegram was despatched to Johnson in Chicago, advising him that it regards his contract with the league abrogated and forbids him to use the league funds for compensation.

The telegram follows: "In view of your repeated violations of the constitution of the league and your fiduciary obligations, including your actions directed to injury and punishment of the New York club, and in view of yesterday's action of board of directors advising to your claim of contract with American League and in view of yesterday's refusal of American League to elect a president, secretary or treasurer, the New York club regrets as abrogated, terminated and expired any contract of employment or for compensation which you claim to have between you and it or between you and the league, and forbids the use of any portion of the funds of the league in which it is interested in payment of any compensation to you under any such contract. We add that your claim of the existence of any such alleged contract is erroneous. "American League baseball club of New York."

In an effort to prove that it was the Johnson faction which prevented a reconciliation, Colonel T. L. Huston, half owner of the Yankees, and Harry Frazee, president of the Boston Americans, last night gave out the tentative agreement of compromise which they submitted to Frank Navin, president of the Detroit club, at a meeting held here last Sunday.

The agreement in short asked for the following terms:

A new board of directors to be elected to consist of five members from each faction, Comiskey of Chicago, Ruppert of New York, Mack of Philadelphia and Navin of Detroit.

President Johnson to have no vote as an ex-officio member of the board of directors.

Navin to agree to absent himself from any meeting of the board of directors of the league at the joint request of Ruppert, Frazee, and Comiskey, thus defeating a quorum, and making it impossible for either side to get the work of it.

The entire league to attend the meeting called in New York on December 10 and to acknowledge the right of the directors to call such meeting. The meeting to be of a routine nature, at the close of which the eight club owners were to meet in an informal meeting of conciliation to throat out the questions concerning the league and looking for a harmonious settlement. Johnson to attend such a meeting if he cared to.

All of the rulings of the board of directors to be recognized by the league, the Mays case to be considered, settled and dropped.

President Johnson of the American League, accompanied by James Dunn of Cleveland left here for Chicago this afternoon. Johnson had nothing to say on the baseball question.

In detailing his experiences Beckett said: "In busy fair times I have fought in one day as many as twenty contests of three rounds each, though, of course, they did not all last three rounds. My orders were to see that no challenger remained on his feet when time was called at the end of the third round, though many tried frantically to get the \$5 guaranteed to any who should do this."

BOYD HOSPITAL MODEL OF MODERN STRUCTURE AND EQUIPMENT IDEAS

Third Avenue Institution of Importance Has Sprung Out of Modest Building—Is De Luxe Throughout and Features the Highest Standards of Sanitation

Doubling the capacity of the institution on Third avenue west, nearly completed. Finishing touches depend now, upon arrival of materials and working conditions.
The third floor is devoted for the most part to the service of the nurse corps as a home. The department is furnished as sleeping and living quarters, housing all the graduate and prospective staff. In this section a library and parlor, with features for light amusements, is provided. The hospital has a class of 15 nurses in training at all times, the faculty conducting classes and schools five days in the week, with lectures by some member of the staff.
For the X-ray department Dr. Boyd plans entirely new equipment at the hospital, the old service to be removed to the down-town laboratory. All rooms in the new annex will be provided with bath and lavatory facilities. Most of the rooms in the old section are so equipped. Every room is to have telephone and call systems.
The Boyd hospital has grown to its present size and importance from a small one-room emergency ward established in 1905 in a typhoid crisis. The hospital was started in a saloon building down town, and served at that time to demonstrate the need of a regular hospital building. In 1907 Dr. Boyd acquired a site on Third avenue west and erected his first regularly equipped hospital in a building 30 by 100 feet, with 15 rooms. Since then four additions have been completed, giving the institution a building of 100 rooms. Particular attention has been paid to natural lighting of all rooms in the building, high windows being the rule in the basement, with broad and high windows on the upper floors. The medical and surgical staffs include experts in all lines of special work.

Valuable Plant
The sum of \$75,000 has been expended on the last annex and other installations, improvements, making the investment in the entire plant something like \$125,000. Fixed and movable equipment comprises de luxe furnishings and finishing, all manner of operating departments and auxiliary institutions, including a surgery section, baths of all sorts, from the tub to electric and steam. Throughout the hospital is equipped with the best systems of sanitation.
Remodeling and additional plans for the hospital have taken into account a heating plant designed to meet the most exact requirements in the most severe weather and seasons. The hot water heating plant has been greatly enlarged, and, in addition, an electric heating system has been installed, being connected with the laundry and other menial sections. The fruit storage room houses at the present time some 1000 crates of fruit. The sterilization ward is to be located in the basement.
On the main floor is an operating room for ear, eye, nose and throat cases, as well as a pathological laboratory and drug-room. The business office, too, is located on this floor.
On the second floor is found the general surgery section, with the instrument and sterilizing rooms in connection. Shower baths; too, are provided in connection with the operating department. The stock room, a part of

REFORM SCHOOL FILLED THROUGH CARELESSNESS OF BUSINESS MEN

Juvenile Officer Charges Merchants of State with Failure to Observe Precaution in Accepting Checks for Payment—Boys Find Path to Ready Money Easy Through Forgery

That businessmen of Idaho are largely responsible for the present crowded condition of the state industrial home in St. Anthony is the charge made by John R. Ault, Twin Falls county juvenile officer.

"In a year the population at the home has increased 50 per cent, and is still increasing," Mr. Ault declares. The juvenile executive returned yesterday from St. Anthony, to which place he consulted ten beds, both having been proven guilty of forging checks.

There are at present 313 boys and girls in the custody of the state for correction, Mr. Ault explains. The proportion is 103 boys and 50 girls. By far the greater number of males are in custody on account of forgery in the issuance of bank checks.

"This criminal instinct is being built up because of the knowledge that a great majority of the business men accept any sort of check in payment for merchandise, taking a chance on

the paper being worth its face value without taking the trouble to look it up," Mr. Ault declares.

"There must be a check put on this system which is making it easy for the youth of the state to become criminals."

The juvenile officer says in most instances checks are made out by boys ignorant of proscribed forms of writing checks, and says that even the least observant business man should be able to quickly detect forgery, or criminal intent in the greater number of presentations.

"The disposition to take a chance and let the law take corrective course is pretty near a rule among business men just now, and until proprietors of mercantile establishments conclude that they have a part of the responsibility in this matter we shall continue to fill the reformatory with young men who really are more the victims of a bad exchange system and carelessness on the part of merchants than of inherent criminal instincts," Mr. Ault avers.

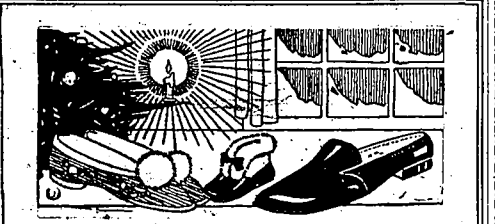
