## MEXICO ARGUES JENKINS CASE IN NEW ASPECT

Officials Refuse to Comment on Text of Reply Given Out in Associated Press Dispatches—Official Note Delayed

### ADMINISTRATION POLICY DRAWS FIRE FROM FALL

New Mexico Senator Declares Government Ultimatum Ends Up with Fourparler and the Abandonment of Stand

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Mexico's reply to the American note renewing the request for the release of consular agent Jenkins had not reached the state department early today and officials declined to comment on the text as given out in Associated Press dispatches last night from Mexico City.

Argues Status Changed  
The Carranza government now argues that the Jenkins case has taken on an entirely different aspect since the release of the consular agent and/or bail and expresses the hope that this case shall no longer disturb the good relations which it sincerely hopes exist between the American and Mexican people.

After Jenkins' release on \$500 bond furnished by J. Walter Hanson, without the consular agent's knowledge, officials here said there had been no change in the government's attitude. An investigation of the release of Jenkins was undertaken by the American embassy at Mexico City, but how far it has progressed has not been made known. Jenkins also has been making an inquiry.

Brings Quasi Comment  
The Mexican reply brought a caustic comment from Senator Fall, republican, New Mexico, chairman of the senate committee investigating Mexican affairs.

"This government has commenced with an ultimatum, and has ended up with a fourparler and with a final abandonment of its position," said the senator. Fall referred to the release of Jenkins as a "fourparler" and charged to Carranza and declared that the Mexican president knew the United States was thoroughly familiar with them.

"Carranza knew full well," he said, "that he was subjecting our possible inquiry, outrage and insult and that he was capitalizing his position by receiving such a large sum of money for the release of himself not only in Mexico, but through Latin America as the one man who dares to insult the United States itself and to receive personal insults with impunity to the president and other departments of the government of the United States."

## DENIES VALIDITY OF SPECIAL LAW

North Dakota Attorney General Stands on Constitution Against Legislature

BISMARCK, N. D., (AP)—House bill number 60 passed at the recent special session of the North Dakota legislature, and which would give immediate effect to every measure adopted at the session, is unconstitutional, according to an opinion by Attorney General William Langer, made public last night. The opinion was given at the request of Carl Kostelky, state auditor. The latter inquired as to whether section 67 of the state constitution providing that only acts receiving two-thirds majority vote in each house in emergency legislation and given immediate effect applied to regular as well as special sessions of the state assembly.

Required Vote Lacking  
The attorney general says the constitution applies to both special and regular sessions and that if this vote is received measures are not classed as emergency laws and would not become effective until July 15.

"The question presented by house bill number 60 is not real, but manufactured," says Mr. Langer's opinion. "It is an effort, without even a title of authority by legislature, to use the language never intended to, and completely change, the meaning of a constitutional provision."

## SUPERSTITIOUS EXPRESS WONDER AS OLD EARTH CONTINUES IT SEVEN WAY

Predictions of Cataclysm to Result when Planets Assume Unusual Configuration Prove Groundless; Weather Experts Seek in Vain for Solar Conspiracy to Produce Storms to Bring the World to Sudden End

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Experts who keep the weather under official surveillance for the government scanned the heavens and weather reports in vain today for any sign that an alleged solar conspiracy between the planets Neptune, Jupiter, et al, was about to produce storms which would bring the world to a sudden end. The best the weather men could do was to say the signs as they read them was that low pressure areas off the north Atlantic coast and in the far northwest had combined to bring weather disturbances generally throughout the country except along the southwestern border. The outlook for tonight and tomorrow, the official forecaster said, was for local snow showers in the Great Lakes region and fair weather elsewhere east of the Mississippi river.

### FOREGAST OCATSTOPHEE FOLLOWS MANY PREDICTIONS

NEW YORK, (AP)—Astrologism was expressed by the superstitious when the earth did not come to an end today. The ominous position of the planets had been well pressed and some astrologers and persons versed in witchcraft had maintained that at the present moment when the major leagues of the solar system formed themselves in a straight line, with Neptune, Saturn, Jupiter, Mars, Venus and Mercury together with the earth and Uranus on the other, the earth, which had moved four or five solar years to the front of the line, would behave like the one horse shay.

Scientists scoffed the idea but the superstitious ones recalled having lighted three cigarettes with one match or having walked under a ladder or having seen a black cat cross the path of the thousand and one other things known far and wide as omens of evil days.

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## WORLD NEWS EVENTS

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Because of the extreme fluctuations in the prevailing quotations for New York Exchange, Canada has suspended temporarily the issue in that country of money orders on the United States, the post office department announced today. The department was advised that the suspension was "for a short period, until conditions become somewhat more stable."

BERLIN, (AP)—Dr. Kahl W. W. Heine, Prussian minister of the interior, declared in the Prussian national assembly today: "We must reckon with the possibility of revolutionary risings this winter. We know how to deal with them."

LONDON, (AP)—The capture of Kiev and the occupation of Kupiansk, southeast of Kharkov, are claimed in a Bolshevik statement received from Moscow by wireless today.

LONDON, (AP)—The government was declared by Justice Sir John Sankey, of the King's bench division today to possess no power to prohibit the importation of certain goods, and that therefore its proclamation to this effect was invalid and illegal. The judgment is considered one of the most important ever rendered against the government. The case in which the decision was given, concerned the importation of pyroclastic acid from the United States which was seized on its arrival.

### REPORT OF MASSACRE OF BRITISH TROOPS DENIED

English Officials Declare Story of Persian Uprising is Bolshevik Propaganda

LONDON, (AP)—Official denial of the report circulated by the Russian Bolsheviks that hostile Persians had massacred British troops in Persia, was made by the war office today. The announcement stated that this report "has been reported to the war office without comment by the office commanding at Meshed three days after the alleged destruction of himself and his command. The dispatch from the Meshed commander was received at two o'clock this afternoon."

It is declared by officials here that the report was obviously Bolshevik propaganda in order to stir up trouble in the east, particularly in India.

### Whistles' Shrieks Remind Citizens of Ominous Forecast

Indianapolis Sirens Join in the Clamor of Early Morning Hours

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., (AP)—One long, wailing, shrieking whistle, then others less strident, finally practically all sirens in the city, mingled with the ringing of a small bell, broke the stillness of the early morning in Indianapolis today. This was followed by the continual jangling of telephone bells in a local telephone office. "I guess it's notice of the end of the world," said one woman tremulously. "The whistles are calling the people to church and I'm going."

### Ohio Farmer Secures Seat for World End

CLEVELAND, O., (AP)—Charles Johnson, sixty-five, farmer living at West Stelem was in Cleveland today with a reserved seat ticket so as to be in the front row when the world came to an end. After going to a house where the "beginning of the end" was to be staged and finding that no one there had even heard the end was at hand, Johnson complained to the police. "Two men came to me that Saturday and sold me a reserved seat for \$15," he said.

## WOMEN ENLIST IN PALMER WAR ON HIGH COSTS

Attorney General Launches a Plan for Fight Against Soaring Prices at Conference in Illinois

### URGES ORGANIZATION OF FAIR PRICE COMMITTEES

Declares Country Needs to Quit Fighting and Go to Work on Maximum Production; Calls Profiteer Devil

CHICAGO, (AP)—Attorney General A. Mitchell Palmer's plan for a fight against high living costs today was launched in Illinois. He outlined it yesterday to 400 state and city officials and representatives of women's clubs called here by Governor Frank O. Lowden. Today they returned home to put into practice that part of the campaign which will be carried on by the formation of fair price committees in every community and buying by women, who, Mr. Palmer said, represent 50 per cent of the nation's purchasing power.

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Favors Economy Meeting  
Holding of "conservation and economy meetings" in every community, use of influence by mayors and prosecutors to stabilize industrial conditions and remobilization of the "four minute men" to deliver "work and save" addresses in theaters each night were other steps advocated by Mr. Palmer.

Profiteers the attorney general termed "devils" and he warned the mayors and state attorneys to "go after them" with all the power in your command and hang them high as Haman before you get through with them.

The country needs to quit fighting and go to work on a maximum production," he said, adding that ten per cent more production would cut 20 per cent from present living costs and ten per cent reduction of buying of necessities would loop off another 20 per cent.

Mr. Palmer advocated men wearing their old clothes until present price drop. His platform for reduction of cost of necessities including congress enacting laws extending government control of food and food prices for six months after the present price reduction and passage of a law requiring growers, manufacturers and producers to stamp all necessities with the price they are charged for. He said that might know exactly the profit made on his purchase.

## PROSPECT FOR PEACE GLOOMY

Estonian Delegation Suspicious of Real Sentiment of Bolsheviks

DORPAT, (AP)—M. Pooka, the Estonian delegation member, in a statement on Tuesday to the conference of the Baltic states declared the Estonian delegation doubted the possibility of peace and was "suspicious of the real sentiment of the peace treaty in Russian government." If proposed adjournment until January 3, but M. Joffe, the Bolshevik representative, demurred.

It was finally agreed to await the arrival tomorrow of General Kobayev, of the soviet delegation, who accompanied M. Krasin to Moscow to consult with the government on pending postponement. Observers offered the opinion that if the conference was postponed it would mean the definite breaking up of the four parliaments. This belief is inspired by conjectures which represent France, planning a campaign against soviet Russia.

### Haywood Activities Cause Landis Wrath

CHICAGO, (AP)—Federal Judge K. M. Landis said today that there was nothing he could do to prevent William D. Haywood, I. W. W. propagandist, from speaking in Detroit next Sunday. The Detroit American Legion post asked him to take action in the matter.

"It is the outrage of the century that these men should be permitted to go around making speeches," Judge Landis added, referring to Haywood and his convicted associates, who are at liberty under bond.

## LABOR CHIEFS ARGUE FOR CONTINUED GOVERNMENT OPERATION OF RAILWAYS

President of American Federation of Labor, Representatives of Railroad Brotherhoods and Representatives of Some Farmer Organizations Protest Against Enactment of Cummins' Bill and Urge Author to Withdraw it from Consideration

### URGE TWO YEARS' ADDITIONAL TEST FOR DETERMINATION OF BEST POLICY

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Protesting against enactment of the Cummins' railroad bill, now before the senate, Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, and representatives of the railroad brotherhoods, together with spokesmen for some farmer organizations, today urged Chairman Cummins, of the senate interstate commerce committee to withdraw the measure and give government operation of the roads a thorough peace time test.

The brotherhood representatives announced that they planned to go to the White House during the day to urge President Wilson to use his influence against the passage of the bill.

Senator Cummins said he had no authority to withdraw the bill but expressed his intention of laying the request before the full committee.

Wants Two Years' Test  
Mr. Gompers declared that originally he wanted the government to retain control of the roads for two years "for the purpose of testing out the best method for their continued operation."

Referring to the anti-strike provision of the bill, Mr. Gompers said: "I do not know whether we are drifting and on that point I am apprehensive. This provision is filled with the gravest consequences. It will not stop strikes, but will make respected citizens lawbreakers."

The injunction against the coal miners, Mr. Gompers said, did not produce an ounce of coal. "Injunctions cannot make men work," he added, "and it is not to remember that if men can get justice in any way they will stop work, and laws which seek to prevent that cannot accomplish their purpose."

Senator Cummins replied that he fully agreed with the statement that people could not be made to work by injunction.

Claims Bill Not Understood  
George P. Hampton, managing director of the Farmers National council, said today that the bill was not understood by farmers and even senators and representatives did not understand the railroad bill. The senate, he said, would turn the roads back January 1. A two year test, he said, would be the farmers' wish, Hampton said.

Feed J. Chamberlain, head of the Washington state grange, asserted that federal operation of the railroads had failed to bring about a price reduction not loyal to the government, but to interests that desired to get back the roads. Four-fifths of the people of the country, he declared, were opposed to "crashing through" the Cummins bill.

Senate Continues Consideration  
The senate continued today consideration of the Cummins railroad bill, which is designed to meet the requirements of the railroads when they are returned to private control. Amendments were up for discussion and prospects for final action on the bill before the Christmas recess practically had vanished.

Senate Leaders who talked today with Director General Hines said he informed them that he had no information from President Wilson regarding disposition of the roads. Mr. Hines said there had been no indication that the president had changed his plan to return the roads by January 1.

Sparks for Stockholders  
When debate on the Cummins bill was resumed today, Senator Pomerene, democrat, Ohio, said congress must not enact laws that would depreciate the value of railway securities.

The senate's addition that interstate commerce commission reports showed that the majority shares of many big roads were in the hands of small holders.

Defending the guaranteed return provision of the bill, Senator Pomerene denied they would be excessive.

### TO OBIVATE CONCURRENCE

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Senate concurrence in sugar relief legislation as passed yesterday by the house, making conference on the bill unnecessary, will be urged by Senator McNary, republican, Oregon, he said today. The house measure proposes to suspend the duties on sugar trade and authorities seizure of refiners' stocks, in addition to continuing the sugar equalization board during 1920.

## GRAND JURY TO BEGIN PROBE IN COAL SITUATION

Reports for Investigation of Alleged Law Violations on the Part of Miners, Operators and Dealers During Strike

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., (AP)—Members of the special grand jury summoned by United States District Judge A. B. Anderson during the coal miners' strike today reported to the court to begin their investigation of alleged violation of anti-trust laws and the lever fuel control act by coal miners, operators and dealers. Several witnesses have been subpoenaed and it was stated, the inquiry will be pushed as rapidly as possible.

Determination to conduct the investigation came from charges that operators had entered a conspiracy to limit the production of coal and that they were joined in a similar conspiracy by some of the miners. Attorneys for the government have stated that the grand jury's investigation will not be confined to Indiana but will be nationwide in its scope. It was pointed out that in conspiracy cases witnesses may be summoned from any section of the country without regard to federal court districts.

Seeks Full Answer  
Judge Anderson's charge to the jury was significant in formulating the case. "Let your investigation in all these matters be thorough and searching and let your conclusions be a full answer to the investigation which has been opposed in the minds of our citizens for the past few weeks: That is, whether the United States government or a group of men shall rule this country, and whether it shall be governed by law or force."

Judge Anderson instructed the jury to investigate charges that the mine owners not only conspired among themselves to limit the production of coal but that they conspired with the miners themselves. Stress was laid on the failure of the miners' return to work while the strike calling the strike of miners was recinded by international officers of the union by direction of the court.

### OPERATORS' COMMITTEE TO ADJUST COMPLICATIONS

CLEVELAND, O., (AP)—The coal operators' scale committee of the central competitive field met here today to adjust complications resulting from a wage increase of 14 per cent to the miners.

The central field, which embraces Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and western Pennsylvania, acts as a unit in wage matters.

### HEAVY COPPER PURCHASES FOR EXPORT ARE REPORTED

NEW YORK, (AP)—Further heavy purchases of copper for exports were reported today. France, Germany and Japan being named as the principal buyers.

Bales so far this month make the total largest of any similar two weeks period this year, except in last July when the export movement got under way. The German buying, it was reported, is being financed by Dutch interests which indicates that the German manufacturers, probably will find their principal outlet for the furnished product in Holland.

Lack of co-operation by former service men was given by Mr. Chalmers as one of the reasons why 20,000 claims have not been settled. "Latterly thousands" of claims failed to furnish required information.

# AMERICA WOLF, MEXICO SHEEP, CABRERA AVERS

### Carranza Government Spokesman Finds Parallel in Fable for Existing International Situation

MEXICO CITY, (AP)—The United States-Mexican international situation has a parallel in the fable of the wolf and the sheep, in which the wolf at the head of a stream accuses the sheep below him of muddying the water, according to a statement issued last night by Luis Cabrera, secretary of the treasury and government spokesman.

#### Denies Charges

An emphatic denial is made by Senor Cabrera of charges contained in newspaper dispatches received in Mexico City that he is favoring the British at the expense of American interests. Branding charges of anti-Americanism made by the interventionist press as part of an international political scheme, Senor Cabrera declares them utterly false.

The statement makes specific mention of charges of favoritism to the British with regard to the return of the railways to their owners, oil concessions and cotton shipments; the proposed visit of Rafael Nieto, an ambassador to the minister of finance, to London; the visit to Mexico of Major Howard and Brig. Gen. Alfred C. Critchley of the Canadian air forces and their conferences with Norman King, the British consul general at Mexico City, together with an intimation which Senor Cabrera declares to be false that an attempt is being made to secure British support in the controversy with the United States over the killing and kidnaping of American citizens.

#### Press Misinterprets

The interventionist press, according to Senor Cabrera, misinterprets Mexico's resumption of relations with the European nations. He declares that during the war Mexico's international relations of necessity were concerned mainly with the United States, but that after the conclusion of peace a resumption of relations with other powers was a natural procedure, which should be regarded as an indication of confidence in the United States instead of a subject for unfounded conjectures that an anti-American motive inspires the move.

#### Tact Assumption

Senor Cabrera, likewise mentions the Monroe doctrine relative to "interventionist press" charges in connection with Mexico's European relations, asserting that the interventionists tacitly assume Latin-America south of Mexico as a United States sphere of expansion. General Critchley stated upon his arrival in Mexico City a week ago that he expected to stay about ten days later leaving for Chihuahua. Major Howard is a former resident of Mexico.

#### FRENCH AVIATOR MAKES SPEED

PARIS, (Havas Agency)—Sadi Lecointe, the French aviator, in an officially timed test today averaged 305 kilometres, 225 metres (about 189 miles 247 1/2 yards) in an hour, one time he attained a speed of 364 kilometres an hour.

# SAYS LAWS FOR SAFETY EVADED

### Borland Charges Railroads with Ignoring Requirements to Reduce Danger

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Evasion of laws to promote the safety of passengers and employees was charged to the railroads of the United States Tuesday by W. P. Borland, chief of the bureau of safety of the interstate commerce commission in his annual report.

In the case of the hours of service law, which prohibits train operatives from remaining on duty more than 16 hours except in extraordinary circumstances, Mr. Borland's report declared managing officers apparently had given their sanction to evasions "to such an extent as to defeat the purpose of the law." He charged that safety had been sacrificed to expediency.

Railroad companies were said to have paid "compensatory little attentions" to the maximum requirement of the law regarding safety appliances. They were said to have contented themselves with making the minimum which orders that 85 per cent of the cars in any train shall be equipped with power brakes, disregarding the maximum requirement that all cars be equipped must be connected and the brakes in operation. Hand brakes also were alleged to be still in use on some railroads for controlling trains on mountain grades, although the law specifies that trains must be controlled by power brakes.

On some roads employing the manual block signal system, it was said dangerous practices are followed and rules violated to such an extent as to render the block signal system entirely useless.

The investigation of accidents by this bureau has disclosed several cases of employees who although they had had sufficient first aid attention to perform service required by them.

# TALK PLANS FOR PEACE ARMY ORGANIZATIONS

### British and French Commands Eschew Question of Military Alliance

PARIS, (AP)—The French and British commands have discussed plans for peace time organization, according to the Matin. The newspaper foresees the maintenance of Marshal Petain French generalissimo at the disposition of the inter-allied council, over which Marshal Foch probably will preside. The discussions had nothing to do with the question of a military alliance with Belgium and Italy, the Matin asserts.

# WOULD BE ASSASSIN MAKES ATTACK ON GEN. OBREGON

AQUA PRIETA, Sonora, Mexico, (AP)—Private advices received here from Mexico City today were to the effect that an attempt was made last Thursday to take the life of General Alvaro Obregon, candidate for the presidency of the republic, after he had addressed a public gathering in one of the suburbs of the capital. The would-be assassin was jailed.

# LORD MAYOR'S SECRETARY IS FIXTURE IN OFFICE

### Principals Come and Go at the Rate of One a Year but Soulsby Stays On

LONDON, (AP)—Lord mayors of London come and go at the rate of one a year, but the lord mayor's private secretary, Sir William James Soulsby, remains in office. He was first appointed to that office in 1872 and he has just been reappointed for the forty-fifth time.

He is the one indispensable man on the lord mayor's staff. He knows just how everything should be done "according to precedent." And to follow that precedent in all things without a hair breadth's deviation is the chief duty of the lord mayor. It is Soulsby who tells him how to do it so as to avoid introducing an innovation which would be regarded as a blunder worse than a crime. For, he it knows, the code of etiquette by which the official conduct of the lord mayor is regulated is more rigid than that which obtains at Buckingham Palace.

Each successive lord mayor after his inauguration puts himself unreservedly in Soulsby's hands and the secretary sees him through. He is the power behind the throne, the man who pulls the strings on ceremonial occasions.

Foreign potentates who have been entertained by lord mayors from time to time have recognized Soulsby's capacity for running things smoothly. In consequence, besides being an English knight, he is a knight of more foreign orders. It is said, though he can count on both hands.

The lord mayor that has to get along without him will have a trying time of it. But it is reported that somebody is carefully understudying the secretary as he is able to passably fill the gap that must occur some time, for Soulsby is 68 years old.

# WASHINGTON FISH LAW STANDS BY COURT ACTION

WASHINGTON, (AP)—By refusal of the supreme court Monday to review appeals from the Washington supreme court, decisions of the latter court holding to be unconstitutional the state statute of 1917 prohibiting possession within the state during the closed season, except for personal use, of salmon caught beyond the three-mile limit outside the Columbia river, will stand. The lower court held the law, which is similar to one in Oregon to be an interference with interstate and foreign commerce.

# DECLARES PULP SUPPLY AMPLE FOR NEWSPAPERS

WASHINGTON, (AP)—In a statement Tuesday urging enactment of his bill for a government survey of pulp paper timber in the northwest, Senator Poindeexter, republican, Washington, declared it was believed this timber would supply enough pulp to end the present shortage of newspaper paper and supply all publishers for decades to come.

"If the pulp wood supply actually exists," Senator Poindeexter said, "the west will go far towards compelling eastern paper manufacturers to abandon their claims of acute scarcity and stop profiteering." He proposed appropriation of \$1,000,000 for the survey.

# AMERICAN BOATS BEAT NO ARMS FOR IRELAND

DUBLIN, (AP)—The Dublin papers report that the American ships Fontana and Franconia, and other American ships have been searched by detectives. The quarters of the crew were visited, and seamen questioned with a view to ascertaining whether they had any arms or ammunition. In no case were any arms found.

# ITALIAN OCCUPATION OF FIUME IS TRUSTEESHIP

### Ultimate Disposition Depends Upon Final Decision of Entente Powers

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Occupation of Fiume by Italian regular troops in accord with the agreement between the Italian government and Captain D'Annunzio will be merely in the nature of a trusteeship pending a final decision of the entente powers as to

its ultimate disposition, according to official dispatches received in Washington. The Italian government was said to be willing to take possession on those terms, resting confident that the strength of its claims to Fiume were recognized. M. Decoin wired Kearns that he was ready to guarantee him a quarter of a million francs and wished to know what percentage was desired. If he receives a satisfactory answer he will leave for Los Angeles immediately.

## NOT YET OILMONGER

Decoin's denunciation of his willingness to pay \$250,000 to have Jack Dempsey box Carpenter in France does not clinch the deal unless he also agrees to the condition that Dempsey shall have the privilege of taking a percentage of the profits, said Dempsey's manager, Jack Kearns, here last night.

## PARTIES UNITE IN EFFORT TO DEFEAT BERGER

### Milwaukee Socialist Ousted from Congress, Runs for Re-election Against Sturdy Opposition of Fusion Candidate

MILWAUKEE, Wis., (AP)—Victor L. Berger is the issue in the special election called for December 19 in the fifth congressional district of Wisconsin. The socialist leader, who was elected to the present congress but denied his seat following his conviction for violation of the espionage act, is again the nominee of every party. He is opposed by Henry H. Bodenshtab, a republican, whose candidacy is backed by the democratic organization and a local socialist known as "The Good Government League."

In Socialist Stronghold

The fifth district is looked upon as the socialist stronghold in Wisconsin. Berger carried it several years ago when he was elected to congress the first time, and again at the regular election in November, 1918. At the latter time he had a plurality of more than 5,000 votes, polling 17,920 against 12,450 for Carney, democrat, and 10,678 for Stafford, republican. Carney instituted the contest which resulted in Berger's loss of his seat.

Every Word Endorsed

Berger was the unanimous choice of a mass meeting called hurriedly because of lack of time for taking the usual party referendum. This Berger meeting approved his "every word" and writing." The platform on which Berger seeks reelection reiterates many of the socialist party principles and declares against prohibition, against "the impertinent presumption of any clique or party in the house of representatives to dictate whom the district is to elect as its representative" and against "meddling in the internal affairs of any foreign country—Russia, Germany and Mexico."

Conference Nominatees

Bodenshtab's candidacy was the outgrowth of a conference between representatives of the republican and democratic county committees and a delegation from the Good Government League.

Bodenshtab also has announced that he is against prohibition. The nub of his platform is the declaration "to keep inviolate the fundamental principles of our government, and stand opposed to every attempt to Bergeize and Bolshovize this country."

Uses Unique Arguments

Prior to the primary election, the socialists were more active than the

fusionists at least with regard to the holding of meetings. Berger was quoted in one of his speeches as having said that he hoped the soldiers would refuse to take the place of striking coal miners and declared that the former German emperor would not use "regular troops" to intimidate strikers. At another time he said "If this district is made up entirely of heroes thieves then a horse thief is its only true representative," in arguing for his own election.

Issue Is Bolshovism

Bodenshtab in outlining the issue of an organization meeting of one of the branches of the Good Government league, said:

"It is not true socialism that the fifth district is confronted with. It is something much worse. It is Bolshovism. The socialists whom Mr. Berger represents are a group of individuals who do nothing but stir up animosity against employer and employer against employee. Now they are trying to overthrow the accepted form of government of this country. Mr. Berger is trying to irritate old scores for his own benefit."

DEPORTATION

Viewed from any angle, deportation of undesirable material for American citizenship is but a makeshift method of dealing with the problem of radiating danger of pernicious radicalism in the United States.

Sent to soviet Russia these persons are likely to find an environment conducive to furtherance of their activities, and there is no region elsewhere upon which such contamination can be inflicted with justice.

This danger is recognized by the commissioner of immigration who declares in his annual report lately made public that deportation is not "punishment for crime" but merely allows the alien to change his field of activity.

The case against deportation is a strong one, but in the absence of any more satisfactory method of dealing with these "international outlaws" it must be exercised to the fullest extent.

Most students of the problem of the anarchist and the bolshevik agree that effective remedy in the long run must be preventative rather than punitive.

Argument, however, that existing economic conditions must be overturned to do away with the disposition to anarchy is to argue that the vast bulk of people now are either anarchists or fools and to assign to the latter category all who find any measure of content in existing conditions.

Damage Claims Heavy: Fifty per cent of "informal" contracts suspended by the armistice have been adjusted with damages to the war department.

Representative Graham attacked the method of sale by the war department of 100,000,000 pounds of surplus copper held during the armistice.

Charges Official Failure: "It is apparent," continues the report, "that certain officers and agents of the United States who were charged with direct responsibility in the matter failed to do the things they should have done to protect the interests of the government."

Porta, who is said to be an amateur astronomer, at present living just outside of Ann Arbor, predicted only in July, according to this information, that beginning about the middle of December and continuing until the middle of January there would be a series of terrific storms, earthquakes and volcanic eruptions.

President Harry B. Hutchins, of the University of Michigan, stated that Porta is not now well, and has been a member of the faculty at Michigan. "We have not been able to discover," said Dr. Hutchins, "that he was ever a student here."

PORTA SAYS PREDICTIONS GREATLY EXAGGERATED

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Professor Albert P. Porta, San Francisco meteorologist, from whose deductions on a planet configuration the prophecy of the world coming to an end today was made, in a letter, reported today by the prognosticators of the world's demise were greatly exaggerated.

The rotation of the sun, preventing a full view of the planetary phenomena on any one place of the earth's history for any considerable length of time would prevent likewise the formation of any sun spot that has been forecast.

Heavy electric-magnetic energies produced by the tension of the planets on the sun would produce a huge sun spot which in turn cause the cataclysms, but which event is prevented by the sun's rotation," Professor Porta said.

In previous statements Professor Porta had admitted the possibility of disturbances in and on the earth as a result of the "pull exerted by the lined-up planets."

# AWAY WITH WAR SOVIET SLOGAN IN NEGOTIATION

## Bolshevik Government Furnish Official Account of Peace Overtures with Baltic States at Dorpat

LONDON. (AP)—A soviet official account of the peace negotiations between the Baltic states and the Bolshevik government at Dorpat, received here by wireless says the Estonians insisted the proposal of M. Krasin, the Bolshevik minister of trade and commerce on December 6.

**Peace on Any Principles**  
The Krasin proposal, referred to in the soviet statement, said: "We desire a speedy and successful issue for our peace negotiations and declare ourselves in readiness to make the greatest possible concession and to maintain a peace upon any principles whatsoever."  
The Estonians, the account says, proposed to break off discussions until December 8 in order to consult their government.

**Demand Disarmament**  
Representatives of the Bolsheviks demanded the disarming of the soviet Russian army in Estonia and the forbidding of the presence of any troops in Estonia except the Estonian national army.  
The soviet plenipotentiaries also demanded prohibition against the entry by units of the northwest Russian army or other enemy organizations into the armies of Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania or Finland. They also insisted on prohibition of transportation through Estonia of any armed forces except those of the Estonian army, and the raising or mobilization of troops in Estonia or Finland by any organization or group springing to the role of the all-Russian government or the raising or mobilization of troops in Estonia or Finland by any organization or group springing to the role of the all-Russian government.

**Frontiers Secondary Consideration**  
At the meeting of the conference on December 9 the soviet account says, questions relative to frontiers were discussed but consideration was postponed temporarily in order to permit M. Krasin to proceed to Moscow to present the question to his government.

In the absence of M. Krasin the issues connected with the economic phase of the peace negotiations in the hands of M. Joffe, one of the soviet delegates, who is continuing negotiations.

**Lithvia Will Not Participate**  
The plenipotentiary of the Lithuanians is reported to have declared that Lithuania would participate in the negotiations with reference to economic questions and that the delegation would arrive at Dorpat shortly. Lithuania was said to have decided not to participate in any negotiations at which Bolshevik delegates were present in Estonia.  
The soviet delegates go to Dorpat only with the slogan "Away with war. Long live peace with the Bolsheviks!"

## POINDEXTER PROPOSES RAIL BILL AMENDMENT

### Washington Senator Seeks to Remove Possibility for Dis- crimination

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Opening the debate Tuesday on the Cummins railroad bill, Senator Poindexter, republican, Washington, clearly indicated his provision which would authorize the interstate commerce commission in special cases to permit a lower charge for a long haul than for a short haul in offering an amendment to the section, the Washington senator urged that the mandatory provision against lower rates for a long haul be removed.

"The object of my amendment is to remove discrimination and put all commodities on an equal footing in respect to freight rates," said Senator Poindexter.

## Uruguayan Minister Would Be Arbitrator

MEXICO CITY, (AP)—Gabriele Terra, the Uruguayan minister of foreign relations, has offered the services of his country as mediator in the difficulties between Mexican foreign relations departments here. Terra's Mexican charge d'affaires Enriquez at Montevideo.

## NATION UNPREPARED FOR PEACE IS HAYS' OPINION

### Declares Republican Party Offers Only Hope of Country's Salvation

DETROIT, Mich., (AP)—Maintaining that the nation is unprepared for peace as it was for war, National Chairman Will H. Hays, addressing the republicans at a central committee meeting here Tuesday, said he has no doubt that the republican party is the country's only salvation.

The strictest individual economy consistent with the proper development of the nation, Hays declared by the national chairman. "The special session of congress just closed saved the nation nearly a billion dollars and if nothing else had been accomplished by republican control except this," he said, "it would warrant an overwhelming victory next year."

Concerning legislation, Mr. Hays declared: "There must be strong federal regulation but not government ownership. Taxes which kill initiative must not be levied." He advocated a large inheritance tax adding that adequate taxes must be provided by careful legislation. "We do not propose, however," he said, "to continue in all the use of the war as an excuse for everything."

Legislation for the betterment of the laboring group, which he said, was the salvation of the country through the crises encountered, was promised by the national chairman. "Labor of this country is entitled to a fair share of the nation's wealth," he added. Mr. Hays closed with an appeal for the patriotism of Abraham Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt.

## DISEASE PREVALENT SAYS STATE OFFICER

### E. E. Laubaugh Warns Against Smallpox and Urges Pro- phylactic Measures

The following warning letter has been received in Twin Falls from E. E. Laubaugh, chief of the state bureau of public health, with respect to health conditions in Idaho:

"Smallpox has become quite prevalent throughout the state of Idaho. In fact, it is now raging in epidemic form. The return of the disease to various counties throughout the state over five hundred cases have been reported during October and November.

Since smallpox is one of the communicable diseases which is absolutely preventable much could be done for its eradication from the state by actively engaging in a campaign disseminating the knowledge of its contagiousness and the methods of prevention by vaccination and quarantine.

## DEMANDS INVESTIGATION OF SOVIET AMBASSADOR

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Investigation of the activities and status of Ludwig (C. A. K. Martov), styled "Russian soviet ambassador" to this country, who has headquarters in New York, was proposed in a resolution introduced Tuesday by Sen. Kenyon, republican, Iowa. It was referred to the foreign relations committee, which would make the inquiry.

WHEREAS, since the adoption of Ordinance No. 274, and as amended, enacted on December 2nd, 1919, Ordinance No. 281 declaring its intention to grade, pave, curb and surface certain streets and parts of streets and alleys within the City of Twin Falls, Idaho, and ordering therein a re-estimate of the cost and expense of such improvement, and does by this ordinance re-establish and to be in effect in Local Improvement District No. 37 in said city.

NOW, THEREFORE, Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Twin Falls, Idaho, as follows: SECTION 1. That here be, and hereby is, established within the City of Twin Falls, State of Idaho, Local Improvement District No. 37, consisting of the following streets, alleys and ways in said City as follows, to-wit:

Third Avenue North, one block, from Sherman Street to Street East, North 400 feet in length, 10 feet in width, making said proposed improvement 50 feet in width instead of 40 feet, as provided by Ordinance No. 250 1-2 of the City of Twin Falls, establishing Local Improvement District No. 34.

Third Avenue East, one block, from Sherman Street to Street East, 400 feet in length, 10 feet in width, making said proposed improvement 50 feet in width instead of 40 feet, as provided by Ordinance No. 250 1-2 of the City of Twin Falls, establishing Local Improvement District No. 34.

Kimberly Road, from Blue Lakes Boulevard to Second Street, South, East city limits, 1324 feet in length, 17 feet in width, making said proposed improvement 35 feet in width instead of 18 feet, as provided by Ordinance No. 250 1-2 of the City of Twin Falls, establishing Local Improvement District No. 34, With curb.

All the property within Local Improvement District No. 37 shall be assessed as aforesaid for the cost of said improvement herein ordered, except that the expense of the improvement in the space formed by the junction of two or more streets or avenues where one main street terminates in a main street, and also necessary street crossings or cross-ways at corners and intersections of streets or avenues and the expense of making and repaving sidewalks shall be included in said assessment, but shall be paid for by the City of Twin Falls.

Where any work or improvement, is done by virtue of this ordinance on one side of the center line of any street, the property on that side only shall be assessed.

SECTION 5. The said assessment roll prepared by said Street Committee shall contain, among other things, the names of the property owners affected by the proposed improvements, the description of each piece, lot or parcel of land, and the amount assessed against the same. On receiving the assessment roll, the City Clerk shall publish in three (3) successive publications in the official newspaper of said City of Twin Falls, that said assessment roll is on file in his office, and that any objections to the description of each piece, lot or parcel of land, and the amount assessed against the same, may be filed with the City Clerk within ten (10) days from the last publication provided herein file with the Clerk his objections in writing to said assessment.

The owner or owners of any property which is assessed in such assessment roll, whether named or not in such roll, may within ten (10) days from the last publication provided herein file with the Clerk his objections in writing to said assessment.

That all assessments heretofore specified shall be known as special assessments for improvements, and shall be levied and collected as special taxes in addition to the tax for general revenue purposes, to be placed on the tax roll for collection subject to the same penalties and collected in the same manner as other city taxes.

SECTION 7. That the Mayor and Council of the City of Twin Falls may in their discretion, provide for the payment of the expense of making the improvements herein ordered in installments by the issuance of improvement bonds of said district, said bonds to be in the name of the City of Twin Falls, and the annual payments at not to exceed seven per cent per annum interest and to be payable on or before ten years.

Such bonds may be issued in installments in excess of the contract price of the proposed improvements, except that the installment coupons shall include interest on such installments, and the interest thereon may, at the discretion of the Mayor and Council of the City of Twin Falls, be issued to the contractor, who shall receive therefor the full amount of the bonds, but not less than their par value net, and the proceeds thereof be paid to the contractor. The bonds shall be in such denominations as the Mayor and Council shall deem proper.

For the payment of installments on such bonds, the Mayor and Council of the City of Twin Falls are hereby authorized to levy annually special assessments against the specific property abutting, contiguous and tributary to the proposed improvements as heretofore provided, sufficient to redeem the installments of such bonds thereafter maturing, with interest thereon at not to exceed seven per cent per annum interest, until the date of the installment next thereafter maturing.

SECTION 8. The owner of any property chargeable by any special assessment hereinafter against his property, may redeem his property from such liability by paying the entire assessment due thereon, and by paying upon the City Clerk mailing him written or printed notice thirty days before the issuance of the bonds or after the issuance of the bonds, by paying all the installments of the assessments which have been levied, and also the amount of unlevied installments of the bonds, and the bonds shall be not to exceed seven per cent per annum from the date of the issuance of the said bonds to the time of maturity of the said installments.

The funds arising from all assessments levied for the redemption of such bonds shall be applied solely toward the redemption of said bonds.

SECTION 9. The bonds herein provided for shall have printed thereon the following to-wit: "The holder of this bond shall have no claim against the City of Twin Falls, Idaho, in any event, except the amount of the bond, and the assessments made for the improvement for which the same was issued, but his remedy in case of non-payment shall be confined to the enforcement of such assessment."

SECTION 10. The procedure for carrying out the provisions of this ordinance shall be governed by the provisions of Chapter 152 of the Compiled Laws of Idaho, entitled "General Powers of Municipal Corporations," and laws amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto.

The said Street Committee shall organize by the selection of a chairman, and their deliberations shall be governed by the rules governing the City Council.

Their meetings shall be called by the chairman and the City Clerk shall act as clerk of the committee, and shall keep a record of the proceedings.

SECTION 4. Said Street Committee shall ascertain the total cost of making said proposed improvements and make an examination of the same, and the said assessment shall be in accordance with and in proportion to the front footage abutting, contiguous or tributary to the streets and parts of streets to be improved and included in said improvement district, for said grading, paving, curbing and surface-draining, and for the payment of the benefits that would accrue to said property so assessed by reason of the proposed grading, paving, curbing, and surface-draining thereof.

Miss McGrath, of Public Health Department, Issues Interesting Report

Telling of an extensive and exceptionally vital work accomplished Miss McGrath, of Public Health Department, issues an interesting report.

SCHOOL INSPECTIONS

Seven hundred and ninety-nine room inspections of children for symptoms of disease were made.

Of the 308 children examined for physical defects 87 had apparently defective vision, 167 had apparently defective hearing, 113 had defective teeth, and 84 were found to be underweight.

Parents of these children were notified and to take definite and advised action for their child's, family physician or dentist.

A surprisingly large number of children were found to have been vaccinated and for proving that many parents are not only realizing that smallpox is a disgraceful disease but one entirely optional and of the ignorant. However, there are still some who prefer to suffer from this loathsome disease as is evidenced by a recent report of 230 cases in this county.

CLUBS VISITED

Six clubs have been attended and the work of this department outlined by the public health nurse.

Where possible the nurse has met with the school boards and advised of work done in these schools and to suggest ways and means of follow-up work.

HELPS PUPILS

In one large community because of such meeting the hot lunches at noon for the children are being introduced into the schools with the hope of decreasing the number of underweight children.

In other respects the school boards as well as teachers, parents and pupils have been most co-operative which is very encouraging.

With such splendid spirit, what can we not accomplish for our young people, the greatest asset a community can have?

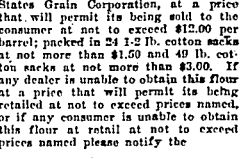
