SUGAR LEGISLATION IS DEALT ANOTHER SETBACK

Debate Prevents Advocates of Federal Control from Securing Vote

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Sugar legislation was dealt another setback in the senate Thursday when advocates of the bill to extend federal sugar control and licensing during 1920 were unable, because of protracted debate, to bring to a vote the house amendments broadening the powers proposed for the United States sugar equalization board.

Managers of the sugar bill planned to send it to conference and were doubtful of its enactment before the proposed holiday recess of congress. Senator Smoot, republican, Utah, presented oral trade statistics giving Cuban sugar quotations which indicated a falling market, but with a crop more than sufficient for American demands by February.

The sugar legislation, Senator Gay demurred, Louisiana, asserted, had sufficient Cuban quotations and would favor the sugar board to buy at falling prices if enacted. He also predicted normal conditions by February. Attorney General Palmer was asked in a resolution passed today by the house to report by what authority he fixed 17 and 18 cents as the price for the Louisiana sugar crop.

Representative Tankership, republican, Massachusetts, urged that the resolution, said living costs had increased \$340,000,000 because of this price fixing.

BUYERS TAKE ADVANTAGE OF VARYING MONEY VALUE
Purchasers of American Money Across Detroit River Making High Profits, Banker Says

DETROIT, (AP)—Buyers in Windsor, Ont., across the Detroit river from this city, American money are making high profits, according to a leading Windsor banker, who declares that 85 per cent of the approximately \$100 million in American money that flows from here is bought at a premium. A sign displayed in a Windsor store window this week reads: "American money bought here; highest prices paid here; American money actually sold here. Chartered banks less than a block away were taking all offerings at 8 per cent it was stated. Retail store dealers in Detroit are taking 7 per cent and many places refuse it entirely."

CONCAVE FILM SCREEN RELIEVES EYE STRAIN

Innovation that May Revolutionize Movies Tried Out in New York

NEW YORK, (AP)—A concave motion picture screen that may revolutionize the movies was tried out at a local theatre Thursday. It is said to give an effect of a third dimension, an appearance of thickness or depth that relieves eye strain. A group of scientists witnessed the experiment. Dr. Louis Foch, head of the faculty of medicine at the University of Montpellier, France, the inventor, supervised the exhibition. Dr. Foch ascribes the relief from eye strain to the fact that the eye fatigues normally when it sees things of three dimensions even if the appearance of the third dimension is an illusion. At the close of the demonstration Professor John J. Furia of the New York university department of physics, who has performed research on natural color and stereoscopic motion pictures declared "while fatigue is eliminated, the stereoscopic effect—the so-called third dimension in pictures—is no slight compared to that obtained from artistic lighting that is hardly worth talking into consideration. The Professor Foch explained that the screen is constructed of celluloid strips that, to avoid distortion, the curvature must be such that every point on the screen is equidistant from the projection machine. Professor Furia said that this principle was "the only scientific principle upon which a screen should be built."

Contrasting the flat to the concave screen, Professor Furia said the latter gave the correct focus at corners of the screen and eliminated curvature distortion. "These two improvements are especially noticeable from points of the theater close up and off the sides," he continued. "It is claimed by Professor Foch that approaching figures in the center of his screen appear slightly stereoscopic, whereas in the flat screen, we do not get this effect. This, he probably the chief cause of fatigue in the flat screen. The shorter the throw from the projection machine to the screen the greater is the superiority of this new contrivance over the old flat screen, so that small theaters probably would profit more than the larger."

LOOK TO SARDINIA FOR CORK

World Turning to That Island for Production of Material So Much in Demand. Cork has probably passed olive oil as the leading export of Sardinia, and Commercial Attaché A. P. Dennis states that recent production has been so stimulated that a large factory at Tempio is quadrupling its capacity. The bark is stripped from the tree once in nine years. At the Tempio factory the dried bark is first thoroughly steamed and then cut into piles about 30 days. When it is taken out covered with blue mold, and is carefully scraped on both sides and cut into widths varying according to the lengths of the cork stoppers desired. The strips are cut into cubes, a process requiring highly skilled labor, with much care in picking out defective pieces. The corks have been rounded and tapered by high-speed cutting machines, but a new, abrasion process is claimed to reduce the waste of this finishing from 20 to 30 per cent. Before the war the fine dust sold in Germany for unknown use for about \$20 a ton. At Terranova the cork is differently utilized, the best being baled in sheets for ship ment, while the inferior is coarsely ground and used with a magnesium surface for walls and floor coverings. The war demand was for cork trench mattresses, which were both light and afforded protection from cold and moisture.

Laid Color on Thickly. There were periods when even men rooked. In the eighteenth century little attempt was made to imitate nature's coloring. The ladies "laid it on thick" in round red spots, and seemed to apply it, as they did patches, to obtain a supposed decorative effect, and to simulate the blush of nature. The red and white they used, unlike the modern cosmetics, were actually poisonous, and there is record of more than one lady of quality who died from the effects of white lead.

Famous English Lotteries. It brought a shock to many Londoners when somebody informed them that Westminster bridge was built from the proceeds of a lottery. Then somebody dug up the fact that was back in 1733, parliament incorporated a lottery through which the beginnings were made toward establishing the British museum.

INTERNATIONAL POLICE FORCE DAVIES PROPOSAL

Member of Parliament Anticipates Most Objection to Plan from America. LONDON, (AP)—Creation of an international police force is suggested by David Davies, a member of the British parliament. He told the Grotius society that each nation should have a sufficient army to maintain internal order and furnish its quota when the league of nations required it; that no nation should employ a new weapon of war; and that each nation should provide the league of nations with an adequate force for immediate use. These units should be concentrated in different parts of the world and the naval portion similarly constituted. Voluntary war planes, submarines, heavy artillery and tanks should be ceded to the league to form the headquarters force and no state should be allowed to own them or to make use of any new invention for war-like purposes, he said. Major Davies said the greatest resistance to his suggestion probably now would be found in America "which was the more saddening because the president of the great republic was one of the earliest and most powerful exponents of the principles of the league."

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Additional funds for the use of the immigration bureau in keeping radicals out of the country were made available Thursday when the house adopted a senate resolution permitting the bureau to spend "as much as necessary" of the \$400,000 granted last October to the state department for its work in supervising the issuance of passports in foreign countries. The house agreed today to take up Saturday the immigration committee bill defining radicalism and making membership of aliens in the I. W. W. and kindred organizations a cause for deportation.

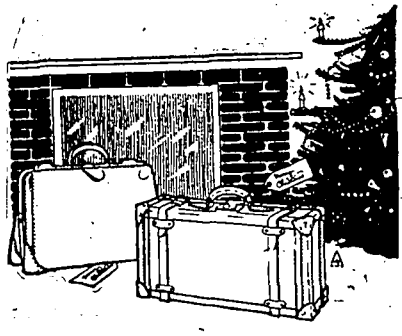

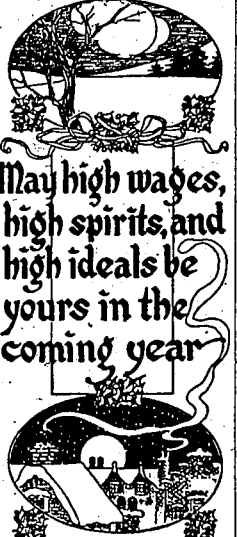

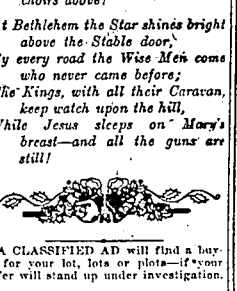

PAST GOOD RECORD HELP TO ROBERTSON

Army Service and Former Exemplary Behavior Considered by Sentencing Court

Babcock, presiding in the district court this morning, after pronouncing sentence against W. C. Robertson, ordered suspension on parole of probation pending good behavior. Robertson has been released from custody on a "ticket of leave" form.

Robertson was recently convicted in the district court of stealing wool, the property of Jose Hanguaco, a Three Creek country sheep raiser. He was sentenced to serve from 1 to 14 years in the penitentiary, that sentence being pronounced this morning.

Filed into court for sentence this morning, after conviction on the stealing of juries during the present term, were J. E. Henley, Cleo Bush, J. H. Swain and W. T. Fox. The latter four have been held guilty of bootlegging. In each case the court has sentenced to jail, with fines from \$100 to \$200 were imposed. Fox, Swain and Bush were each ordered to pay the highest sum as fines, while in the case of Henley a fine of \$100 was imposed. Henley and Bush had parole was granted in each case. Swain and Fox could not pay and were ordered to serve the entire sentence in the county jail, the fines to be served at a rate of \$2 per day. Fox appeared in court this morning at his own request and changed a former plea of not guilty to an admission of the charge preferred.

MAY SOON ABOLISH DISTRIBUTION PLAN

Movement Started to Lift Embargo Locally—Council to Be Invoked

Probabilities are that the municipal fuel distributing department will be abolished at or before the next session of the city council. A movement in this direction has already been started.

With the settlement of the miners' strike, and the resulting increased coal production there now seems little need for the local fuel administration, especially in view of the lifting of the extreme cold weather.

Twin Falls is now regularly in receipt of coal supplies more than sufficient to meet daily requirements, and dealers are able to make shipments to outside points. All retailers here report fair stocks on hand today. Calls at the fuel distribution office this morning were fewer than usual, suggesting that residents and merchantable people are fairly well supplied.
