DEPORTATION CLOSES 30 YEARS' ACTIVITIES OF ANARCHISTS IN AMERICA

Joint Career of Emma Goldman and Her Devoted Companion, Alexander Berkman, in United States is Ended with Sailing of Soviet Ark—Never Punished for Results of Teachings

NEW YORK, (AP)—The deportation of Emma Goldman and her devoted companion, Alexander Berkman, ends a joint career of 30 years in the United States during which they preached a doctrine of government by violence...

Berkman served fourteen years for shooting Henry Clay Frick and two years for urging young men to abstain from registering for the draft early in the war...

His anarchist activities as publisher of the anarchist organ, "Mother Earth" and "The Blast," supported the war combined with their addresses at anarchists' meetings, helped cause the assassination of President McKinley...

Their influence was traced in the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times, Matthew Schmidt and David Caplan, now in jail with others for their part in the 'Goldman case'...

They were suspected of receiving German money for propaganda work in the United States before the United States entered the war...

They were pioneer radicals in the United States. Now there are 60,000 Reds here and 472 distrustful foreign language newspapers, according to Attorney General Palmer...

When their co-workers, the Nihilists in Russia, whence they came in youth, evaded into the Bolshevik and formed a soviet government after the downfall of the monarchy...

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Children All Over America

Emma Goldman is 49 years old and Berkman 50. She was born in Kovno, Russia, and in early childhood removed with her parents to East Prussia...

In 1887, when he was 10, she was married in Rochester to Jacob A. Kerener, who came from Russia in 1882 and was naturalized two years later...

Her father came to the United States in 1868 one year after her arrival, and was naturalized at Rochester when his daughter was 24 years old...

Her association with Berkman began 30 years ago in New York. Other than that he is 50 years old and came from Russia he seems to have concealed his prior history pretty well...

CHARGES CAB DRIVERS EXPLOITERS OF GRIEF

French Newspaper Alleges Relatives of Soldiers who Fell at Front Victims of Profitors

PARIS, (AP)—Relatives of soldiers who fell at the battle front are being victimized by cab drivers, hotel men, dealers in coffins and grave diggers, according to L'Information. The newspaper says this "odious exploitation of grief is such that it cannot be passed over in silence."

It is charged the worst cases of exploitation occur in the Champagne and Somme regions where "unhappy pilgrims are charged from sixty to sixty-five francs for a six mile drive. It is said the carriage drivers, in agreement with the innkeepers, invariably manage to miss the last train out of these regions so that the mourners are compelled to stay all night. Coffins of the cheapest grade, it is said, are sold from 300 to 400 francs.

PLAN STUDY OF TONGUES OF THE BRITISH EMPIRE

LONDON, (AP)—The University of London is planning to build an institution of phonetics at a cost of \$600,000 where seventy assistants would be engaged in research work on the 1,000 languages of the British empire. The scheme, which originated with Daniel Jones, head of the phonetic department of the university calls for the expenditure of \$2,500,000.

It was purchased by Randolph Boreas for \$625 but the owner has insured it for \$10,000. Silkire owned a tavern near Clapham but died in 1723 at sea as a lieutenant aboard a naval vessel.

SAYS MAJORITY COULD COMMAND LARGER SALARY

Member of Parliament Tells Efficiency Club Most Healthy Men and Women Potential Earners of \$50,000 a Year

LONDON, (P)—Most healthy men and women are potential earners of \$10,000 a year, according to C. F. Higham, member of parliament. Mr. Higham recently told members of the efficiency club how to earn this big income.

"Ten thousand a year men never write asking for a position," he declared. "The secret of how to obtain large incomes is to get others to work out your ideas, to have the courage of your convictions, to be able to say 'yes' or 'no' on the instant and to stick to your decision. Men who can make up their own minds and make up other people's minds are so few that only these few get \$10,000 a year or more in business."

Opportunities are Made
Most men and women, he said, wait for opportunity to knock at the door and when it does they are usually too tired to get up. Opportunities are made. They rarely seek one out. If people want to earn \$10,000 they make up their minds to get it and let nothing stand in their way. If it is worth having it is worth fighting for.

Few \$10,000 a year men are really happy men, said the speaker. They have that terrible discontent that is never satisfied. The man who thinks he can earn \$10,000 a year should decide whether he really wants it. He will not get it if he does not make up his mind, and one day, when he gets it, he will probably regret it. A man should never envy the successful, but emulate them. He should show to his employers an infinite capacity for taking pains and be ready for any question or emergency.

Be An Optimist
"Be careful of your personal appearance," he proceeded, "look prosperous, act prosperous, be an optimist. Pessimists never get far. Be kind; that is

a great virtue. Be courteous. It is the cheapest thing in the world and being so easy to do most people don't do it. Never break your word. The business world is ever on the lookout for reliable men.

"Snack yourself from the job that does not make you happy to perform it. No man ever got on in life if he became the fete that placed him in 'that business.' You must take chances if you want big prizes. Have faith in yourself or no one else will. The world judges you by what you can and do—not by what you say you can do.

Greatest Business Task
"The greatest business task in the world," he concluded, "is the organization and development of the British Empire. Its managing director, David Lloyd George, considering his great capacity, energy, vision and decision, is the poorest paid managing director in the world. He needs a dozen \$10,000 a year men to help him. But the state also, limits his authority for paying for brains to a few thousand a year. His minister of labor, one of the most competent men in the kingdom, gets a paltry \$2,000 a year—a first class man on a third class income. The state must learn to pay its public servants better."

"Directors of great corporations need a new point of view also. Throughout the country directors getting fees of 500 pounds a year spend many wasted hours seeing how they can avoid paying a man \$10,000 a year to run the business while they waste \$10,000 a month for the shareholders while they debate the point. Directors of limited liability companies have still much to learn. And so has labor as a whole. "No man who works eight hours a day for a minimum wage will ever earn \$10,000 a year. The labor leaders are working day and night trying to get shorter hours for those who labor. And they are poorly paid for their work also. J. H. Thomas, president of the national union of railway men also is worth \$10,000 a year."

DEFENSE BRINGS CRISIS IN HOLLAND GOVERNMENT

Problematical Results of League of Nations Factor in the Situation

THE HAGUE, (P)—Post-war defense problems, closely allied with the problematical result of the formation of the league of nations have brought about what appears to be a crisis in the Dutch government.

Closely following the resignation of Jankeer Byleveld, minister of marine last week, Ailing Van Geussen, minister of war, announced his resignation Monday when the Dutch states general amended his war budget and greatly reduced the sums available for munitions.

Socialist members oppose the budget on the theory that the league of nations would end the necessity for large armaments.

COUNTERFEITS DAYLIGHT

British Inventor Perfects Device Surpassing Other Lighting Arrangements

LONDON, (P)—A light which far surpasses any existing arrangement of artificial light and is the closest approximation to actual daylight ever accomplished, is understood by the American chamber of commerce in London to have been perfected here.

The apparatus consists of a high power electric light bulb, fitted with a cup shaped opal reflector, the silvered inner side of which reflects the light against a parabol-shaped screen placed above the light. The screen is lined with small patches of different colors arranged according to a formula worked out by Mr. Sheringham, the inventor, and carefully tested and perfected in the Imperial College of Science and Technology.

The light thrown down from the screen is said to show colors almost as in full daylight.

COST OF LIVING INCREASES 300 TIMES UNDER COMMUNIST REGIME

BERWICK, Eng. (P)—The cost of living in Odessa is about 300 times more than before the war, says Mrs. Russell, sister of the local food controller, who has just returned from that Russian city. She lived there for two and one-half years.

A pair of boots, she says, cost from 2,000 to 3,000 rubles—a year's salary—and a dress was only to be had at a similar ruinous figure. In Odessa the day before she left the English pound was equivalent to 800 rubles in

stead of less than 10 as in previous days. "The Bolsheviks," she explained, "are Communists and the principle of the Communists is everything for themselves and nothing for the rest. The others they say have had their turn, and they treat them with ruthless cruelty. Life for the educated people is utterly impossible. Those who have money are fast eating into their capital; those who have not are dying of starvation. That is also an expensive business, for the cost of coffins has reached a prohibitive figure."

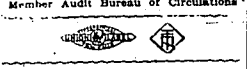

The one who is foremost in our thoughts at this time was pre-eminently a helper. From the hour ever since he swept his hand there came no pessimistic strain, no note of despair.

Religion, so-called, is responsible for a vast amount of mental misery. It has created many a mind, broken many a heart, driven countless thousands into the throes of despair...

CITY LEGISLATURE PROMULGATES PRECEDENT APLENTY AT SESSION

Municipal Board Speeds Through Business and Closing Meeting in Record Time—Street Widening is Ordered and City Cows are Ordered Tuberculin Tested—Veterinarian Wants Kennel License

Precedent was apilled all over the place at the hebdomadal session of the municipal legislature held on Monday's nocturnal period. No records were barred, and few old ones remained at the fish of the feast. It was as though the board of city selectmen were pledged to a new order of things in recognition and celebration of Christmas week. Anyway the thing was done up proper. In the first instance the prolix convention, marking other weekly conventions of the aldermanic board in the past few months, was well kept, although the meeting was marked by some measure of petitioning debate. In the second instance what business appeared was transacted in big time as far as the magnitude of importance connected with the business permitted "jiggling" in the issue. In the third instance the council board took definite action toward the establishing of a permanent business district improvement designed to give the city at least two blocks of wide roadway along one side of the hebdomadal session, thus eliminating controversy, and criticism over the alley appearance of Twin Falls streets at some future period when the city is to be made fifty feet wide instead of forty as at present. The extra width will be taken from the sidewalks, which, as the city council now stands, is in width thus giving the avenue fifteen feet of walk on either side of the driveway. The permanent ordinance will be ready for adoption at the next meeting. Engineering estimates fix the cost of this improvement at \$5,270. Protests will be heard January 6.

For Posterity In this connection the council passed an intentional ordinance ordering the widening of second-avenue north between Second street north and second street east, the roadway to be made fifty feet wide instead of forty as at present. The extra width will be taken from the sidewalks, which, as the city council now stands, is in width thus giving the avenue fifteen feet of walk on either side of the driveway. The permanent ordinance will be ready for adoption at the next meeting. Engineering estimates fix the cost of this improvement at \$5,270. Protests will be heard January 6.

The city ordinance, which, since the final disposal of the plan for taxing property, has assumed the place of importance as the board's bete noir of legislation, solemnly "sat in" again at the meeting of the legislature. The council decided that "cows is cows" is an ordinance is an ordinance, and that the law is maintained in a city barn is quite as subject to law and regulation if bossy is to function as a provider of lactical liquor for sale and consumption in the country. The law is maintained and provided for the purposes of the day. In other words the council decided that city maintained cows must be tested for tuberculosis and so be subject to the penalties or immunities provided by the law.

Talks of Hound Farm H. B. Groome, a home veterinarian, supplied the dogmatic portion of the legislative meeting. He wanted a modification of the dog ordinance permit him to establish kennels for the propagation of a certain race of canines in which he has a profound interest. This modification demanded contemplates a blanket license for a bunch of hounds instead of a single tax for each and every one. The law may be amended along these lines but nothing definite was done last night in this regard, although Dr. Groome made a lengthy, eloquent and language-filled plea for his purpose.

Writing in reply to city clerk's petition for appointment of A. W. Murray, city health inspector, as a deputy state health officer, J. K. Whitaker, state commissioner of public health, explains that the state law permits him to appoint only two state health deputies.

Mr. Murray get an appointment as co-operator with the county department of health, adding that if this plan does not work out satisfactorily in advising the state bureau of health and he (Mr. White) will consider the matter further. The letter was read into the minutes of last night's meeting. Charles Yarker, who does janitorial service about the municipal hall, has met up with the high cost of living, and wants more of the wherewithal to meet the growing demand upon his household purse. The janitor, in a petition to the municipal board, submitted last night, explains that his wage of \$12.50 per month is not sufficient alldimentary emolument for the service performed. "I must have the other \$2.50," he commands. The request is passing through the regular channel of consideration and may be allowed at the next session.

With the passing of the season's compliments the council adjourned its record of speed.

LONDON PRESS FAVORABLE TO IRISH MEASURE

Fair Consideration and Trial for Fourth Home Rule Bill is Urged in Face of Almost Certain Rejection

LONDON, (AP)—Aside from one or two irreconcilable anti-home rule journals, London newspapers this morning give, on the whole, a favorable reception to the government's new scheme for Irish self-government. None, however, expresses genuine expectation of the success of the plan. While it is recognized that such a bill which Premier George Lloyd outlined yesterday—the fourth home rule measure to be presented to parliament—will be absolutely rejected by a large section of the Irish people and regarded with suspicion and distrust by others, it is contended it deserved to be fairly considered and tried. The Daily News, perhaps the most thorough champion of home rule of the London newspapers and a severe critic of Premier Lloyd George and the coalition government, says: "The government will give Ireland a greater degree of autonomy since its sets up an Irish parliament and it manifestly contemplates the probability of a united Irish parliament. In the desperate situation in which Ireland now stands this offer so far as Englishmen can judge, should not be rejected out of hand, assuming it to be honestly put forward." "Belief that the bill offers the only possible way out of the Irish tangle is expressed by the Liberal Chronicle which says on the whole the measure appears generous.

Calls It Better Scheme The Daily Mail declares it to be a better scheme than any previous government has produced and an honest endeavor conceived with single aim of ministering to the good of Ireland while maintaining the unity of the British empire. Representing the extreme nationalist position, the Morning Post says: "It is a bad settlement—had failed Ireland because it does not settle the Irish question and had for Great Britain because it weakens the United Kingdom."

IRISH COMMENT GENERALLY UNFAVORABLE TO MEASURE DUBLIN, (AP)—In commenting upon the speech made by Premier Lloyd George in the house of commons yesterday during which the premier outlined the provisions of the proposed Irish home rule bill, the Freeman's Journal says Mr. Lloyd George "in the presence of the American ambassador but in the absence of every representative of the majority of the Irish people, explained to the house his panacea for the ills of Ireland." "Even the few Irish nationalist members who have survived the premier's past treacheries and betrayals abstained themselves," the newspaper continued. "They probably had a forecast that their gesture of contempt would be warmly approved by the whole Irish nation and race. As a matter of fact they were merely

obeying the command of their deal leader, given when he and they withdrew from the house upon the first declaration of the prime minister's intention to permanently partition their country.

The Irish Times says that for many reasons "some good, some bad, some wise and some mad", three quarters of the Irish people will reject the bill. "Its principle is hateful alike to the Unionists and Nationalists," the newspaper says.
